## RESULTS AND DIVIDEND

The profit of the Company for the year, after taxation, amounted to £18,363,159 (1995 - £13,376,789). During the year, interim dividends totalling £8,000,000 (1995 - £12,600,000) were paid. ## 13. HOLDING COMPANY

The Company is a wholly owned subsidiary of Mercury Asset Management plc, whose ultimate holding company at 31 March 1996 was Mercury Asset Management Group plc, registered in England.

The smallest and largest group of which this Company is a member and which has included this Company in group financial statements is Mercury Asset Management Group plc, registered in England. Financial statements for Mercury Asset Management Group plc may be obtained from 33 King William Street, London EC4R 9AS.

At an Extraordinary General Meeting of S. G. Warburg Group plc held on 1 June 1995, the shareholders approved the sale of the investment banking business of the S. G. Warburg group to Swiss Bank Corporation. The sale, which was completed on 2 July 1995, was followed by a Scheme of Arrangement, the effect of which was that S. G. Warburg Group plc ceased to be the ultimate holding company.
