OUR PURPOSE AND ACTIVITIES

- 1) To advance public education in the history of marine vessels by the preservation and public display of vessels at their disposal
- 2) To acquire, maintain and preserve exhibits for public display
- 3) The Society endeavours to provide educational facilities and tours for the benefit of the public at large

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The Society had a quite year with regard to activities involving the vessel Massey Shaw. Unfortunately, one of the main marine engines suffered a catastrophic failure whilst returning from a Dunkirk Little Ship event in Ipswich. The engine had to be stripped down and the problem identified. However the restoration has taken longer than expected, resulting in a number of trips being cancelled and revenue lost. Fund-raising was commended in 2019 to help fix the engine and over £2,500 has been raised to date.

The Society has managed to build upon its partnerships with the London Fire Brigade Fire Cadets and Dockland Scout Project to establish a Marine Unit that provides marine and water safety skills to young people from various Boroughs across the capital. It is intended to expand the above programme during the coming year and provide more opportunities to learn about the River Fire Service.

The Society continues with its working towards becoming an Accredited Independent Museum. Our volunteers have continued to produce a comprehensive archive of material based on the River Fire Service and our vessel's unique history.

During the year our volunteers have welcomed a number of individuals, families and historical groups to the vessel to learn about Massey Shaw's history and how it contributes to the history of the Thames and the capital. Many visitors visit our Website and follow our activities on social media which is a growing area of our activity.

The Society continues with its work with local historical groups and schools by providing support to their Open Days and providing talks on a wide range of subjects.

The Society has attended a number of London Fire Brigade and Fire Service Preservation Group Open Days and events on shore throughout the year. Thanks are due to the efforts of our volunteers who have given up their time and energies to promote the work of the Society.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

During the coming year the Society will endeavour to increase its efforts to improve funding opportunities by working with other heritage organisations and attracting more members and volunteers to develop the Society's brand.

The 80th Commemoration of the evacuation at Dunkirk will take place in May 2020 in Dunkirk Harbour and the Trustees are planning the vessel's attendance, although this will be dependent on funding and testing of the repaired starboard engine.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Society's income has declined from £101,381 to £8,823, predominantly due to the ending of the Heritage Lottery Fund Transition Grant, which paid for consultants to write a business plan, a social media communication plan and to deploy a re-vamped website plus funding the employment off a part-time member of staff to co-ordinate the projects. All the projects were completed to time and quality.

Expenditure also fell, from £96,822 to £9,781 again as a consequence of the ending of the HLF Transition Grant.

Insurance remains the largest expenditure by some considerable margin and the Trustees are reviewing the insurance policy to ensure that it delivers value for money. A partial refund was obtained in 2019 as a consequence of the vessel being laid up whilst the engine repairs are ongoing.

INVESTMENT POWERS AND POLICY

The Trust does not have any investments, due to a lack of funds, except for some SSE plc shares received as a donation. There was a review of the investment policy post the year end and it was decided that any future donated shares should be sold on receipt. Consequently the SSE shares will be sold by the end of 2019.

RESERVES POLICY and GOING CONCERN

The Directors reviewed the Reserves Policy during the year and continue to work towards generating enough reserves to cover maintenance costs and unexpected events. The target amount of reserves is £23,000. As at 31 December 2018 unrestricted reserves stood at £5,377 (2017: £2,913). The Directors have reviewed the finances of the Trust and consider that the Trust is a going concern and have produced the accounts on that basis.

STRUCTURE GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT (INCLUDING PAY POLICY FOR SENIOR STAFF)

The Society was constituted in 1982 as a voluntary organisation. A Board of Directors, elected on an annual basis, oversees the running of the Society. All the Directors are volunteers and do not claim expenses. Board Members have the responsibility for one or more areas i.e. Membership, Finance, Fundraising, Restoration and Promotion. One of the elected Directors is re-elected at each AGM. The Society can, and has, co-opt individuals to the Board for specific advice and support. The Society is a Company limited by guarantee as well as a charity.

Newly elected members of the Board have their appointment confirmed at the next AGM. The Society continues to review its procedures to ensure that it is compliant with the Best Practice Guidelines of the Charity Commission. Apart from one fixed-term staff member whose pay was funded by the HLF Transition Grant (which has now ceased and the staff member has reverted to being a volunteer) no Directors or volunteers of the Trust received any compensation for their time. Nor did any Director or volunteer claim travel or subsistence expenses.

Newly elected members of the Board have their appointment confirmed at the next AGM. The Society continues to review its procedures to ensure that it is compliant with the Best Practice Guidelines of the Charity Commission.

Apart from one fixed-term staff member whose pay was funded by the HLF Transition grant no Directors or volunteers of the Trust received any compensation for their time. Nor did any Director or volunteer claim travel or subsistence expenses.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Trust undertook a security review in 2016 to ensure the safe mooring of the vessel. The recommendations of the report have been implemented in full.

A Health and Safety review of the operating procedures used on the boat has been undertaken during the past year .Several amendments have been made to equipment carried on the vessel in order to comply with changes to maritime regulations and to ensure our volunteers and visitors are safe.

The Society continues to monitor all risks which affect the operation and financial well-being of the vessel.

Risks to the public whilst the vessel is being operated have been reviewed and all appropriate insurances have been obtained. The vessel is only operated under the command of a licenced Thames skipper and with the appropriate Maritime and Coastguard Agency certificate, which is awarded annually after independent inspection.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice. This report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies entitled to the small company's exemption.

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement on Recommended Practise applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

Cash Flow

The financial statements do not include a cash flow statement because the charity, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under Financial Reporting Standard 1 "Cash flow statements".

1.2 Incoming Resources

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable.

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants are for a particular restricted purpose, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable.

1.3 Resources expended and recognition of liabilities

All expenditure is incurred on an accruals basis. The majority of costs are directly attributable to the specific charitable activities.

Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles.

Management and administration of the Charity represent costs incurred in the management of the Charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with charitable and statutory requirements.

11. Trustee Remuneration

I report on the accounts of Massey Shaw and Marine Vessels Preservation Society Limited for the year ended 31 March 2018 which are set out on pages 5 to 10.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 144 (2) of the Charities Act 2011 (The Act) but that an independent examination is needed.
