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Strategic report

The Directors present their Strategic report for the year ended 31 March 2018.

Principal activities

Dairy Crest Dairy Products Limited (the 'Company') is a private company limited by shares. It provides financing to fellow subsidiaries within the Dairy Crest Group on an arm's length basis and earn a market rate of return from its financing activities.

Business review

The profit after taxation for the year ended 31 March 2018 amounted to £2,000 (2017: £19,000).

No dividends were paid in the year ended 31 March 2018 (2017: £1,200,000).

Key performance indicators

The key performance indicators are those of the wider Dairy Crest Group. Refer to the financial statements of Dairy Crest Group plc for further details.

Future developments

The Company will continue to receive interest on amounts receivable from group undertakings at market rates of interest.

Principal risks and uncertainties

Interest Risk - The Company is exposed to interest rate risk on its intercompany loan balances as these are at floating rates based on LIBOR. These risks, along with the wider Dairy Crest Group interest rate risks are continuously monitored.

Recoverability of intercompany balances - The Company is exposed to risk on the recovery of its intercompany loan balances.

1. Accounting policies

General information and basis of accounting

Dairy Crest Dairy Products Limited (the Company) is a private Company limited by shares incorporated in the United Kingdom under the Companies Act 2006 and is registered in England and Wales. The address of the Company's registered office is Claygate House, Littleworth Road, Esher, Surrey, KT10 9PN.

The principal activities of the Company are set out in the strategic report on page 4.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) issued by the Financial Reporting Council. The Group has applied the amendments to FRS 102 issued by the FRC in December 2017 prior to their mandatory effective date of accounting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019.

Dairy Crest Dairy Products Limited meets the definition of a qualifying entity under FRS 102 and has therefore taken advantage of the disclosure exemptions available to it in respect of its separate financial statements, which are presented alongside the consolidated financial statements. Exemptions have been taken in relation to share-based payments, financial instruments, presentation of a cash flow statement and remuneration of key management personnel.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards. The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the company and rounded to the nearest £1,000.

Interest

Interest is recognised on an accrual basis.

Cash flow statement

The Directors have taken advantage of the exemption in FRS 102.1.12 "Cash flow statements" from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the Company is wholly-owned and its ultimate parent publishes consolidated financial statements, which are available from Companies House.

Dividends

In accordance with FRS 102.23.29.C dividends are recognised when the Shareholders' right to receive payment is established.

There are no key sources of estimation uncertainty that have a significant risk of causing material adjustments to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year.
