REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF MANAGEMENT

The Council present their report and financial statements of Philharmonia Limited for the year ended 31 March 2003.

GOVERNING INSTRUMENT

The company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

MANAGEMENT

The company ('The Charity') is managed by a Council of Management comprised of 8 playing members of the orchestra, elected in accordance with the Articles of Association, plus 4 non-playing members, who are co-opted at each annual general meeting. The Council of Management is supported by two sub committees, the Finance Committee, charged with working on the detail of the Orchestra's Finance and the Orchestra Committee responsible for orchestral and musical matters including personnel.

APPOINTMENT OF COUNCIL OF MANAGEMENT

The Council of Management is appointed by the members of the Company. A vote is conducted at each AGM to elect nominated members to fill vacancies created by the retirement of existing Members of the Council.

Exceptionally, a member may be elected by a properly constituted Extraordinary General Meeting. The 4 non-playing members are co-opted at each annual general meeting.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF MANAGEMENT

ACTIVITIES AND REVIEW OF THE BUSINESS

Artistic Programme 2002/03 Season

2002/03 was another highly successful year for the Philharmonia Orchestra. In addition to its Royal Festival Hall season the Orchestra gave concerts throughout the UK, Europe, North America, Russia and Japan to large and enthusiastic audiences. Despite the difficult trading conditions that prevailed in the orchestral sector, the Philharmonia produced a small surplus whilst at the same time increasing its reserves, some of which it intends to transfer over to the Philharmonia Trust.

The Royal Festival Hall season was particularly rich in terms of conductors, soloists and repertoire. Highlights included the 90th birthday celebrations of Kurt Sanderling, Germany's most eminent conductor and the Philharmonia's Conductor Emeritus, and a Beethoven Cycle, originally to be conducted by Wolfgang Sawallisch, but owing to his indisposition shared amongst a wide range of conductors including some of the most provocative performers in the classical field. In the autumn Vladimir Ashkenazy joined the Orchestra for a Tchaikovsky Cycle which was also repeated in Japan, where it was recorded and became the subject of a documentary. Ashkenazy returned to the Orchestra in March to lead a major project exploring the music of Shostakovich and Prokofiev composed at the time of the Great Terror in the Soviet Union. This project, which embraced film, chamber music, recitals and seminars, was one of the highlights of the London season.

Other highlights included a celebration of the 300th anniversary of St Petersburg featuring Valerie Gergiev and his protégé Tugan Sokhiev. Christian Thielemann joined the Orchestra for some remarkable concerts including a tour to Germany. Andras Schiff joined the Orchestra for three superb concerts of classical repertoire, and Charles Dutoit returned to the Orchestra after an interval of some years to conduct two outstanding concerts of French repertoire. Dutoit brings a unique sense of style to this music. Principal conductor Christoph von Dohnányi continued to develop his relationship with the Orchestra, bringing performances of great authority to the Orchestra's core repertoire. Under his direction the Orchestra achieves a remarkably cultivated sense of musicianship, which is distinct among the London Orchestras. One bonus of the indisposition of Sawallisch was the return of Sir Charles Mackerras to the Philharmonia. This partnership was so successful that the Orchestra immediately appointed him Principal Guest Conductor, a decision hailed in the press as the "best piece of news all year".

Thirty-four subscription concerts were given in the Royal Festival Hall, and a further 10 promoted independently in the Hall exploring new repertoire, and formats designed to appeal to new audiences.

2002/03 marked Julian Anderson's first season as Director of the MOT series. Seven concerns were given. Julian Anderson has brought a distinctive approach to this series focusing on predominantly British composers. The featured composers included Michael Jarrell, Anthony Gilbert, Simon Holt, Richard Causton, Alexander Goehr, and Denis Bouliane. Each concert was well received by enthusiastic audiences. Under Julian's direction this series continues to present the most innovative music from the best contemporary composers.

The Leicester and Bedford residencies continue successfully with a wide range of music presented in each venue. In the course of the year discussions commenced with Bristol City Council regarding a partnership with the Philharmonia Orchestra. Following lengthy consultation, the Orchestra has now established an innovative partnership which will include work at the Watershed Media Centre, Colston Hall, St George's, Bristol University and the Education Service.

The Orchestra continued to work actively in the regions taking some 43 programmes with the world's finest conductors and soloists to a wide range of venues. The satellite residencies in Basingstoke and Southend continued to be particularly successful, and the MOT concerts presented for the first time outside London achieved some success. Audiences in the regions remain committed and enthusiastic, but very conservative in their taste.

The Philharmonia Orchestra maintained an active touring programme throughout the year performing in Spain, Germany, Italy, Sardinia, Greece, France (including the Chatelet residency), Belgium, Japan, North America and for the first time Russia. Market conditions in Europe, North America and Japan remain very tough, and this sector of the Orchestra's work can no longer be relied on to make a major contribution to overheads. The financial objective in touring is now to cover costs rather than make a surplus as in previous years.

The Orchestra undertook a number of recording projects throughout the year, being principally funded through external Trusts and Foundations. Opera recordings continue to be popular, particularly the Chandos Opera in English series, but mainstream repertoire is no longer recorded.

Through its Community & Education Programme, the Philharmonia Orchestra aims to respond to the culturally diverse communities located in each of its residency areas, crossing cultural boundaries with activities planned in close consultation with local agencies. The Philharmonia Orchestra has recently developed a strategy on cultural diversity, and the aims of this strategy will be integrated into the Community & Education Programme during the 2003/04 season.

The 2002/03 season saw the launch of a number of new initiatives, including new projects for schools (School Links and Stepping Stones) and activity for gifted and talented children attending Bedford's Frontiers Club. It also saw the establishment of youth councils (known as Sound Boards) in each of the Orchestra's residency areas.

The 2002/03 financial year has seen the successful implementation of major change in the Philharmonia Orchestra marketing department. Following the departure of the Acting Head of Sales and Marketing in June 2002, an in-depth analysis of the current and proposed future departmental structure was undertaken. After a lengthy consultation process, and in the light of a rapidly changing climate in both e-commerce and recording, a revised departmental structure was agreed, which acknowledged the need for the department to be managed by an orchestral marketing specialist.

The Orchestra was very pleased with the outcome of the Stabilisation process. As mentioned elsewhere the balance sheet has been strengthened, Finance Department strengthened, and new initiatives developed, including the Education website development, in the course of the 2002/03 year.

The Philharmonia Orchestra was delighted to learn that the Arts Council of England will increase funding through the 2004/05 and 2005/06 financial years. Early notification of this decision has enabled the Orchestra to plan with some confidence for the future, and take steps to mitigate the effect of SBC closure on its operations. The increase in subsidy for 2002/03 had a major impact on the work of the Orchestra leading to an increase in activity as well as underwriting a number of artistically ambitious projects. It also enabled the Orchestra to improve the conditions for its members through the provision of a holiday fee scheme.

Despite difficult trading conditions the Orchestra made a modest surplus of £50,860 (excluding Stabilisation funding and the MMSF), whilst at the same time increasing its reserves, some of which it intends to transfer over to the Philharmonia Trust. Own promotion concerts at the Royal Festival Hall performed well against the budget. Unforeseen costs increased the planned budgeted deficit for the Bedford/Leicester residencies, but this was more than offset by the improved performance in touring, recording and engagements. Earned income for recording, touring and engagements continues to decline. Commercial sponsorship remains very difficult to secure and for the first time donations were slightly below budget. However, the total income raised from sponsorship, donations and gifts amounted to £1,288,000, a very healthy figure that is unlikely to be reached in the future. The education budget remained in deficit and it remains difficult to secure funding for the entirety of the Orchestra's education programmes. Planning for 2003/04 and beyond has taken account of this. Looking ahead, once the remaining tranches of debt mitigation have been received during 2003/04 and 2004/05 the orchestra should have a positive balance sheet.

Cultural Diversity Action Plan

The Philharmonia Orchestra has formally adopted its Cultural Diversity Strategy and Action Plan, which will guide its work in this important field over the next 3 years. To date, collaborations have been established with the Bhavan centre in London, and 2 major collaborations with Indian Classical musicians are under way. Partnerships are also under way in Bedford and Leicester. The strategy will permeate every aspect of the Orchestras' work, although it is recognised that it will have particular impact in the Sales and Marketing and Community and Education Strategies. But, the strategy is regarded as a working document. There is much new and excellent advice and work in this area which the Orchestra, with its relationship with Bristol, Bedford and Leicester, will want to adopt. Contact is being established with the Arts Ambassadors and the Decibel Programme as well as WOMAD.

Equal Opportunities Action Plan

The Philharmonia Orchestra is committed to principles of equal opportunities in all areas of its operation. It is committed to providing equality of opportunity for all people regardless of sex, sexual orientation, ethnic background, disability, culture, religion, class, employment status, marital status, age, responsibility to dependants, and unrelated criminal conviction.

This policy applies to:

Current staff, applicants for administrative posts, orchestra members, soloists and guest artists, applicants for positions as players, concert attendees, participants in Education Programme.

Objectives.

The objectives of the policy are as follows:

Careful wording of advertisements for staff vacancies, job descriptions and contracts.

Monitoring of equal opportunities performance in all recruitment of office staff, players and council of management. Encouraging promoters to provide discretionary benefits to disadvantaged groups.

Providing publicity in accessible formats (e.g. Braille, tape, large print) on request

Including Cultural Diversity as an important element in programme planning and selection of artists.

The Philharmonia Orchestra occupies new offices in High Holborn, which have disabled access.

The Development Department raised nearly £1.3 million in the course of the year aided by the Philharmonia Trust, the Friends Development Committee and the Strategic Advisors. Sponsorships and supporters included The Clore Duffield Foundation, Conde Nast Publications Limited, PricewaterhouseCoopers, the Dowager Vicountess Rothermere, TotalFinaElf, Yoko Ceschina, Unilever, FujiXerox, Reuters, Wilson Bowden plc, Bedfordia Group plc, Piraeus Bank group, the John S Cohen Foundation, ICAP plc, Mr G Modiano, Fleming Family & Partners and Brigade Electronics plc. The Development Department also worked with Life Action Trust and UNAids on fundraising galas at the Royal Festival Hall and St Johns Smith Square. The Orchestra is most grateful to the Philharmonia Trust which under the chairmanship of Sir Sydney Lipworth QC, gave sterling support and continued to offer valuable strategic and policy advice. The following Trustees supported the Orchestra financially throughout the year: Vincent Meyer, John Wates, Hazel Westbury, Sir Sydney Lipworth QC, Daniel Salem, Donald Kahn, OBE, Chrysanthe Lemos and Mark Austen. The Philharmonia Orchestra is most grateful for their continued and loyal support.

The Philharmonia Orchestra anticipates being able to retain its offices in High Holborn until the expiry of the current lease in 2004. Whilst it is inevitable that the property will be redeveloped, this is subject to rigorous planning consent and is unlikely to take place in the near future. However, it is unlikely that any new lease negotiated by the Philharmonia Orchestra to stay in its current premises will be on the current favourable rates, provision will be made in the 2004/05 budget for an increase in rent. The Philharmonia Orchestra will also investigate alternative premises to ensure that its overheads remain as low as possible.

LOOKING AHEAD

Subsidy

The Philharmonia Orchestra was delighted with the announcement that the Arts Council of England Grant will increase across the 2004/05 and 2005/06 financial year. This welcome news brings, for the first time, parity of subsidy with the LSO in London and the principal regional orchestras. However, unlike the LSO and the regional orchestras, the Philharmonia Orchestra does not receive matching funding from a local authority. It is therefore still at a financial disadvantage in comparison with most of its colleagues.

South Bank Centre

Whilst the Orchestra is delighted that the South Bank Board has received substantial grants from the lottery to refurbish the Royal Festival Hall, the closure of the venue for a period of 19 months presents a significant threat to the Orchestra. Negotiations are in hand with both the South Bank Board and the Arts Council of England to ensure that the closure does not adversely affect, either financially or artistically, the Philharmonia Orchestra. Meanwhile, the Royal Festival Hall and its immediate environs continues to deteriorate, and with a refurbished Barbican, with its re-engineered acoustics, the competitive position of the Philharmonia in relation to audiences and sponsors in London continues to be weakened. It remains a priority for the Orchestra to renegotiate its relationship with the South Bank Centre, in particular to avoid double funding for its sales and marketing operation. The Boyden Review, funded by the Stabilisation Unit, is still addressing this issue, and the Orchestra hopes for an early conclusion to this process. Failure to achieve satisfactory outcome to the Boyden Review would undermine the Orchestra's future.

DESIGNATED FUNDS AND OTHER FUNDS

Note 21 to the accounts sets out an analysis of the company's designated and other funds.

RESERVES AND INVESTMENT POLICY

Upon receipt of the full amount of debt mitigation the Philharmonia Orchestra will be in a position to begin building reserves and is in the process of defining a reserves policy. It is noted that the Stabilisation Unit and The Arts Council of England/London Arts require The Orchestra to have sufficient reserves in order to protect its position in the future. Through the creation of an Endowment Fund in Philharmonia Trust, an associated charity of Philharmonia Limited, the Philharmonia Orchestra will be establishing an investment policy.

Currently any funds which are available for investment are invested in high rate, low risk deposit accounts, thus meeting The Orchestra's current requirements that all funds need to be reasonably liquid.

The Martin Musical Scholarship Fund has a separate Reserves and Investment Policy.

PHILHARMONIA INCOME AND EXPENDITURE ACCOUNT

This fund has been in deficit for a number of years due to operating, as most UK symphony orchestras have, with insufficient funding. Once full settlement of the debt mitigation award from the Stabilisation Unit has been received, this account will be at a break-even position.

THE MARTIN MUSICAL SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The Fund is a registered charity (number 313937) and was established under a Trust Deed dated 30 March 1967, whereby all monies accepted by the Fund were to be applied at the discretion of Philharmonia Limited for the advancement of musical education.

The Fund is administered by Philharmonia Limited, which itself is managed by a Council of Management whose current members are listed on page 1.

FRIENDS OF THE PHILHARMONIA INCOME AND EXPENDITURE ACCOUNT

The results for the year reveal a small surplus of income over expenditure. It is very welcome to see the growth in the number of friends and the positive impact that they have on the life and work of the Orchestra.

MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL

The members named on page 1 served throughout the year. Michael Hurwitz, Julian Milone and Mark David retired by rotation under Article 49 of the Articles of Association and Julian Milone and Mark David offered themselves for re-election. Julian Milone, Mark David and Matthias Feile were elected.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Council of Management is responsible for the management of the risks faced by the company. Key risks have been identified as under:

a) Box Office Income

The continuing economic downturn will affect box office income particularly from the sector of the population dependent on investment income. The planned increases in prices in the stabilisation business plan have therefore been substantially reduced and ticket prices will remain static from the 2003/04 to the 2004/05 season.

b) Sponsorship & Donations

Corporate sector sponsorship of the arts continues to decline. The arts, and in particular orchestral concerts, are increasingly less attractive to corporate funders than social and environmental issues.

Similarly, as explained above, private donations from the sector of the population dependent on investment income are more at risk in the current economic climate.

c) Touring and UK Engagements Income

It is envisaged that trading conditions in these areas will continue to be tough and therefore that surpluses will continue to decline.

d) South Bank Centre Closure

Please see above.

e) Maintaining Parity of Subsidy

Please see above.

f) Internal Control

It is vital to maintain proper internal controls in order to safeguard the Orchestra's financial position and protect against the possibility of mismanagement. Internal systems, procedures and controls are accordingly kept under regular review and the Council of Management is satisfied that the risks in this area have been adequately addressed.

The Finance Committee is a very useful part of the Orchestra' structure in this regard. The Orchestra is delighted to welcome two outstanding new recruits, Nadine Majaro and Sioban Healy, who will strengthen this Committee.

g) Key personnel

The risks identified by The Orchestra as resulting from the possibility of loss of key personnel are discussed regularly by the Orchestral Committee and the Council of Management.

RISK MANAGEMENT (continued)

Through the above risk management process, the Council of Management are satisfied that the major risks are identified, and as far as practicable, adequately mitigated.

AUDITORS

The auditors, Baker Tilly, have expressed their willingness to continue in office and a resolution will be proposed in General Meeting that they be reappointed.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and the company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinion we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

The responsibilities of the trustees (who are also the directors of Philharmonia Limited for the purposes of company law) for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards are set out in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Annual Report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the charity has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding trustees' remuneration and transactions with the charity is not disclosed.

We read other information contained in the Annual Report, and consider whether it is consistent with the audited financial statements. This other information comprises only the Report of the Council of Management. We consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements or material inconsistencies with the financial statements. Our responsibilities do not extend to any other information.

Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

A summary of the principal accounting policies, all of which have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year, is set out below.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, and the Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in October 2000, and on a going concern basis. Where necessary comparative figures have been restated to follow the new format.

These financial statements combine the results of Philharmonia Limited together with its branches, the Friends of the Philharmonia and The Martin Musical Scholarship Fund.

The company relies substantially on funding by grants from the Arts Council of England for its current and future commitments and operates on the basis that, taking one year with another, its revenue will match its expenditure. There is no indication that the company's activities will be curtailed or substantially altered and therefore no provision has been included in the financial statements for costs that would be incurred in these events.

In addition, overdraft facilities in line with the company's projected cash flow requirements have been negotiated with the company's bankers for the period to 25 July 2004.

The company has been accepted onto the Arts Council of England's main Stabilisation programme. This will enable the company to strengthen its balance sheet by means of debt mitigation and removal of the accumulated deficit.

In view of this and of the continuing support of the Arts Council of England, the going concern basis is considered an appropriate basis for the preparation of these financial statements.

TURNOVER

This represents income generated from own promotions, engagements and foreign tours, but excludes grants, sponsorship and donations. It comprises the total value of ticket and programme sales, advertising revenue, relay and transcription revenue, and services invoiced to customers, after deducting all credits and allowances and excluding value added tax.

DEPRECIATION

Fixed assets include musical instruments which have been revalued. Other fixed assets are stated at cost.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets except those which are considered to be of high residual value with an immaterial depreciation charge, at rates calculated to write off the cost of the assets down to its estimated residual value evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:-

Office furniture and fittings	20%
Musical instruments, instrument boxes and recordings	10%
Computers and office equipment	33.33%
Motor vehicles	20%

GRANTS AND SPONSORSHIP

Grants and sponsorship are credited to the statement of financial activities in the year in which they accrue.

DONATIONS

Donations if allocated to specific concerts, engagements or projects are credited to the statement of financial activities in the year in which they accrue.

EXPENDITURE

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration on each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function is included as administrative overheads.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

INVESTMENTS

Investments held as fixed assets are revalued at mid market value at the balance sheet date and the gain or loss taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

FUNDS

Unrestricted funds are donations or other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Council of Management for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.

The endowment fund represent those assets held permanently by the charity, principally investments. Income arising on the endowment fund is to be used to provide grants through the grant fund. Any capital gains or losses arising on the investments form part of the fund. Investment management charges and legal advice relating to the fund are charged against the fund.

EXCHANGE CONVERSIONS

Overseas currencies received from foreign tours have been stated at the actual rates obtained.

LEASES

Rentals under operating leases are charged to income and expenditure account as incurred.

CONNECTED CHARITIES

The Philharmonia Trust Limited (registered charity number 254191) is a connected charity as certain members of the Council of Management who are also trustees, are Members of the Council of Management of Philharmonia Limited.

The position at the end of the year between Philharmonia Limited and the Trust is shown in debtors, note 14 and note 18 to the financial statements.

The Philharmonia Benevolent Fund (registered charity number 280370) is connected to Philharmonia Limited having two trustees who are members of the Council of Management.

No transactions between the entities took place during the year.

PENSION COSTS

The company contributes to personal pension schemes. The charge to the statement of financial activities is the amount payable in respect of the accounting period.

The transfer of £32,135 from unrestricted to restricted funds represents the deficits on projects financed by specific funding.
