#### Structure, Governance and Management

#### **Governing Document**

The Royal British Legion Attendants Company Trust (By Guarantee) (formerly The Royal British Legion Attendants Company Limited (By Guarantee) (hereafter referred to as the 'charitable company' or "the RBLA" or "the Trust") is a registered company and is registered with the Charity Commission. The Trust is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 9<sup>th</sup> December 2004, which were completely rewritten in conjunction with, and agreement of, the Charity Commission from the original Memorandum and Articles of Association as amended on 28th September 1962, 1<sup>st</sup> April 1978, 25<sup>th</sup> April 1995 and 28<sup>th</sup> October 1999. The charitable company was originally incorporated on 1<sup>st</sup> September 1943. In the event of the charity being wound up, the guarantee of each member is limited to £1.

#### Appointment of Trustees

Trustees, who act as directors for the purposes of company law, are elected from the Trust membership at the Annual General Meeting. Members, (who have to enjoy current membership of the Royal British Legion) are upon application to the Trust admitted to membership by a majority vote of the trustees present at a meeting of the Board.

No body or person is entitled to appoint trustees other than the members.

One third (or the number nearest one third) of the trustees must retire at each AGM, those longest in office retiring first and the choice between any of equal service being made by drawing lots.

#### Trustee Induction and Training

When required new trustees, when elected, undergo an orientation period to introduce them to their legal obligations under charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the committee structure and process by which decisions are made. They are introduced to the current business plan and financial performance.

#### Organisation

The 'Members' at the AGM elect trustees from their number to replace those who retire by rotation. The trustees in turn elect a chairperson and the members of two standing committees, the Audit Committee and the Grants Committee.

The board meet formerly two to three times each year as agreed by the trustees, to conduct business and receive reports. The Audit Committee oversee the routine expenditure of the charity as agreed by the board and recorded in the minutes. The Grants Committee are empowered by the board to examine applications to the Trust and make grants to institutions where individuals are to undertake training. Each year the board re-examines and sets the maximum expenditure for the year together with the maximum individual grant the committee are able to award within that expenditure. Grants above these sums are agenda items referred to the board at a formal meeting.

The Trust does not currently solicit funding from the public or any other institution. The Trust's income for its charitable activities is derived from the returns upon its cash on deposit held with CCLA (COIF) and Lloyds Bonds together with donations received.

#### Structure, Governance and Management (continued)

#### **Employees**

The charitable company has no employees.

Risk Review

The trustees have examined the principal areas of the charity company's operations and considered the major risks faced in each of these areas.

- the return on investment in a COIF deposit account.
- Lloyds investment Bonds.

In the opinion of the trustees the charitable company has established resources and reviewed systems which, under normal conditions, should allow these risks to its cash holdings be mitigated to an acceptable level in its day to day operations.

#### **Objectives and Activities**

The objectives of the charitable company, which were redefined with the assistance of the Charity Commission and adopted in December 2005, remain:

'To promote the rehabilitation and resettlement of men and women of Her Majesty's Armed Forces who are in need of assistance to re-establish themselves into civilian life by such charitable means as shall from time to time be thought fit' and; 'To relieve need amongst individuals in need of such assistance which arises by reason of sickness, financial need, disability or infirmity by such charitable means as shall from time to time be thought fit by the trustees'.

#### They include:

- · the provision of grants to enhance employment prospects;
- grants or loans to organisations supporting the ex-service community;
- grants to provide respite breaks for carers of individuals in need of assistance; and
- assistance with rehabilitation of disabled persons to enhance their work prospects.

The main objectives and activities for the year continued to focus upon the provision of grants for training individuals in new skills to enhance their employment prospects. This was achieved by:

- the promotion of the availability of grants through the ex-service community and resettlement services; and
- working in partnership with other agencies to identify those in need of assistance

Grants, normally to a maximum of £3,500 for any one individual in any one year, are made only to the training institutions, colleges and companies who are able to provide the individual with the new skills necessary to enhance their future employment opportunities.

Applications are received from individuals and other agencies and directed to the Grants Committee. Each application is judged formally by the Committee members against eligibility, need and the charitable objectives of the Trust. The amount of grants made in any one year is determined by the Trust's board, which establishes the total grants spend. The Grant Committee is able to bring exceptional matters before the board at a formal meeting.

#### Trustees' report (continued)

#### **Achievements and Performance**

The board agreed, as interest rates remained so low, to allocated funds from both capital and income from its deposit accounts to grants to individuals during the year. This was to enable the trust to meet its grant objectives for the year.

The trustees had agreed that they would invest their funds into COIF deposit account and two short term fixed interest bonds with Lloyds bank.

The trust made some 53 grants a total of £69,247 during the year making the average grant £1306. The grants made are mainly a contribution towards the cost of training, rather than meeting the full amount. The trustees had previously agreed that the annual limit for training grants would be £50,000 during the year, and the limit for a single grant would be £3,500. The trustees, subsequently, agreed to increase the limit to £69247.

Clearly, each year the Trust is dependent on maintaining the income stream from its investments and that was beyond the control of the Trust. However, these funds are held within an approved institution and reviewed on a regular basis by the trustees.

#### **Financial Review**

During the year the Trust has received investment income and bank interest of £1311 plus a legacy donation of £14068 which it has used to support the funding of grants.

#### Reserves policy

The trustees have reviewed the Trust's policy in respect of the level of free reserves (that is those funds that are freely available) and agreed that both capital and income earned would be spent to make grants. Currently, there are no committed future donations.

#### Investment policy

The investment policy of the Trust continues to hold cash assets within COIF deposit account earning interest plus short term bonds with Lloyds Bank. It holds limited funds in a current banking account drawing down funds from deposit when necessary to meet payments.

#### Plans for the future

Despite the continued reductions in H M Forces there has been little evidence to suggest that the numbers of potential beneficiaries of the charity are likely to diminish in the foreseeable future. Many continue to leave the Services with no transferable employment skills. However, as the trust's funds were rapidly depleting and the prospects of future income streams were limited the Board had to consider the long term viability of the charity. The Board agreed to consider a managed wind down of the charity with any residual funds spent on activities associated with its primary objectives.

#### Political and charitable contributions

The Trust made no political contributions during the year. Contributions in 2013 Nil.

#### Disclosure of information to auditors.

The trustees who held office at the date of approval of this trustees' report confirm that, so far as they are each aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the Trust's examiners are unaware; and each trustee has taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a trustee to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the Trust's examiners are aware of that information.

They have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the charitable company and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.
