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THE DIRECTORS' REPORT

PERIOD ENDED 14 DECEMBER 2008

The directors have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements of the group and the company for the period ended 14 December 2008.

Principal activities and business review

The principal activity of the group and company is the manufacture and distribution of food products to the retail, foodservice and vending beverage market places. The business performance for the period reflects the operating environment across the group's key categories of coffee, cheese, confectionery and other foods.

The group's results show a profit after tax for the period of £9,791,000 (2007 - £31,256,000) and sales of £539,266,000 (2007 - £552,958,000). The net assets of the group decreased to £184,415,000 (2007 as restated - £209,100,000).

Business environment, principal risks and uncertainties

The business environment in which the group operates is highly competitive, particularly around product pricing, quality and health and wellness issues.

In order to mitigate this risk the group continues to monitor market prices, improve product nutrition and the quality and quantity of consumer information, to market products responsibly and to encourage healthy lifestyles for people and their communities.

The key performance indicators during the period, together with historical trend data, are set out in the table below:

Strategy and future outlook

The outlook for 2009 remains challenging as the group continues to strive for reliable, consistent growth. The key elements to the group's strategy for growth are its brands, people, values and vision. The group aims to achieve this by:

- 1. Sharing the global vision of its parent company, Kraft Foods Inc., to help people around the world eat and live better continuing the further development of its brand portfolio and focussing on its core power brands where a competitive advantage can be achieved.
- 2. Maintaining specific values of innovation, quality, safety, respect for communities and the environment, integrity and openness.
- 3. Recruiting talented and dedicated employees who are focused and passionate about their work.

As noted below the Kraft group of companies undertook a reorganisation in April 2009 and the research and development and production functions of Kraft Foods UK Limited were sold to subsidiaries of the company. The company is focussing on its sales operations from that date.

Results and dividends

The profit for the period, after taxation, amounted to £9,791,000 (2007 - £31,256,000). The directors have not recommended a dividend.

Financial risk management

The group's operations expose it to a variety of financial risks that include price risk, the effects of foreign currency exchange rates, credit risks, liquidity, interest rates and cash flow. The directors have not delegated the responsibility of monitoring financial risk management to a sub-committee of the board. The risk management procedures are implemented by the company's finance department and approved by the parent company. The department has specific guidelines to manage financial risk. The company does not use financial instruments speculatively.

Price risk

The group is exposed to commodity price risk as a result of its operations. This is managed by the use of forward contracts to purchase commodities.

Foreign currency exchange risk-

The group is exposed to foreign exchange risks in the normal course of business primarily with respect to US dollars. The compány uses financial instruments to hedge a portion of its foreign currency exposure when purchasing certain commodities.

Credit risk

The group has implemented policies that require appropriate credit checks on potential and existing customers, before sales are made. The amount of any exposure to any individual counterparty is subject to a limit which is reassessed regularly.

Liquidity risk

The group has sufficient available funds for operations and planned expansions.

Interest rate and cash flow risk

The group has interest bearing assets and interest bearing liabilities. The interest bearing assets are cash balances and inter-company loans. Interest is earned at variable rates. The only interest bearing liabilities are finance lease agreements which are at fixed rates.

We have audited the group and parent company financial statements ("the financial statements") of Kraft Foods UK Ltd. for the period ended 14 December 2008, which comprise the Group Profit and Loss Account, the Group and Company Balance Sheets, the Group Statement of Total Recognised Gains and Losses and the related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein.

Respective responsibilities of directors and auditor

The directors' responsibilities for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) are set out in the Statement of Directors' Responsibilities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

PERIOD ENDED 14 DECEMBER 2008

1. Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards.

The financial statements are also prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. The principal accounting policies which have been applied consistently throughout the period, except where noted, are set out below.

Changes in accounting policies

The company has adopted the amendment to FRS17, 'Retirement Benefits', in these financial statements. As a result of this quoted securities held as plan assets in the defined benefit pension scheme are now valued at bid price rather than mid-market value. The effect of this change is that the value of plan assets at 15 December 2007 has been restated from £495,665,000 to £495,219,000, a decrease of £446,000. There is a corresponding increase in deferred tax of £125,000 and the net pension surplus at 15 December 2007 decreased by £321,000. Current and prior period profits have been unaffected by this change as the movements are through the statement of total recognised gains and losses.

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated profit and loss account and balance sheet include the financial statements of the company and its subsidiary undertakings made up to 14 December 2008. The results of subsidiaries sold or acquired are included in the consolidated profit and loss account up to, or from, the date control passes. Intra-group sales and profits are eliminated fully on consolidation.

On acquisition of a subsidiary, all of the subsidiary's assets and liabilities that exist at the date of acquisition are recorded at their fair values reflecting their condition at that date. All changes to those assets and liabilities, and the resulting gains and losses that arise after the group has gained control of the subsidiary are charged to the post acquisition profit and loss account.

Cash flow statement

The directors have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (Revised 1996) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the company is wholly owned and its parent publishes a consolidated cash flow statement.

Turnover

Turnover comprises the selling value, after deduction of any allowances and taxes, of goods sold in the ordinary course of business.

Research and development

Research and development expenditure is written off in the year in which it is incurred.

Goodwill

Goodwill arises where the purchase consideration exceeds the value of the underlying net assets.

Accounting policies (continued)

Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Goodwill

Fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at historic cost less depreciation. Cost includes the original purchase price of the asset and the costs attributable to bringing the asset to its working condition for its intended use.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Buildings

- 25 to 40 years

Leasehold assets

- shorter of useful economic life and lease term

Plant & machinery

- 3 to 20 years

Capital work in progress and freehold land are not depreciated.

Investments in subsidiary undertakings

Investments in subsidiary undertakings are recorded at cost plus incidental expenses less any provision for impairment. Impairment reviews are performed by the directors when there has been an indication of potential impairment.

Impairment of goodwill

The Group carries out an impairment review of its intangible assets when a change in circumstances or situation indicates that those assets may have suffered an impairment loss. Impairment is measured by comparing the carrying amount of the asset with the recoverable amount of the associated income generating unit on a value-in-use basis. Value-in-use is calculated by discounting the expected future cash flows.

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost comprises the direct cost of materials and labour, and a proportion of relevant overheads. Net realisable value is the price at which stocks can be sold in the normal course of business, after allowing for the cost of realisation and, where appropriate, the cost of conversion from their existing state to a finished condition. Provision is made where necessary for obsolete, slow moving and defective stocks.

Work in progress .

Work in progress is valued on the basis of direct costs plus attributable overheads based on normal level of activity. Provision is made for any foreseeable losses where appropriate. No element of profit is included in the valuation of work in progress.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Finance lease agreements

Where the company enters into a lease which entails taking substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset, the lease is treated as a finance lease. The asset is recorded in the balance sheet as a tangible fixed asset and is depreciated in accordance with the above depreciation policies. Future instalments under such leases, net of finance charges, are included within creditors. Rentals payable are apportioned between the finance element, which is charged to the group profit and loss account on a straight line basis, and the capital element which reduces the outstanding obligation for future instalments.

Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The group operates a defined benefit type pension plan for the benefit of the majority of its employees, the assets of which are held separately from those of the company in independently administered funds. The assets of the plan are measured at market value at the balance sheet date and the liabilities are measured using the Projected Unit method. The increase in the present value of the liabilities of the group's defined benefit pension schemes expected to arise from employee service in the period is charged to operating profit. The expected return on the schemes' assets and the increase during the year in the present value of the schemes' liabilities arising from the passage of time are included in other finance income. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised in the consolidated statement of total recognised gains and losses. The resulting pension scheme surplus or deficit is recognised immediately on the balance sheet net of the related deferred tax.

Deferred taxation

Deferred taxation is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date, where transactions or events that result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future or a right to pay less tax in the future have occurred at the balance sheet date. A net deferred tax asset is not recognised to the extent that the transfer of economic benefits in the future is uncertain. Deferred tax is measured at the average tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which timing differences are expected to reverse based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis.

Foreign currencies

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at average exchange rates in operation when the transaction occurred. Exchange gains and losses on settled transactions are reported in the profit and loss account. Monetary assets and liabilities in foreign currencies have been expressed in sterling at the rates ruling at the end of the period, except when covered by an open foreign exchange contract in which case the rate of exchange specified in the contract is used, and any gains or losses reported in the profit and loss account.

Share-based payments

Equity-settled share-based payment transactions for employee services received are measured at fair value and recognised as an expense spread over the service periods for share awards expected to vest. The fair value is measured by reference to the number and market value of the equity instruments at the date of grant. At each balance sheet date the company revises its estimates of the number of awards that are expected to vest and recognises the impact in the income statement with a corresponding adjustment to equity.

Recharges made to the company when the share awards have vested are recognised when paid and accounted for as a decrease in equity.

Provision is also made for the cost of stock option awards, granted by the ultimate parent company before November 2002, based on the market value of outstanding stock options at the end of the period. The costs of stock options exercised during the period are recharged to the company based on the spread between the issue and exercise price of those options.

Financial instruments

The company uses financial instruments to hedge a portion of its foreign currency exposure when purchasing certain commodities. Forward currency contracts entered into as hedges in foreign currencies are not recognised until they mature. At maturity gains and losses are included in the profit and loss account.

2. Segmental information

The group and company undertake one class of business, being the manufacture and distribution of food products to the retail, foodservice and vending beverage market places. The geographical analysis of turnover, profit on ordinary activities before taxation and net assets has been omitted as in the opinion of the directors it would be seriously prejudicial to the interests of the group and company.

The full actuarial valuation of the Plan carried out as at 1 April 2007 by Mercers, actuarial consultants to the Plan, has been updated to 14 December 2008 by Watson Wyatt Limited, actuarial consultants to the company.

### **Actuarial valuation**

The latest full actuarial valuation of the pension Plan was carried out as at 1 April 2007 using the projected unit method. At that date the market value of the assets was £483,500,000 and the actuarial value of those assets represented 96% of the value of the benefits that had accrued to members, after allowing for expected future increases in earnings. Following the valuation, as advised by the Plan actuary and agreed by the Trustees, contributions to the Plan are being made at 20% of pensionable salaries, plus annual contributions of £5.5 million for the period from 1 April 2008 to 30 September 2012 to enable the Plan to meet its liabilities as they fall due. The assets were taken at market value and no allowance was made for discretionary pension increases.

The next actuarial valuation of the Plan will be undertaken as at 1 April 2010.

### 31. Post balance sheet events

In April 2009, a reorganisation of the Kraft group of companies was completed to facilitate the group delivering its strategic goals and achieving sustainable and profitable growth by managing its business by category across its European markets.

Kraft Foods International (EU) Limited was acquired by Kraft Foods UK Ltd as a 100% subsidiary, from a fellow subsidiary, on 18 March 2009 and was renamed Kraft Foods UK R&D Limited on 20 April 2009. Furthermore two United Kingdom branches of Swiss entities, Kraft Foods Europe Procurement GmbH and Kraft Foods Europe Services GmbH have been set up for United Kingdom procurement and group services.

On the 20 April 2009 the directors approved the sale of the company's research and development business to Kraft Foods UK R&D Limited and the food manufacturing business to Kraft Foods UK Production Limited for £10 million and £73 million respectively, the net book value of the assets and liabilities in each business. Both sales were as a going concern and included the fixed assets, certain support functions and services used in the businesses. The consideration was satisfied by the assumption of the relevant liabilities together with an issue of 10 million £1 shares by Kraft Foods UK R&D Limited and 73 million £1 shares by Kraft Foods UK Production Limited to Kraft Foods UK Ltd.

Certain trademarks and other intellectual property held by Kraft Foods UK Ltd have been gifted to Kraft Foods UK Intellectual Property Limited for nil consideration.

On the 20 April 2009 the directors approved the sale of the assets and liabilities associated with Kraft Foods UK Ltd's service and procurement functions to the UK Branches of the Swiss Entities namely Kraft Foods Europe Procurement GmbH and Kraft Foods Europe Services GmbH.

On the 19 April 2009 the directors approved the sale of Kraft Foods UK Ltd's stock with a book value of £48.4 million to Kraft Foods Europe GmbH for £50.5 million which the directors consider to be a market value consideration.

After the completion of the restructuring Kraft Foods UK Ltd will act as a sales and distribution company selling Kraft Foods products into the existing United Kingdom markets and customers.

# 32. Ultimate parent company

At 14 December 2008 the immediate parent company is Kraft Foods Schweiz Holdings GmbH, a company incorporated in Switzerland. This is the parent company of the smallest group to consolidate these financial statements.

At 14 December 2008 the company's ultimate parent company and controlling party is Kraft Foods Inc., incorporated in the United States of America. This is the parent company of the largest group to consolidate these financial statements.
