#### Method of appointment of trustees

#### Induction and training of trustees

New Trustees are inducted through meetings and through documentation Quarterly Trustees' meetings begin with a morning training session in a specific area of responsibility (e.g. Charity Law, the Disability Discrimination Act, equal opportunities, safeguarding, audited accounts, etc)

The Trustees are responsible "for steering the ship" This means that the Trustees take decisions to ensure that there is a balance between resources available for the capital programme and for the cultural programme, and that there is a balance within the cultural programme between 'performing' and 'making' arts, and between 'youth arts' and the 'main programme' Management accounts, audited accounts, and revisions of business plans are received, considered, and determined by the Trustees The Building Sub Committee, Audit Sub Committee, Archive Sub Committee and Personnel Sub Committee have delegated powers in relation to their respective areas, and report back to Trustees' meetings

Staff take decisions of detail within parameters set by the Trustees, e.g. the detail of the Gallery or Youth Arts programme

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

In setting our objectives and planning our activities the Trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit

The objects for which the charity is established are

- a) To advance the education of the public in and by means of all the arts including performing arts, visual arts, applied arts and experimental work in the arts and by improving standards of execution and appreciation of the arts
- b) To provide or assist in the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure-time occupation in the interests of social welfare for members of the public at large and for persons who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social or economic circumstances, with the object of improving conditions of life for the persons for whom the facilities are intended
- c) To establish and maintain Community Centres for the benefit of the inhabitants of the Merseyside Area and to promote all or any objects for the benefit of the said inhabitants which now are or hereafter may be deemed by law to be charitable

The creation of contexts (both social and environmental) which encourage an improved and meaningful relationship between artists and communities for the creation, presentation and promotion of contemporary work of high quality and originality. This means that the Black-E is committed to

- a) access both providing access and improving access to the artist and for the artist, and for those individuals and groups already involved in the arts as well as for those with no previous involvement with the arts for example by the provision of workshops both as part of the ongoing programme and in conjunction with residencies, performances, by establishing an on-going dialogue between artists and their audiences through repeated visits and work, and by running seminars, residencies, etc. which enable artists to meet and work together.
- b) positive action in relation to artists who are discriminated against and in relation to communities and individuals who are discriminated against or disadvantaged in order to provide opportunities for such artists, communities, and individuals to give expression to their experience, their needs, and their aspirations, and in order to celebrate their achievements and rediscover their history
- c) education (learning and unlearning) and training both by and for artists and both by and for communities and individuals- with a view to improving performance, understanding, and communication

The creation of opportunities and contexts which enable people to actively participate in creative activities - a participation based in "doing" as well as "viewing" - in order, amongst other aims, to further democratise the arts

Indeed, since democracy rests on the creation of a common language, and since the arts remain among the most restricted of languages, such involvement aims to promote democratisation not only through a shared understanding of these languages but also through growth and development in the languages themselves

The recognition and valuing of cultural diversity This means the Black-E is committed to


- a) promoting work which reflects the experience and concerns of those groups within our society whose voices have been marginalised, anthropologised or ignored
- b) programming across the spectrum of creative activities the fine arts, the popular arts, the performing arts, the making arts, creative and co-operative games, contemporary media, and traditional crafts in order to promote and develop harmony rather than hierarchy between forms, and additionally to promote and develop cross-fertilisation and positive interaction between forms
- c) a perspective of the arts which is local, regional, national, and international in order to stimulate and develop a sense of cultural and geographical inter-relatedness and variety

From all the above it can be seen that, in committing itself to exploring and recreating the relationship between contemporary society and the contemporary artist and between contemporary society and creative activities and opportunities, the Black-E is committing itself to a two-in-one duality - to the development of communities and to the development of artists

In terms of communities, then such a commitment is based on a recognition of the role of the arts in community development every community issue is also an issue to be explored through the arts. In terms of artists, then such a commitment is based on the complementary recognition that - only given the opportunity - everyone is an artist.

The main objectives for the year were -

- 1) to prioritise work for young people in the cultural programme, and
- 2) to produce and promote the re-launched cultural programme, (especially our Kinetic Theatre Programme), in conjunction with hires and 'sharings' to commercial and cultural organisations

Weekly staff meetings undertook the detailed planning and organisational work to produce the re-launched cultural programme in line with strategies and objectives determined by the trustees. Hires and 'sharings' were achieved through networking with organisations and individuals, and through the rentals page of the Black-E website.

The activities undertaken are itemised in detail in appendix to the accounts, Cultural Activities Schedule, under 'Cultural and Further Education' and 'Activities' The continuing re-launch programme (offering a mix of 'viewing' and 'doing') was approved by the Trustees as a 'soft re-launch' - that is, the on-going re-launch was organic, and a process

This process has continued during the year with the performance No Fit State Circus 'Circus of Dreams', Afrovibes Festival 'Sibikwa African Indigenous Orchestra', and 'Thirst', National Dance Theatre Company of Jamaica Launch events included the publication of 'Women, Art and Society A Tribute to Virginia Woolf' by Judy Chicago, and the launch of The Black-E Archive both physical and online We also held a Commemoration Ceremony for Sally Morris who sadly passed away in May, under Sally's wishes the ceremony included much singing, dancing and poetry. Further, an on-going programme prioritising young people included the weekly term time and school holiday sessions. Significant activities also included. Year of the Rat Chinese New Year celebrations, completion of 'The Black-E Goes Red' and weekly creative and co-operative games sessions.

#### REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The activities of the charity are the promotion of the arts and education through a cultural programme at the charity's premises and elsewhere, which combines the activities of a contemporary arts centre and community centre. The capital programme was principally one of interior redevelopment ("a new building within old walls") including the creation of a large-scale in-the-round performance / exhibition / meeting / workshop space, the Main Space

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The activities undertaken are itemised in detail in the appendix to the accounts, Cultural Activities Schedule, under 'Cultural and Further Education' and 'Activities' These activities correspond to the objectives described earlier under Objectives and Activities (3) & (4)

Cultural programme fundraising activities have focused on continuing to ensure both

- 1) increased funding over the years 2012-15 from the Arts Council England North West under the National Portfolio Scheme, and
- on-going support from Liverpool City Council (Arts Funding) through 2012-14

Both these objectives have been achieved

As outlined in previous years, communities are always fearful when organisations in which they are involved undergo a major capital refurbishment, and this has certainly been the case with communities benefiting from activities at The Black-E following re-launch. They were fearful that the organisation would change its nature, become 'posh', be less welcoming, and might introduce prices or price rises which didn't exist before, especially in a period of austerity and cutbacks. The main challenge facing The Black-E, following relaunch in extended and refurbished spaces, has been to retain its welcoming and community friendly nature. It is a challenge which we believe has now been met.

This continuing successful outcome remains dependent on all elements of the organisation working together towards the common aim of turning policy objectives into practical realities, with the Trustees steering the ship But with the crew - of staff, part-time and session workers, associates, consultants, volunteers, participants, apprentices, placements, trainees, and regular participants - having all played their part in meeting (and enjoying) the challenges

The opportunities, given both the enhanced scale and the location of the building, and the commitment of all those involved in the organisation, remain extraordinary. Following the re-launch, they will only be fully realised over an extended 5+ year period - as programmes settle in, and as a seasonal cycle of activities becomes established again. It remains clear from the continuing very positive feedback from communities and individuals, that the re-launched Black-E has retained its welcome, its convivality and its ethos. This continues to be particularly evident in the relationships which have been established with the young people participating in the cultural programme and their supportive families.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The results for the year and the charity's financial position at the end of the year are shown in the attached financial statements

The principal funding sources are detailed under note 4 to the accounts, Incoming resources. The key objectives of the charity are in the process of being significantly expanded in the cultural programme

#### Reserves policy

The designated funds are determined by the Trustees and detailed in note 15 to the accounts

It is anticipated that the single designated fund for Games Publications will contribute towards further publications in the area of participatory theatre and participatory exhibition

A deficit arose in the last three years as a result of the transition phase of the capital programme completion progressing towards full operational capacity. This is a common occurrence in respect of projects of this nature, where increased running costs are not immediately supported by equivalent increases in revenues.

The Black-E continues to have a number of strategies which it intends to put in place over time which will address this. These focus on increasing income generation as the building continues to move towards optimal operation. The risk analysis with respect to this issue has been mitigated by the decision to sell one the organisation's assets.

#### Risk policy

The major risks to which the charity is exposed as identified by the Trustees have been reviewed and systems have been established to mitigate these risks, including regular periodic reviews of income and expenditure and cash flow and the revision of commitments and expenditure in relation to income

With regards to the cultural programme, the major risks are linked to funding availability. Core funding risks are mitigated by the fact that The Black-E holds funding agreements with both Arts Council England North West, and Liverpool City Council (Arts Funding) through to March 2015 and March 2014 respectively

#### Risk policy (continued)

Increased funding through the National Portfolio Scheme was confirmed by Arts Council England North West for the years 2012-15 Continued support, albeit with a modest reduction in funding in line with other arts organisations, has been confirmed by Liverpool City Council (Arts Funding) for 2012-14 (and there is now – November 2013, a recommendation to continue this support for a further 3 years) On the basis of a fundraising strategy approved by the Trustees, The Black-E continues to make applications and submissions for funding of the cultural programme to charitable trusts, local and national government departments, and other bodies

Obtaining project funding is always a risk, but risks are mitigated by The Black-E's track record in fundraising and the wider potential for local, national and European funding on account of and following the relaunch of the Black-E in a much enhanced and refurbished building (including the unique in-the-round Main Space with a capacity of 550 and 2 overlooking balconies)

The future finances of The Black-E (as analysed in the current Business Plan) are dependent on a balance of income from (a) grants, and (b) rental from hires. Rental from hires of the completed building will not 'leap' to an optimal level following relaunch, but is predicted to grow over a 5 year period. Optimal income continues to grow following the installation of the main lift in October 2010, and the issue of an annual license in January 2011. The building is Disability Discrimination Act compliant.

The financial crises have meant that the last 2 years and the current year have been - and the following 2-3 years (at least) will be - among the most challenging of periods in the life of The Black-E

The Trustees have considered these challenges and have determined (following the risk analysis in the previous Business Plan) to sell the property 40 Canning Street to pay off deficits resulting from the capital and cultural programmes, and also to provide a boost to the cultural programme

In respect of their grants for the capital programme

- (1) the Millennium Commission required and has taken a first fixed 80 year charge over The Black-E building and land together with a floating charge over all assets, and
- (ii) the Arts Council has required and taken a second fixed 20 year charge over the Black-E building and land

#### **FIXED ASSETS**

The previous year the Trustees considered the auditor's Report and Accounts for the financial year to 5 April 2012 in the light of the draft out-turn for that year and the reports thereon prepared by the auditors and budget committee and the detailed schedules of income and expenditure. It was necessary to consider changes to the balance sheet consequently upon the end of the building project and the Trustees' decision to dispose of the property at Canning Street.

#### 1 Accounting Policies

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006

#### **Going Concern**

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis that assumes that the charity will continue to receive the support of its bankers, creditors and funders. Funding has been secured from the Arts Council England North West and from Liverpool City Council. The charity is aware of the deficit incurred on unrestricted funds and has implemented plans to address this. Amongst these are actions to secure more funding, sell some property and other efficiency strategies.

#### 1.2 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows

- When donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods
- When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the preconditions for use have been met

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants, are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to preconditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable

Voluntary income includes discretionary grants for projects, goods and services where no service agreement or contract exists

Other grants, which have particular service requirements and which are provided in accordance with a contract or service level agreement are included in the Statement of Financial Activities under the heading Incoming Resources from Charitable Activities

Interest is included when receivable

#### 1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure reflects all amounts paid and accrued during the year Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource

Charitable expenditure

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

These represent costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity

#### 1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

All assets costing more than £100 are capitalised at cost

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows

Leasehold property
Fixtures, fittings & equipment

In accordance with the terms of the lease 33% p a on a straight line basis

#### 1.5 Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts and finance leases are capitalised as tangible assets and depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives. Obligations under such agreements are included in creditors net of the finance charge allocated to future periods. The finance element of the rental payment is charged to the profit and loss account so as to produce a constant periodic rate of charge on the net obligation outstanding in each period.

#### 1.6 Accumulated funds

Funds held by the charity are

*Unrestricted general funds* - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for a particular purpose. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.
