## Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 August 2007

The Trustees who are also directors of the company for the purpose of the Companies Act, are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

The information with respect to Trustees, directors, officers and advisors set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association applicable Accounting Standards in the United Kingdom and the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 1985

#### Status and administration

The School is a company limited by guarantee and having a share capital, incorporated on 12 September 1877 (company registration number 11701) and a charity registered with the Charity Commission (charity registration number 311736). The company's Memorandum and Articles of Association were last amended on 30 November 1995.

#### **Objects**

The principal object of the School is to provide the highest quality education to girls and boys aged 3-11 and to girls aged 11-18. To complement this aim, we involve the whole School community in the life of those around us and those less fortunate. Our ethos is to provide a well-rounded education to all pupils and with extensive pastoral care, allow each of them to achieve their full potential, academic and otherwise

#### Governance of the School

The School is governed by a Council of voluntary Trustees whose names are listed on page 1. With senior members of staff in attendance, there were five formal Council meetings in the year. These meetings were augmented by a number of seperate meeting s of the Finance Committee, comprising Trustees and senior members of staff, with defined Terms of Reference and which makes recommendations to the Council. Other frequent meetings were convened to econsider specific projects and strategies.

Trustees are selected and appointed by existing Trustees on personal recommendation. One-third of the Trustees retire annually and are eligible for re-appointment subject to a maximum term of office of 15 years.

New Trustees are inducted in a variety of ways and all Trustees are encouraged to attend seminars organised by the Association of Governing Bodies of Independent Schools and have access to information disseminated by other bodies in the independent schools sector and by our professional advisers. The induction process has been reviewed and updated to ensure its currency and relevance in light of recent changes to charity law.

The operation of the school is delegated to the professional staff led by the Headmistress

#### Strategy

The medium to long term strategy is to continue to maintain and improve facilities so that academic achievements and levels of pastoral care can be maximised. The success of this strategy is measured by the delivery of regular academic and pastoral reports that include detailed comments about overall examination results and individual achievements, in the arts, sports and the humanities. Key performance indicators are used to measure success against known benchmarks in the sector. Frequent newsletters summarise wider community activities including charitable works hosted events, visiting speakers, concerts, plays and other public benefits.

#### Financial review, developments and reserves

Our unrestricted operating deficit for the year to 31 August 2007 was £361,000, after charging depreciation of £79 000, giving a cash deficit of £282 000. We also created a modern cafeteria adjoining the very popular Beech. Room. This facility is already in wide use by many departments of the school and visitors, and has attracted very favourable comment for the way in which the original features have been blended in with modern finishes.

Generous donations from the Parent Association funded the purchase of many small but costly items to enhance the educational experience of our pupils

Of the Unrestricted Funds of £3 868,000 at 31 August 2007, £3,283,000 was accounted for by Fixed Assets and other unlisted investments

#### Risk management

The Trustees continue to review the major strategic, business and operational risks to which the School is exposed the main one being the ability to attract sufficient new pupils each year in the fierce Bristol market. Systems are in place to mitigate those risks and procedures have been implemented to minimise any potential impact on the School should any of those risks materialise. On a day to day basis the school employs a professional Health and Safety Advisor who also orchestrates regular departmental safety audits and produces reports on them The key control measures adopted by the charity include

Annual review of the risk identification matrix

Formal written policies maintained through a review programme

Enhanced Criminal Records Bureau checks are submitted for all members of staff and volunteer helpers

Comprehensive tactical and strategic planning management accounting and budgeting

#### Pupils' achievements

Examination results were once more a source of pride GCSE results were excellent, 66% of grades at A\*/A meant that locally only one school got better results. Seven girls were awarded certificates of excellence for their performance in the English Literature examination. A Level results were outstanding. The pass rate was 100% with 86% of all grades at A or B, so that the school was ranked in The Daily Telegraph's league tables as 99th nationally, ahead of all but two other local schools. Girls went on to a wide range of universities including Oxford and the Russell group universities, degree subjects include biology, French and Spanish, nursing, law, classics and medicine.

Excellent teaching continues to be a hall mark of the school, from the very earliest stages all teachers and assistants in the Foundation Stage have again achieved the Bristol standard and, with the help of a grant, the teachers visited our partner school in Beira, Mozambique The school continues to invest in the development of its staff, with training sessions taking place termly and covering a wider range of topics. A new post of Head of Learning Support has been created in order better to provide for children across the school and to provide individual support lessons for girls at secondary level. Evening classes are running for parents in Latin. French and Spanish, adding to the perception of the school as a community committed to on going learning.

The school remains true to its belief that education extends beyond the classroom. Trips have included ski-ing holidays in France and America, Junior school children going to PGL, a Classics department trip to Italy and an RS department trip to India, a sports tour to Canada, in the course of which the girls appeared on national TV, and numerous outings to places within easy reach, such as London, Cardiff and Bath

The school is proud of the various achievements of its pupils outside the formal classroom

- The Junior school again won a national mythology competition
- Junior school children won a 'Sports Superstars' competition run for local primary schools
- Again a girl in Yr9 was runner-up in the Bristol Young Chefs competition
- Yr 12 girls were part of the Engineers scheme, working with Airbus UK and earning a Gold Crest certificate
- Yr 9 girls won Bronze CREST awards in the Salter's chemistry competition and over the summer holiday two girls attended the Salters Chemistry Camp at the University of Bath
- The Sixth form enrichment programme has provided girls with the opportunity to develop their leadership, communication and business skills and to challenge themselves in a variety of activities
- An extension to the Upper school clubs programme gives the girls access to a whole range of activities including
  astronomy, business matters, chess and Japanese. The last week of the summer term '07 became an activities week
  for girls in Yrs 7-13, during which they had the opportunity to learn a whole new range of skills as staff drew on their
  personal interests to enrich the curriculum.
- Two Sixth form girls were named Best Cadet in the region in their Cadet corps, one Army and one Navy The latter is now in Officer training at Dartmouth
- Virtually all members of Year 10 are involved in the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh award and many members of Year 12 are working for Gold. Two girls in Yr 13 completed their Gold Award while still in school
- A number of girls are preparing for a World Challenge expedition to Kenya and Uganda planned for 2008
- The community service element of DoE and World Challenge reflect the school's ethos the school continues to raise considerable amounts of money for charities, local, national and international. A major concert in the Colston Hall in February 2007, mounted by joint choirs from the Junior department, Upper School and adult choral society raised £10,000 for the new Children's Hospice at Wraxall

We continue to be a top sports school in the city. In the course of the year we ran thirteen netball teams, eight hockey teams, eight swimming teams, five tennis squads, four teams for each of rounders, cross country and football and one rugby team. With the appointment in September 2007 of a specialist PE teacher as teacher in charge of Lower School sport, we expect to be running more junior teams in the future. We amassed 11 trophies at the Bristol Schools Primary and Secondary. Swimming Championships and the u10 u11,U13,U15 teams were unbeaten throughout the year. Several girls represented the County of Avon in a variety of sports including hockey, tennis, athletics, squash, badminton, sailing. Clifton High girls are County Tennis champions at U18 and U16 singles and, for the 3rd successive year running the 1st tennis team played at the Aberdare Cup National Finals and won the Plate Competition. Three girls were nationally ranked synchronized swimmers, 1 tennis player had a national ranking and 1 girl played for England rounders for the fourth year running. The recent hockey and netball tour to Canada was extremely successful and plans are being drawn up for another sports tour in July '09.

Creativity continues to flourish. At the end of the summer term Old Girl Cordelia Cembrovitz became artist in residence, running sculpture workshops for girls in Yr 11 and 12. Many of the pupils take Guildhall Drama examinations, achieving outstanding results in both solo and in group work. GCSE and A level Drama students presented many devised pieces in the course of the year and a Yr 9. Theatre in education drama project was a great success. In November 07 the school presents a Bollywood style version of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. The school continues to enrich the curriculum with visits to the theatre and art galleries, at primary level the visit of a storyteller and by a Mozambique poet and musician was much enjoyed by the children.

With the retirement of the Director of Music, music provision within the school has been restructured to create a Whole School music department. The junior music room has been moved into the Music block and the two Directors of music are working closely to ensure involvement of Junior children in major whole school events such as Rose Day and the concert in February. Many of the pupils from Yr 3 to Yr 13 children have taken AEB music examinations, a high number achieving merits or distinctions. Girls sing in the Bristol Schools Choir or perform with local orchestras. Within school, there have been numerous lunchtime concerts as well as evening concerts in school and at outside venues. A highlight was the concert in Colston Hall with performances of Polovstian Dances, Carmina Burana and pieces specially composed for the evening. A day's workshop and concert with the Royal Logistic Corps was a wonderful experience for the brass, percussion and wind players.

The Head of a local primary school visited the school recently and said that she felt what differentiates Clifton High School from other schools in the city is that, "You're not prissy – and you're very practical as well as ambitious in your approach" According to the Sixth Form girls it is thanks to this approach that the school produces confident, well rounded individuals of whom it can be proud

#### Public benefit

The School continues to have a broad engagement with the wider community, in Bristol and beyond

Within the education sector, we release staff to teach in a maintained school and to act as examiners and moderators in public examinations, we appoint Newly Qualified Teachers and take them through their statutory training period, and we provide school placements for student teachers. The School is used as a venue for training groups of Newly Qualified Teachers in the South West, for meetings of professionals involved with the introduction of the Foundation Stage and of teaching primary Latin, for at least three free lectures each year on the topics of interest to all teachers and others, and by the Association of Language Learning for social events and competitions. Representatives from the maintained sector and the local community are invited to, and do, attend these functions.

Also, when the School arranges outside specialists to speak as part of its In-service Training programme, representatives of the maintained sector are often invited

Our swimming pool is used by 25 community clubs and our rooms are hired or lent free of charge to a number of local clubs and other organisations such as Neighbourhood Watch. Occasionally, School equipment is lent to other charities free of charge. Whenever we can, we invite members of the local community, free of charge to school events such as plays or concerts. The School provides the venue for an adult community choir is rehearsal and performance, led by a staff member.

In 2006/07, we provided £137,000 in means-tested financial support to 27 pupils

Our partnership with the University of Bristol and the Avon County Lawn Tennis Association at Coombe Dingle has allowed the construction of a first-rate sports facility which is widely used by the local community on a routine basis as

well as on special occasions such as the Bristol Week of Sport We own a listed building which we maintain to a standard that has attracted favourable comment from many sources

We have a policy of using local suppliers as much as possible for the provision of dairy produce fruit and vegetables and meat which accounts for an average of 45% of all purchases of this type

#### Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees are required by law to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the School and of the surplus or deficit of the School as at the end of the financial year

The Trustees confirm that suitable accounting policies have been used and applied consistently and reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates have been made in the preparation of the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2007. The Trustees also confirm that applicable accounting standards have been followed and that the financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the School and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the School and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

So far as each of the Trustees is aware at the time the report is approved

# Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 August 2007

### 1. Principal accounting policies

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards in the United Kingdom and the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in March 2005. A summary of the principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently, are set out below.

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention modified by the revaluation of fixed asset listed investments

#### Donations, legacies and gifts in kind

Donations and legacies are credited to revenue on a receivable basis. Legacies are accounted for on receipt of correspondence from the personal representative indicating that payment of the legacy will be made. Gifts in kind are valued at a reasonable estimate of their value to the School. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

#### Fees and similar income

Fees receivable and charges for services and use of premises are accounted for in the period in which the service is provided

#### Composition fees

The School offers parents the opportunity to pay for up to seven years' tuition fees in advance in accordance with a written contract. The amount received is treated as a creditor. As School fees become due the fee for each School term is charged against the remaining balance and taken to income. Interest is allocated to the outstanding balance. Any residual shortfall or excess is charged or returned to the parents as appropriate.

#### Pupil deposits

Pupil deposits are deposits placed when pupils join the School that are offset against fees and disbursements due for the last term each pupil attends. All deposits are classified as creditors

#### Grants receivable

Grants receivable are credited to the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable

#### Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

#### Bursaries, grants and allowances payable

Grants bursaries and scholarships are included as expenditure in the period for which the award is given

#### Support costs

Support costs comprise the direct costs, including staff attributable to School activities

#### Irrecoverable VAT

Any irrecoverable VAT is charged to the statement of financial activities, or capitalised as part of the cost of the related asset, where appropriate

#### Recognition of liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when an obligation arises to transfer economic benefits as a result of past transactions or events

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the School and have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restritions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the School for particular purposes. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate fund

#### Pension costs

The School contributes to the Teachers' Pension Scheme at rates set by the Scheme Actuary and advised to the Trustees by the Scheme Administrator The School also contributes to a defined contribution scheme for non-teaching staff

#### Finance and operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight-line basis over the lease terms

#### Tangible fixed assets

#### Capitalisation and replacement

All assets are included at their purchase price together with any incidental expense of acquisition. Assets with a cost below £6,000 are not capitalised

#### Depreciation

Land is not depreciated. Depreciation of other assets is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of tangible fixed assets, less their estimated residual values, over the expected useful economic lives of the assets concerned. Assets in the course of construction are not depreciated until they are brought into use. The principal annual rates, applied on a straight-line basis are

#### 18. Pensions

#### **Teachers Pension Scheme**

The School participates in the Teachers' Pension Scheme (England and Wales) ("the Scheme"), for its teaching staff This is a multi-employer defined benefits pension scheme and it is not possible or appropriate to identify the assets and liabilities of the Scheme which are attributable to the School

The latest actuarial valuation of the Scheme by the Government Actuary issued in October 2006 relating to the period 1 April 2001 to 31 March 2004 revealed that the total liabilities of the Scheme (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) exceeded the value of the Scheme's assets (estimated future contributions together with the proceeds from the notional investments held at the valuation date) by 2 0%

From 1 January 2007, and as part of the cost-sharing agreement between employers' and teachers' representatives, the standard contribution has been assessed at 19 75%, with a supplementary contribution of 0 75% to balance the Scheme's assets and liabilities within 15 years as required by the regulations. This translates into an employer contribution rate of 14 1% and an employee contribution rate of 6 4% The cost-sharing agreement has also introduced effective for the first time from the 2008 valuation - a 14% cap on employer contributions

The pension charge for the year includes contributions payable to the scheme of £306,977 (2006 £298,864)

#### Other Pension Schemes

Certain non-academic employees are members of the Clifton High School Group Pension Scheme, which is a defined contribution insured fund, administered by a private pensions company to which contributions are paid as they become due

The total pension cost for the year was £24,362 (2006 £24,126)
