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THE NAUTICAL ARCHAEOLOGY SOCIETY (LIMITED BY GUARANTEE) DIRECTORS' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2006

The Directors present their report and financial statements for the Year ended 31 March 2006.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The aims and objectives of the society are to:

- preserve our nautical heritage
- to act as a focus for nautical archaeology and to provide publications
- to provide education, training and information for improving techniques of excavation, recording and conservation.

MANAGEMENT OF THE CHARITY

The Management of the charity is through an executive committee, which is made up of the Trustees. There are sub-committees which are formed for the management and awarding of grants under the Joan Du Platt Taylor awards scheme, and for the management aspects of the society's publication and outreach activities and for general management of the society's, activities in the office at Portsmouth, onto which members may be co-opted. The Society, by the year-end, had one full time employee, and one part time staff member.

The financial position of the society is monitored through the Honorary Treasurer who reports back to the committee. Control over expenditure in the Society is exercised through the Honorary Treasurer. Every cheque needs to be signed and countersigned by authorised signatures on the accounts. Major items of expenditure are authorised by a sub-committee of the executive committee. The accounts are maintained and regularly updated on a computer software accounting system by the employees at the Portsmouth office, and the Honorary Treasurer monitors this process.

GRANTS

Grants for training activities are received from CADW (for training in Wales), and Historic Scotland (for training in Scotland), so that the society can carry out its training role in those countries. The Historic Scotland grant was applied by the Lochaline Dive Centre to enable the Scottish element of the training programme to be effected. One off grants were received from the BSA Jubilee Trust and from PADI Project Aware to support printing and distribution of Wreckmap Britain 2006 leaflets. A one-off grant received from the Crown Estate was received in this period to support activity occurring after 1st April 2006. In the period 2005-6, the society did not award any grants under the Joan du Platt Taylor Award scheme.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITY

The society's office and staff are now well established in the English Heritage casemates at Fort Cumberland, Portsmouth. New computer and communication equipment has been installed.

Outreach Activity

The society continued to exhibit at the annual Birmingham Dive Show and presented at events organised by educational and charitable associations around the UK. It ran a Conference weekend where speakers presented papers on research undertaken and exhibitors provided stands on topics relevant to Nautical Archaeology. The conference was sponsored by English Heritage, the Professional Association of Diving Instructors (PADI), The Sub-Aqua Association (SAA) and the British Sub-Aqua Club (BSAC).

Publishing Activity

The society continues to publish the International Journal of Nautical Archaeology through Blackwells Publishing ltd.

The members' Newsletter continues to be published in-house.

The society is still embarked on the re-write of its handbook, Archaeology Underwater.

Training Activity

The society continued with its training regime, through the Introductory Courses in Foreshore and Underwater Archaeology and the Part 1 course, which is formally certificated by examination. It continues to run its traditional Part 3 training courses. The society continued to assess part 2 reports submitted by students and to provide field opportunities for students to generate data for Part 2 reports. The society remains the leading organisation for the education of recreational divers, archaeologists and non-archaeologists in the techniques of maritime archaeology on land, in the inter-tidal zone and underwater. The training programme is widely followed overseas and has been praised internationally.

Trading Activity

The society continued to sell merchandise, largely of a nautical archaeological nature, and mainly to its own membership to further the aims of the society.

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards, and the Charitable Accounting Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP).

1.2 Turnover

All income is included on the basis of amounts received in the year, with the following exceptions:

Membership subscriptions which are accounted for on an accruals basis

Payments in advance for courses or projects which are accounted for on an accruals basis

A grant received from the Crown Estate with a pre-condition pertaining to the London Dive Show on

1st April 2006, which has been accounted for on an accruals basis.

1.3 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided on fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the costs of each asset evenly over its expected useful life. The estimated useful lives are as follows:

Computer equipment	3 years
Other equipment including digital photography equipment used for training	3 years

1.4 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1.5 Trading activities

The trading activities of the charitable company are permissible within the charity's objectives.

1.6 Grants

Grants are received from CADW (for Wales) and Historic Scotland (for Scotland), these are payable in arrears for training carried out in those countries during the year. One off grants were received from the BSA Jubilee Trust and from PADI Project Aware to support printing and distribution of Wreckmap Britain leaflets. A one-off grant received from the Crown Estate with a pre-condition pertaining to the London Dive Show on 1st April 2006 has been accounted for on an accruals basis.
