DIRECTORS' REPORT

The directors present their annual report with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 30 September 2005.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The company is a charity, the objects of which are to promote, maintain, improve and advance the education of the public in the art of music by means of:

- Annual music festivals of international excellence and recognised standing in the Lake District;
- Summer schools of quality linked with the music festivals and
- Outreach programmes bringing educational benefits to schools in the Lake District.

FINANCIAL RESULTS

The result for the financial year was a deficit of £13,183 as funds received in previous years for festival expansion continued to be spent. Income for the year totalled £324,289 compared to £285,552 for 2004, while expenditure increased from £296,792 in 2004 to £337,472.

The increase in income came principally from:

- Increased numbers of Summer School students;
- Higher ticket sales resulting from the completion of Festival expansion and enhanced marketing;
- An increased Arts Council England North West grant following the designation of the Company as a Regularly Funded Organisation;
- The Patrons of Lake District Summer Music increasing their annual bursary donation in addition to providing a grant to support the running costs of the Company;
- The receipt of the second of two instalments of the Northern Rock grant to support the expansion of the Festival.

The Company was unable to replace a major sponsor whose period of support came to an end; this explains substantially the drop in sponsorship income.

The increase in costs was the result of:

- Higher accommodation costs due to increased student numbers on the Summer School and an inflation linked increase in the charges made by St. Martin's College;
- An increase in artists fees and expenses due to the planned expansion of the Festival and Summer School;
- Higher administration expenses which included increases in staff salaries, freelance staff costs, office rent, insurance premium and office expenses
- Increased computer costs to enable internet sales to be made (a grant was received to assist with the cost of this work in the Company's last financial year)

The deficit on unrestricted funds has been cleared since the year end as a result of a donation of £15,000 from Lake District Summer Music Trust.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

REVIEW OF THE BUSINESS

Agreed additional funding enabled the directors to complete the planned expansion of the festival in 2005, from 15 to 17 days and to consolidate new areas of programming. This has led to enhanced national and international recognition and audiences.

Amongst the musical highlights in our 21st season were:

- the 'Evolution of the String Quartet' and it's extension to 'Quartet+1'. These strands of programming introduced rarely heard works, such as Caplet's Conte Fantastique, new works such as Piers Hellawell's Weaver of Grass and new collaborations between professional artists such as Škampa Quartet and Frans Helmerson (cello).
- the further extension of the 'Rising Stars' series featuring UK debuts of international competition prize winners, such as Quatuor Ebène (winners of the 2004 ARD Munich Competition) and pianist Akiko Yamamoto (winner of the 2004 Robert Schumann Piano Competition. Further UK festival engagements and a Wigmore Hall debut have resulted from their appearance at LDSM.
- further exploration of new genres such Early Music (e.g. I Fagiolini's theatrical presentation of Monteverdi arias) and Opera & Music Theatre (e.g. Jane Manning's lecture demonstration and performance on her specialist subject of vocal music theatre and including a full performance of Judith Weir's King Harald's Saga)

177 students represented 23 countries at our 2005 Summer School courses. The residential International Summer School at St Martin's College in Ambleside attracted 97 musicians. New weeklong courses for double-bass and clarinet were introduced. The Young String Venture at Windermere St. Anne's School was attended by 80 students.

A synergy of training and performance is central to Lake District Summer Music. Designated Festival concerts offer professional concert opportunity to students on the summer courses.

It is the view of the Directors that with the continuing deterioration of student finances, greater bursary support will be needed for students wishing to benefit from the high quality opportunities at Lake District Summer Music.

The directors wish to place on record their gratitude for the support received from sponsors, donors, trusts, foundations and grant awarding bodies, whose names are listed on page 2.

The directors also wish to thank the permanent staff, the freelance staff and the many volunteers who all worked so hard to make the 2005 Festival and Summer School so successful.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

STATUS OF THE COMPANY

The company is a registered charity, number 516350, and is limited by guarantee.

The directors form the Council of Management which is responsible for the promotion of the charity's objectives and for the appointment of new directors.

The powers of the Council of Management are governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the company.

The Directors thank Lady Kerr and Michael Robinson for their many years of dedicated work for the Company. During the review period the Board met as the Council of Management of the company five times. In addition sub-committees of the Board with responsibility for overseeing the finances and the further development of the company have met during the period and reported on their work to the Board.

The Board have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks that the company faces and have put in place procedures and systems to manage these risks.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Independent Auditors' Report to the members of Lake District Summer Music Limited

We have audited the financial statements of Lake District Summer Music Limited for the year ended 30 September 2005 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and the company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of directors and auditors

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2005

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (The "2000 SORP"), the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002) and the Companies Act 1985.

INCOMING RESOURCES

Charitable trading activities

Income from concert admission and summer school fees is included in incoming resources in the period in which the relevant event takes place.

Donations and grants

income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows:

- When donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
- When donors impose conditions that have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met.

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants, are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to pre-conditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable.

Interest receivable

Interest is included when receivable by the charity.

RESOURCES EXPENDED

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred over the term of the lease.

Depreciation of tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its useful life:

Piano Staging and office equipment 10% on cost 20% on cost

FUND ACCOUNTING

Funds held by the charity are either:

- Unrestricted general funds these are funds, which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.
- Designated funds these are funds set aside by the trustees out of unrestricted general funds for specific purposes or projects.
- Restricted funds these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes
 within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when
 funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

The Northern Rock Foundation and Arts Council England Regional Arts Lottery Programme (RALP) grants were secured to facilitate organisational development and festival expansion. In addition, the RALP grant enabled LDSM to purchase some new staging.

The Clothworkers restricted funds were to purchase additional staging and to enhance festival venues with promotional stands.

The Northern Rock restricted fund was established to expand the activities of Lake District Summer Music.

Assets purchased using restricted funds are depreciated over five years and the annual depreciation is charged against these funds. The balances on restricted funds at the year end are committed to future depreciation charges.

9. LIABILITY OF MEMBERS

10. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

Sir J Manduell and R Kellaway were directors of the company and also trustees of Lake District Summer Music Trust which was established to advance the education of the public in music and other arts.

The balance owing to the Trust on loan account at the year end amounted to £1,128 (2004: £7,854) on which interest for the year of £501 was paid (2004: £Nil).

During the year donations and sponsorship were received from a number of the directors of the company or from companies associated with them.

Since the year end the Trust has made a donation of £15,000 to the company.
