#### TRUSTEES' REPORT

The trustees present their annual report and the consolidated audited financial statements of the group for the year ended 31 March 2004. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in October 2000 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

#### LEGAL AND ADMINISTRATIVE DETAILS

The company is registered as a charity, number 206862, and is limited by guarantee, number 409726. Legal and administrative information is set out on pages 1 and 2 and forms part of this report. The governing body of the charity is the council of trustees and its governing documents are the memorandum and articles of association.

#### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The Soil Association was founded in 1946 by Lady Eve Balfour, bringing together farmers, scientists and nutritionists concerned about the impact of intensive farming practices on the environment, food quality and health. Since then the Association has increasingly challenged the dominance of industrial agriculture, associated as it is with degradation of the countryside, increases in diet-related illness, mistreatment of animals and the betrayal of public trust in food.

Fifty years on, the Soil Association has become one of the UK's most respected environmental groups, a not-for-profit membership organisation and charity, playing a crucial role in the transformation of attitudes to food and farming in the UK and internationally.

We work with the public, farmers, growers, food processors, retailers, consumers and policy makers. Our mission is to bring about change by creating a growing body of public opinion that understands the links between farming practice and food, and between plant, animal, human and environmental health.

The Soil Association works with the backing of its members, supporters and partners in:

- Raising awareness. We publicise the wide benefits of sustainable, organic agriculture through the media, direct to the public through events and seminars, and through widely respected policy reports. We have become a highly respected information source on the environment, human health, animal welfare and community benefits of organic farming.
- Education. Our network of 55 demonstration farms open to the public is supported by curriculum-linked materials for schools, a comprehensive website, helplines and numerous technical publications.
- Lobbying for change. We liaise with government and non-government organisations to improve the policy climate for sustainable, organic agriculture.
- Promoting local food. We work with hundreds of local partners to support local food initiatives such as box schemes, farmers' markets, co-operatives, community-supported agriculture and direct marketing projects.
- Transforming food provision in schools and hospitals. We are establishing healthy, local and organic food schemes in partnership with a number of public institutions, to improve public health.
- Supporting farmers. We advise and represent Britain's community of organic farmers and growers.
- Safeguarding integrity. We lead the field in setting and developing organic standards that are trusted by consumers.
- Inspection and certification. Our distinctive symbol is a hallmark of integrity and consumer trust, backed by rigorous inspection and certification of organic food production.
- Pioneering sustainable agriculture worldwide. We lead in the establishment of international organic standards, and work with developing countries to establish organic markets.

#### TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued)

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The charity's income grew from £7,074,000 to £7,456,000, which represents year on year growth of over 5%, which is a significant achievement at a time when fundraising is becoming increasingly difficult.

Income from donations and gifts increased by 8% year on year, which is an encouraging result when trusts are feeling the adverse effect of volatile stock markets and increasing tax burdens.

There have also been some considerable successes in the area of grants receivable which has increased by £174,000 or 14%. We have been working with many of the Regional Development Agencies within the English regions as well as the national government agencies within England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland, with a particular emphasis on bringing together organic producers and processors to supply the local economy with quality organic produce.

Certification income stabilised this year after several years of significant growth as the certification market reached maturity. The subsidiary retained its market share and is optimistic about future prospects in non-food organic product certification.

The membership income growth of £266,000 or 48% resulted from recruitment activity both in 2003/04 and the previous year in developing our monthly direct debit scheme, and the results of those efforts have shown in this excellent result.

Charitable expenditure has grown this year by £481,000 or 7%. All programme areas, with the exception of membership, have grown quite modestly as the association has been forced to limit expansion due to financial constraints. The reduction in membership expenditure was a result of the phasing of recruitment activity over the two years rather than a reduction in activity.

The emphasis in our programmes has been on the development of the organic supply chain, including public procurement, to maximise the availability of locally sourced products. Increased activity in policy and campaigns, producer services, national & regional development and local food support this policy aim.

#### RESERVES POLICY

The general unrestricted fund is held to support administration and overhead costs, and to act as back up should any project need funding. The intention is that this should be grown and maintained in surplus. Such unrestricted income is expendable at the discretion of trustees in the furtherance of the objects of the charity and may be held to finance both working capital and capital investment. Other funds are specifically restricted to identified projects.

The overall reserves figure has increased this year from £785,000 to £819,000 of which £773,000 is designated as unrestricted.

This reserves figure covers 56 days of operating costs compared to 58 days at the start of the year. It is the wish of the Trustees that the charity aims to have 100 days' operating costs held in unrestricted reserves, but this has proved to be a stretching task given the organisation's aspirations for work programmes over the last three years. It is therefore the view of the Trustees that we need to embark on a major fundraising campaign to fund our expanding programmes whilst also consolidating our reserves position.

#### TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued)

#### RISK MANAGEMENT

The trustees have overall responsibility for ensuring that the charity has an appropriate system of controls, financial and otherwise. The systems of financial control are designed to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance against material misstatement or loss. They include:

- an annual budget approved by the trustees;
- regular consideration by the trustees of financial results and variance from budgets;
- delegation of authority and segregation of duties, and;
- identification and management of risks.

The trustees have reviewed major risks and established systems together with appropriate monitoring procedures as a means to mitigate them.

#### INVESTMENT POLICY

The trustees have powers within the memorandum of association to invest surplus funds providing the Association does not undertake any substantial permanent trading activities.

The Association currently has a relatively small investment holding and does not retain professional investment managers.

The trustees will accept a bequest or gift of shares but reserve the right to liquidate those shares at any time unless the transfer imposes a condition to the contrary.

# **FUTURE PROSPECTS**

The single most important aim of the Soil Association is giving the public the facts about intensive farming, and presenting them with the alternative, organic farming. Only then can the public make up its own mind about what food they can trust, and how they feed their children. Never has this been more true than in the last year, when our Food for Life campaign for healthy local and organic school meals struck a chord with the nation, and made those in power listen.

We have earned the trust of the public. This is a huge responsibility. We have never lost sight of our deeply held convictions while moving closer to positions of influence. But there is a great deal still to be done. Over the coming years, our aim is to scale up our activities by entering a phase of intensive fundraising to back vital new initiatives.

#### GOVERNANCE

The membership of the council as at 31 March 2004 is set out on page 1.

The Soil Association has a council of trustees, elected by the charity's members, who in turn elect the chairperson and management committee. Executive responsibility rests with the director and senior management team who report to the management committee.

Professional advisers are as set out on page 2.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF

#### THE SOIL ASSOCIATION LIMITED

We have audited the financial statements of The Soil Association Limited for the year ended 31 March 2004 which comprise the consolidated statement of financial activities, the balance sheets, the consolidated cash flow statement and the related notes 1 to 21. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and the company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As described in the statement of trustees' responsibilities, the company's trustees are responsible for the preparation of financial statements which are required to be prepared in accordance with applicable United Kingdom law and accounting standards. Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant United Kingdom legal and regulatory requirements and auditing standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report if, in our opinion, the trustees' report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the company has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding trustees' remuneration and transactions with the company is not disclosed.

We read the trustees' report for the above year and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements.

#### Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom auditing standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. #### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments, which are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" published in October 2000 and in accordance with applicable accounting standards.

The statement of financial activities (SOFA), balance sheet and cash flow consolidate the financial statements of the charity and its wholly owned subsidiary undertakings, Soil Association Certification Limited and SA Sales and Services Limited. The results of the subsidiaries are consolidated on a line by line basis.

No separate SOFA has been presented for the charity alone as permitted by Section 230 of the Companies Act 1985.

#### Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

#### Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been restricted for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate fund.

# **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included in SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. For legacies, where the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy, entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received.

#### Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Direct charitable expenditure comprises direct expenditure including direct staff costs attributable to the activity. Where costs cannot be directly attributed, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with the management of the group's assets, organisational administration and compliance with statutory requirements.

Fund raising costs are those incurred in seeking voluntary contributions and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity. Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

# 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £1,000 are capitalised and included at cost including any incidental expenses of acquisition.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Office furniture and fittings
Office equipment and software

#### Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The SOFA includes the net gains and losses arising on revaluations and from disposals throughout the year.

#### Stock

Stock consists of purchased goods for resale. Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

#### Pension costs

The group contributes to a money purchase scheme to which the employee contributes an equal amount. The amount charged to the SOFA is the contribution payable in the year. The group has no other pension liability.

#### Finance and operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases are charged to the SOFA over the period in which the cost is incurred. Assets purchased under finance lease are capitalised as fixed assets. Obligations under such agreements are included in creditors. The difference between the capitalised cost and the total obligation under the lease represents the finance charges. Finance charges are written off to the SOFA over the period of the lease so as to produce a constant periodic rate of charge.

#### Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities are retranslated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are taken to the SOFA.

#### Taxation

No corporation tax has been provided in the financial statements of The Soil Association Limited as the income of the charity is covered by the exemption granted by Section 505 of the Income and Corporation Taxes Act 1988. Provision for deferred taxation is made in the subsidiary companies at the appropriate rates in respect of all material timing differences only to the extent that, in the opinion of the trustees, there is a reasonable probability that an asset or liability will crystallise in the foreseeable future.

#### Restatement of comparatives - Total Resources Expended

Items of expenditure which involve more than one cost category have been apportioned on a reasonable and justifiable basis in accordance with SORP guidelines. The figures reported for 2003 have been restated to reflect this change and provide consistent comparative information.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Membership income

Annual membership subscriptions are accounted for on a cash received basis because there are non-refundable.

#### Support costs

Support costs include the remaining salary cost (after direct attribution to relevant departments) of the support teams (finance, human resources and information technology) and a proportion of premise costs for these staff.

#### Management and Administration costs

These costs include a proportion of salary costs for the officers of the company in line with the time spent on statutory and constitutional matters. In line with this an apportionment of premises costs is included. Also included are the audit costs, bank charges, legal costs, insurance costs, and the cost of trustees meetings.

#### 2. LEGACIES

No accrual for legacies not received by 31 March 2004 has been included in the financial statements as no notification of impending distribution has been received.
