FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2007

The Council present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 December 2007

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, applicable law and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2000

Structure, governance and management

The Church of England Soldiers', Sailors' and Airmen's Clubs (short title CESSAC) is a Company limited by Guarantee and not having share capital, registered in England (Company No. 34118) and is a Registered Chanty (No. 226684) which does not trade for profit and is exempt from Corporation Tax. Its Memorandum and Articles of Association govern the charitable company, including the appointment and reappointment of its members of Council. CESSAC is VAT-registered. (No. 675.8276.83). CESSAC is a founder member of the Council for Voluntary Welfare Work, an MOD recognised umbrella group for Christian charities supporting the Armed Forces at home and abroad.

Trustees are initially recruited through personal contacts and advertisements. Interested individuals are then invited to an informal meeting with the Chairman and Vice Chairman. This is followed by a brief from the General Secretary on CESSAC's activities and then an invitation to attend the next Council meeting as an observer. Following this a formal invitation to join the Council is made if both they and the Council wish to continue. New trustees are co-opted until formal election is proposed to the members at the next AGM.

None of the Council has any beneficial interest in the company. All of the Council are members of the company and guarantee to contribute £1 in the event of a winding up.

The directors of the company are its trustees for the purpose of charity legislation and throughout this report are referred to collectively as the Council. The charity is governed by the Council, which meets twice a year. The Council is assisted in its day-to-day management responsibilities by the General Secretary.

CESSAC shares its Head Office with a sister organisation, CESSA Housing Association Both have their own Boards of Trustees and operate independently

The Council have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks

COUNCIL MEMBERS' REPORT (CONTINUED)

Objectives and activities

CESSAC's objectives are the operation of centres in military bases in support of the Armed Forces and the provision and management of sheltered housing for elderly ex-services people, their spouses, widows, widowers and immediate relatives

Cyprus Centres

The acquisition of the former YWCA Centre at Akrotiri in 2006 has helped to generate an increased level of incoming resources of approximately £500k during 2007. Whilst there has been considerable capital outlay on improving the décor and furnishings of the Cafeteria and the layout, fixtures and fittings of the shop at Akrotiri indications are that the money has been well spent and both facilities are likely to deliver good results in 2008. Troop movements or rather lack of service people and their families in Episkopi have been reflected in the lower turnover there but Dhekelia has sustained its growth throughout the year.

UK Centres

All three centres have continued to face the implications of new MOD contractors being appointed to provide the on-site catering and amenity facilities. However CESSAC has been allowed to remain and operate and the licences to run mobile sandwich rounds have not as yet been withdrawn because of the high quality of our service and customer insistence that the quality level must not be compromised. The provision of lunch buffet services has continued to expand and the feedback from customers has been consistently favourable.

Sheltered Housing

CESSAC owns 14 flats at Glamis Court where a further 40 flats belong to CESSA Housing Association Following Charity Commission agreement the CESSAC Council has decided to transfer the 14 flats to CESSA Housing Association on 1 January 2008 CESSAC continues to manage a further 96 sheltered flats on behalf of Greenwich Hospital, a Crown charitable trust, for a fee on a five-year contract (which is due for review in September 2008), although as two like-minded charitable bodies operating together, this fee is well below current commercial rates

Achievements and performance

CESSAC's primary aim is to provide a service through its UK and Cyprus shops and cafes for military personnel, as well as their dependants in Cyprus. It is useful to measure this in terms of their combined turnover for the year which defines the use being made of them. It has increased year on year since 2000 from £658 491 at that time to the 2007 figure of £2,455,254, an increase of 270% although this does not take account of the effect of inflation.

Financial review

The overall loss for the year of £52,974 results from the Council's intention to spend more of the Charity's income from investment. To achieve this a total of £99,384 in grants were made including donations of £30,000 to the "Help the Heroes" charity and £55,617 to remodel two studio flats in CESSAC House. In activity terms gains on investments and exchange have generated an overall surplus of £164,268.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The Council considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

Asset cover for funds

The charity has no restricted funds and therefore no analysis of funds is given in the notes

1 Accounting policies

11 Basis of preparation

The accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention modified to include the revaluation of certain fixed assets

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2000

12 Incoming resources

Income from charitable trading activities principally represents retail sales and other income in CESSAC's Services Centre in Cyprus and at CESSAC Centres in Blandford Camp, HQ Land Command, Wilton and 14 Regiment Royal Artillery, Larkhill with other operating income arising from sheltered lettings and income fees for managing sheltered lettings, owned by other charitable bodies, for ex-members of HM Forces and their spouses

1,3 Resources expended

Expenditure, which is charged on an accruals basis, is allocated between -

- expenditure incurred directly to the fulfilment of the Charity's objectives (direct charitable)
- expenditure incurred directly in providing sheltered housing for the elderly (sheltered housing)
- expenditure incurred directly in the effort to raise voluntary contributions (fundraising and publicity)
- expenditure incurred in supporting the charitable activities and in the governance of the charity
- expenditure incurred in funding grants and donations

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows.

Freehold land is not depreciated

Freehold buildings Leasehold property 2% straight line basis over life of the lease

(Cyprus improvements 10% straight line)

Furniture, fittings & equipment

Motor vehicles

10% straight line basis 25% straight line basis

1.5 Investments

Investments are included at market value. The cost of quoted investments is shown by way of a note investment income received and accrued, including income tax recoverable, is taken to the credit of the income and expenditure account. Net gains and losses arising on revaluations and disposals during the year are included in the statement of financial activities.

16 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value

17 Pensions

The charity operates a defined contributions pension scheme. Contributions are charged in the accounts as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

1 Accounting Policies

(continued)

18 Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are included in net outgoing resources

19 Taxation

CESSAC is a registered charity and is not subject to taxation on income. Any income tax recovered on investment income and covenanted subscriptions is included with the respective income.

1 10 Reserves

Reserves have been established as follows

- a A Short Term Tactical Reserve, which will include 3 months of typical expenditure by CESSAC UK, CESSAC Cyprus plus the Maintenance Reserve. This is to cover any short-term setbacks, cash flow difficulties or unexpected, large maintenance demands.
- b A Medium Term Opportunistic Reserve that will allow CESSAC to evolve and take advantage of strategic opportunities
- c A Long Term Reserve to generate working income and growth to maintain its value. CESSAC UK Centres have difficulty in breaking even and this provides no incoming resources for donations and other expenses. This has absorbed the former Housing Reserve, should it ever be required for a new development. Current trends, however, indicate a declining demand for sheltered housing.

Designated Maintenance Reserve (part of the Short Term Tactical Reserve)

All properties are maintained in good condition by a planned programme of repair and maintenance External and internal redecoration is planned to take place every 3 to 5 years. Flats are redecorated and refurbished on a 5 years' rolling programme.

This programme, and the experience of the last 10 years, allows the Company to operate without a committed provision for future repairs and maintenance. Actual costs incurred are normally charged to the income & expenditure account.

However, the Company's prudent policy is to operate a Designated Maintenance Reserve to cover any future modernisation and major repair programmes

Designated Housing Reserve (now part of the Long Term Reserve)

This reserve is designated for the purchase of any suitable, freehold building land (of the required size and in the required location at the right price) that may come available
