TRUSTEES' REPORT

The Trustees are pleased to present their annual directors' report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ending 31 March 2019 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum & Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The company has taken advantage of the exemption to not have to prepare a strategic report in accordance with "The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013".

OUR PURPOSES AND ACTIVITIES

The company's objectives and principal activities are:

The advancement of education and learning amongst the public generally and more particularly amongst those engaged in the fields of training and education, whether general, professional or technical.

The main objectives and activities for the year, as previously, are to continue to focus upon the provision of creative projects for children and young people focussing primarily, but not exclusively, on music and performing arts.

The fundamental ethos of the charity's work is to provide children and young people with educative and inspirational experiences that significantly improve learning capabilities, creativity, group working, communication skills and self-esteem.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

In addition to delivering a varied programme of activities over the last year, we have also focussed on developing a sustainability plan that focusses on unrestricted funding streams which include:

The Bonus Room at Factory 8:

Our community uses space at Factory 8 continues to see regular evening and weekend use. We are working to increase the amount of free advertising that we are able to take advantage of and envisage usage growing over the coming year. Activities include yoga, choirs, early years music, theatre rehearsals, community meetings and personal and professional development workshops.

• Creative Outreach Programme, The Works in Bedminster:

As part of our Creative Outreach and Leadership Programme, we have taken on these diverse sites on a 'meanwhile' basis with a vision to create affordable, flexible and practical workplaces for the creative community. Since 2014 GV's Creative Outreach programme has been bringing life back to underused and vacant spaces in and off East Street, re-purposing

them to strengthen, diversify and regenerate this area of South Bristol, by forming and supporting creative and digital communities. Along with space for independent young and/or developing creatives we have also offered free space for local charities and emerging young artists under 25. The Works comprises of:

PrintWorks, Fabrication & Paradise Studios

Home to over 60 young and developing creatives (including 3 start up collectives), in a range of shared and individual studio spaces (including 2 public exhibition spaces). Since August 2018 over 1,000 local people have visited The Works and free public activity has included:

- open workshops weekend in collaboration with BV Studios introducing the public to The
 Works and the activities and resources on offer
- over a dozen free public exhibitions
- over a dozen free creative workshops for adults and children
- over 40 sewing and textile classes/workshops (covering both beginners and professional levels including courses for those wishing to start a fashion business) and regular weekly sewing groups for local people
- 2 scratch lab events giving artists a space to create community connections, explore ideas and take risks
- free film screenings
- activities with local residents and business owners exploring their histories/stories
- art and photography activities for the East Street Summer Fair for the local community
- local school workshops using animation, mural and mask making
- a collaboration with a Bristol organisation supporting adults with learning disabilities

In addition to this focus on developing unrestricted income streams, we have:

- continued to run regular children, young people, adult and inter-generational community
 music and vocal groups/sessions, as well as offering a range of open access public workshops
 and performances.
 - WorldRoots Acappella (for young people aged 12+) is now in its 16th year and continues to be our flagship vocal project, being invited to perform at both Glastonbury Festival 2019 (for the 13th time) and WOMAD Festival 2019 (for the 4th time).
 - NewRoots has been running for 12 years and works with children aged 8-11 to develop a
 grounding in music through singing by ear.
 - SoulRoots Acappella (our adult vocal group) is continuing strongly into its 7th year and continues to develop and encourage adults to explore their creativity and confidence through voice.
 - The Synergy Collective is our live band setting where musicians and selected singers from WorldRoots Acappella come together to create, rehearse and perform music to a live audience. There is an established practice of those with more experience mentoring and supporting newcomers as part of our Creative Youth Leadership work.

- continued to expand and develop our mentoring, creative coaching and leadership work for young people, creative adults and arts related organisations.
- continued a positive relationship with our Factory 8 neighbours (and landlords) within the building at Ashton Gate Primary School. The school understands the value of having this sort of community resource in such close proximity to extend their creative curriculum and as a source of out of school activities and we continue to look for ways to make creative collaborations.
- continued to nurture an innovative associate relationship with The Actor's Workshop (TAW), collaborating across music and theatre. Through this relationship a unique centre of excellence trains young performers aged 12+ for drama school auditions and the profession. After another successful year over 75% of those taking part at College Foundation level were offered places on BA/MA courses at accredited drama schools. In addition we have collaborated to run the second year of Theatre in Education (TIE) projects delivered across 8 South Bristol primary schools in the summer term.
- launched the newly created Gathering Voices website (www.gatheringvoices.org.uk). With
 the old website created over 10 years ago, we have launched the new site this year which
 includes information on GV's musical projects, outreach work, Factory 8 and the Bonus Room,
 walkabout performances, youth leadership work and our growing Heritage Group blog,
 created as a result of GV's HLF funded projects over the last 5 years.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Income for the year totals £80,383 which is a 88% increase on the previous year. Expenditure increased by 36% to £65,016 giving rise to an overall surplus of £15,367 in the year ended 31 March 2019 of which all relates to unrestricted funds. Further detail is set out in the Statement of Financial activities on page 9.

There are net current liabilities of £4,025 as at 31 March 2019, as set out in Note 12 and hence negative free reserves of £4,025 as at 31 March 2019.

The total funds carried forward as at 31 March 2019 are £24,391, all of which are held as unrestricted funds.

Principal Funding Sources

The principal funding sources for the charity are currently fees receivable from services rendered, donations, grants and traded services as well as subscriptions from participants. The charity is in a continual process of investigating new grant possibilities from organisations that share a similar ethos.

RESERVES POLICY

The charity does not have any employees or fixed overhead commitments. The Trustees are committed to increasing the level of unrestricted reserves carried forward in order to maintain readily available reserves equivalent to 6 months of unrestricted expenditure. This amounts to approximately £30,000.

As part of the relocation to 'Factory 8' space owned by Bristol City Council it was agreed that in return for a 5 year rent free period up to the first break clause the charity would invest an equivalent sum of the rent incentive into the refurbishment of the space provided.

Last year the charity received a loan from Nick Spollin, a trustee of the charity to provide capital to secure the provision of a refurbished space to develop and grow the provision of the charitable objects over the next 10 years. The development has assisted the charity in generate additional information from renting space in the year. This level of fees is foreseeable in the future. It has been agreed by the trustees that the loan should only be repaid subject to sufficient funds being available to the charity.

As a result of the charity's investment in its facilities to deliver its objectives, the trustees plan to generate future surpluses from an increase in activity and securing the provision of a refurbished space in order to return a consistent stream of future surpluses and repay the loan.

PLANS FOR CURRENT AND NEXT FINANCIAL PERIODS In 2019/2020 we plan to:

- continue to run regular children, young people, adult and inter-generational music sessions, as well as offering a range of open access public workshops and performances.
- continue to ensure that Factory 8 is an accessible and safe space for members of the community, especially children, young people and vulnerable adults, to work and create alongside our Creative Associates and other community focussed partners.
- continue to build upon our working partnership with current Creative Associates 'The Actors'
 Workshop' which will deliver joint theatre/music projects and outreach performances in
 Bristol primary schools during each summer term.
- investigate a Heritage Lottery Funded project in the mixed demographic area of Bedminster, engaging local people, schools, community organisations & businesses as well as the Civic Society, Councillors and Bristol Archives in the heritage aspects. Local interest in the proposed Bedminster Green development is very high, but there are few opportunities to become involved in heritage, to explore and celebrate individual and collective histories and memories.
- add SixtySix (ex-Argos site on East Street) to The Works. We are negotiating a one year secure
 meanwhile lease with subsequent rolling 3 months which will be the base for community
 aspect of the proposed 'Futures Past' project preparation, with additional studio space for
 young and developing artists, plus arts and mental health referral CIC Creative Shift.
- continue to raise the profile of GV through a series of meetings and discussions with BCC Head of culture, BCC Head of Arts Development, BCC Property Services, West of England Regional Development, UWE and Bristol University etc. The intention is to ensure that Gathering Voices are known not merely for our music activities but as significant movers and shakers in the creative culture of Bristol by using our successful project 'The Works' as an example.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

GOVERNING DOCUMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 18 March 1985 and registered as a charity on 10 April 1985 under the name 'View to Learning Ltd'. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. The company changed its name to 'Gathering Voices Ltd' on 6 April 2009.

RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Management Committee. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the members of the Management Committee are elected to serve for a period of three years after which they must be re-elected at the next Annual General Meeting. One third of the membership shall retire annually but shall be eligible for re-election.

TRUSTEE INDUCTION AND TRAINING

All new trustees are given the Charity Commission's guide, 'The Essential Trustee', a copy of the Memorandum and Articles and the latest financial statements and Trustee Report. Trustees are signposted to publications produced by the Charity Commission and other relevant organisations including the NCVO.

ORGANISATION

Gathering Voices' structure allows for a Council of Management of up to 10 members whose role is to meet quarterly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the Council has seven members from a variety of backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of services rest with two members, trustees Nick Spollin and Hannah Klewin. They are responsible for ensuring that the Charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met. They are also responsible for the recruitment and supervision of project staff.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Trustees have had due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit in deciding what activities the Charity should undertake and confirm that all the Charity's activities are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Charity's modus operandi is to run on a project by project basis with specific and restricted funds assigned to each project. The charity has no permanent employees and therefore the risks are minimised. Risk assessments are carried out on a project by project basis and procedures are in place to ensure compliance with the health and safety requirements of project facilitators, volunteers and participants and all are made aware of our Child Protection Policy. It is a policy of the Charity to make sure that all facilitators and volunteers over the age of 18 are appropriately CRB checked.

Management Committee responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

The Management Committee (who are also directors of Gathering Voices Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing a trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Management Committee to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustee board are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue in business.

The Management Committee are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Management Committee are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Gathering Voices Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

(b) Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees have considered the 12-month period from the date of approval of the financial statements. Based on forward projections, a surplus of £15,000 is anticipated for the 2019/20 and 2020/21 financial years which will replenish reserves to historic levels. The current deficit on free reserves is planned and financed by an interest free loan from one of the trustees. In addition, there are no significant third-party creditors or contractual commitments anticipated in the foreseeable future. As a result, we are confident the charity will be able to pay its debts as they fall due.

(c) Income

Donations and grants

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows:

- when donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
- when donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met.

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants, are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to pre-conditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable.

Interest receivable

Interest is included when receivable by the charity.

(d) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

(e) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value of each asset, over its expected useful life as follows:

- Leasehold Improvements 10% straight line
- Fixtures, fittings and equipment 25% straight line

(f) Funds accounting

Funds held by the charity are:

Unrestricted general funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds- these are funds set aside by the trustees out of general funds for specific purposes or projects.

Restricted funds – these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the accounts.
