TRUSTEES' REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2011

Objectives and activities

MDF The Bipolar Organisation is the only national charity dedicated to supporting individuals with the much misunderstood and devastating condition of bipolar, their carers and families

Although a small national charity our services have enormous reach. We provide a range of services to enable people affected by bipolar to take control of their lives including supporting 4,500 members, hosting over 100 self help groups across the UK, facilitating self management training courses, working directly with psychiatric units in a pioneering project, providing workplace training and a Helpline. In early 2011 we commenced a new project working with and supporting young people 18 to 25 years of age in the London area.

We also seek to combat the stigma and prejudice associated with bipolar disorder. We produce a selection of information and guidance publications, we campaign for research into treatment, lobby for improved services and our vibrant e-community provides members a forum to express and share their views and experiences

We work to ensure all individuals with bipolar can take control and lead independent lives. With the amazing support of our staff team, members, parents and families, volunteers, friends and supporters we all work to achieve this vision.

Achievements and Performance

The past year has been one of our busiest as we continued to develop our service provision to meet unprecedented demand in the midst of a challenging economic environment. The major achievements and successes are highlighted below

Member Services

The slow but steady rise in public awareness of bipolar has resulted in a substantial increase in demand for information, guidance and support. During the year we restructured our member services team to ensure we have the resources to meet demand

Following feedback from our members and a detailed analysis of the demands on the existing service the major area of restructuring was with regard to our support line. In October 2010 this was relaunched to provide a dedicated Helpline to our members operating 12 hours a day, seven days a week. The first six months of this service demonstrates the Helpline team are better able to support individuals with complex and complicated needs.

In addition to calls to the Helpline, our offices receive in excess of 200 telephone queries a week. Within these around 60% of all calls are with regard to support and information and the remaining 40% are more detailed concerning relationships and families, legal issues, employment law, disability payments and benefits, specific financial issues and problem solving

The total service package available to members was restructured with the introduction of new service opportunities for members which included free access to the acclaimed Beating Bipolar programme for the first four months of 2011 and a review of our recommended insurance products

Our quarterly journal Pendulum continues to receive fantastic feedback and its circulation has increased during the year

Our e community continued to expand providing unique peer-to-peer support in a safe and secure environment

The Year Ahead

We will continue to evaluate the services we provide to our members and potential service opportunities available to them

As discussed below the Communications Committee continues to review the leaflets and information sheets of the charity

Self Help Groups

Our national network of 117 self-help groups from Jersey to Northumberland, across Wales and in Northern Ireland are the heart and soul of everything we do. The groups provide support and assistance to individuals with bipolar, their carers and families at a grass roots level within our local communities. They play a vital role in offering peer support with regard to the significant challenges individuals face. They also provide a unique forum for individuals to openly discuss their concerns and anxieties with regard to the impact on everyday life.

Self help groups assist in reducing individuals' stress levels—a major cause of episodes. The groups also work as a catalyst—signposting individuals to other services run by us, other voluntary organisations and primary care trusts. Self help groups facilitate improved health and wellbeing through a shared understanding of this complicated and devastating illness. During the year we have seen previously committed financial assistance for local groups from local authorities and primary care trusts withdrawn across the county. As a result we proactively developed a programme of enhanced support for our groups in terms of greater support for our volunteer leaders/facilitators and financial support for the groups themselves.

Without the support of the Department of Health Financial Assistance Fund we would not have been able to continue to provide this extensive service

At the time of writing this report our revised fundraising strategy (see below) alongside the enhanced support for group facilitators means these crucially needed groups are continuing to develop and expand

Towards the end of the year we developed a partnership with Birmingham University to evaluate our self help groups which will demonstrate the impact of this service

The Year Ahead

Facilitator and group support will continue to develop overseen by the National Development Manager

An annual schedule of regional meetings has already been finalised for 2011 and into 2012

It is essential we receive core service funding to ensure we continue to fully support and develop what is the heart and soul of the charity – our self help groups

The evaluation project by Birmingham University will be undertaken and completed

Self Management Training (SMT)

Our SMT courses are core to enabling people with bipolar to regain control of their lives Each comprehensive three-day course is led by two trained facilitators both of whom have bipolar. By the close of the course participants will have greater confidence and skills to manage their extreme mood swings.

From past courses we know that

- 95% of participants feel they are better able self manage the condition
- 98% of participants fully understand their triggers and warning signs
- 96% of participants developed more effective coping strategies and action plans for preventing future episodes

Participants have told us

- "Very useful course, just as important as medication"
- "Everyone with a mental health diagnosis of bipolar should have opportunity to experience this self-management training course"
- "A fantastic opportunity to learn from others, who have begun to manage effectively"

In the past twelve months the programme has continued to operate across England and Wales In particular

- Over 180 individuals participated in SMT programmes in England and Wales
- Our courses in Wales were offered through working in partnership with the Mental Health Foundation
- Our facilitators continued to receive training and support
- We also provided support to the Mental Health Foundation and assisted their selfmanagement courses for people with serious mental health conditions other than bipolar

The Year Ahead

Alongside our overall strategic review (see below) we are working on a strategic plan for SMT within the wider pschyo education field

We will develop a communications strategy for GP consortia and commissioners for the SMT service

Bipolar Link Wales

This was the second year of this pioneering project working directly with patients and staff in psychiatric units funded by The Big Lottery

We trained 19 new volunteer mentors to participate within the project – ongoing training includes mental health, personal development and supervision

The project provided one-to-one mentoring for over 57 highly vulnerable individuals with bipolar in both psychiatric units and within the community. Our mentoring ensured they were fully supported through their treatment and then connected with services – including self help groups - within their communities when they left specialist care. Our Link workers and volunteers raised awareness of available services and support to

Our Link workers and volunteers raised awareness of available services and support to over 500 individuals with bipolar

Our Link workers and volunteers hosted over 109 awareness sessions to mental health professionals. These awareness sessions have resulted in more than 1,000 health professionals having a greater understanding of bipolar and its impact on individuals, families and carers.

We completed an independent evaluation of the project to date. The participants indicated an overwhelmingly positive view of the project and reported it was particularly important in providing a "missing link" between being diagnosed and coming to terms with the implications of the diagnosis

Over 76% of respondents stated the mentoring project has had a positive effect in reducing their suicidal thoughts. Whilst the project does not impact directly on the experience of mood changes, it does impact on their ability to cope with these (and other) symptoms of bipolar evidenced by reduced isolation, increased confidence, reduced self harm and increased engagement with community and social activities

The project absolutely raises awareness of bipolar and its impact within local communities, including police, community mental health teams, voluntary sector organisations and members of the public

The Year Ahead

Our focus is on continuing to develop the service working closely with mental health professionals and within local communities to provide the high level of support essential for our clients

Work has commenced towards developing this project on a sustainable basis taking on board recommendations from the Evaluation Report undertaken in the second year. We now have a footprint for future development of the project in Wales and hopefully the foundations of extending the project to England.

Employment Project & Workplace Training

As explained in last year's report we were not successful in securing funding for a permanent employment service and in September 2010 the service came to a close

However following an internal review the workplace training aspect was retained. This bespoke service works with employers and employees with bipolar in the workplace. During the course of the year we worked with eight organisations and plan to develop this service further.

The Year Ahead

Ongoing develop of Workplace Training and proactively communicating to employers as to the benefits of this training

London Youth

In March 2011 we launched a three-year pilot service working and supporting young people 18 to 25 years of age in the London. In the first few months of operations the service has been developing relationships with further education organisations and other organisations working with young people.

The Year Ahead

In the year ahead we will Engage with 20 London further education organisations Work with and support 140 young people Develop a young peoples' web presence Establish and develop three young peoples self help groups

Communications

The Communications Committee – an operational group comprising trustees and staff members – commenced its review of our external communications. During the year we developed and launched a new introduction booklet "An Introduction to Bipolar and your National Bipolar Charity" and a new information sheet "An Introduction to Medication"

We also raised our external profile through enhanced relationships with media and mental health organisations/professionals. During the year we were involved in over 50 articles/seminars/conferences focusing on bipolar.

Our Annual Conference in June 2010 was one of the most successful yet with the introduction of breakout sessions and workshops receiving fantastic feedback. In March 2011 we hosted our first awareness reception at Christie's Viscount Linley kindly hosted this very special evening with friends — old and new — joining us

The Year Ahead

The Communications Committee will continue to work on reviewing our external communications

At the time of writing we have just completed our 2011 National Conference in London and within the next few months work will commence on the 2012 event

Following the public strategic planning consultation (see below), trustees will discuss and approve a new five-year strategic plan including our charity name in September 2011 Following the decisions made we will review our website and methods of communication

Following the success of our first Bipolar Awareness reception in March 2011 work has already commenced for another in 2012. Work is also underway to join our services and users together to celebrate World Mental Health Day in October 2011.

Fundraising

The appointment of our new CEO in July 2010 coincided with a number of our restricted funds coming to a close. This challenging time gave us the opportunity to look in detail at our approach to fundraising. In the summer months we developed and implemented a revised approach to fundraising with the objective of broadening our funding base, increasing unrestricted income and raising our profile.

As the economic climate continued to bite, a small group of long-term supporters put their trust in our ability to develop and implement a strategy to ensure our continued viability and assisted us through a period of funding challenges

Towards the close of 2010 the new fundraising strategy began to pay dividends and this positive trend has continued through 2011 to date. Slowly but surely we have welcomed new supporters to the charity, broadened our funding base and raised our profile.

With our near total reliance on voluntary income, we could not continue to provide our first class service provision without the generous support of so many. The notes to the accounts detail a number of supporters who fund particular services or projects. We would, however, like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who supports the charity. Every pound raised makes a difference in terms of enabling us to meet the needs of individuals affected by bipolar.

The Year Ahead

We will continue to develop and build upon the fantastic foundations put in place over the past year. Our operational plan and associated budget for the current financial year although ambitious is, we believe, realistic and will ensure we continue to grow on a sustainable basis.

Key to this is our ability to raise our profile and enhance our communications and core to this is the current public consultation on strategic planning

Plans for the future

In the past two years we have completed national recruitment campaigns for new trustees and a chief executive. We now have strong leadership to steer the charity on its journey through these challenging economic times. During the next five years everyone involved with mental health service provision will see significant changes and we need to ensure that as the national bipolar charity we not only meet the demands on our services today, but as importantly develop to meet the needs of individuals affected by bipolar tomorrow

In June 2011 we launched a public consultation with regard to ten major strategic planning issues. The responses will be analysed by trustees during the summer months with a timetable to approve our new five-year strategic plan and a new charity name in September 2011.

Alongside our developing work for the future, we relocated our London head office in May 2011 to a central London charity centre providing a flexible and cost effective home for the charity

We are an amazing, caring charity that truly makes a difference. The passion, dedication and commitment of our small staff team, volunteers, trustees, members and supporters alongside services that literally change (and indeed save) lives absolutely deserve a sustainable, innovative and effective national bipolar charity

Structure, Governance and Management

The Board of Trustees, which meets four times per year, is supported by the Finance, Audit and Resources Committee chaired by our Treasurer which meets monthly

During the year two other committees convened. The Communications Committee – comprising trustees and officers – leads on the ongoing review of communications. The Strategy Subcommittee – comprising four trustees (including the Chair and Vice Chair) and three staff members including the chief executive - were delegated to lead on the work and public consultation of the charity's strategic review.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Trustees are recruited openly and through recommendation. During the past year we have been delighted to welcome Tamasin Little to the Board.

Trustee induction and training

All new trustees receive induction training Trustees also receive training during the year on the work of the charity and on specific issues. Some of this training is combined with staff training.

Public Benefit

The Board of trustees understand the requirements as set out in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 and believe MDF The Bipolar Organisation completely satisfies all guidance issued by the charity commission with regard to public benefit

Risk Management

The trustees have a risk management strategy which comprises

An annual review of the risks the charity may face,

The establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified in the review, and

The implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the charity should those risks materialise, including the annual operational plan and annual budget, regular consideration by the trustees of financial results, variance from budget and non financial performance indicators and an in depth review of financial performance and risk by the Finance Audit and Resources Committee

Risks are identified and managed using an organisational risk register. A matrix format is used which allows identified risks to be rated according to the likelihood and impact of the risk occurring. All identified risks are reviewed and mitigating strategies are put in place to reduce them as far as practicable. Those activities with higher risk ratings are prioritised.

Financial review

MDF Bipolar recorded a small operating deficit for the year ended March 2011. As explained earlier in this report although we experienced a fall in our restricted grant income explained by a number of restricted grants coming to a close in the opening months of the financial year, our revised fundraising strategy developed and implemented in the summer of 2010 started to positively impact our income towards the end of 2010 with a notable increase in donations in line with our aim to broaden our funding base.

The current economic environment is one of the most difficult for decades. In 2010 we took action to reduce headcount and contain costs. We continue to monitor the financial position of the organisation to ensure that we continue to build on the fundraising progress achieved in the second half of the financial year to support our operational aims for the current year and our strategic aims to support and work with more people affected by bipolar. We continue to focus on securing future income streams, in part by the maintenance of a diverse spread of revenue sources.

Reserves Policy

The trustees recognise the need to build and maintain free reserves equivalent to three months expenditure in order to manage risks relating to fluctuations in income and expenditure. It is acknowledged that rebuilding reserves to these levels will take time particularly given the wider economic environment. Our reserves clearly show our free reserves, restricted reserves and fixed assets

Statement of Trustees' Responsibility

The trustees, who are also the directors of MDF The Bipolar Organisation for the purpose of company law, are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the accounts in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

Company law requires the trustees to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company of that year

In preparing these accounts, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent, and
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1 Accounting policies

11 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Chanties", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006

12 Incoming resources

All income is accounted for on a receivable basis. Grant income is recognised in accordance with the terms of the grant and when the conditions of receipt have been complied with

13 Resources expended

All expenses are accounted for on an accruals basis. The majority of costs are directly attributable to specific activities. Certain shared costs including staff and office costs are apportioned to activities in furtherance of the objects of the chanty. The apportionment has been calculated by analysing the usage of the building between direct chantable activities and activities relating to the management and administration of the chanty. This ratio has then been applied to the overheads to provide an equitable basis for the analysis of expenditure.

1 4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Assets under £1,000 are written off to the SoFA. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows.
