Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL AND TRUSTEES

The Trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2022.

Legal Status

The Memorandum and Articles of the Association dated 12th June 1962 as amended in 2002 and 2018 govern the Association. It is also a Registered Charity.

Objects of the Charity

The principal object for which the Association was established is to promote the general acquisition by Citizens of the United Kingdom and in particular those residing in the County and City of Nottingham, of skills in shooting and the safe use of firearms with a view thereto to promote the establishment and maintenance of civilian rifle and pistol clubs. The Association encourages all affiliated clubs to be open to all persons irrespective of ethnicity, nationality, sexual orientation, religion or belief, age, sex or disability, except as a necessary consequence of the requirement of shooting as a particular sport.

Review of Activities

The Association has fourteen affiliated clubs in its membership.

At the start of the year, the Association was planning to organise its usual programme of competitions for full-bore rifle, small-bore target rifle, gallery and light weight sport rifle, and black powder muskets and rifles where possible. For the first year since the start of the Pandemic we were able to hold a full programme of events and expect this to continue into the 2023/2024 season.

The Great Britain Match Rifle Team toured Australia in 2022 after a 3-year process of application, selection and training. The team of 18 had two members with Nottinghamshire credentials, Simon Whitby, born in the County and Fiona Day who lives in the County currently. Both were selected to take part in the prestigious Woomera Match which is shooting's equivalent of The Ashes. Simon was the coach on the L/H target with Fiona being one of his shooters. Great Britain won the Woomera Match in 2022. The final score was 1764.170v to 1751.152v. To highlight the quality of the shooting in the match, Great Britain's score set a record for the Woomera Match. The previous highest score was 1762 and was set in both 2006 and 2010

Details of all scores covering target rifle and match rifle competitions are available from the Association's website (www.nottsra.co.uk).

Later in the 2022 at the Premier Black powder event the Trafalgar held in October at Bisley There was an outstanding showing from many Nottinghamshire shooters in all of the events taking place over that weekend Nottingham shooters were placed in the top 3 for most events and winning a significant number of them.

All in all the Association is getting back on track after the significant impact of the pandemic. As a sport with participants all the way up into their 80s we have been hit harder than most sports, with a significant number of 'old guard' choosing not to return to the sport after their enforced break. However, there are also a significant number who have come back, and are back competing, with the winter postal leagues entries being back to about 75% of their prepandemic numbers. Nottinghamshire's black powder weekend suffered from the change in membership, but a new subcommittee is reinventing the event for a changing audience, so we are excited to see the outcome. The fullbore team is now being led by Rick Shouler, our most recent Queens prize winner, and is going from strength to strength. We still have a lot of work to do and face a number of challenges in the near future, but the association and membership are keen to find solutions and keep pushing forwards for our sport.

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REPORT OF THE COUNCIL AND TRUSTEES

Income Generation and Resources Expended

The total income of the Association from subscriptions has increased from £562 in 2021 to £1093 in 2022. The increase is the result of returning the subscription fees to their normal value as were not exhibiting reduced activity due to the Coronavirus pandemic. The overall income rose from £3,822 in 2021 to £3,942 in 2022. However total expenditure has decreased from £3,852 in 2021 to £3,119 in 2022. The Association's funds have increased by £823 to £17,364. A more detailed analysis of the income and expenditure for the year is shown in the Income and Expenditure Account.

Reserves Policy

In order to allow the Charity to be managed efficiently and to provide a sufficient buffer against fluctuations in income and expenditure, the Trustees consider that a minimum general reserve should be maintained between one and a half and two times annual expenditure. During the year the Association's unrestricted funds increased from £16,541 to £17,364 so we met the minimum requirement of the reserves policy. There were no restricted funds outstanding during the year.

Governance and Internal Control

The Association is a Company and the liability of its members is limited. Every member of the Association undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Association, in the event of the same being wound up while he is a member, or within one year after he ceases to be a member, and to the costs, charges and expenses of the winding up, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributories among themselves, such amount as may be required not exceeding £1.

The business of the Association is managed by the Council, consisting of neither less than nine nor more than eighteen members of the Association and its affiliated clubs. Council members are elected by the Association's Annual General Meeting, with one third of the council members retiring by rotation and being eligible for re-election at each Annual General Meeting. In the pursuance of the objects of the charity the members of Council have had due regard to the Charity Commission's public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.
