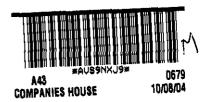

Report of the Trustee Board for the Year Ended 31 March 2004

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 March 2004.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The principal activity of the company in the year under review was that of the promotion of charitable objects to benefit the community of the City and County of Swansea.

REVIEW OF BUSINESS

The results for the year and financial position of the company are as shown in the annexed financial statements.

The net surplus for the year amounted to £6,277.

A surplus of £3,722 was attributable to the general fund and a surplus of £2,555 to the restricted funds.

At 31 March 2004, the balance on the general fund amounted to £10,288 and the balance on the restricted funds amounted to £21,253.

The unrestricted designated funds remained unchanged at £15,000 during the year.

STATUS, STRUCTURE AND MANAGEMENT

Members of the Trustee Board, who are directors for the purposes of the Companies Acts and trustees for the purposes of charity law, who served during the year, are listed on page 1.

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, founded in 1936 and incorporated on 25 February 1983. The Bureau adopted a new Memorandum & Articles of Association in January 2002. The Bureau is a member of Citizens Advice (National Association of Citizens Advice Bureaux).

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association that established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed by its Articles of Association. Under those Articles the members of the Trustee Board are elected at AGM. A member may be co-opted at an ordinary meeting, subject to the Articles, until the next AGM.

The names of the Trustee Board are shown on page one. The charity is a company limited by guarantee and none of the officers hold any shares in the company. The charity is administered by a Trustee Board of between four and eighteen persons. The following have the right to nominate to the Board the number of persons specified:-

The remaining Trustee Board members can either be elected at the Annual General Meeting or co-opted by the Trustee Board provided that the total number of co-opted and nominated members does not exceed one third of the total members of the Trustee Board. No member of the Trustee Board can serve for more than three years without being formally re-elected.

The charity is operated in accordance with its Memorandum and Articles of Association, which were last amended in January 2002. The Trustee Board is responsible for all aspects of the bureau. The Board has set up two sub-committees: Resources and Monitoring and Review. These are each delegated the power to make some decisions on behalf of the Bureau. In other areas, recommendations are made to the Trustee Board, which makes the ultimate decision.

Swansea Citizens Advice Bureau is a member of the Citizens Advice (the working title of the National Association of Citizens Bureaux), but is an independently registered charity and company limited by guarantee. Citizens Advice provides support services to bureau in the form of information and training amongst others. Bureau are required to adopt service wide policies and comply with Membership Scheme requirements.

CHARITABLE OBJECTS

To promote any charitable purpose for the benefit of the community in the City and County of Swansea and surrounding areas by the advancement of education, the protection and preservation of health and the relief of poverty, sickness and distress.

ACTIVITIES

The Swansea Citizens' Advice Bureau is an advice, information and casework support service, offering assistance to members of the general public in respect to their rights and responsibilities.

The Bureau operates from a central base in High Street, Swansea.

The Bureau is funded from a number of sources. Funding for its core activities is provided by the City and County of Swansea Local Authority. In addition, a contract provides funding from the Legal Services Commission to support a Legal Help specialist casework service to clients who meet the eligibility test in the subjects of Debt, Employment and Welfare Benefits.

Outreach project funding is provided by the National Assembly Government in Wales, enabling the Bureau to meet and assist clients in local Health Centres and to administer the Bond Board Scheme. The Townhill and Mayhill Community Advice Project was funded from 1 October 2002 via the Phoenix Community Development Trust by the National Assembly. All Assembly funding is regarded as Restricted Funds.

The Community Fund provides money to enable the client to deliver outreach services from additional Health Centres. This funding appears as a Restricted Fund.

EMPLOYMENT

During the year a maximum of fifteen employees were retained by the Swansea Citizens Advice Bureau in addition to 35 volunteer workers.

FUTURE STRATEGY

The Bureau operates as part of a two to three year Development Plan, the activities of which are monitored on a regular basis by a Monitoring and Review Sub-Committee reporting to the main Trustee Board.

RESERVES POLICY

The trustees believe that the nature of the bureau is such that it should hold financial reserves sufficient to enable it to continue its operations and to meet the needs of clients in the event of unforeseen and potentially financially damaging circumstances arising.

The trustees consider that it would be prudent to set aside an amount equivalent to three months operating expenditure.

In addition, unrestricted reserves have been designated for the following purpose:

Redundancy Reserve.

The purpose of the reserve is to meet the potential liability for redundancy payments to staff in the event of closure of the bureau.

Restricted reserves.

Restricted reserves are funds, not yet expended, provided for specific purposes stipulated by the donor or funder and cannot be used for the general purposes of the bureau. Such funds do not imply that there has been an underspend but may result from a variety of circumstances including timing differences.

This reserves policy is monitored and reviewed by the trustees from time to time.

INVESTMENT POLICY

The Trustee Board has considered the most appropriate policy for investing funds and has utilised the Charities Official Investment Fund for a number of years, yielding some interest on the balances. The Board continue to monitor returns on this and have agreed for the coming 12 months that the return on the long-term deposit account in this form is satisfactory.

RISK REVIEW

During the year the Board has reviewed each of the Bureau's operations and activities as part of an overall risk assessment approach. All new ventures are appraised on the basis of the risks identified and the procedures and policies associated with the minimisation of such risks that are significant.

In addition, the Bureau is audited annually by the Legal Services Help Quality Mark.

OTHER

The Trustee Board would like to thank the volunteers for their work during the year.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

Report of the Independent Auditors to the Members of Swansea Citizens Advice Bureau

We have audited the financial statements of Swansea Citizens Advice Bureau for the year ended 31 March 2004 on pages eight to fourteen. These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002), under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the charity's trustees in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charity's trustees those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charity and the charity's trustees, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As described on page five the charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and the Charities Act 1993. Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2004

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002). In preparing the financial statements the charity follows best practice as set out in the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP) issued in October 2000.

Incoming resources

Incoming resources represent amounts derived from the charity's ordinary activities, including grants received, donations and funding from the Legal Services Commission, net of VAT.

Voluntary income by way of donations and gifts is included in full when received. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included. Grants receivable are included for the period in respect of which they are receivable. Deferred income is provided by reference to the unexpired portion of the funded project on a time basis.

Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT, which cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to a particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. The cost of overall direction and administration on each activity, comprising salary and overhead cost of the central function, is apportioned on the basis of estimated staff time attributable to each category.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on reducing balance

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable for the year are charged in the Income and Expenditure account.

Hire purchase and lease commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities/ Income and Expenditure Account as incurred.

Funds Structure

Unrestricted funds are grants and donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the management committee for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the grantor.

Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund, together with an allocation of permitted management and support costs
