Review of Performance, Progress and Achievements 2017 – 2018

The first half of this year was dominated by the transfer of the Museum from Waverley Borough Council to Godalming Town Council, the second half by the General Data Protection Regulations (GDPR) which came into force in May 2018.

Godalming Museum Trust ran Godalming Museum in partnership with Waverley Borough Council for 30 years, from 1987 to 2017, although the Museum itself has a much longer history, having been founded by Godalming Borough Council in 1921. At the beginning of 2017 Waverley Borough Council approached Godalming Town Council with the proposal that the Museum be transferred back to them. On 1st October the museum building and the paid staff were transferred to the Town Council and Waverley committed to a 5-year funding package, tapering from full to zero funding. A service level agreement is in place between the two councils and the Waverley Trustee, Councillor Tom Martin, will remain on the board for the duration of this funding. Councillor Tony Gordon-Smith continues to represent the Town Council on the Trustees and Trustees were pleased to welcome Councillor Steve Bott who joins them as an observer on behalf of the Town. The roles of Godalming Museum Trust, the Trustees, Management Committee, Volunteers and Friends remain the same. The Trust would like to thank Waverley Borough Council for its support over the years and looks forward to working closely with Godalming Town Council to promote the enjoyment and understanding of the town and its surrounding villages and to encourage and support lifelong learning.

The Mayors of Waverley and Godalming and the Chairman of the Museum Trust signed the transfer document at the Friends' party at the Museum in October and, with the ink on the signatures barely dry, the Trust turned its attention to GDPR. The curator and volunteer co-ordinator both attended training and carried out a review of all personal data collected and processed by the Museum. New forms and procedures were devised and the volunteers trained. In January the Trustees agreed a new Data Protection Policy and Notice and appointed William Edwards as the Trustee to take a lead on data protection. The Trust re-collected the personal data of all its volunteers, Friends and other contacts in order to comply with the requirements of the new regulations. We feel confident now that all of our data is accurate and up to date and it was lovely to speak to some of the Friends and to hear them express their warm support of the Museum. Several of the Friends took the opportunity to make additional donations with their membership fees and these were much appreciated. Membership of the Friends at the beginning of the year was 374 and at the end of the year 333. We think that we lost 11 Friends through re-collecting the data, i.e. 11 people simply did not return their new forms, nor respond to follow-up calls. The remaining drop in numbers appears to have been the result of "data cleaning" with the GDPR process identifying Friends who had already moved or died or decided to resign. The Trust would like to take this opportunity to thank the volunteers and the Friends of the Museum for their support through this process and to formally and warmly acknowledge the importance of their contribution to the Museum. It is also indebted to the staff who put other work on hold to see this through and particularly to the volunteer co-ordinator who worked many extra hours unpaid in order to prepare the Museum and the Trust for the new legislation.

The core work of the Museum continued through the year, although it was inevitably affected by the time that staff and volunteers put into managing the significant changes in the Museum's governance and operation.

Collections

64 accessions (over 1,300 individual items) were added to the Museum collection in 2017. These included:-

- A unique collection of bank notes, cheques and other items relating to the early years of the Godalming bank and a plan for the Godalming navigation dated 1768. These had been on loan to the Museum for many years and the owner has now generously decided to donate them.
- A large collection of photographs taken and collected by Godalming photographer, author and longtime friend of the Museum, Ron Head. These include photographs collected for "Godalming in Old Picture Postcards", volumes I - IV
- Architectural drawings of local buildings done in the 1980s and '90s by Graham Bierton. These include drawings of buildings demolished for the Godalming bypass, Flambard Way.
- A Bronze Age flint arrowhead found on the Lammas Land by a local schoolboy
- The archive of the Godalming Club for the Disabled 1963 2009
- The archive of the Godalming Inner Wheel 1993 2015
- Digital copies of photographs of Eashing taken by Josiah Denyer (1868 -1936)

The Archivist and collections volunteers also catalogued some large collections donated in previous years:-

- An archive of material relating to the Deanery Players (1954 1969)
- An archive of material relating to Godalming Junior Play Reading Group (1955 1972)
- Items excavated from the rubbish dump of the First World War camp at Witley
- A large collection of bottles and other items from Norman the Chemist
- A large collection of photographs of local buildings (from the 1950s to the 1990s) taken and collected by Waverley Borough Council planning department

Work continued on the long term project to photograph the collections and began on indexing the collections, using a list of terms established by the curator and developed with the help of the archivist and collections and library volunteers.

The Trust is grateful to the Arts and Crafts Movement in West Surrey who generously funded the digitization of the large collection of slides of Gertrude Jekyll gardens donated in 2016, and to all the volunteers who have worked so hard and so skilfully on the collections over the year.

Education

666 school children visited the Museum in 21 groups, which ranged from the whole of Farncombe Infant School (visiting a class at a time for a workshop on toys) to a class of 6 children from St Ives School in Haslemere. A further 420 children enjoyed workshops in schools. None of this would have been possible without the dedicated work of the Museum's education volunteer who, as well as leading sessions on Jack Phillips and the Titanic and Gertrude Jekyll, developed a new session for younger children on toys. An estimated 900 students made use of the Museum's loan boxes. Comments from teachers and students have included:-

"Thank you so much – we had a wonderful time and I think the walk was my favourite part. You did an amazing job and the children were thoroughly invested in the Gertrude Jekyll experience too! We have done lots of writing following the walk."

"Thank you for taking us on a lovely trip. I liked the stink pipe and when you explained about the other things we saw."

"Thank you for teaching me all the cool stuff about Godalming. I really loved touching the pottery of the Romans and Saxons."

The Museum has also provided work experience for students at school and at university and has worked with Alan Smith, a naval history MA student at the University of Portsmouth/National Museum of the Royal Navy. A visit to the Museum's local studies library sparked Alan's interest in Admiral Balchen (born in Godalming in 1670) who became the subject of his MA thesis. To fulfil the public presentation requirement of his MA, Alan gave a well received museum gallery talk about the Admiral and will deposit a copy of his completed thesis in the local studies library. He has since been invited to repeat his talk at the university and through that has become engaged with a new display about Admiral Balchen at the National Maritime Museum.

The Museum has also taken part in the Surrey Museums Partnership project "Learning on My Doorstep 2" with the curator sitting on the project's steering group and both curator and education volunteer attending training and sessions marketing the Museum's education services to schools.

The Museum organised a programme of events and lectures, which were promoted to the general public as well as to members of the Museum Trust and the Godalming Trust. In addition museum volunteers and the Curator have given talks to groups and led guided tours of the Museum and town.

For all other aspects of its work, the Museum depends on, and is deeply grateful for, the hard work and good will of its team of 70 volunteers who generously give their time and expertise to facilitate the practical day-to-day operation of the Museum, to develop and deliver its services and to keep it financially viable.

Three volunteer training sessions were held during the year. The session on data protection and equality, diversity and inclusion was repeated several times and individual training given to volunteers unable to attend any of the sessions.

The Museum counted 16,823 service users in 2017-18, compared to 16,178 in 2016-17. Comments from visitors this year have included:-

REVIEW OF FINANCIAL ACTIVITIES AND AFFAIRS

Over the year, the Trust's assets rose from £124,812 to £139,419 (as per the Balance Sheet on page 10), although £19,661 of these are ring-fenced for specific Restricted Funds. This means that the assets available to meet our future needs at the year end were £119,758. The Trustees consider this to be an adequate level of reserves to meet the Museum's immediate expenditure needs.

There was a surplus in General Funds of £11,835 (2017: £2,763) from day-to-day activities during the year (as per the Statement of Financial Activities on page 8) although the Trust's investments fell in value over the year by £124.

We are grateful for the continued support of both Waverley Borough Council and Godalming Town Council, both of which continue following the transfer of the Museum from Waverley to Godalming.

We have also continued to receive funds for the longer term projects, all of which are very much appreciated.

On the expenditure side the costs of maintaining the Museum continue to be challenging but generally under control, and Trustees are continuing to monitor expenses closely.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) – (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Godalming Museum Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

b) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

c) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

d) Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the Trust's work.

e) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

f) Stock

Stock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

g) Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

h) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

i) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

j) Financial instruments

The trust only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

2. LEGAL STATUS OF THE TRUST

The Trust is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF GODALMING MUSEUM TRUST

I report on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 31 March 2018 which are set out on pages 8 to 15.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a "true and fair view" and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Independent examiner's statement

I have completed my examination. I confirm that no matters have come to my attention in connection with the examination giving me cause to believe that in any material respect:

- accounting records were not kept in respect of the company as required by section 386 of the 2006 Act; or
