Report of the Management Committee

The members of the Management Committee submit their report and the audited accounts for the year ended 31 March 1999.

Objects of the charity

The primary purpose of the charity is the furtherance of visual arts and in particular photography as an art and the promotion of public knowledge and understanding thereof.

The advancement of the education of women through the provision of opportunities for undertaking and participating in commissions, exhibitions, training projects or activities connected with the visual arts and in particular photography and creative technologies as art.

Policies and organisation of the charity

Following amendments to its Charitable Objectives in January 1998 which enabled Pavilion to broaden its services and audience base, the company has made great strides in consolidating and delivering new organisational and programming objectives. Acknowledging that 1998/99 was to be an extraordinary year for Pavilion due to its high profile within the 'Year of Photography and Electronic Image', a number of initiatives were undertaken to inform and enhance Pavilion's ability to deliver to a high professional standard and to reach national audiences.

The key roles of Chair and Company Secretary of the Pavilion Board of Directors remain occupied by senior professionals within the academic and legal fields respectively and a Treasurer was appointed in May 1998 who is a Chartered Accountant working in public practice. A Board 'Induction and Development Day' gave Directors an opportunity to further their knowledge of Pavilion's programme, in addition to receiving presentations from the Company Secretary and from Sense Internet, an Internet design and marketing company contracted to deliver a 'hands-on' consultancy to Pavilion.

The Board gave approval to a range of new policies, which included a revised mission statement, objectives, a new 'Staff Terms and Conditions Handbook' and an Equal Opportunities audit report, produced by LEO (Leeds Equal Opportunities/Leeds TEC). In May 1998, the Board approved a new corporate image for Pavilion: the logo, strap-line, associated literature and signage were designed to offer a consistent brand for all marketing activities that reflected the enhanced artistic nature of the organisation. The format for Board reporting was reviewed and financial reports facilitated by moving the accounts onto a computerised system.

At Board level, the Directors acknowledge the advisory and championing role of a number of Steering or project teams that operate within Pavilion to enhance the delivery of individual projects. These include the Steering Group for the Switched On programme, which incorporates partner organisations across the city leading strategic initiatives in creative and public uses of Information and Communication Technology, such as The University of Leeds and Leeds City Council. Other project teams initiated to input and provide guidance to the Heart & Mind and the Leeds Fringe Photography Festival projects have consolidated close working relationships with a wide range of public and voluntary sector agencies.

To deliver the range and scale of the programme, Pavilion staffing structure incorporated the three core staff (Artistic Director, Finance Officer/Administrator and Marketing Assistant/PA) and four additional project-related short-term contracts, three of which had freelance status. A line-management and supervision framework was devised to enhance internal communication. Unfortunately, the Marketing Assistant/PA post was not renewed after the 12-month contract ended in February 1999 and the post remains unfilled.

Two consultancies were completed during this period: a Marketing Appraisal conducted by Hayton Associates and another by Sense Internet who worked with Pavilion to explore organisational and creative Internet applications.

Activities Review

The programme delivered and launched during 1998/99 was by far the most ambitious in Pavilion's 16-year history. It made physical a range of significant projects that had taken the previous twelve months to initiate and which marked the re-animation of Pavilion's artistic programme. It explored contemporary uses of photography and the digital media from a variety of angles and viewpoints, brought together inter-disciplinary teams of creative professionals, identified and worked alongside a wide range of partners from the public, private and voluntary sectors, placed permanent (and temporary) works outside the gallery and engaged diverse audiences through exhibition and events.

Working through Photo 98, the agency delivering the Year of Photography and Electronic Image and their 'Public Sightings' programme, Pavilion launched the publicly sited following projects:

- Heart & Mind: a partnership with The Leeds Teaching Hospitals which explored issues of healthcare, location and audience as artists and architects were commissioned to produce new 'photographically originated' works for three sites (a major roof-garden, a car park banner and the link corridor) in the new Jubilee Wing of the hospital and publicly launched in October 1998. An extensive education programme ran in parallel to that of the hospital and primary schools children explored similar themes to those facing the artists within the hospital setting. Through an artist-in-residency, each of the five participating schools created new permanent artworks for their school environment.
- The Future Looms: an Internet based exhibition that sought to explore declining technologies (identified through the textile industries) and the new technologies (digital communication). Two artists and a writer were commissioned and worked extensively with an Internet design company, producing digital 'threads' weaving narratives that explored both theoretical and the social-economic realities of shifting technologies. The project focused on the West Yorkshire town of Batley and used extensive archive and oral history material. The work was released onto the Internet in three phases with a launch in January 99 in Leeds as part of the Yorkshire HUB programme of events. The major prize for Internet artworks at the Transmediele (Media) Festival in Berlin was awarded to the commissioned artist Alicia Felberbaum for her contribution to The Future Looms.

Other projects profiled and partially funded through Photo 98 were:

- Loiners: Portraits from Leeds by photographer Casey Orr. Casey's contemporary portraits of people of Leeds were placed within shop windows of the Victoria Quarter, an exclusive shopping arcade in the city. The 52 images were displayed in 35 shops and by their context, made comment on contemporary uses of 'ordinary' people within contemporary fashion photography.
- The Leeds Fringe Photography Festival. Pavilion took the lead role in delivering the 4-week Festival
 across the city centre, bringing together 121 photographers within 25 sites that included churches,
 bars and galleries. A series of 17 opening events created a wide and diverse audience for the event.
 An educational and interpretive programme was offered with Pavilion offering Internet workshops and
 portfolio sessions with commissioning editors from the national press.

Outside Photo 98, Pavilion was completing the Feasibility and Development Study for Switched On...In The Community, a programme that sought to develop long-term support enabling young people's creative access to Internet technologies. A citywide event at the West Yorkshire Playhouse attracted 120 young people and formed part of an extensive consultation programme with young people, community and strategic partners and national agencies. The findings underpinned the development of a four-year Business Plan for the substantive programme that was launched in December 1998. Successful fundraising has secured funding for two posts and related project costs that will develop facilities, structured support and the development of an on-line community.

In reviewing the programme, two audience response surveys within the Heart and Mind programme and a market research exercise were undertaken to develop a critical feedback loop. The production of a CD-ROM catalogue with an accompanying revision of Pavilion's Internet presence will archive three of the publicly sited projects and offer opportunities for further promotion to target audiences.

Management Committee responsibilities

Company and charity law require the Management Committee to prepare financial statements for the financial year to give a true and fair view of the affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources for the year and the application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Management Committee are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue on that basis

The Management Committee are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities, as well as exercising proper financial controls.

Commentary on the financial statements

Pavilion's overall income continued to grow to £281,000 in 1998/99, compared to £176,000 in 1997/98 and £63,000 in 1996/97. This increase was due to income raised for the major projects identified in the 'Activities Review': Heart and Mind and The Future Looms (funded through Photo 98/National Lottery) and Switched On (funded through SRB Round 3 and Leeds TEC).

Pavilion's core revenue funding made up 18% of total project funds, compared to 72% in 1996/97, remaining at the same level for the last five years, £30,000 from Yorkshire Arts (formerly Yorkshire and Humberside Arts) and £13,200 from Leeds City Council.

Pavilion identified a contribution to overheads within each project, which brought an additional £28,500 to cover core running costs. This is identified within the accounts as 'reallocation of costs' within 'Outgoing Resources' (Note 3).

In October 1998, a paper was presented to the Directors that acknowledged the exceptional nature of the 1998/99 programme but identified a potential deficit situation of £21,000 at the end of the financial year: this was largely due to slippage on one of the major projects, caused by the host venue.

A number of strategies were proposed to alleviate the situation and to increase levels of core and earned revenue for forthcoming years. This was then acted upon and extensive programme development and related fund-raising undertaken.

Other measures taken to minimise core costs included the decision not to renew the contract for the Marketing Assistant/PA when it finished in February 1999, and a budget reduction of £17,000 (from £89,000 to £72,000) for 1999-2000, which reflected a decrease in activities following 1998 the Year of Photography, which presented an exceptional number and range of projects (see Activities Review).

Already measures taken have significantly reduced the final accumulated deficit on unrestricted funds, which at the year-end was £14,000. With core revenue funding for 1999-2000 confirmed at £44,100, at the end of the first quarter Pavilion has raised an additional £120,000 of grant income for projects, of which £22,000 has been identified as a contribution towards core costs. This constitutes approximately 61% of our total fundraising target for 1999-2000 of £36,000. On this basis, we are confident that we will be able to reduce our accumulated deficit by a minimum of £7,000 during this financial year, thus achieving our target of eliminating this deficit over a two-year period.

1. Accounting policies
