TO BE HELD AT THE ELWICK CLUB, CHURCH ROAD, ASHFORD, KENT ON
THURSDAY APRIL 17TH 1997 AT 8.00p.m.

PRESIDENT Mr J. Coultrip has been our President for the year.

MEMBERSHIP

Two new flocks were registered during the year; one flock was dispersed and sold by auction. Two members gave up keeping Romney sheep, but are still on our 'other members' list. There are now 53 flock owning members. Some are more active in pedigree breeding than others, but all play their part.

We have 53 other members. We could do with more members. The Society is not just a ram breeders' club. Commercial flock masters and other ancillary businesses who rely on the prosperity of Romneys all benefit from the high profile image we try to create for the breed. Their annual subscription is still only £15. We really need all the support (and subscriptions!) we can get at the moment.

COUNCIL

Mr Andrew Barr was elected Chairman of Council. Your Council met 5 times, in Ashford, during the year.

Council member and breed stalwart, Percy Hickman, died during the year. Luckily he was with us long enough to be the first recipient of The Youngs Centenary Trophy.

FLOCK BOOK

Volume 102 of the Flock Book contained individual entries of 360 rams and 2139 ewes, compared with 248 rams and 807 ewes in the previous volume. The increased numbers were mostly young sheep sent the the Azores in late 1995.

We seem to have got the home market supply of rams in balance for the demand.

ACCOUNTS

With the Centenary behind us and no exports, the Society income "nosedived" during the year.

Costs exceeded income by £1616 which has been met from our reserves.

ACCOUNTS Contd Society officers have visited the accountants and will report to the Annual General Meeting. Audited accounts for 1996 will be available at the Annual General Meeting.

RAM SALES

The quality of rams entered at our two main sales continues to improve each year.

ASHFORD 97 rams were entered. Judge, Frank Langrish, awarded the Championship to Hugh & Pauline Skinner from Sissinghurst. The judge later backed his choice by purchasing this ram for £560. Frank Langrish also purchased the Reserve Champion, from the Swallow Mill flock. Limestone Farming Company, on their first visit to a Society ram sale won the Wool prize. Peter Skinner & Son won the Best Group of Three and the Hobbs Parker prize for the Best Pen of Five Animals.

The average price for the Sale was £292. An improvement of £9 on the previous year.

RYE From a catalogue of 75, Peter Skinner & Son were given top spot by judge Robert Mair. Reserve were new exhibitors, Gary & Louise Mortley. As at the Ashford sale, the judge backed his judgement by purchasing the Champion for £400. The Reserve Champion made £500, staying on the Romney Marsh with R.S. Wimble & Sons. P.H. & P.E. Skinner won the Wool prize. The best wooled sheep was shown by Hugh & Pauline Skinner.

The average price for the Sale was £284. Once again, an increase on the previous year of £27.

EWE FLOCK COMPETITION

There was a total entry of thirteen flocks. After travelling to Cumbria and Dorset, as well as all over Kent and East Sussex, the judges awarded the Championship to E. & M.E. Brundrett with G.B. Richards & Son as Reserve.

Class winners:

Class 1 - Up to 50 breeding ewes - Andrew Barr & Son

Class 2 - Up to 51-150 ewes - G.B. Richards & Son

Class 3 - Over 150 breeding ewes - E. & M.E. Brundrett

Denis & Gordon Wimble had an easier task and less travelling, placing the unregistered flocks. David Dunlop retained his position of winner of this class. The Chairman and Secretary visited his farm at Pett to present the cup.

EXPORTS

As we mentioned earlier, this was the first year for some time when we recorded zero exports.

SUMMER SHOWS Romneys are not alone in the pedigree sheep world in finding sufficient exhibits of good quality to make a Your Council worthwhile presence at the Summer Shows. have addressed the problem and are offering some financial help with the ever increasing expenses of the Royal Show.

> At the 1996 Royal Show our usual gallant showing trio had exhibits in every class. Limestone Farming Company won the Championship with two shear ram. Hugh & Pauline Skinner won the female Championship with a pair of woolly We really are concerned about the Romney ewe tegs. classes at future Royal Shows.

> Romney sheep are offered more prize Kent County Show. money than any other livestock (except some of the horse We responded well with a total of 94 animals from ten exhibitors. A really handsome turnout of Romney Judge Jim Cross chose, as his Champion exhibit, Trevor Richards' two shear ram (bred by R.S. Wimble & In Reserve place were a pair of ram tegs from Hugh & Pauline Skinner.

> Hugh & Pauline also won the Redland Trophy for gaining most points in the Romney classes.

> South of England Show. George Horne won the Cazelet Cup for the best Romney. The only other exhibitor, Julie Murray, won a first prize. We show these in the "British Longwool Class".

> Heathfield Show. We keep hoping that our numbers will build up at Heathfield so that we will qualify for our own classes. However, we dropped down to two exhibitors with five sheep, so we still have far to go. The Catt Trophy for the best Romney was won by Graham & Pauline Thorn.

RAM LAMB PERFORMANCE TEST

This was again successful, with 40 ram lambs on test. The growth rates and scanning figures keep improving year by year.

Progeny of some of the rams from earlier tests are starting to feature in members breeding returns

ANNUAL DINNER We returned to the familiar venue at Elvy Farm Pluckley. We had to limit the numbers and turn some people away. We must find ourselves another good venue.

YOUNGS CENTENARY TROPHY

This was awarded for the first time, to Percy Hickman, as the person chosen by the selection committee, who had done most for Romney sheep.

He was not well enough to collect the trophy but it was delivered and presented to him shortly before he died.

THE FUTURE

Commercial flockmasters are enjoying a spell of relative prosperity. Meat prices have been good and Romney wool is in good demand.

High prices for cull ewes has meant a greater demand for young replacement sheep.

Commercial flocks are the mainstay of any breed. The pedigree sector is there to serve their needs.

Each time a commercial flock master buys 100 replacement ewe tegs, he takes up the equivalent of a lifetime's work for the average ram. That is what we want to see. More commercial Romney ewes, because that means more pedigree rams will be needed.

1. LIMITED LIABILITY

The Company is Limited by Guarantee and does not have a Share Capital. The liability of each member is limited to a maximum of One Pound.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Accounting Convention

The Financial Statements are prepared under the Historical Cost convention.

2.2 Depreciation of Tangible Assets

Provision is made for depreciation of tangible assets at rates calculated to write off their costs, less residual values, over their estimated useful lives. The rates used for this purpose are:

Office and Tattooing Equipment 25% p.a. on written down value.
