Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Tees Valley Arts is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 5th August 1982, and a registered charity governed by its memorandum and articles of association as amended by special resolutions passed 3rd May 1984, 5th June 1984, 2nd December 1987, 18th March 1996 and 4th December 2000. On 5th September 2003, the charity changed its name from Cleveland Arts to **Tees Valley Arts**. In the event of the company's being wound up, each of the members has pledged to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity state its principal objects to be "to promote, maintain and encourage for the education of the public, the development of the whole range of arts activity in the area currently known as the Tees Valley and its environs including drama, dance, music, opera, ballet, visual arts, photography, exhibitions, crafts, films, literature and community arts, for all members of the local community, without regard to disability, ethnic background, sexuality, age, gender, ability or religious or other belief."

Tees Valley Arts continues to work to develop the arts in the Boroughs of Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar and Cleveland, Stockton on Tees and Darlington. It aims to develop art projects with a wide range of people, to develop audiences for a range of arts events, to support locally-based artists and to liaise with other arts providers.

Tees Valley Arts works in partnership with local authorities, building developers, architects, social services, the education sector, business, artists and local people to develop arts projects.

Recruitment and appointment of the Trustees

The charity's policy for recruitment of Trustees is shown on page 2 above.

Trustee induction and training

All new trustees are issued with a copy of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the most recent, audited accounts and any relevant Charity Commission publications relating to their role as Trustee. They are also encouraged to visit the office and speak to staff about the charity's activities. All trustees are given details of relevant external courses and encouraged to attend.

Risk management

The charity has produced a business plan which determines the policies, strategies, aims and objectives of the organisation over a 3 year period while fully taking into account external threats and opportunities. Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects and to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charitable company. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

Organisational Structure

A board of trustees of between 14 and 18 members, who meet quarterly, administers the charity. A Chief Executive, whose title is Director but they are not a director for the purposes of the Companies Act 1985, is appointed by the trustees to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity.

Related Parties

The charity has a very close relationship with Arts Council England, North East, which is itself a charity. It can nominate trustees and provides funding to enable the charity to carry out its charitable objects. A summary of transactions with this party is shown in note 12 to the Financial Statements.

Objectives and Activities

The Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity state its principal objects to be "to promote, maintain and encourage for the education of the public, the development of the whole range of arts activity in the area currently known as the Tees Valley and its environs including drama, dance, music, opera, ballet, visual arts, photography, exhibitions, crafts, films, literature and community arts, for all members of the local community, without regard to disability, ethnic background, sexuality, age, gender, ability or religious or other belief."

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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED $31^{\rm ST}$ MARCH 2006

Achievements and performance

Community Programme

During 2005/06 the three year ERDF funded **In:volve** social inclusion programme came to a successful completion. In:volve 1 and In:volve 2 included a total of nine projects each focusing on a different socially inclusive theme. These projects were entitled; You Are Here, small world: Big Drums, Phoenix Arts, Gallery TS1, Shoot your Mouth Off, Roaring Mouse, Tees Valley Creatives (Inkspot, and Metalworks) and 1:3 Sigma.

Themes included mental health, physical and learning ability, domestic abuse, young people, refugee communities and seeking asylum. Art forms included music, drama, film, graphic design, and creative writing. The two programme strands sought to "promote diversity, inclusion and sustainability in the Tees Valley; establishing capacity in target communities via [creative and participative activities and] contributing to accelerating renaissance and employment by investing in sustainable communities". Six of seven social enterprises were successfully 'fledged' and £30,000 was generated from resulting artworks and other saleable resources. Gallery TS1 continues to work particularly successfully and has subsequently received further support from Middlesbrough Council via ERDF until 2009.

In March 2006 Tees Valley Arts piloted the first **Winterfest** Festival of World Music and Culture. This event ran over three days and showcased local, regional, national and international artists from 15 countries including Iraq, Iran, Kurdistan, Zimbabwe, Congo, Palestine, Egypt, the Caribbean, South America and Nigeria. The Winterfest pilot took place in Middlesbrough and attracted a mixed race audience of approximately 600. Winterfest 2006 cost £23,100 which was secured through funding provided by Northern Rock Foundation, Arts Council England North East, Middlesbrough Council and ticket sales.

Education Programme

During 2005/06 the **Evolve** Science through the Arts programme was launched in partnership with the North East Processing Industries Cluster (NEPIC) and funded through the Tees Valley Partnership Investment Fund to a total of £200,000 over two years. The programme seeks to raise aspirations. This year Evolve has worked with 7 special schools, trained 6 artists, delivered INSET training to 45 science teachers, delivered cross curricular training to 50 student teachers and intensive training sessions to a further 18 student teachers.

In addition to Evolve, the **Art:Works** programme of small school 'seed' projects has begun to develop under the coordination of an Art:Works coordinator and during this year £3,000 worth of projects have come to fruition.

The **Waveband** and **Lifecycle** projects continued to encourage school children to explore the environment and sustainability issues through music and performance with support from the Grants for the Arts fund and in the case of Lifecycle additional support from NEPIC and the Education through the Arts, Science and Industry (**EASI**) programme.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2006

Staff Profile

During 2005/06 the previous Director; Lesley Featherstone resigned from Tees Valley Arts in July 2005. After a difficult recruitment drive the new Director; Rosi Lister was appointed in August but due to an extended notice period did not arrive until November 2005. Clive Rawson's Fundraising contract came to an end and was not renewed.

Janette Pratt remains the Education Programme Manager, Andrea Williams the Administrator (Finance), Simon Smith finished his contract as Administrative Officer, on the 31st March 06, Andy Wray finished his contract as Administrative Assistant, on the 31st March 06. Both these contracts were extended until 30th June 2006 with funding provided by the Arts Council North East. Tim Coyte continued as Education Projects Officer.

Strategic Planning

Between December 2005 and March 2006 a new strategic plan was developed after widespread consultation with Tees Valley partners. This document sets out Tees Valley Arts' vision to expand and develop as a regional Arts Development Agency working within and across the public realm. Tees Valley Arts retains a strong commitment to Cultural Education and Community Development, but will expand its horizons by embracing all aspects of social, physical and cultural revitalisation. New staff will be appointed and a clearer staffing structure developed. All quality assurance mechanisms will be reviewed and robust procedures adopted.

Strategic Profile

During the spring of 2006 key strategic partnerships have been formed. These include Local Authority Cultural Services, Children's Services, and Regeneration Teams, NEPIC, MIMA, Strategic Health Authorities, Government Office North East Drugs Intervention Programme (GONE DIP), the Regional Development Agency (ONE), Tees Valley Wildlife Trust, Groundwork South Tees, the RSPB, INCA, Commissions North, Tees Valley Partnerships and Tees Valley Tourism Bureau, NEMLAC and the Arts Council.

Tees Valley Arts are now members of the North East Tourism and Cultural Network, TV DCMS, First For Festivals Group, and the ONE Regional Economic Strategy (RES) Cultural working group.

Tees Valley Arts continue to Chair and administer the Tees Valley Education and Arts Forum, and regularly attends the TV Strategic Arts Officers Group.

Tees Valley Arts sit on the Board of Saltburn Artists Project.

Fundraising

2006 saw the end of three years of ERDF funding which supported the Community Programme. As the Director moved to pastures new, a gap in funding was unfortunately experienced. However, the new strategic plan identifies a need to adopt a more commercial 'full cost recovery' model as a not-for-profit organisation and registered charity.

The new Director has implemented plans to increase funding targets and employ fundraising methodologies that maximise access to a broad range of revenue and activity funding. Tees Valley Arts are seeking revenue funding from the Northern Rock Foundation for three years to support strategic development and infrastructure. This funding will effectively increase the capacity of the organisation. The Director leads on fundraising issues. Programme Managers support the Director in developing applications.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2006

Future Plans

Implement the first phase of the new Strategic Plan. Launch and secure fiscal support for four thematic programmes: Heritage & Environment, Aspiration & Achievement, Cultural Diversity & Well Being and Regeneration. Community development and Education will form cross cutting themes, and developing a central role for providing support and training for artists is pivotal to Tees Valley Arts plans. The next three years will see a move toward the development of wide reaching strategic programmes that align priorities with key stakeholders. The reintroduction of Public Art is also recognised to be a particular opportunity in the Tees Valley in respect of a growing profile for Culture within the regional regeneration agenda.

Financial review

There has been a decrease in general reserves in the period, but the trustees are confident that the future plans and fundraising programme detailed above will permit the charity to again build up its general reserves.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that, in order to maximise the amount of funding available for arts activities, that unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets ('the free reserves') held by the charity should not exceed £25000. At 31st March 2006 the level of free reserves was £19205.

This policy will be regularly reviewed by the trustees in the light of prevailing financial circumstances.

Investment policy

The charity invests its surplus funds according to its anticipated short and medium term needs. At present bank deposit accounts are considered to be the most suitable medium. The trustees will continue to review this policy.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED $31^{\rm ST}$ MARCH 2006

Responsibilities of the Trustees

Company law requires the trustees, who are directors of the company for the purpose of company law, to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the financial year. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis.

The trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. TEES VALLEY ARTS NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2006

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2005) and the Companies Act 1985. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

INCOMING RESOURCES

Donations and grants

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except when donors specify that donations must be used in future accounting periods, when the income is deferred until those periods. Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity, where this can be quantified.

Contracts for the provision of services

Such income, which takes the form of grants and fees for services, is included in incoming resources when receivable except where it has been received in advance of the provision of the service. In these cases the income is deferred until the particular service is provided in full.

Interest receivable

Interest is included when receivable by the charity.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities.

Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred over the term of the lease.
