## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006

### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The charity is administered by a Trustee Board of between four and eighteen persons. The following have the right to nominate to the Board the number of persons specified -

City & County of Swansea

2 persons

Mental Health Forum

1 person

The remaining Trustee Board members can either be elected at the Annual General Meeting or co-opted by the Trustee Board provided that the total number of co-opted and nominated members does not exceed one third of the total members of the Trustee Board No member of the Trustee Board can serve for more than three years without being formally re-elected

### Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are provided with a trustee handbook and follow a course of induction procedures. This includes being briefed on their legal obligations under Charity and Company Law, the committee decision making progress, the business plan and the recent financial performance of the Charity. They are also given the opportunity to meet key employees and other Trustees. Trustees are provided with details of appropriate external training events where these will help facilitate the undertaking of their role.

### Organisational structure

The charity is operated in accordance with its Memorandum and Articles of Association, which were last amended in October 2010

Members of the Trustee Board, who are directors for the purposes of the Companies Acts and trustees for the purposes of charity law, who served during the year, are listed on page 1. None of the officers hold any shares in the company

The Trustee Board is responsible for all aspects of the Bureau Sub committees are delegated the power to make some decisions on behalf of the Board In other areas, recommendations are made to the Trustee Board, which makes the ultimate decision.

## Wider network

Citizens Advice provides support services to Bureaux in the form of information and training amongst others. The Bureau is required to adopt service wide policies and comply with Membership Scheme requirements.

### Related parties

Swansea Citizens Advice Bureau is a member of Citizens Advice (the working title of the National Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux), but is an independently registered charity and company limited by guarantee

## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2011

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

During the year the Board has reviewed each of the Bureau's operations and activities as part of an overall risk assessment approach. All new ventures are appraised on the basis of the risks identified and the procedures and policies associated with the minimisation of such risks that are significant

In addition, the Bureau is subject to regular audit by Citizens Advice and the Legal Services Commission

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

To promote any charitable purpose for the benefit of the immediate community in the City and County of Swansea but generally throughout Wales ("the area of benefit") by the advancement of education, the protection and preservation of health and the relief of poverty, sickness and distress

The Board have established three key strategic priorities

- To achieve ongoing sustainability of Swansea Citizens Advice Bureau
- Become the first port of call for advice
- Become a recognised Centre for Excellence

### Significant activities

The Department of Business, Innovation and Skills (formerly Department of Trade and Industry) continued to finance the Financial Inclusion Fund work so that we can provide additional debt casework support. This is regarded as a Restricted Fund

#### **Public Benefit**

Readers of this report are also referred to the Annual Report of the Bureau's activities for the period in question. The Annual Report details the aims of the Citizens Advice Bureau service which are compatible with the bureau's own objects set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The CAB delivers services to members of the general public, which encompass the provision of information, advice and support. The bureau hosts a number of volunteering opportunities and provides training for volunteer workers and other members of the public, along with space in which to carry them out All services are free to the end user and as such, the funds of the bureaux are targeted at the widest possible public audience. The Bureau is a unique organisation in that it does not restrict its services to any specific client group or age range.

As a member of the National Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux, Swansea C A B operates an equal opportunities policy The Bureau takes seriously the need to pro-actively target its services at all parts of the community, and specifically at those groups and communities who are currently under using the bureau's services We regularly review our equality objectives along with all other objectives at Trustee Board, Executive Committee and Officer level to identify the outcomes of our work with clients and what has been achieved by each activity

### Volunteers

During the year a maximum of 21 employees were retained by the Swansea Citizens Advice Bureau in addition to 53 volunteer workers. The Trustee Board would like to thank the volunteers for their substantial work during the year.

# Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2011

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

The Swansea Citizens' Advice Bureau is an advice, information and casework support service, offering assistance to members of the general public in respect to their rights and responsibilities

The Bureau operates from its base in Pleasant Street

### FINANCIAL REVIEW

### Reserves policy

The trustees believe that the nature of the Bureau is such that it should hold financial reserves sufficient to enable it to continue its operations and to meet the needs of clients in the event of unforeseen and potentially financially damaging circumstances arising

The trustees consider that it would be prudent to set aside an amount equivalent to three months operating expenditure on unrestricted funds, and the trustees monitor and review the adequacy of the policy from time to time. The free reserves of the Charity at 31 March 2011 amounted to £99,472 (2010 £83,307). This is the balance on the general reserves of £109,262 (2010 £104,872) (note 14) less the book value of Tangible Fixed Assets totalling £9,790 (2010 £21,565). Three months of expenditure on unrestricted funds, based on these financial statements, amounts to £72,230 (2010 £71,622) {£288,920 x 25% (2010 £286,489 x 25%)}. The Trustees consider that the objectives in respect of the reserves policy have been met

In addition, unrestricted reserves have been designated for redundancy, to meet the potential liability for redundancy payments to staff in the event of closure of the Bureau

Restricted reserves are funds, not yet expended, provided for specific purposes stipulated by the donor or funder and cannot be used for the general purposes of the Bureau Balances on such funds do not imply that there has been an underspend but may result from a variety of circumstances including timing differences

This reserves policy is monitored and reviewed by the trustees on an annual basis

### Principal funding sources

The Bureau is funded from a number of sources Funding for its core activities is provided by the City and County of Swansea Local Authority. In addition, a contract provides funding from the Legal Services Commission to support a Legal Help specialist casework service to clients who meet the eligibility test in the subjects of Debt and Welfare Benefits.

Outreach project funding is provided by the Welsh Government, enabling the Bureau to meet and assist clients in local Health Centres. All Welsh Government funding is regarded as Restricted Funds

## Investment policy and objectives

The Trustee Board has considered the most appropriate policy for investing funds and has utilised the Charities Official Investment Fund for a number of years, yielding some interest on the balances. The Board continues to monitor returns on this and have agreed for the coming 12 months that the return on the long-term deposit account in this form is satisfactory.

#### **FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS**

The Bureau operates a two to three year Development Plan, the activities of which are monitored on a regular basis by the main Trustee Board

### STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of Swansea Citizens Advice Bureau Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

# Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2011

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities

### **Incoming resources**

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Incoming resources represent amounts derived from the charity's ordinary activities, including grants received, donations and funding from the Legal Services Commission, net of VAT

Voluntary income by way of donations and gifts is included in full when received. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included. Grants receivable are included for the period in respect of which they are receivable. Deferred income is provided by reference to the unexpired portion of the funded project on a time basis.

### Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred Resources expended include attributable VAT, which cannot be recovered

Resources expended are allocated to a particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. The cost of overall direction and administration on each activity, comprising salary and overhead cost of the central function, is apportioned on the basis of estimated staff time attributable to each category

### Allocation and apportionment of costs

Costs have been allocated as far as possible between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocate directly. Others have been apportioned based on the estimated usage of the resource.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Improvements to property

- 33% on cost

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on reducing balance

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The cost of minor additions or those costing below £500 are not capitalised. An impairment review is carried out to ensure that the net book value of the asset is not materially in excess of the market value.

#### Stocks

Work in progress is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value and relates to the contract the Bureau has with the Legal Services Commission

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements

### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate
