Directors' report

The directors of Land Machinery Limited present their annual report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 30 September 2006

Principal activities and business review

The principal activity of the company continues to consist of the distribution of agricultural and horticultural garden machinery and equipment

Delayed receipt by farmers of Single Farm Payments resulted in difficult trading conditions for much of the financial year

Turnover was at similar levels to last year but the company improved its profitability due to the cost saving measures implemented in 2005

In 2007 certain sectors of the industry may benefit from improved market prices but the overall outlook is uncertain

Company results and dividends

The financial statements for the year ended 30 September 2006 show profit before tax of £109,000 (2005 £55,000) on turnover of £8,188,000 (2005 £8,064,000) There is a profit on ordinary activities after taxation for the period of £86,000 (2005 £40,000)

The Board of Directors proposes a final dividend on profits for the year ended 30 September 2006 of £42,000 As this dividend has neither been voted by the shareholders nor been paid it has not been charged to the profit and loss account, and is not recognised as a liability

Details of the movements in reserves are shown in the notes to the financial statements

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the company's financial statements except as noted below. In these financial statements FRS 21 'Events after the balance sheet date' has been adopted for the first time. The accounting policies under this new standard are set out below together with an indication of the effects of their requirements.

The prior year adjustment required by the implementation of FRS 21 'Events after the balance sheet date' is set out in note 15

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, and under the historical cost accounting rules

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the company and its subsidiary undertakings made up to 30 September 2006. The acquisition method of accounting has been adopted. Under this method, the results of subsidiary undertakings acquired or disposed of in the year are included in the consolidated profit and loss account from the date of acquisition or up to the date of disposal.

Under section 230(4) of the Companies Act 1985 the company is exempt from the requirement to present its own profit and loss account. The profit dealt with in the accounts of the company is stated in note 17

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded using the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction, or if hedged forward, at the rate of exchange under the related forward currency contract. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated using the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date and the gains and losses on translation are included in the profit and loss account

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset on a straight line basis over its expected useful life determined as follows

Plant and machinery - 10-20% per annum Motor vehicles - 25% per annum Fixtures, fittings, tools and equipment - 10-33% per annum

Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the period of the lease

Pension costs

Land Machinery Limited operates a defined contribution group personal pension plan, the assets of which are held separately in an independently administered fund. The amount charged against profits represents the contributions payable to the scheme in respect of the accounting period.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Taxation

The charge for taxation is based on the profit for the year and takes into account taxation deferred because of timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes

Deferred tax is recognised without discounting, in respect of all timing differences between the treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes which have arisen but not reversed by the balance sheet date, except as otherwise required by FRS 19

Leases and Hire Purchase

Assets acquired under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are capitalised and the outstanding future lease obligations are shown in creditors. Operating lease rentals are charged to the profit and loss account as incurred

Stock and work in progress

Stock and work in progress is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Where relevant, cost includes an appropriate share of overheads

Turnover

Turnover represents sales of goods and services outside the group net of discounts, allowances and value added tax

The principal activity of the group is the distribution of agricultural, horticultural and garden machinery and equipment

There was no significant turnover from sales outside the UK

All sales originate in the UK
