### **DIRECTORS' REPORT**

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2012

### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activities of the company and its subsidiaries during the year were independent testing, inspection, verification, employment agency services and certification services

### **REVIEW OF BUSINESS AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

The consolidated profit and loss is set out on page 7 The directors expect the present level of business to be sustained in the foreseeable future

As shown in the consolidated profit and loss account, turnover has increased by 13% to £115,216,000 (2011 £102,095,000) in the main due to growth in existing operations, a full year from operations acquired in 2011 and from operations acquired in 2012 Operating profit from operations has decreased from £13,069,000 to £11,437,000

During the year the company acquired Vitrology Limited, Roplex Limited and Emics Limited and subsequently renamed them as SGS Vitrology Limited, SGS Roplex Limited and SGS Emics Limited respectively. The details of these acquisitions are disclosed in note 22. Also during the year, the Wireless division in the UK ceased and as a result a goodwill impairment has been made in the accounts.

The statutory change for the indexation of certain future benefits for deferred members of the defined benefit pension schemes was implemented in 2011. The impact of the change from RPI to CPI was recognised as a credit in the income statement during 2011. No such event occurred during 2012

Average group employee numbers have increased in the year from 1,017 to 1,161 heads

The balance sheet shows net assets of £48,393,000 (2011 £39,056,000)

## PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The group operates in a competitive trading environment. The group manages the risk by offering diversified activities in different industry sectors that enable the group to minimise any specific industry downturn risk. There is continued focus on the group's product offering and its relationship with its customers.

A reasonable proportion of the group's sales are made in US dollars and Euros and it is therefore exposed to the movement in exchange rates. While there are some purchases in Euros and US Dollars to offset this risk, the Group also manages this risk by the maintenance of foreign currency bank accounts and the use of forward foreign exchange contracts

Group risks are discussed in the Annual Report of the ultimate parent, SGS SA, which does not form part of this report

The group has prepared the financial statements on a going concern basis, further details of which are given in note 1 to the financial statements

#### **DIVIDENDS AND TRANSFERS TO RESERVES**

The profit transferred to reserves for the year was £6,221,000 (2011 £13,434,000).

No interim dividend was paid during the year and no final dividend is proposed (2011 £nil)

Applications for employment by disabled workers are given full consideration for those vacancies that they are able to fill All necessary assistance with initial training is given. Once employed, a career plan is developed so as to ensure suitable opportunities for each disabled person. Arrangements are made, wherever possible, for retraining employees who become disabled, to enable them to perform work identified as appropriate to their aptitudes and abilities.

# NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS Year ended 31 December 2012

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable United Kingdom law and accounting standards. The principal accounting policies, which have been applied consistently in the current and prior year, are summarised below.

#### **Basis of accounting**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the historical cost convention

#### Going concern

The group's business activities, together with its performance and principal risks and uncertainties, are set out in the Director's Report. The group has considerable financial resources and contracts with a number of customers across different industry sectors and geographical areas. As a consequence, the directors believe that the group is well placed to manage its business risks successfully despite the current uncertain economic outlook.

Based on internal forecasts and projections, prepared for a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of the financial statements and which take into account reasonably possible changes in the company's trading performance, the directors have a reasonable expectation that the company and the group have adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, the going concern basis has continued to be adopted in the preparation of the financial statements

#### Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the company and all its subsidiaries. The results of operations sold or acquired during the year are included in the consolidated profit and loss account up to, or from, the date control passes. Intra group sales and profits are eliminated upon consolidation. Acquisitions are accounted for under the acquisition method.

#### Goodwill

Goodwill arising on consolidation, being the excess of the fair value of the consideration given over the fair value of the identifiable net assets of operations acquired at the date of acquisition, is amortised through the profit and loss account on a straight line basis over 5 and 20 years, being its expected useful economic life Provision is made for any impairment.

#### Investments

Investments held as fixed assets are stated at cost less provision for any impairment

#### Tangible fixed assets

The cost of fixed assets is their purchase cost, together with any incidental costs of acquisition

Provision for depreciation is made so as to write off the cost of tangible fixed assets on a straight line basis, over the expected useful economic life of the assets concerned. The principal annual rates used for this purpose are

Leasehold buildings are amortised over the period of the lease. Freehold land is not depreciated

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Taxation

Current tax, including UK corporation tax and foreign tax, is provided at amounts expected to be paid (or recovered) using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date where transactions or events that result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future or a right to pay less tax in the future have occurred at the balance sheet date. Timing differences are differences between the group's taxable profits and its results as stated in the financial statements that arise from the inclusion of gains and losses in tax assessments in periods different from those in which they are recognised in the financial statements.

A net deferred tax asset is regarded as recoverable and therefore recognised only to the extent that, on the basis of all available evidence, it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted

Deferred tax is not recognised when fixed assets are revalued unless by the balance sheet date there is a binding agreement to sell the revalued assets and the gain or loss expected to arise on sale has been recognised in the financial statements. Neither is deferred tax recognised when fixed assets are sold and it is more likely than not that the taxable gain will be rolled over, being charged to tax only if and when the replacement assets are sold.

Deferred tax is measured at the average tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse, based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is measured on a non-discounted basis

#### **Operating leases**

Costs in respect of operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term, even where payments are not made on such a basis

### Stocks and work in progress

Stocks and work in progress are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Net realisable value is the price at which stocks and work in progress can be sold in the normal course of business after allowing for the costs of realisation.

#### Long-term contracts

Turnover on long-term contracts is recognised according to the stage reached in the contract by reference to the value of work done. A prudent estimate of the profit attributable to work completed is recognised once the outcome of the contract can be assessed with reasonable certainty. The amount by which the turnover exceeds payments on account is shown under debtors as amounts recoverable on contracts. Payments on account less work completed at the balance sheet date are shown separately in creditors. Provision is made for the full amount of foreseeable losses on contracts.

## Foreign currencies

Trading transactions denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the exchange rate ruling when the transaction was entered into or at the forward contract rate where applicable Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the exchange rate ruling at the balance sheet date or, if appropriate, at the forward contract rate. Exchange gains or losses are included in the profit on ordinary activities.

The group uses derivative financial instruments to reduce exposure in foreign exchange risk. The group does not hold or issue derivative financial instruments for speculative purposes

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### **Turnover**

Turnover represents the amount receivable for services during the year and excludes value added tax, and the majority of which is recognised at the point at which the service is provided. Turnover from the supply of services represents the value of services provided under contracts to the extent that there is a right to consideration and is recorded at the value of the consideration due. Where a contract has only been partially completed at the balance sheet date turnover represents the value of the service provided to date based on a proportion of the total contract value. Where payments are received from customers in advance of services provided, the amounts are recorded as deferred income and included as part of creditors due within one year

#### Pension costs

For defined benefit schemes the amounts charged to operating profit are the current service costs and gains and losses on settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs. Past service costs are recognised immediately in the profit and loss account if the benefits have vested. If the benefits have not vested immediately, the costs are recognised over the period until vesting occurs. The interest cost and the expected return on assets are shown as a net amount of other finance costs credits adjacent to interest. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in the statement of total recognised gains and losses.

Defined benefit schemes are funded, with the assets of the scheme held separately from those of the group, in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent currency and term to the scheme liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The resulting defined benefit asset or liability, net of the related deferred tax, is presented separately after other net assets on the face of the balance sheet.

For defined contribution schemes the amount charged to the profit and loss account in respect of pension costs and other post-retirement benefits is the contributions payable in the year. Differences between contributions payable in the year and contributions actually paid are shown as either accruals or prepayments in the balance sheet.

#### Cash flow statement

As permitted by paragraph 5(a) of FRS 1 'Cash flow Statements' the groups's consolidated cash flow statement has not been included in these financial statements. The company is a wholly owned subsidiary of SGS SA, the ultimate parent company, which produces a group cash flow statement

#### Share-based payment

The group has applied the requirements of FRS 20 'Share-based Payments'

The ultimate parent SGS SA issues equity-settled share-based payments to certain employees Equity-settled share-based payments are measured at fair value (excluding the effect of non market-based vesting conditions) at the date of grant. The fair value determined at the grant date of the equity-settled share-based payments is expensed over the vesting period, based on the group's estimate of shares that will eventually vest and adjusted for the effect of non market-based vesting conditions. The fair value of share options is based on the market value at grant date

#### Associates

In the consolidated financial statements investments in associates are accounted for using the equity method. The consolidated profit and loss account includes the group's share of associates' losses while the group's share of the net liabilities of the associates is shown in the consolidated balance sheet. Goodwill arising on the acquisition of associates is accounted for in accordance with the policy set out above. Any unamortised balance of goodwill is included in the carrying value of the investment in associates.

#### Intangible assets - brand names and customer relationships

Patents and trademarks are included at cost and depreciated in equal annual instalments over a period of ten years which is their estimated useful economic life. Provision is made for any impairment
