

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

The Council submits its annual report and audited accounts for the year ended 31 December 2009

Consultation with government and other authorities in the UK and the EU remains the prime task of the Association as the representative body of the mining industry of the United Kingdom

ENVIRONMENT

During 2009 the Association has continued to be involved on environmental issues at European and National levels

The Association has continued to be involved with its colleagues and Government on the transposition on the Mining Waste Directive which came into force in UK law on 7 July 2009. Through CBI Minerals Group, the Association has been involved in discussions with the Environment Agency on putting the Directive into practice through the Environmental Permitting Programme. This has included responding to drafts of the Technical Guidances being prepared by Defra and the Environment Agency. This has continued into 2010. The Association's members had a presentation from Defra in November 2009 and this was followed by a meeting in December with the Environment Agency at which the members explained their operations. Although the exact details of how the system will work have not been completed, any waste facility opened since May 2008 has had to be registered.

During 2009 the proposed Soil Directive was again on and off the agenda. A number of Member States including UK remain firmly opposed to the proposal. The UK Government has stated that whilst it supports soil protection, it is opposed to a Soil Directive.

Members of the Association have a good environmental record and the Association takes a pro-active stance on environmental issues. The Association now produces annual environmental statistics. The figures below represent the UK underground operating members.

HEALTH & SAFETY

The occupational exposure levels for NO_x was again raised by SCOEL (the Standing Committee on Occupational Exposure Levels. It was using a Brazilian study as the basis. This study was flawed and at present there has been no change to the levels.

In the UK the Association continued to work closely with the Health and Safety Executive and is represented by Dr P Holmes on the Safety and Health in Mines Advisory Board. Over a number of years, the Association has taken a pro-active position and this continues to benefit the industry. In addition the Association has two representatives on the Mining Industry Committee.

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The UK underground operating members of the Association report their safety as a lost time accident frequency rate based on the number of accidents (defined as more than 3 consecutive days off work) per 100,000 man-hours worked. The results for the last four calendar years are
