Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020.

This report has been prepared as the UK enters a national lockdown due to the COVID -19 global pandemic. Some notes are included within this report to reflect the impact on young people and how Young Bristol has responded to meet their needs.

The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

In preparing this report the trustees have regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and have satisfied themselves that the aims and objectives of the charity and its core programmes are aligned and continue to serve children and young people within the City of Bristol and surrounding areas. To accompany this trustee's report, the charity also produces an annual Impact Report that demonstrates the charity's work and its public benefit.

The trustees acknowledge the huge contribution made by its paid employees as well as the many volunteers who provide their time, expertise and skills freely to support, deliver and help develop the charity's services. These range from those volunteers who work in direct support of our programmes through to our volunteer Fundralsing Committee who continue to raise much needed funds in support of our work.

Charitable activities
Our Core Programmes

Young Bristol delivers the following core programmes that are freely available to all children and young people aged 8-25 years:-

- Community Youth Clubs We are recognised as one of Bristol's leading providers of community based youth services, through our Community Youth Club network. We work across Bristol in areas of multiple deprivation. Our Clubs typically open 3-4 nights a week, 46 weeks a year.
- Creative programme We deliver a variety of art, design, music and media projects in youth clubs, schools and other venues. As well as being great fun, young people are able to gain qualifications, such as the nationally recognised AQA's and Arts Award.
- National Citizen Service This programme is a once in a lifetime opportunity for young people aged 16
 and 17. Their adventure is split into different phases and includes an action packed outdoor activity
 residential and working in teams on a social action project that helps the community.
- Outdoor Activities We have over 16 water and land-based activities to choose from. Our activities give young people the opportunity to build teamwork and communication skills whilst doing something inspiring, motivating and fun.
- Employment Training Scheme This programme engages and trains "at risk" young people to become
 qualified outdoor activity instructors. This provides them with paid employment, an opportunity to
 gain real "hands on" work experience and increases their pathway to longer term employment in the
 outdoor activities industry.
- Youth Club on Wheels This new provision, launched in 2019 following a successful 90th Anniversary
 Fundraising Appeal in 2018, has allowed Young Bristol to expand our open access youth provision to
 communities with little or no existing Youth Club provision in the City of Bristol and surrounding areas.
- Youth Voice made up of young people from across the City who use and benefit from our programmes. The group helps shape and influences our programmes; they discuss issues that affect young people and aim to positively influence decision makers within the City and beyond.

Investing in our members clubs

In addition to our core programmes we are committed to a range of activities that will enable us to invest in our Community Youth Clubs to develop their capacity, skills, knowledge, systems, funding and resources that will enable them to thrive. This includes developing strategic and corporate Partners, delivering against our 2020 strategy, and demonstrating positive outcomes for young people. We continue to offer a wide range of training, networking and development opportunities for member clubs and work and support them on their journey to sustainability.

Listening to young people and meeting their needs

Through working effectively with our "Youth Voice" group and other mechanisms for engaging, supporting and listening to young people, we embed young people's needs and views across the organisation. Furthermore, we involve them in the design, delivery and evaluation of our work. We effectively use technology and social media to ensure we are reaching young people through routes that are familiar to them. We continue to expand our links with education providers and employers and invest in projects which reach those young people who need our services most. We work in collaboration with other youth providers including Bristol City Council and voluntary sector organisations to ensure that the needs identified by young people can be met through coordinated provision.

Membership and Governing organisations

Young Bristol continues to be active and proud members of UK Youth, National Association of Boys & Girls Clubs, National Youth Agency and The World Federation of Youth Clubs. Through being members of these Youth Sector organisations, Young Bristol keeps abreast of current and emerging youth related issues. We are also members of the Fundraising Regulator and operate within their Code of Practice in relation to raising funds in support of our work. Young Bristol employs an experienced Development and Fundraising Manager who oversees the majority of our Fundraising activity. This role is supported and overseen by our Chief Executive and a fundraising expert among our trustees also supports this member of staff. The trustees are pleased to confirm that the charity has not received any complaints in relation to its fundraising activity nor have the trustees had cause to report itself to the Charity Commission in relation to any breaches in its operation and/or governance.

Financial Review

The past Financial Year has been one of continued growth in our programme delivery which has been matched by growth within our general finances. Young Bristol has a broad funding base which safeguards us against any one source of funding coming to an end. We are funded through donations, grants from trust and foundations, corporate donations, direct fundraising, selling of our services and an endowment. As evidenced in these accounts, the charity continues to be financially well managed generating an operating surplus of £97,557. Charity accounting standards require charities to recognise income when it is received which means that grant income in the accounts will fluctuate from year to year and the related expenditure will often not appear in the same financial year as the income.

The trustees have undertaken a review of all of its assets and liabilities, including carrying out a cash flow analysis and have concluded that the charity is adequately resourced and remains a going concern with no immediate risk. That said, at the time of preparing this trustee report, the Country is entering into a national lockdown due to COVID-19. Whilst too early to understand the full effect and impact on our programmes and finances, the trustees will work closely with its Chief Executive to ensure all necessary steps are taken so Young Bristol can continue to meet its charitable aims while at the same time protecting the charity's long term future.

Reserves policy

The trustees have an approved reserves policy which is reviewed annually as part of its ongoing good governance and will be reflective of the charity's work. The charity's existing policy is to hold unrestricted reserves equivalent to at least six months operating costs.

Unrestricted reserves

Unrestricted reserves are deemed to be those readily available to support charitable activities in the event of unexpected reductions in income or increases in cost. This excludes any funds invested in fixed assets as these are not immediately accessible. As at the end of March 2020 the charity has unrestricted reserves of £593,689, with six months core running costs of the charity estimated to be in the region of £200,000. On this basis the charity continues to be compliant with its current reserve policy. The trustees acknowledge the current level of reserves is above its reserve policy target. However, the trustees are desirous of investing in its core programmes, especially its Community Youth Clubs in the coming year and in light of the unknown impact COVID-19 may have on the charity's finances feel it is prudent in the current economic climate to carry more than 6 months operating cost.

Restricted reserves

Restricted reserves are those reserves held by the charity which are required by law to be spent as directed by the donor or funder so cannot be used for any other purpose.

Financial review
Main achievements and performance

The trustees are pleased to report that the past year has been one of continued growth in its programmes, increased contacts with young people and further stability around it finances. During the past year the charity secured a diverse range of funding from trust funds, donors, private companies and trading activities through the selling of its outdoor activities. The charity has also secured additional corporate support.

Main highlights during 2019-20.

Organisational overview

The charity has recorded 26,330 recorded contacts with children and young people during the past year. A 53% increase on the previous year. This is due to a number of factors including more young people attending our core programmes, especially our Community Youth Clubs and Outdoor Activity sessions on a regular basis, more accurate data capture of participants and the launching of our new Youth Club on Wheels which has proved extremely popular since it was launched in November 2019.

We have had four young people nominated for their "outstanding individual achievement" and Young Bristol nominated in the inaugural "Team of Heroes Award" category in the annual Bristol Young Heroes Awards Event.

Young Bristol received the "Partnership Award" for our intergenerational programme with Alive Activities, at VOSCUR's Bristol Social Impact Awards Event.

We are one of the leading youth charity's involved in organising the annual national NABGC 100 Canoe Challenge with a growing number of young people from Bristol and across the country completing this four day canoeing event.

In February 2020 two of Young Bristol's Senior Management Team were invited to attend the World Federation of Youth Clubs Annual Conference in the USA. Here they met, discussed, networked and presented to an audience of senior youth professionals from across the World on the work being done by Young Bristol.

Young Bristol continues to support its staff, young people and volunteers to achieve various qualifications in a wide range of subjects as part of its ongoing investment in their personal and professional development.

Programme overview

Below is selection of achievements across all our core programmes we have seen during this past year:

Community Youth Clubs achieved: -

- 97% of their Year 3 Youth Investment Fund targets
- 3,183 hours of open access provision delivered
- 1,146 contacts through our free holiday activity club programmes with each participant being offered a meal to help tackle the growing crisis within our City relating to holiday hunger
- 2,203 hours of alternative learning provision provided
- 1,134 recorded members attending our Community Youth Clubs, resulting in 11,428 contacts over the year an increase of 51%.
- 22 Community Youth Club sessions delivered each week

Since launching in November 2019 our new Youth Club on Wheels has achieved:-

- 157 young people accessing the provision resulting in 626 contacts
- 234 hours of alternative learning provision being delivered in schools
- 99 sessions delivered in new communities

Creative has seen:

- Engagement with 508 individual young people resulting in a total of 835 contacts
- Supported these young people to achieve 58 Arts related Awards
- . 100% of young people who completed our Youth Arts Action project stated they felt more positive

National Citizen Service saw:

The Team had 5,600 contacts with young people 16-17 years of age across summer and autumn programmes, learning new life skills and making friendships along the way. This resulted in 145 young people completing these two programmes and receiving their nationally recognised NCS Certificate signed by The Prime Minister. They raised £2,870.88 for local charities and volunteered 3,870 hours of social action in local communities.

Youth Voice has supported 12 young people who met on a weekly basis throughout the year and committed 123 hours of their time influencing local decision makers and YB programmes.

Outdoor Activities and Employment Training Scheme continue to provide fun activities and help young people prepare for employment. The Team has:-

- Had contact with 5,162 young people during the past year
- 100% of trainees who completed the High Ropes Training course gained employment with ss Great Britain
- 66 nationally recognised qualifications in outdoor activities have been awarded
- Seen 88% of the young people on the Employment Training Scheme achieve a positive outcome and go onto either further education or employment

STRATEGIC REPORT YB COVID-19 response

During the initial lockdown in March 2020, Young Bristol adapted quickly following Government and National Youth Agency guidance to suspend face to face delivery of its core programmes. Keen to keep contact and supporting the young people and families we work with, we moved most of our provision on line with staff delivering 38 virtual youth club sessions, creating 69 entertaining short video's known as "Boredom Busters" which were viewed by 19,223 individuals and providing 50 vulnerable families with sport, creative and educational packs. Our trained and skilled youth workers regularly provided telephone assistance to those young people we knew were likely to really struggle being at home in a lockdown situation. This was an extremely testing few months for everyone and we were pleased when National Youth Agency guidance allowed us to commence a planned and phased a re-opening of our core programmes in July 2020. Sadly, at the time of writing this trustee report we find ourselves in yet another lockdown. Young Bristol learnt many lessons from the initial lockdown and now has robust plans and procedures in place ensuring that we can continue supporting young people and families during this current time.

Future plans

Our ambitious plans for growth rely on a number of key activities: Namely;

- ensuring we can demonstrate the impact of our work
- building a sustainable and diverse funding base
- campaigning work to become more influential
- maintaining strong, effective Governance

As part of our forward planning process, we engaged with Bristol City Council and Quartet Community Foundation amongst others to help us identify and understand how we can best support the current needs for young people in the City. This resulted in the development of our "2020 Strategy document." This document sets out our five strategic priorities for young people and how we intend to meet those needs whilst continuing to ensure a sustainable future for Young Bristol. We acknowledge that we cannot achieve everything on our own so continue to work in collaboration with a wide range of Partners to realise our current Strategy and annual delivery plans.

These priorities fall into five key areas:-

- 1. Community based provision
- 2. Employability and social mobility
- 3. Education both formal and informal
- 4. Crime prevention
- 5. Mental health & wellbeing

We are confident that our core programmes continue to deliver against these five key areas of our existing Strategy and at our 2020 Annual General Meeting we will be launching our 2019-20 Impact Report. Our existing strategy document concludes at the end of 2020. We had started work on reviewing our strategy and consulting with young people and key stakeholders in the development of our new strategy. However, in light of the pandemic and the uncertainty that this has created, we have decided to carry out a further review and consultation in 2021, to help with the development of our 2021-23 Strategy. We are planning to have this work concluded for launch at our AGM in November 2021.

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The charity is governed by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The governing document of the charity is its articles of association last updated December 2018. The charity is incorporated and does not have a share capital and is formed otherwise than for profit. The charity is a Registered Charity Number 301681 and Company Limited By Guarantee numbered 363502.

The principle address of the charity is The Station, Silver Street, Bristol BS1 2AG.

Charity constitution

Young Bristol Is governed by a Board of trustees which meets at least four times a year to oversee the governance and strategic direction of the charity. As of 31 March 2020 the Board has 12 members, including the Chair, Vice Chair and Treasurer. All elected trustees have a vote and have a collective responsibility for the charity. Trustees can be appointed throughout the year with their appointment confirmed at the charity's AGM. The Board is made up of individuals who ensure the optimum balance of expertise and experience is available to Young Bristol.

Each new trustee is inducted into their role and they are provided with copies of relevant Charity Commission documents. They also meet with the Chief Executive and Chair to better understand the programmes and work of Young Bristol. All trustees are also directors of the Company with details registered at Companies House.

Organisational structure

There is a small staff team based at the registered offices of the charity led by its Chief Executive who reports to the Board of trustees.

Key management personnel

A full list of individual trustees is contained within these audited accounts. The trustees appoint and support the Chief Executive. The Chief Executive has delegated responsibilities and is responsible for directing, controlling, running and operating the charity on a day to day basis. The Chief Executive is supported by a Senior Management Team which consists of its Development & Fundraising and Outdoor Activities & Programmes Managers.

No individual employee of the charity received remuneration exceeding £60K pa with the total gross salary cost of the Senior Management Team totaling £108K in the past financial year.

All trustees give of their time freely and no trustee received remuneration during the year under review. The charity has effected and maintains a range of Insurances with a reputable insurance company, which includes Charity Trustee Insurance to manage the charity's exposure to financial loss due to unforeseen events occurring.

The trustees review the pay of all employees on an annual basis, and normally consider increases in accordance with average earnings, subject to the financial position of the charity. In view of the nature of the charity, the trustees benchmark against pay levels in other charities of a similar size.

Risk management

The trustees and management of Young Bristol have carried out an evaluation of all risks to which the charity is exposed and, in particular, to those relating to its operations and finances. A risk register has been developed and is regularly reviewed and updated to support the Board in evaluating risk. The trustees believe the most significant risks to the charity are around funding sources, financial loss and safeguarding of both employees, including volunteers and young people.

Financial risks include:

- Lack of funding to sustain Young Bristol's existing programmes
- Financial loss suffered or legal dispute entered into with regard to Young Bristol custodian trustee
 role with six properties leased from the City Council
- Over reliance on key funders to meet staff and project costs
- Charity has insufficient cash flow to meet liabilities

Safeguarding

Young Bristol is committed to safeguarding at all levels of the organisation and this matter is frequently discussed at Board level. Our commitment to safeguarding includes:

- Having a comprehensive Safeguarding and Child Protection policy which is reviewed externally on an annual basis and compiles with all relevant legislation namely; Keeping Children Safe in Education (2018) and Working Together to Safeguard Children (2018).
- Ensuring all staff and volunteers are trained in safeguarding and child protection.
- Following safer recruitment practices when recruiting adult staff and volunteers.
- Having all staff and volunteers complete and pass an enhanced DBS check.
- A safeguarding management structure which includes an appointed Designated Safeguarding Lead and an appointed Young Bristol Trustee with responsibility for Safeguarding and Child Protection.

We have experience managing complex safeguarding issues with young people, including those who have multi-agency involvement from social care, health services, local authorities and the police. We also have experience in responding within nationally and locally recognised guidelines, to new safeguarding disclosures, and working with other agencies to manage these.

These areas of risk, and all others, are regularly monitored and are mitigated by:

- Agreeing a course of action and annual operating budgets with the Chief Executive
- Working to expand funding resources and sources of Income
- Ensuring monitoring and evaluation procedures are implemented for all programmes and activities
- Continuing to review Young Bristol's custodian trustee responsibilities
- Reducing the risk through continual revision on a regular basis of all policies and procedures
- Seeking external professional guidance and support on all health and safety and safeguarding issues
- Continuous monitoring of procedures and capturing learning from any complaint(s) or incident reporting
- Taking out and maintaining appropriate insurance

- Appointing an appropriate qualified Auditor to independently audit the charity's income and expenditure on an annual basis.
- -Ensure Charity Commission and Companies House details are regularly updated concerning the trustees/directors of the charity along with relevant financial information.

In other areas of little or no risk, existing controls were found to be satisfactory although regular assessment of working practices will continue.

All records are secured in lockable cabinets and the legal documents are stored with Young Bristol legal advisors safe from fire, flood or other significant damage. Any exceptional custodian trustee issues are discussed by the Board of Trustees.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Going Concern

The trustees have undertaken a review of all of its assets and liabilities, including carrying out a cash flow analysis and have concluded that the charity is adequately resourced and remains a going concern with no immediate risk.

income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Land and buildings

Land and buildings purchased by or gifted to Young Bristol have been provided to various affiliated Young People's Clubs for their use in perpetuity and rent free. Land and buildings are shown in the balance sheet at cost.

No depreciation is provided on freehold buildings as the residual value is greater than the cost and therefore charging no depreciation is deemed appropriate.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Other tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than on freehold buildings at rates calculated to write off the costs, less estimated residual value, of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Office furniture and equipment 25% on cost

Motor vehicles 20% on cost

Club and activity equipment 25% on cost

Leasehold land & equipment length of lease, 5 years

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension contributions

Pension contributions are paid on behalf of certain employees to the Teachers Pension Scheme, a defined contribution scheme. Contributions are recognised as they fall due. Non-teaching staffs are eligible for participation in a stakeholder pension scheme managed by Friends Provident and a workplace pension scheme managed by NEST.

Investments

Investments are included in the balance sheet at market value. Both realised and unrealised gains or losses in the value of investments arising during the year are dealt with as movements of funds. Income from investments is included when receivable.

Affiliated Clubs

Young Bristol's financial statements at 31 March 2020 do not consolidate the results of clubs and organisations affiliated to Young Bristol.

Commitments

The charitable commitments, assets and liabilities of specific projects are dealt with in separate funds.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Grants

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activity in the year in which they are received unless there are specific performance objectives attached in line with the charity SORP.

Subscriptions and donations

Subscriptions and donations are shown inclusive of income tax recoverable when payments have been received under deed of covenant. Donations of tangible assets are included in the financial statements at valuation.

Voluntary help and donations-in-kind

Donations in the form of voluntary help and services-in-kind are not valued in the income and expenditure financial statements. The Trustees do not believe that these donations can be quantified.

Resources Expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

UNRESTRICTED FUNDS

General fund

The purpose of the General fund is to meet the general operating expenses of Young Bristol including staff costs. These expenses are met by subscriptions, donations, fundraising events and grants. The General fund is independent of the Special funds, although, from time to time and where the constitution permits, grants may be received from Other funds to help defray operating expenses.

RESTRICTED FUNDS

Riverside Fund

This fund was established to provide facilities at the Broad Plain & Riverside Youth Project in Bristol. It also represents transactions undertaken on behalf of the Riverside Club.

Restricted Income Fund

During the year, Young Bristol received funding to deliver specific projects, the details of which are shown in the movement in funds above.

20. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

There were no related party transactions for the year ended 31 March 2020.

21. AFFILIATED ORGANISATIONS

Young Bristol operates through autonomous affiliated clubs and organisations in the former County of Avon. Young Bristol provides support to the management committees of these clubs, and access to activities organised by Young Bristol, and other organisations.
