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#### Minutes of the 42<sup>nd</sup> Annual General Meeting Sunday 7<sup>th</sup> October 2007, 2.15pm

Present: There were 60 members present including B. Sartin (President), D. Little (Chairman), N. Gardner (Company Secretary), A. Hill (Finance Officer)

The Chairman welcomed everyone to the 42<sup>nd</sup> Annual General Meeting and asked all to stand for a minute's silence in memory of Ron Charles and Paul Bull (Director) who had both been associated with Halsway Manor over many years

The Chairman introduced the President, Bonny Sartin and congratulated him and the Yetties for obtaining the Gold Badge which was presented at Sidmouth International Festival in August, and invited him to say a few words

The President commented upon the mix of volunteer and professional helpers who all worked tirelessly for Halsway Manor and wished them every success in the next 41 years

#### 1. Apologies for Absence

Apologies were received from 43 members

#### 2. Minutes of the Annual General Meeting 2006

The Minutes were circulated

It was proposed by R Rudd and seconded by G Elwell that the Minutes be accepted as a true record, and this was agreed by all The Chairman signed the Minutes

#### 3. Matters Arising

R Rudd asked a question about subscriptions, item 9

The Chairman said that the Council had considered the question of an increase in subscriptions and had disagreed with the proposal and decided not to proceed

#### 4. Annual Report

The Chairman reported that this had been a year in which the Manor had taken on more Manor organised events than previously and recorded his grateful thanks to the Events Organiser, Alan Corkett, for his work in this area and also to his wife Christine He hoped that in this way Halsway Manor could broaden its appeal to more guests

The Chairman remarked that there continues to be a long list of building work requiring attention and that the Board is continuing its efforts in this respect within the limited funds available. He mentioned two large donations, one from Lancashire Folk and one from Mary Ireson in memory of Irene Pike, which had helped considerably with further en-suiting of bedrooms in the Manor and recorded his thanks for these

The Chairman was pleased to inform the Members that in November the old boiler in the basement would be replaced with three new boilers, situated in the loft space

The Chairman remembered Paul Bull, a Director of the Council, who died suddenly earlier in the year Paul had organised Estates Maintenance for some time and will be greatly missed On that note, the Chairman asked if any

Member had any particular skills in that direction, he would like to be informed

The Chairman said that when Graham Roberts moved away from the area, he resigned as Archivist and donated his copyright of The History of Halsway Manor to Halsway Manor Society The new Archivist is Gillian Payne

The Chairman thanked the Friends for their continuing support, always being ready to help with donations towards the boiler and other works, and in buying a folding machine for the office to help in the task of folding the many leaflets sent out each week. He also thanked all the Members for their support and especially for volunteer work, which had been estimated to amount to an extra four full time staff

The Chairman drew attention to the landscaping outside the Long Room, which is an area where gas storage tanks have been installed underground and the lawn flattened

The Chairman said that there would be a pause in development at the moment, due to a limit in funding

#### 5. Annual Accounts

These were circulated

The Finance Officer reiterated what the Chairman mentioned in that folk activity is increasing but that trading activities had dropped by one third. He said a rise in inflation together with regulations of Health and Safety and Listed Buildings, made maintenance and improvement of premises very difficult. He said that consolidation was required and that we need to increase income particularly with an increased residential programme. He remarked that money reserves were at rock bottom

There was a question from Janet Wood – Page 13 – paragraph about Lloyds TSB holding a legal charge The Company Secretary explained the paragraph and said that they held the Deeds but there was no loan outstanding

There was a further question from Janet Wood – Page 2, 22 – she asked that plans go ahead for a new Library and that planning permission be obtained and work costed – The Chairman said that there were no funds available at present for this project but that he would discuss this matter with the Council on her behalf – The Finance Officer reported that grants would be required for this and would need matching funding – Cynthia Sartin raised the matter of Heritage Lottery

It was proposed by the Council and seconded by E Bromell that the Annual Report and Accounts be accepted and this was agreed by all

#### 6. Election of Council Members

Four names were put forward for election The members all agreed to stand and were accepted They were

Anthea Deane, Gwen Poole, Susan Swann, Ray Goodswen

The Chairman thanked Euphine Bromell who was standing down from the Council after 21 years and also her husband Alan who had worked as a volunteer throughout this time They were thanked by all with a round of applause

#### 7. Appointment of A. C. Mole & Sons as Auditors

The Council asked the Members to approve the appointment of A C Mole & Sons as Auditors and this was seconded by Coral Charles and agreed by all

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#### 8. Subscriptions

There is to be no increase in subscriptions for 2008 which remain at £12 per year

#### 9. Special Resolutions to the AGM

The resolution to amend the Memorandum of Association was circulated The Company Secretary explained this resolution and called for questions G Woolfe asked about continued research on folk music and links with other music and the Company Secretary confirmed this would be preserved if the amendment was passed

The Company Secretary pointed out a spelling error on P 9, section 8, line 6 which should read "extent at least as great as is imposed on the Society under"

The Council proposed that this resolution be approved and this was seconded by Mrs E Bromell All present agreed also 33 proxy voted in favour

#### 10. AOB

- The Chairman reported that the "William Winter's Quantocks Tune Book" is currently in the Library, published by HMS. He thanked Geoff Woolfe who edited the book, who in turn thanked HMS for supporting his work. Gwen Poole asked how many books had been published and at what cost and how many had been sold. It was thought that between 300 and 400 had been sold of the 1000 published at a cost of £5,500.
- 2 Chris Turner talked about becoming Halsway Manor Ambassadors and encouraged Members to see him or Elaine to become an Ambassador, taking leaflets and information about HM further afield. He said that at present there were 46 such Ambassadors Gwen Poole said she was an Ambassador and asked for a supply of forms and Chris said he would look into this.
- Janet Wood asked whether young people presently working at Halsway Manor were given training. The Manager reported that those working at HM at present are currently on probation but that when this time had elapsed they would be given further training with a view to obtaining NVQs.
- 4 Euphine Bromell on behalf of herself and her husband Alan thanked everyone for their support during her time on the Council and wished the Council all the very best for the future

There being no further business the Chairman closed the meeting at 3 02pm

Provided that nothing herein shall prevent the payment, in good faith, of reasonable and proper remuneration to any officer or servant of the Society, or to any member of the Society, in return for any services actually rendered to the Society, nor prevent the payment of interest at a rate not exceeding 6 per cent per annum on money lent or reasonable and proper rent for premises demised or let by any member of the Society; but so that no member of the Council of Management or Governing Body of the Society shall be appointed to any salaried office of the Society or any office of the Society paid by fees, and that no remuneration or other benefit in money or money's worth shall be given by the Society to any member of such Council or Governing Body, except repayment of out-of-pocket expenses and interest at the rate aforesaid on money lent or reasonable and proper rents for premises demised or let to the Society; provided that the provisions last aforesaid shall not apply to any payment to any company of which a member of the Council of Management or Governing Body may be a member, and in which such member shall not hold more than one hundredth part of the capital, and such member shall not be bound to account for any share of profits he may receive in respect of any such payment; and of any premium in respect of any indemnity insurance to cover the hability of the directors which by virtue of any rule of law would otherwise attach to them in respect of any negligence, default, breach of trust or breach of duty of which they may be guilty in relation to the company: Provided that any such insurance shall not extend to any claim arising from any act or omission which the directors knew to be a breach of trust or breach of duty or which was committed by the directors in reckless disregard to whether it was a breach of trust or breach of duty or not and provided also that any such insurance shall not extend to the costs of any unsuccessful defence to a criminal prosecution brought against the directors in their capacity as directors of the company.
  - 6. The liability of the members is limited.
  - 7. Every member of the Society undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Society, in the event of the same being wound up while he is a member, or within one year after he ceases to be a member, for payment of the debts and liabilities of the Society contracted before he ceases to be a member, and of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors among themselves, such amount as may be required not exceeding £1
  - 8. If upon the winding up or dissolution of the Society there remains, after the satisfaction of all its debts and liabilities, any property whatsoever, the same shall not be paid to or distributed among the members of the Society, but shall be given or transferred to some other institution or institutions having charitable objects similar to the objects of the Society, and which shall prohibit the distribution of its or their income and property among its or their members to an extent as least as great as is imposed on the Society under or by virtue of Clause 5 hereof, such institution or institutions to be determined by members of the Society at or before the time of dissolution, and if and so far as effect cannot be given to such provision, then to some charitable object.
