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The directors present the strategic report on the group and company for the year ended 31 December 2013

#### Review of the business

Despite ongoing uncertainty in some of the markets the group operates in, the group has delivered consistent financial performance in 2013. Operating results are impacted by the level of UK residential and commercial construction (including retrofits and upgrades), capital spending and operating expenditures on buildings and process automation, industrial plant capacity utilisation and expansion, inventory levels in distribution channels, and economic growth rates. UK government and public sector spending on large projects also influence our results.

Turnover fell by 1 3% to £1,055 million compared to 2012 turnover of £1,068 million. The products businesses performed well, taking advantage of improved economic conditions in the UK. The projects businesses continue to operate in competitive environments, as well as competing against the 2012 performance which benefited from the London Olympics contracts.

Gross profit fell by 3 6% to £306 million compared to 2012 gross profit of £317 million. Gross profit margin year on year remained consistent at 29% 2012 benefitted from the high margins experienced on the London Olympics work, whereas 2013 has seen improved margin in the products businesses through supply chain initiatives and other cost control measures.

The gross profit performance has flowed through to operating profit, which has fallen 8 5% from £57 million in 2012 to £52 million in 2013 SG&A costs have been closely monitored, and together with repositioning activity have contributed to the group's performance

The group's net assets increased by 19% to £723 million in 2013 compared to £607 million in 2012. The primary driver of this movement was the group's net position in relation to defined benefit pension schemes changing from a net liability of £97 million to a net asset of £12 million, mainly as a result of company contributions of £69 million (2012 £97 million) and actuarial gains of £64 million (2012 £63 million losses) following improved market conditions (note 19)

Other events during the year contributed to the financial results

- the business of BW Europe Ltd was transferred to other Honeywell companies outside of the group, reducing year on year revenue by £35 million
- shares in B/E Aerospace Inc. were sold realising a gain of £33 million
- net return on pension plan assets were £23 million
- net gain on disposal of assets realised £5 million
- intercompany loan financing reduced by £13 million over 2012

The group is in a strong financial position and is looking forward to another challenging year in 2014, looking for growth opportunities using market leading technology and service to differentiate itself from the competition

#### Pensions

The group's net position in relation to defined benefit pension schemes changed from a net liability of £97 million to a net asset of £12 million, mainly as a result of company contributions of £69 million (2012 £97 million) and actuarial gains of £64 million (2012 £63 million losses) following improved market conditions (note 19)

Income from other fixed asset investments

The group made a gain of £33 million as a result of the sale of quoted shares in B/E Aerospace Inc which had been acquired in 2009 as part of the sale of the Consumable Solutions business (note 7)

Interest income and expense

The group monitors its net interest income/expense

The interest receivable from group undertakings has reduced in 2013 having seen the full year impact of five year loans that matured in September 2012. The new interest rate for these loans is 1.28%, reduced from 6.13%

The reduction in interest payable to group undertakings is the result of the replacement, in April, of loans at 7% and 7.5% with new loans at 2.9% and 3.25% respectively

#### Turnover

A number of factors contributed to the turnover performance during 2013 The transfer of the BW Europe Ltd business contributed to the reduction, together with non-repetitive business in 2012 such as the Olympics Games project

Economic conditions both in the UK and globally impacted performance across the portfolio, with both positive and negative experience depending upon the markets being operated in

#### Gross profit

The main driver behind the overall decrease in gross profit has been the volume mix being experienced across the businesses. Efficiencies in the manufacturing businesses have helped drive cost management, yielding higher margins, whilst other areas have seen economic conditions drive lower margins in competitive markets.

#### Operating result

The operating performance of the business, partly offset by savings from business transformation projects, has resulted in the fall in results for 2013

#### Headcount

Ongoing restructuring and skill realignment work in each of the businesses has resulted in operational efficiencies being achieved resulting in the requirement for less headcount

#### Strategy

The group maintains market share and sustainable growth through the following strategies

- focus on customers, including customer survey programmes to obtain and action customer feedback to improve business performance,
- providing the highest standard of product, service and delivery to its customer at a competitive cost,
- productivity and process improvement,
- product development,
- continued expansion into current and new markets,
- proactive alignment of its business structure to meet changing market demands,
- defending and extending the installed base through productivity improvements, and
- strong brand recognition through brand and channel management

#### Principal risks and uncertainties

The management of the business and the execution of the group's strategy are subject to a number of risks. The key business risks affecting the group are

- changes in spending and capital investment patterns
- fluctuation in customer demand
- adverse economic conditions
- raw material price fluctuations
- · obsolescence arising from a shift in technology

The directors present their report and group financial statements of the group and company for the year ended 31 December 2013

This is the first time that the company has presented consolidated financial statements. Comparative figures for 2012 are shown as unaudited because of the expense of auditing certain foreign subsidiaries which were not audited in 2012. As explained in note 27, preparing consolidated financial statements enables UK subsidiaries to claim an exemption from audit.

#### Principal activities

The group's principal activities during the year include a diversified portfolio of manufacturing and integrated solutions businesses, across a range of industries including automation and control solutions, aerospace and transportation systems

Manufacturing activity includes electrical and electronic products, security equipment including intruder detection, video surveillance and building access control, life safety equipment including fire detection and emergency lighting, and intelligent products and systems for measurement and control of the building environments including energy consumption. The group's products are distributed across a wide network for use in domestic, commercial and industrial applications.

The group's integrated solutions and products makes homes, buildings, industrial sites, airport facilities and infrastructure more efficient, safe and comfortable by improving energy efficiency, industrial productivity and safety while enhancing convenience and control

The group's operations in the UK are supported by employees primarily in Bracknell, Glasgow and Basildon

The aim of the group is to maintain a market leading position in these industries and to continue to grow turnover and profits through investment in technology and people, as well as through acquisitions

The company's primary activity is that of a holding company

## **Business review and future developments**

A review of the business of the group and future developments is included in the strategic report

#### Results and dividends

The group's profit for the financial year was £68,826,000 (2012 £32,791,000 profit) which will be transferred to reserves. The results for the year are shown on page 9

The directors do not recommend the payment of a dividend (2012 £nil)

#### Change of name

On 2 October 2013 the company changed its name from Garrett Thermal Systems Holdings Ltd to Honeywell Group Ltd

#### Financial risk management

Foreign currency risk

The worldwide group hedges its exposures to significant foreign currency movements

At 31 December, the fair value of unrealised assets/(liabilities) under hedge contracts was not material (2012 £nil)

#### Credit risk

Credit risk arises from cash at bank and credit exposures to customers. Bank balances are maintained within the permitted credit limits set by the group's Investment Committee who frequently monitor banks' credit ratings. The creditworthiness of customers granted credit terms in the normal course of business is monitored continually. The terms and conditions of credit sales are designed to mitigate or eliminate concentrations of credit risk with any single customer. Sales are not materially dependent on a single customer or a small group of customers.

#### 1 Accounting policies

These financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and applicable accounting standards in the United Kingdom. The accounting policies which have been applied consistently throughout the year are set out below.

The prior year comparatives for the group are unaudited. This is the first time that the company has presented consolidated financial statements

#### Changes in accounting policies

The accounting policies have been reviewed by the board of directors in accordance with FRS18 "Accounting policies"

There were no changes to accounting standards in 2013 which were applicable to the group or to the company

#### Consolidation of group companies

The consolidated financial statements comprise the financial statements of the company and all its subsidiary undertakings and incorporate the results of its associated undertakings. The results of subsidiaries acquired during the year are included from the date of acquisition and are accounted for using the acquisition method of accounting Associates are accounted for using the equity method.

The group's subsidiaries are shown in note 27 of these financial statements

#### Turnover and revenue recognition

Turnover comprises sales to customers and service revenues net of value added tax

Revenue from product and service sales is recognised on delivery and when acceptance by the customer has occurred Revenue from long term contracts is recognised on the percentage of completion basis once the outcome of the contract can be recognised with reasonable certainty. Revenue from service contracts is recognised evenly over the period of the contract and the difference is reported in accrued or deferred income. Revenue from the sale of consignment stock is recognised when the title of goods sold passes to the customer. Instalments receivable after completion are recognised when the timing of their receipt becomes certain. Revenue from licensing agreements is recognized evenly over the period of the agreement.

Where, for a particular contract, turnover exceeds amounts invoiced on account, the excess is included in debtors as amounts recoverable on contracts. Where amounts invoiced exceed turnover, the excess is included in payments on account. Royalty income is recognised in line with the performance criteria specified in the royalty agreement.

On 1 September 2002 a UK General Partnership ('the partnership') was formed by Honeywell Aerospace BV (99%), a company registered in the Netherlands, and Honeywell UK Ltd (1%), a UK registered company From this date certain subsidiaries of the group have acted as disclosed agents for the partnership earning commission income on staff costs recharged to the partnership Commission income on staff costs is recognised upon supply to the partnership

#### Leases- as lessee

Rental costs under operating leases are charged to the profit and loss account in equal amounts over the period of the lease

#### Leases- as lessor

Operating lease income is recognised on a straight line basis with any rental increases recognised during the period of the lease

#### Bad debt provision

An allowance for doubtful debts is made against trade debtors which exceed 180 days past due date. Provisioning made against debts subsequently settled after 180 days past due are released back to the current profit and loss account.

Research and development

All costs associated with research and development are written off to the profit and loss account in the year of expenditure, less any R&D expenditure credit reclaimable from HM Revenue and Customs in respect of those costs

Foreign currency

Transactions denominated in foreign currency are booked using daily or monthly exchange rates prevailing when the transaction is recorded. Monetary assets and habilities which are denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Pounds sterling at rates of exchange approximating to those ruling at the balance sheet date. Exchange gains or losses resulting from the year's trading are reflected in the operating results for the year. Exchange gains and losses from financing activities are recognised in interest income and expense. Gains or losses on foreign currency hedges obtained from the ultimate parent company are recognised when realised. The fair value of unrealised hedges at the year end is disclosed in the Directors' report if material.

The cost of investment in overseas subsidiaries and associates is stated at the rate of exchange in force at the date each investment was made. The results of overseas subsidiaries and associates are translated into Pounds sterling at the average rate of exchange during the year. Assets and habilities of overseas subsidiaries are translated into Pounds sterling at rates ruling at the balance sheet date. Currency differences arising from the retranslation of the opening net investments subsidiaries and associates are taken to reserves.

#### Taxation

Current tax is the amount of tax estimated to be payable or recoverable in respect of the taxable profit or loss for a period, along with adjustments to estimates in respect of previous periods

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of the future estimated tax consequences of transactions or events recognised in the group financial statements of the current and previous periods

Deferred tax assets are recognised to the extent that, on the basis of all available evidence, it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted

Deferred tax is measured at the average tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse, based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is measured on a non-discounted basis

Intangible assets

Purchased goodwill is stated at purchase cost and amortised on a straight line basis over its estimated useful life Purchased goodwill is assessed on a business by business basis to determine its useful life, the useful life being the period of amortisation. The period of amortisation ranges from 3 years to 20 years.

Purchased know-how and licences are stated at cost and amortised on a straight line basis over the period which the group expects to derive economic benefit. The period of amortisation ranges from 3 to 5 years

The group evaluates the carrying value of intangible assets in each financial year to determine if there has been an impairment in value resulting in the group being unable to recover the carrying amount. Where it is determined that the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the excess is written off to the profit and loss account

#### Tangible assets and depreciation

Tangible assets are stated at historical purchase cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated using the straight line method at rates calculated to write down the cost to the estimated residual value over the estimate useful life. Cost comprises purchase costs together with any incidental expenses of acquisition. The annual depreciation rates used for the major assets are

#### Investments

#### Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost incurred in bringing each product to its present location and condition, and net realisable value. The cost of raw materials, consumables and goods for resale represents purchase cost on a first-in, first-out basis. The cost of work in progress and finished goods is the cost of direct materials and labour plus attributable overheads based on a normal level of activity. Net realisable value is based on estimated selling price less any further costs expected to be incurred to completion and disposal. Provisions for obsolete and slow moving stocks are made where appropriate. Consignment stock is held by certain customers as part of maintenance agreements between the company and those customers, this stock is replenished when used

#### Current asset investments

Amounts held as current asset investments represent short term deposits held by banks approved by the worldwide group's treasury facility

#### Amounts recoverable on contracts

Debtors include amounts recoverable on contracts, representing work in progress on long term contracts not included in stocks. Amounts recoverable on contracts are stated at cost incurred net of amounts transferred to cost of sales, after deducting foreseeable losses and payments on account not matched to turnover.

#### Provisions

The group recognises a provision when it has a present obligation, either legal or constructive, which can be rehably measured and it is probable that the transfer of economic benefits will be required to settle that obligation Provisions are based on the best estimate of expenditure required to settle the obligation

#### Pensions

Defined benefit plan assets are measured at market value and plan habilities are measured using the projected unit method. Liabilities are discounted at the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of term and equivalent currency to the hability. Full actuarial valuations are obtained every three years, and are updated at each balance sheet date.

The group's share of the surplus or deficit of a defined benefit plan in which it participates is based on its actual shares of assets and obligations to the extent they are identifiable, or otherwise in proportion to its anticipated share of future contributions to the plan, normally in proportion to the number of defined benefit members reported on the most recent annual return from the trustees to the pension regulator

A surplus is recognised to the extent that it is recoverable through reduced contributions and refunds

Current and past service costs are included in the profit and loss account within operating expenses. The net amount of interest cost and expected return on assets is shown as other finance costs or income. Actuarial gains and losses, including differences between the expected and actual return on plan assets, are recognised in the statement of group total recognised gains and losses, net of related deferred tax.

Defined contribution plans are externally funded, with the assets of the plan held separately from those of the group in separate trustee administered funds. Contributions to such plans are charged to the profit and loss account as they become payable.

#### Share-based payments

The group's employees participate in share option plans operated by Honeywell International Inc, the ultimate parent company. All share-based payments are equity-settled and are measured at fair value at the date of grant. The fair value determined at the grant date is expensed on a straight line basis over the vesting period, based on the group's estimate of the number of options that will eventually vest. At each balance sheet date, the group reviews its estimate of the number of options that are expected to vest.

In accordance with FRS20, the charge arising for share-based payments is recognised in the profit and loss account of the group which employs those to whom share-based awards are granted. The credit entry is reported directly to reserves as a capital contribution.

The group accrues for employers' national insurance contributions payable on share-based payments at the applicable contribution rate

#### 2. Cash flow statement and related party transactions
