Structure, governance and management, and governing document:

Tees Valley Arts is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 5th August 1982, and a registered charity governed by its memorandum and articles of association as amended by special resolution(s) dated 03 may 1984 as amended by special resolution(s) dated 5th June 1984 as amended by certificate of incorporation on change of name dated 11th July 1984 as amended by special resolution(s) dated 2nd December 1987 as amended by special resolution(s) dated 4th December 2000 as amended by certificate of incorporation on change of name dated 5th September 2003 as amended by special resolution(s) dated 5th September 2011 as amended by special resolution(s) dated 6th March 2013 as amended by special resolution(s) dated 2nd March 2016 as amended by special resolution(s) dated 7th September 2016 as amended by special resolution(s) dated 7th January 2017.

In the event of the company being wound up, each of the members has pledged to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity state its principal objects to be "to promote, develop, provide and maintain access to, and engagement in, arts and culture, for the public benefit and education of people in the Tees Valley, particularly those with fewest opportunities to participate in, and to make progress through, such engagement."

Mission statement:

Tees Valley Arts is a charity that uses the arts to create social change.

We believe that arts and culture create societies and offer challenges to the status quo. Communities have a right to tell their stories which reflect their past and will shape their future. Tees Valley Arts will act as a catalyst for all communities to become cultural producers, galvanising creative action and championing positive change.

Working with partners, we will lead in the cultural sector regionally and advocate for our region's culture in national and international arenas.

Recruitment and appointment of the Directors:

The charity's policy for recruitment of Directors is outlined elsewhere in this document.

Director induction and training:

All new Directors complete an induction and are issued with a role profile clearly setting out their legal responsibilities and what is expected of them. Directors are encouraged to attend at least one project event during the year as well as participate in a strategic away-day.

Risk management:

The charity has produced a three-year strategic plan 2015/18, which outlines the policies, strategies, aims and objectives of the organisation over a 3-year period while fully taking into account external threats and opportunities. An annual business plan is approved by the Board.

Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of a policy framework and procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects and to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charitable company. The policy and procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they meet our regulatory and business needs. Board and staff sub-committees are set up to ensure regular periodic review of specific issues such as policy updating, presentation of statistics and financial reporting.

Organisational Structure:

A board of Directors of at least 8 members, who meet quarterly, oversees the charity.

An Executive Director is appointed by the Directors to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity. Additionally, there are two core team roles: Operations Manager and Curator.

Objectives and Activities:

Tees Valley Arts is a charity that uses the arts based in Middlesbrough in the North East of England, working across the five boroughs of the Tees Valley (Darlington, Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar and Cleveland, Stockton) and elsewhere. Tees Valley Arts champions co-production of high quality, stimulating creative activities as a tool for enhancing learning and life for individuals and communities.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity state its principal objects to be "to promote, develop, provide and maintain access to, and engagement in, arts and culture, for the public benefit and education of people in the Tees Valley, particularly those with fewest opportunities to participate in, and to make progress through, such engagement."

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

Particular successes in 2017/18

- Making Time: a project working with inmates in Kirklevington and Holme House prison and supported by the Ministry of Justice has supported the rehabilitation of prisoners whilst addressing skills development and mental health. A gallery has now been established in Kirklevington Prison and the arts activities that we initiated have been sustained by inmates. A particular highlight was one of the works made during this project being personally selected by Antony Gormley to exhibit in the Koestler Award exhibition at London's Sounthbank Centre.
- Thorntree Roses Bloom: representing a continuation of our work in the Thorntree Ward of Middlesbrough and our relationship with this group of female residents who have become active cultural ambassadors within their communities and who are now taking a lead on the project moving to becoming self-sustainable and formally constituted.
- Festival of Thrift: we have built upon our relationship with the Festival of Thrift, delivering a programme
 with the Sue Gill, John Fox and the associated artists of the Dead Good Guides to develop skills for
 delivering and officiating at artistic civil ceremonies. We were also able to support our friends in the
 Thorntree Roses group to present and sell their work at the festival, something that they plan to
 continue in the future.
- Creative Bloom: developed in partnership with Middlesbrough Council, Navigator North and Middlesbrough Institute of Modern Art, we supported and delivered sessions on this artist CPD programme.
- Catalyst / Evolve: as part of our partnership with Arts Council England to develop our fundraising
 capacity, especially in relation to private philanthropy we were able to deliver two fundraiser events in
 the form of a supper for invited guests and a fundraising concert at the Arc in Stockton. Notable success
 has also been achieved in terms of small donations through regular direct debits and through capitalizing
 on incentivized giving.
- **CFF Fertilizers outdoor sculpture**: we delivered an outdoor sculpture project on behalf of CFF Fertilizers on the site of the former ICI works, together with community in the Port Clarence area.
- **Billingham Forum:** we were involved in delivering artistic commissions to help the Billingham Forum celebrate its 50th anniversary.
- Creative Fuse: we started work on our partnership research project with the 5 North East universities to look at how arts charities could adapt the model of the alumni associations to remain in contact with past constituents.

Tees Valley Arts' Partners and Freelance Artists

Partnerships at all levels remain hugely important for Tees Valley Arts and allow us to create and deliver all of the work that we do.

During the year Board member and former Chair Richard Anderson stepped down, and Cllr Craig Hannaway (Redcar and Cleveland) and Professor Natasha Vall joined. Michael Lavery was appointed as Chair of Trustees.

Tees Valley Arts works with a wide variety of freelance arts practitioners, and we thank them for their invaluable contributions.

Review of the year: (continued)

Governance

Tees Valley Arts' Board contains representatives of different sectoral interests and professions. Thanks are due to trustees for their time, interest and support.

Richard Anderson (Group Legal and Compliance Director for Marston Holdings) stepped down as Chair of Trustees on 14th June 2017 and as a trustee on 7th March 2018, he was succeeded by Michael Lavery as Chair of Trustees.

Other Directors in 2017/18 were: Jim Ainslie; Tony Campbell; Ged Flanagan; Craig Hannaway (appointed 14.12.17); Michael Lavery; Mike McNulty; Doff Pollard; Natasha Vall (joined 08.06.16); and Margaret Walters.

The Board has continued to be conscious of the greater importance being placed on charity governance and throughout the year the governance sub-committee led by vice-chair Mike McNulty has continued its work in reviewing the organisations practice in line with the guidance provided by the draft "Good Governance Code".

Fundraising

Tees Valley Arts maintains its great offer to the Tees Valley through continuous fundraising, grant applications and submission of tenders.

We thank all our funders, and we are particularly grateful to the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation who have awarded us a grant to our core costs over three years.

Tees Valley Arts has continued to address the issue of recruiting philanthropic fundraising from individuals and businesses and is very grateful for a grant from the Arts Council Catalyst Evolve fund which is helping us develop new approaches and offers match funding to funds raised in this way.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that, in order to maximise the amount of funding available for arts activities, that unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets ('the free reserves') held by the charity should not exceed £125,000. At 31st March 2018 the level of free reserves was £3201.

This policy will be regularly reviewed by the Directors in the light of prevailing financial circumstances.

Investment policy

The charity invests its surplus funds according to its anticipated short- and medium-term needs. At present bank deposit accounts are considered to be the most suitable medium. The Directors will continue to review this policy.

Responsibilities of the Directors

The Directors (who are also charity trustees of Tees Valley Arts as defined by section 177 of the Charities Act 2011) are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for the year. In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) General information and basis of preparation

Tees Valley Arts is a company limited by guarantee and registered in England. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 2 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are to promote, maintain and encourage for the education of the public, the development of the whole range of arts activity in the area currently known as the Tees Valley and its environs including drama, dance, music, opera, ballet, visual arts, photography, exhibitions, crafts, films, literature and community arts, for all members of the local community, without regard to disability, ethnic background, sexuality, age, gender, ability or religious or other belief.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2016 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The charity has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not include a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

The charity adopted SORP (FRS 102) in the current year but this has not affected the financial position or performance.

(b) Funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(c) Income recognition

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations to be recognised the charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Donated facilities and donated professional services are recognised in income at their fair value when their economic benefit is probable, it can be measured reliably and the charity has control over the item. Fair value is determined on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity. For example the amount the charity would be willing to pay in the open market for such facilities and services. A corresponding amount is recognised in expenditure.

No amount is included in the financial statements for volunteer time in line with the SORP (FRS 102). Further detail is given in the Trustees' Annual Report.

For legacies, entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received. At this point income is recognised. On occasion legacies will be notified to the charity however it is not possible to measure the amount expected to be distributed. On these occasions, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed.

Investment income is earned through holding cash in a deposit account and is recognised when it is earned.

(d) Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All direct costs relate to the charity's charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(e) Support costs allocation

Support costs are those that assist the work of the charity but do not directly represent charitable activities and include office costs, governance costs, administrative payroll costs. They are incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out at Headquarters. Where support costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

The analysis of these costs is included in note 3.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as an expense against the activity for which expenditure arose.

(f) Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost (or deemed cost) or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset on a systematic basis over its expected useful life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings

25% reducing balance.

(g) Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

(h) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the charity has an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount can be reliably estimated.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(i) Employee benefits

When employees have rendered service to the charity, short-term employee benefits to which the employees are entitled are recognised at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

The charity operates a defined contribution plan for the benefit of its employees. Contributions are expensed as they become payable.

(j) Tax

The charity is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

(k) Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.
