## Trustees' Report

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 December 2019.

#### Objects and aims

The objective for which the Trust was established is to promote the advancement of the education of the public in nautical history and archaeology, by the provision of the museum or museums. This is to be achieved by the acquisition, restoration and preservation of nautical exhibits of historical importance for the display in the museum, for the public benefit.

To promote and encourage the involvement of local community organisations, by the arrangement of lectures, schools visits, training courses, audio video film shows, exhibitions and conferences to ensure that the public is informed of the matters connected with nautical history and archaeology.

To encourage the protection of archaeological sites of importance in nautical history.

In setting the charity's objectives and planning its activities the trustees have given consideration to the Charity Commission guidelines on public benefit.

#### Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

As part of our charitable public benefit objectives we continue to offer free admission to our museum, relying on the profits of our small gift shop, events and public donations to cover our costs.

The trustees, as part of their report, have asked the Chairman to give an account of the main events and activities of the year, which fall within his responsibilities.

#### Trustees' Report (continued)

#### Financial review

The charity recorded an operating surplus of £11,860 before depreciation (2018: deficit £1,738 before depreciation) on Total Income of £69,623 (2018 £68,945).

Cash at year end was £15,479 (2018: £9,005)

#### Policy on reserves

The trustees recognise that the Trust needs to hold sufficient reserves to be able to withstand an unforeseen material reduction in its income; and/or an unexpected increase in costs in particular of costs associated with the fabric of the museum.

Current reserves do not provide that level of comfort and accordingly the trustees have resolved to increase retained earnings over the next three to five years until adequate reserves are available.

#### Structure, governance and management

#### Nature of Governing Document

Nautical Museums Trust Limited is a company limited by guarantee governed by its memorandum and articles of association. It is registered, alongside two subsidiary trusts: The Warship Ann Trust; and the Warship Resolution Trust as a charity.

#### Recruitment and appointment of trustees

Trustees can be appointed on an ad hoc basis during the year by the Board of Trustees to fill identified skill vacancies. Any trustee appointed during the year and one third of remaining trustees are subject to reappointment by members at the Annual General Meeting.

All trustees are required to register any potential conflict of interest between their personal and private interests and those of the Trust.

#### Organisational Structure

The trustees meet 8 times a year to administer the charity. In the absence of a full time administrator individual trustees are appointed to deal with the day to day affairs of the Trust where they are supported by volunteers.

#### Major risks and the management of these risks

#### General risk management

The trustees review the risks attached to the operation of the Trust on a continuous basis at each Board Meeting. Identified risks are then allocated risk management procedures and strategies designed to minimise any potential impact on the charity should those risks materialize.

#### Museum Accreditation

In order to hold historic artefacts the Trust is encouraged to gain formal Accreditation from the designated body namely Arts Council England which is awarded for a 5 year period. The Museum gained formal Accreditation during 2019.

#### Trustees' Report (continued)

Volunteer recruitment, training and safeguarding

The Trust is reliant upon volunteers to keep the museum open throughout the year. All volunteers are DBS checked and training is implemented to ensure volunteers are both well briefed on the exhibits on show in the museum and also on the safeguarding issues inherent in school and similar visits.

Visits to wrecks

A regular programme of accompanied visits and talks are made to the wreck of The Amsterdam, lying on the beach in Bulverhythe. These visits are subject to risk review and a recent risk assessment.

Other risks

Other risks include fire and business interruption are subject to review and the Trust maintains adequate insurance to mitigate these risks.

#### Objectives and policies

The charity's activities expose it to a limited number of financial risks, being principally a liquidity risk arising either from a sharp reduction in income or unexpected expenditure, likely to be associated with building maintenance issues. In order to offset liquidity risk the trustees have resolved to increase cash reserves held at year end and until these reserves have reached an acceptable level to maintain tight cash control and seek opportunities to access third party grants.

#### Trustees' Report (continued)

#### Chairman's Report

I am pleased to present my Report for the year ended 31 December 2019. Overall, 2019 was a very positive year for the Nautical Museums Trust (NMT) and the Shipwreck Museum. After a period of deficits, I am happy to report that, under the guidance and skill of our Treasurer, we have achieved a return to surplus. We have therefore enjoyed a period of stability in which we have been able to attend to some of the Museum's long-term maintenance issues including the installation of a fire alarm system. Using an outside consultant, we have made good progress undertaking a long overdue condition survey of all our artefacts.

We began the year by achieving another important milestone, gaining our re-accreditation as a museum from Arts Council England. This is an important quality assurance badge attesting to our capability as a 'proper' museum. This, together with completion of our medium term business plan, lays a foundation for considering what changes we need to bring about in order to update the Museum and to better use the artefacts to fulfill our mission to tell the story of the English Channel coastal heritage between Dungeness and Beachy Head.

Relationships with bodies with whom we share common interests are very important. During 2019 we strengthened our links with other museums and heritage organisations including the Nautical Archaeology Society, the Dutch Maritime Museum and, at the end of the year, we negotiated with the National Museum of the Royal Navy to become one of their (very few) affiliated museums. We anticipate that these links will enable us to bring some new artefacts or exhibitions to Hastings. We continue to participate in local and regional groups concerned with museums (e.g. South East Museums Service) and with heritage and tourism (e.g. 1066 Country, Stade Partnership).

Visitors are our lifeblood both economically and in terms of fulfilling our mission. We continue to offer free entry for visitors, relying upon the profits of our gift shop, events and public donations to fund the Trust's work. But, like many attractions in tourist areas we have to continue to fight hard to attract those visitors. In the event we recorded 61,245 visitors in the year (2018: 55,529). We received much positive visitor feedback on Trip Advisor and other social media and our guided tours to the wreck of the Amsterdam proved an exceptionally popular (and profitable) feature of our offer to visitors. We also commissioned our own visitor survey to better understand the profile of visitors to the Museum.

We reach out to our potential audience in other ways, too. For example, we give talks to outside bodies and we receive school and youth groups for tailor-made visits. We organize a winter series of in house talks and fossil workshops. We joined with the United Nations Association to mark World Oceans Day. For the success of these (and indeed all our activities from cleaning, maintenance to serving in the shop) we depend absolutely on the energy, skills and commitment of our volunteers. On behalf of all trustees, I thank them for their loyalty and that commitment.

This brings me to another personnel issue. In the absence of a paid Administrator the responsibility of keeping the Museum open and functioning has fallen heavily upon my fellow Trustees and I thank them for their outstanding contribution over the past eighteen months. We hope to move to the appointment of a paid administrator very soon. We are also continuing with efforts to recruit additional trustees.

I would also like to thank our shop Manager for her dedication and hard work both in running the shop and in ensuring that visitors to the Museum report an enjoyable visit exceeding all expectations.

I have emphasized the importance of our shop in generating much of the income on which the viability of the NMT rests. In an effort to improve our retail offering in our Gift Shop we also commissioned a third-party report which we anticipate will help us to improve the takings on which we are so reliant to support our work. We also continue to pursue other funding sources but, in the charity sector, competition for the limited resources available is severe.

#### Trustees' Report (continued)

We entered 2020 with an optimistic feeling confident that we were poised to make significant progress. However, as we all recognize, the widespread COVID 19 pandemic has changed all the rules. Nevertheless, I am glad to report that we have benefitted from Government schemes designed to support small businesses and charities and that the Trust is financially sound. As I write we are reviewing the feasibility of reopening the Museum and shop while meeting the very demanding guidelines designed to protect our staff, volunteers and visitors. If we are unable to reopen we are developing a comprehensive programme to revitalize the interiors and to attend to some longer term maintenance issues so that when we can reopen we can offer visitors a better experience.

I end on a personal note. In early 2020, having served for more than 11 years as a trustee, I decided to step back and hand over the Chair to Rebecca Rees who had joined us as Trustee in early 2019 and who had a professional background in heritage management. Happily for her but sadly for us she has recently left us to take on a full time role elsewhere in the heritage sector. Our Treasurer, Neil McClure, has agreed to take on the role of Chair on an interim basis.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). They also comply with the Companies Act 2006 and Charities Act 2011.

#### Basis of preparation

Nautical Museums Trust Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

#### Going concern

The trustees consider that the Charity has sufficient reserves to continue as a going concern but are urgently reviewing ways to ensure future financial sustainability. There are no significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the Charity.

#### Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

#### **Income and endowments**

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

#### **Donations and legacies**

Donations are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the charity before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that these conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

#### Grants receivable

Grants are recognised when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and are yet to be met, the income is recognised as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2019 (continued)

#### 1 Accounting policies (continued) -

#### **Expenditure**

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

#### Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

#### Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

#### Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the Charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and Trustees' meetings and reimbursed expenses.

#### Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £500.00 or more are initially recorded at cost.

The Charity maintains an Accession Register and the majority of the artefacts have been donated to or are on loan to the charity and therefore no valuation has been carried out and the artefacts are not included in the charity's Balance Sheet.

#### **Depreciation and amortisation**

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

#### Asset class

#### Depreciation method and rate

#### Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell, after due regard for obsolete and slow moving stocks. Cost is determined using the first-in, first-out (FIFO).

#### Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

#### Trade creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the Charity does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price.

#### **Borrowings**

Interest-bearing borrowings are initially recorded at fair value, net of transaction costs. Interest-bearing borrowings are subsequently carried at amortised cost, with the difference between the proceeds, net of transaction costs, and the amount due on redemption being recognised as a charge to the Statement of Financial Activities over the period of the relevant borrowing.

Interest expense is recognised on the basis of the effective interest method and is included in interest payable and similar charges.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the charity has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date.

#### Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.
