Report of the Directors

For the Year Ended 31 March 2000

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2000.

Activities Report and Review

Community Music completed a highly successful year of education, training, work with socially excluded young people, higher education partnerships and professional and artistic development for talented musicians.

Notable developments were the new partnerships with Higher Education aiming to create real access routes into Higher Education for musicians without formal qualifications. The collaboration with the University of North London began after a two-year development period. Community Music has always tried to create innovative models of training, which can have a cascade effect in statutory provision. Community Music believes that the most urgent priority in modernising music education is to find ways of training musicians to teach who are from musical and social backgrounds that reflect the multicultural nature of London's schools and the musical needs of the students. The 2-year B.Music (Education) degree targets musicians without degrees and other qualifications to train to teach in secondary schools. This is a unique attempt to create an alternative to the normal route for music teachers and effect real change within the music education system.

The two-year Certificate in Higher Education in Music Production and Development with the University of Westminster is a chance for students from Community Music's access courses to move into Higher Education, even if they do not have GCSE or A level qualifications. This again is the only course of its kind in the country and is seen as a prototype for new routes for progression to Higher Education.

The BreakBeat project funded by FOCUS TEC for 16-25 year olds suffering serious social exclusion began its second successful year as part of the Breaking Barriers initiative. A video and CD were produced by FOCUS to show the success of the project and the high success rate of employment creation for young people completing the course.

Musicians and Producers is a professional and artistic development programme for talented young musicians and producers run in close collaboration with the London Arts Board, University of Westminster, SHAPE, Overtones and sponsored by Spirit/Soundcraft. It is funded by the A4E lottery scheme and the London Arts Board. 20 musicians of all musical genres receive financial, personal and professional support for a year including training, studio and pre-production time and mentoring from music business professionals. The first year was successfully completed with a number of deals being signed and records being produced.

Report of the Directors

For the Year Ended 31 March 2000

Community Music continued it's ground breaking role with music technology by starting an Internet Radio station called Pyrotechnic. This project was conceived and set up by the ex- modern apprentice and is managed and marketed by the young people from the musical community it serves. It has gained an international reputation very quickly for the quality of the music, which is focused on non-mainstream and experimental music.

Community Music promoted live shows of new music at 15 events around London and continued to work closely with Asian Dub Foundation to collaborate on promotions with their sound system.

The development of the new building project continued with the completion of a 2-year feasibility study preceding a submission to Capital Programme 2 of the Arts Council's National Lottery scheme. The study, which investigated a new building for Community Music incorporating a performance, training and production centre on a land site in Union Street donated by Southwark Council, was submitted to the Arts Council and approved. Southwark Council had offered a 125-year lease on the land and funds towards the costs of building the centre, and the project had been developed closely in collaboration with the Regeneration department since 1997. However, the project subsequently foundered when Southwark Planning Department decided not to recommend planning permission.

The Board of Trustees are investigating other possibilities to create a permanent base for Community Music when the lease on the current premises runs out in August 2003.

Responsibilities of the Directors

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure, for the year then ended.

In preparing those financial statements which give a true and fair view, the directors should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis

The directors are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with responsible accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 31 March 2000

1. Accounting Policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and follow the recommendations in *Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting by Charities*.
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when received.
- c) Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities when they are received or receivable, whichever is earlier. Depreciation on the fixed assets purchased with such grants is charged against the restricted fund.
- d) Depreciation on tangible fixed assets is calculated to write off the cost of each asset evenly over its expected useful life as follows:

Studio equipment - 20% and 33.3% per annum

Computer and musical equipment - 33.3% per annum

Motor vehicles - 33.3% per annum

Office equipment and furniture - 33.3% per annum

Musical Instruments - 50% per annum

- e) Restricted funds are to be used for specified purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is identified to the fund.
- f) Unrestricted funds are donations and other income received or generated for the charitable purposes.
- g) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the directors for particular purposes.
- h) Staff costs and overhead expenses are allocated to activities on the basis of staff time spent on those activities.
- i) Fundraising and publicity costs comprise the costs actually incurred in producing materials for promotional purposes, and of raising funds.
- j) Management and administration costs relate to the costs of running the charity.
- k) Donations in kind are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when received and are valued by the directors at estimated cost.
- I) All leases of land and buildings and equipment are operating leases, and rentals are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities when incurred. No assets are held under hire purchase agreements.
