POLICY STATEMENTS

Reserves

The reserves are the resources from the Farm's unrestricted income to spend at the Trustee's direction in the furtherance of the Farm's objects once it has met its commitments and covered its planned expenditure. The Trustees direct that sums are to be held as reserves when it is their considered view that it is in the Charity's best interest to do so. The review is made annually, normally at budget approval and at other times as the Trustees consider prudent. Currently the Farm maintains a 3 month operating cost reserve with any remainder designated to Farm development projects.

Investments

The Trustees have reviewed the deposition of the Farm's reserves funds and approve a policy of placing reserved funds with deposit taking institutions where appropriate. No more than the maximum covered by the Financial Services Compensation Scheme is to be placed with any one deposit taker.

Risk Analysis

The Farm has developed a Risk Management System and associated working policies. This has been in conjunction with the PQASSO Quality Standards Scheme.

Quality Standards

The Farm holds the Charity Evaluation Services PQASSO Standard Level One in all areas.

Public Benefit

The objects of the Farm are for public benefit, specifically around food farming and the wider environment. The City Farm serves to create and maintain a lifelong learning environment where local people can gain knowledge, green skills, confidence and learning opportunities through Farm activities and the education & training programmes. In planning and reviewing the Farm Business Plan and the activities taking place, the Trustees are mindful of the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE SUMMARY OF THE YEARS ACTIVITIES

The beginning of the 2019-2020 period had a strong direction following numerous funding bids applied for at the end of the preceding year and the adoption of a new five-year business strategy. The 5 Year Plan set out an ambitious programme of work to ensure the Farm continues to be a well accessed and relevant community resource long into the future.

After a broad consultation, the 5 Year Plan was approved by Trustees and the process of reviewing and updating key systems and processes was started. Primarily these identified financial control, monitoring and evaluation and income generation as priority areas. With the support of the SIB Reach Fund we moved from a ledger and Excel based accounting system to using Xero for financial control. Over the last 12 months we have been learning more about this system and integrating its use into the day to day management. This has already brought efficiencies in reporting and invoicing, as well as enhancing business planning and budget management.

The Farm's Theory of change focus previously identified three main impacts we are striving for and some key highlights from the year illustrates how far we are beginning to meet these.

- People are healthier, happier and more fulfilled

During the period over 73 000 people visited the Farm with over 3500 school pupils on a direct educational visit. There were 1924 hours of workshops run and the Farm supported 120 volunteers.

The school which is part of the Farm provided full time education and pastoral care to 10 young people who had been excluded from mainstream Hackney provision and all the pupils were well on target to achieve accredited qualifications by the end of their learning.

The art classes really are fantastic and the enthusiasm and passion for art and teaching is amazing. The results the kids come home with are like nothing I remember from my childhood. It's a fantastic refreshing approach to art that we and the kids love.

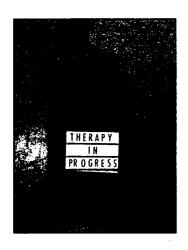

- A stronger local community

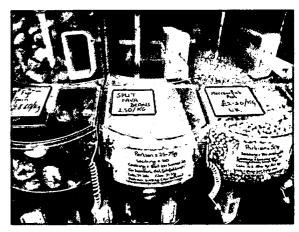
The Farm has continued to build on its place within the community as a hub and seed bed for community grown activity. Over the year work with Super Roots – Nature activity resource, Get Loose Plastic -free food, Growing Communities Organic Veg box and Gaia Therapy on site wellness project have all had significant impacts on the community in particular marginalised and vulnerable people. The enthusiasm of the people delivering theses innovative projects is infectious and inspiring and the Farm is dedicated to working hard with these projects to maximise their impact locally.

Gaia Therapy is a CIC based at the Farm. As a result of the collaboration over 1000 free or low-cost counselling sessions have been provided to people in the local community.

- Increased care for nature and the environment

The breeding programmes for goats and sheep have been developed and the Farm now has registered blood lines for its Kerryhill sheep and Anglo-Nubian goats. The young filly Luna has grown through the year and a new stable built to accommodate her. Time has been spent working in harness preparing her to begin driving again

Staff and volunteers have worked hard developing the Farm's growing areas and were rewarded for their skills and efforts winning Best Community Garden at the Hampton Court RHS Show.

Kevin, who has learning difficulties attended work experience for 1 day a week from May to August. He went from coming with a support assistant to attending on his own making a valuable contribution to the setting up of the plant shop and the creation of the RHS Show Garden. He has since secured an internship at North Middlesex Hospital with prospect of employment at the end of the programme.

After several years break, we restarted beekeeping activities delivering a range of workshops and supporting two other community beekeeping projects at SOAS University and The Calthorpe Community Garden. The apiary has expanded to 9 hives that produced over 60kg of honey which was sold by the students doing work experience with the Farm. The honey has generated funds that we plan to spend on activities to support pollinators around the gardens next season.







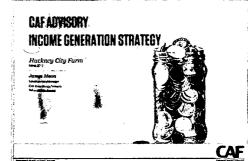

Delivery

To fund delivery of these impacts and many more not covered in the scope of this report a review of our Income Generation Strategy with input from CAF Advisory has enabled us to boost income from social enterprise, in general donations as well as further income from room hire and workshops and corporate link development. This is in addition to securing grant funding. This year we were awarded a grant for our work experience programme in horticulture, retail and animal husbandry for young

people with learning difficulties, development of the City Farm shop, a collaboration with Get Loose with the London Waste Authority. We will also be working in partnership with Tower Hamlets Homes to care for several bee hives on council housing in the borough, working with Residents' Associations to spread understanding and appreciation of bees and the important role they play in our food system.



Work going forward

In the next twelve months we were intending to consolidate this work in a number of areas.

Building on the success of the grant led activities further develop the Growing Skills programme to incorporate more plant retail placements and workshops for young adults, establishing a sustainable teaching resource.

Create a Pollinators in the Community project building on the work established at the Farm to date and develop further revenue stream s offering specialist bee colony care to meet the current interest already received.

Continue to scope the Farm's large capital development plan Building a second storey on the Classroom and pottery to provide improved education and art facilities. This will involve further consultation and feasibility studies.

Corona Virus Pandemic

Following the global pandemic and the government restrictions these aims, as well as others will be deferred or indeed now maybe made obsolete. It is difficult to know what effect it could have on the Farm both physically and financially. Approximately a fifth of income is a result of people-based activity (individual donations, corporate days, room hire and workshops). Restrictions mean that this could rapidly shrink or indeed disappear completely. Furthermore, the restrictions could also impact on the licence holders based at the Farm, in particular the Café - Frizzante. These licences account for around a quarter of the Farm income which contributes significantly to the Farm's core costs.

The project has enjoyed the success of becoming less grant and trust focused and built up its social enterprise portfolio substantially in the last 10 years. This has enabled it to become responsive to need and relieved pressure of reporting and monitoring - which whilst a useful tool can often become a burdensome constraint.

It is revealing not just to this project but to virtually all charities and businesses nationwide that within our business risk management plan there are no significant provision for the effect of a pandemic. The Farm has Key man insurance to protect it as a small enterprise from the effects of loss of people with key skills but like virtually all business in the UK there is no financially protection in respect the current and foreseen difficulties.

That said however, the Farm has particular strengths and resources which provide some protection going forward in the short to middle term; these include specialist skills and facilities to assist the community in a time of crisis and a large enough profile to reach out into wider society for support during this challenging and unprecedented time.

It is in confidence that we go forward into 2020-2021 to adapt to the changing needs of the world around us.
