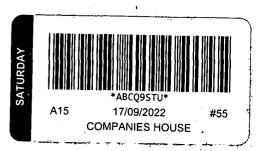

STRATEGIC REPORT FOR THE 53 WEEKS ENDED 2 APRIL 2022

The directors present their strategic report for the year ended 2 April 2022.

Business review

The Scotch House Limited (the "Company") is a wholly owned subsidiary of Burberry Group plc (the "Group"). Its principal activity is to trade the owned Scotch House brand through licence in Japan.

The Balance Sheet on page 8 of the financial statements shows that the Company is in a net asset position at the year end consistent with the prior year.

The Income Statement on page 7 reflects a £745,000 profit for the financial year (2021 - £836,000).

Future developments

At the date of this report the directors do not anticipate any major changes in the Company's activities in the next year.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The management of the business and the execution of the Company's growth strategies are subject to a number of risks. The principal risks and uncertainties are integrated with the principal risks of the Group and are not managed separately. Accordingly, the principal risks and uncertainties of the Group, which include those of the Company, are discussed on pages 107 to 149 of the Group's 2021/22 Annual Report which does not form part of this report.

Financial risk management

From the perspective of the Company, financial risk management is integrated with the financial risk management of the Group and is not managed separately. Accordingly, financial risk management of the Group, which include those of the Company, is discussed on pages 280 to 284 of the Group's 2021/22 Annual Report, which does not form part of this report.

The Group's directors manage the Group's operations on a consolidated basis using key performance indicators. For this reason, the Company's directors believe that analysis using key performance indicators for the Company is not necessary or appropriate. Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Scotch House Limited for the year ended 2 April 2022 which comprise the Income Statement, Balance Sheet and Statement of Changes in Equity and the related notes 1 to 8, including a summary of significant accounting policies. Explanation as to what extent the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect irregularities, including fraud. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement due to fraud is higher than the risk of not detecting one resulting from error, as fraud may involve deliberate concealment by, for example, forgery or intentional misrepresentations, or through collusion. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE 53 WEEKS ENDED 2 APRIL 2022

1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented, unless otherwise stated.

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The Scotch House Limited is a trading company which trades the owned Scotch House brand through licence in Japan. The Company which is private and limited by shares is incorporated and domiciled in the UK. The Company is registered in England and Wales and the address of its registered office is Horseferry House, Horseferry Road, London, SW1P 2AW.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 101 'Reduced Disclosure Framework' and the Companies Act 2006.

The preparation of the financial statements in compliance with FRS 101 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the Company's accounting policies (see note 2).

The financial year is the 53 weeks ended 2 April 2022 (last year: 52 weeks ended 27 March 2021).

Financial Reporting Standard 101 - reduced disclosure exemptions

1. Accounting policies (continued)

1.2 New Standards adopted in the period

There are no amendments to accounting standards, or IFRIC interpretations that are effective for the year ended 2 April 2022 that have had a material impact on the Company's financial statements.

1.3 Going concern

The directors have assessed the liquidity and future cash generation of the Company, the facilities available to it, and the principal risks and uncertainties the Company is subject to. On the basis of these assessments, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and therefore consider it appropriate to continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the annual financial statements of the Company.

1.4 Revenue

The Company obtains revenue through licences issued to third parties to produce and sell goods carrying 'Burberry' trademarks. Revenue is stated excluding Value Added Tax and other sales related taxes.

The Company's licences entitle the licensee to access the Company's trademarks over the term of the licence. Hence revenue from licensing is recognised over the term of access to the licence. Royalties payable under licence agreements are usually based on production or sales volumes and are accrued in revenue as the subsequent production or sale occurs. Any amounts received which have not been recognised in revenue are classified as contract liabilities.

1.5 Taxation

Tax expense represents the sum of the current tax expense and deferred tax charge.

The current tax expense is based on taxable profit for the year. Taxable profit differs from net profit as reported in the Income Statement because it excludes items of income or expense which are taxable or deductible in other years and it further excludes items which are never taxable or deductible. The current tax liability is calculated using tax rates which have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

1.6 Called up share capital

Ordinary shares are classified as equity. Incremental costs directly attributable to the issue of new shares or options are shown in equity as a deduction, net of tax, from the proceeds.

1. Accounting policies (continued)

1.7 Foreign currency translation

Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates (the functional currency). The financial statements are presented in Sterling which is the Company's functional and presentation currency.

Transactions in foreign currencies

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies, which are held at the year end, are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate ruling at the balance sheet date (closing rate). Exchange differences on monetary items are recognised in the Income Statement in the period in which they arise.

1.8 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is initially recognised at fair value on the Balance Sheet when the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. A financial asset is derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flow expire or substantially all risks and rewards of the asset are transferred. A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

At initial recognition, all financial liabilities are stated at fair value. Subsequent to initial recognition, all financial liabilities are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. Financial assets are classified as either amortised cost or fair value through profit or loss depending on their cash flow characteristics. Assets with cash flows that represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortised cost. The fair value of the financial assets and liabilities held at amortised cost approximate their carrying amount due to the use of market interest rates.

The Company's primary category of financial instruments is listed below:

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are included in current assets. Trade and other receivables with maturities greater than 12 months after the balance sheet date are classified as trade and other receivables falling due after more than one year. The receivables are held with the objective to collect the contractual cash flows and are therefore recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the expected loss on receivables is established at inception. This is modified when there is a change in the credit risk. The amount of the movement in the provision is recognised in the Income Statement.

2. Key sources of estimation uncertainty and judgements

2.1 Key sources of estimation uncertainty

Preparation of the financial statements in conformity with FRS 101 requires that management make certain estimates and assumptions that affect the reported revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities.

If in the future such estimates and assumptions, which are based on management's best estimates at the date of the financial statements, deviate from actual circumstances, the original estimates and assumptions will be updated as appropriate in the period in which the circumstances change.

Estimates are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The COVID-19 pandemic (COVID-19) has continued to have an impact on the global economy throughout the current year. The impact of COVID-19 has been considered and management have concluded that this is not a source of estimation uncertainty.

The key areas where estimates and assumptions applied have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying value of assets and liabilities are discussed below.

There were no key sources of estimation uncertainty arising in the current period or prior period.

Further details of the Company's accounting policies in relation to these areas are provided in note 1.

2.2 Key judgements in applying the Company's accounting policies

Judgements are those decisions made when applying accounting policies which have a significant impact on the amounts recognised in the Company's financial statements. UK Group companies do not charge/pay for group tax relief from other UK companies. Amounts owed by fellow subsidiaries of £20,962,000 (2021 - £20,217,000) are unsecured, interest free and receivable on demand.

The amounts owed by fellow subsidiaries falling due within one year is denominated in Japanese Yen and as at 2 April 2022 was ¥89,062,503. Foreign exchange gains and losses on this Japanese Yen Intercompany trade are recognised in the Income Statement.

Credit Risk

The trade and other receivables balance comprises of intercompany trade receivables with companies within the Group. These Group companies are assessed at each reporting date as to their ability to repay outstanding balances.

The counterparty credit risk of trade and other receivables is reviewed on a regular basis and assessed for impairment as follows:

At inception the receivable is recorded net of expected 12 month credit losses. If a significant increase in the credit risk occurs during the lifetime, credit losses are recorded in the profit and loss account and the effective interest is calculated using the gross carrying amount of the asset. If a loss event occurs, the effective interest is calculated using the amortised cost of the asset net of any credit losses.

The Company's sole debtor is Burberry Limited. Burberry Limited is the holder of the Burberry brand and the main operating company of the Group. Based on its liquidity and expected cash generation, the expected 12 months credit loss for Burberry Limited trade and other receivables is not considered to be significant. As a result, no impairment has been recorded for amounts owed by fellow subsidiaries as at 2 April 2022.

Foreign Exchange Risk

The Company has a Japanese Yen denominated intercompany trade receivable with fellow subsidiaries and is therefore exposed to foreign exchange risk arising from this Japanese Yen denominated transaction.

From the perspective of the Company, foreign exchange risk management is integrated with the foreign exchange risk management of the Group and is not managed separately. Further details of the Group's foreign exchange policy are included in the consolidated financial statements of Burberry Group plc, which are available publicly.
