REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Trustees submit their Report, together with the audited financial statements of the Trust for the year ended 31st March 2000.

1. TRUSTEES ACTING DURING THE YEAR

David Clayton Brian Dodsworth Eric Richard Brian Stewart

In accordance with Clause 23 of the Articles of Association, Mr. Richard and Mr. Stewart retire as Trustees at the Annual General Meeting, and being eligible, offer themselves for re-election.

2. PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The objects of the Trust are to provide or assist in the provision of facilities for the recreation and other leisure-time occupations of young people who have need for such facilities by reason of their youth, disablement, poverty, or social and economic circumstances; and so as to develop the physical, mental and spiritual capacities of these young people, that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society, and thus improve their conditions of life.

3. REVIEW OF THE YEAR'S OPERATIONS

The year began with a five-day training course, over Easter 1999 at Walton Hall School near Stafford, that concentrated on behaviour and routines when living and working away from home; and which led straight into the Imps' first visit to the USA, in the form of the last week of April spent at Norfolk, Virginia, taking part in an indoor Tattoo that was one of the principal attractions of the Tidewater International Festival.

While they earned golden opinions from press and public, for the members of the Team the high spot of the visit was not the actual Tattoo but the occasion on which they were booked to give a special performance at a shopping centre some twenty miles from Norfolk; and when, in the absence of any transport suitable for carrying the Team's fleet of motorcycles, the smaller children and their 50cc. Machines were put in a truck, together with the 'props', and everyone else rode there and back through the Virginia countryside - something that they are never allowed to do in the UK - two by two, with the Union Jack flying, and escorted by police cars with sirens wailing. The locals said that the 'Old Dominion State' hadn't seen anything like it since Grant's advance on Richmond in '65 - 1865, of course!

After that it was back to a very full summer programme of Shows that included four extremely wet days at the Royal Bath and West Show at Shepton Mallet during the Spring Half Term week - with the detachment from the Gurkhas presenting arms to the Imps as they rode past, caked with mud, at the end of their last performance - and a seven-day tour at the beginning of August that took in Shows at Edinburgh, Lincoln, Great Yarmouth and Honiton. Probably the most bizarre and exhausting experience of the summer was a series of five Tuesday evening performances at Caister Speedway, providing the entertainment between two sessions of stock car racing; and one of the most gratifying was at the Metropolitan Police Show at Chigwell, when a nine year old Imp whizzed faultlessly around an adult motorcycle skills course - seesaws, barrels, jumps - when not a single policeman could do it without coming off!

Meanwhile the Imps settled into the Base and began to make really effective use of it. With the help of a grant from the London Marathon Trust the large portacabin that had been bought the previous year was converted into a very presentable and comfortable small meeting hall, with a galley and toilets - the first time in twenty years that the Imps had enjoyed such a luxury - and, during the winter, the realisation that the Team included a number of children who had been Statemented as having Special Educational Needs has led to it being used on Friday evenings for an 'Education Project': which has already shown some quite remarkable results.

The downside of the year's activities lay in the increasing and crippling expense of keeping the Team's large and ageing vehicles - coach and articulated transporter - on the road; and, while the surplus from the Season's Shows was one of the best on record, it was largely nullified by the problems caused by the coach. Fortunately, the Imps had had two exceptional pieces of good publicity during the year, in the form of a four page article in 'Country Life' in September (not, on the face of it, the most obvious periodical to feature the doings of a group of East London children .. but, of course, many of its readers keep seeing the Imps at their local Shows and might well be interested to learn more about them), and a full two page article by Nicholas Roe in the Daily Mail's weekend supplement at the end of January 2000. This latter created considerable interest and led to a number of donations from individual members of the public, together with a very substantial contribution from an anonymous source, that went a long way towards keeping the Team's financial head above water.

The coach was disposed of in December 1999, and the Imps found itself without the means to move the Team around for the first time in eighteen years. However, a successful application to the Charities Aid Foundation has enabled the Trust to employ fund-raising consultants to assist it to put together a capital appeal for funds to replace the coach and to complete the development of the Base; and, as the year ended, arrangements were being made to lease a coach for six months during the 2000 Show season - not by any means a cheap option, but substantially less than had to be spent during 1999 on our own vehicle - while plans and preparations are going forward for launching the appeal.

In conclusion, the Trustees wish to express their appreciation of the continuing financial assistance received during the year from the London Borough of Newham's Community Education and Youth Service. In addition to the individual donations already referred to, the Trust also received much-appreciated donations for general purposes from the Misses Barrie Charitable Trust and the Jeffrey Charitable Trust; and grants for specific purposes from the London Marathon Trust, the Charities Aid Foundation, Capital Radio's 'Help a London Child', the Jack Petchey Achievement Awards, and Cooperative Partnerships. Meanwhile the Team continued to enjoy direct sponsorship by Texaco Ltd. - and, if it were not for the ongoing sponsorship and support in kind received from Honda UK, the Imps would not have very many motorcycles on which to practise and perform!

We believe that the Imps gives excellent value for every penny that it receives: and our thanks go to all those individuals, trusts, companies, and local authorities whose support demonstrates that they share this belief.

4. RESULTS

The results for the year are shown on page 10. The Trustees consider the performance of the Trust to be satisfactory; while remaining fully aware that much remains to be done in order to reduce the Trust's dependence upon the financial backing of its Trustees.

5. AUDITORS

The Board of Trustees proposes the re-appointment of Messrs. Brooks & Co. as Auditors to the Impstart Trust in accordance with Clause 47 of the Trust's Articles of Association.

AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE GUARANTORS OF THE IMPSTART TRUST

We have audited the financial statements on pages 6 to 9 which have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out on page 7.

RESPECTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES OF TRUSTEES AND AUDITORS

It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the directors in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the company's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we consider necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error.

In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended 31st March 2000

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Accounting Convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies which the Trustees have adopted within that convention are set out below.

b) Income

Income represents donations, gifts, legacies, grants, settlements and transfers received in the year, including tax recovered where applicable.

c) Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis to write off the cost of the assets, less their residual value, over their expected lives which are as follows:

Coach	8 years
Tractor unit	8 years
Trailer	8 years
Motorcycles	6 years
Storage containers and sectional buildings	12 years

The depreciation policy was changed in the year ended 31st March 2000 to account for residual values and to depreciate motor cycles over 6 years rather than over 4 years, which is a more accurate reflection of their expected lives. The previous depreciation policy would have shown a depreciation charge of £15,795.
