CONSTITUTION

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Paul Strickland Scanner Centre is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its Articles of Association

DIRECTORS AND TRUSTEES

The directors of the charitable company the "Charity" are its trustees for the purposes of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the "Trustees". The Trustees of the Charity are also its members.

During the year the Charity revised its Articles to be in line with the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Act 1993 as amended by the Charities Act 2006

As set out in the Articles of Association, new Trustees may be appointed by the existing Trustees by resolution but must retire from office at the next general meeting but shall be eligible for election at that meeting. At each annual general meeting one third of the Trustees must retire from office. The Trustees to retire by rotation shall be those who have been longest in office since their last appointment. A Trustee shall not hold office for more than nine consecutive years and shall not be eligible for appointment or reelection upon the expiry of such period until a period of twelve months has elapsed since they retired as a Trustee. There shall be a minimum of three and a maximum of twelve Trustees.

TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2011

The Trustees are pleased to present their report together with the Financial Statements of the Charity for the year ended 30 September 2011

Legal and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report

The Financial Statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) - "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in 2005

HISTORY

Paul Strickland Scanner Centre and its associated fundraising activities were originally dealt with as part of the Harefield and Northwood Post Graduate Medical Trust. The assets and liabilities in respect of this part of the Trust were transferred to the Charity on 1st October 1988. The operation of the Scanner Centre and associated fundraising activities have been dealt with by this Charity since that date.

OBJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of the Charity are to provide advanced medical diagnostic imaging services primarily to the Cancer Centre at Mount Vernon Hospital but also to the National Health Service and private health sector in general

In planning its activities the Trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit. By using donated funds and any excess income over expenditure from providing services to the private health sector and pharmaceutical and radiological research organisations, the Charity purchases appropriate leading edge medical imaging systems and operates them using medical, radiographic and support staff of the highest calibre. The Centre provides scans of the very highest quality to enhance diagnosis and treatment planning for patients. Decisions on the purchase of such systems are carefully evaluated in the light of clinical need, the potential for clinical service development and enhancement and research and development opportunities.

Imaging systems currently available are Computerised Tomography (CT), Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) and Positron Emission Tomography (PET/CT) PET/CT scanning is not available in local hospitals and whilst mainly used for detection and diagnosis of cancer, it is also of benefit in neurology and cardiology

ORGANISATION AND POLICY ON THE APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

The governing document of Paul Strickland Scanner Centre is its Articles of Association. All policy decisions are made by the Board of Trustees, who meet bi-monthly, and the day to day running of the Centre is delegated to the Centre's Chief Executive who is not on the Board of Trustees.

Trustees are appointed to the Board of the Charity by reference to their professional qualification, association with the locality and relevant experience. There is a formal induction process for new Trustees which provides sufficient information to allow them to understand the charitable purpose of the Scanner Centre as well as providing an introduction to understanding the Centre's activities, financial position, Trustees' responsibilities and current issues.

Potential new Trustees are invited to the Scanner Centre to meet the Chief Executive and other members of staff including the fundraising team and are shown around and given an overview of the Centre's main areas of activity. They also meet the Trustees and are given the opportunity to ask questions. Their curriculum-vitae is circulated and reviewed by existing Trustees and they are provided with a pack of information outlining the history of the Centre, information relating to each scanning modality, together with financial information and fundraising materials. On appointment, a further pack of documents is provided containing the governing documents, Board terms of reference, statement of Trustee liability, frequency/timings of Board meetings, list of current Trustees, organisational structure, current strategic plan and summary of insurance policies. The new Trustee is allocated an existing Trustee as a mentor.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued)

INVESTMENT POWERS

Under the Articles of Association, the Charity has the power to make any investment which the Trustees see fit

The Trustees remain cautious in respect of the Charity's investment strategy and are satisfied they have taken appropriate steps to ensure that reserves are not placed at undue risk. During the period and at the Balance Sheet date, the majority of the Charity's cash reserves had been placed on short term fixed treasury deposit accounts.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The review of activities and future developments is given in the Chairman's Report on pages 5-6 of these Financial Statements

Whilst the Charity continues to rely on the receipt of donations to assist in financing its activities, the Trustees are confident that sufficient resources will be available to fund its operations for the foreseeable future

The Charity is currently involved in a dispute with its landlord over invoices which purport to be in respect of service charges, please see note 15

VOLUNTEERS

The Charity is grateful for the efforts and range of contributions made by our volunteers who help in fundraising, through the Friends of Paul Strickland Scanner Centre

TRUSTEES AND THEIR INTERESTS

The Charity is a charitable company limited by guarantee and does not have share capital and therefore there are no Trustees' interests

AUDITORS

The auditors, Nunn Hayward, are deemed to be reappointed under section 487(2) of the Companies Act 2006

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

Trustees are responsible for preparing the Report and Financial Statements in accordance with applicable laws and regulations

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare the Financial Statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustees have elected to prepare the Financial Statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under that law the Trustees must not approve the Financial Statements unless they are satisfied, that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of the surplus or deficit of the Charity for that period In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to

- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,
- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- prepare the Financial Statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue its activities

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the Charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and enable them to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued)

RESERVES POLICY AND RISK MANAGEMENT

At bi-monthly Board meetings the Trustees continue to focus on major risks for the Charity which would have a severe impact on operational performance as well as reputation should they occur. A risk register is in place with responsibilities identified, monitoring procedures and the required follow up actions. The key areas under regular review are financial, clinical governance, staff and health and safety. Significant issues addressed in the past year include the continued upgrading of scanning equipment, improvements made to the computerised imaging system, the security and protection of high-value data and the management of clinical risk.

Paul Strickland Scanner Centre's policy on reserves is consistent with the recommendations published by the Charity Commissioners. Reserves are established and reviewed to ensure that the Charity retains a level of funds to meet its forward obligations and to ensure it can reasonably maintain a level of service in line with its objectives. In particular the Trustees of the Charity recognise that the operational life of the scanner equipment in use is limited. Therefore, amounts are set aside from the accumulated fund to acknowledge the future commitment of the Charity to fund the replacement of the existing equipment. The Scanner Replacement Reserve has been reviewed at 30 September 2011 and remains at £2 million. The General Fund of the Charity represents its investment in fixed assets and working capital.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER 2011

As Chairman of the Board of Trustees I am pleased to be able to look back on a successful year for Paul Strickland Scanner Centre but also one in which we have had significant change

Dr Paul Strickland OBE stepped down from the Board of Trustees and as our Honorary Medical Director. In recognition of his truly outstanding achievements the Board conferred on Dr Strickland the title of Founder and Honorary Life President. His vision, hard work and commitment over the lifetime of the Appeal (founded in 1983) and the 26 years' lifetime of the Scanner Centre, have resulted in a world class imaging service which attracts the highest calibre of staff. The Centre and Board of Trustees remain true to Dr Strickland's vision to be at the forefront of scanning technology to give patients with cancer and other serious diseases the best possible chance of recovery.

Professor Barry Michael, Scientist Emeritus of the Gray Cancer Institute, who had been a Trustee for 15 years, also stepped down. During that time he played a significant role in the establishment of the Cyclotron Unit, which was a key factor in the growth of PET scanning at Mount Vernon.

We have been fortunate to add to our complement of Trustees and have appointed three new Trustees Dr Roberto Alonzi, who is a Medical Research Council Clinician Scientist and Consultant Oncologist at Mount Vernon Cancer Centre, Mr Bharat C Shah, with a distinguished international career in business and finance, and Mr Michael Vine, an experienced civil and commercial litigation solicitor. Our new Trustees provide a wealth of experience and join a group of committed Trustees. We are grateful to all of our Trustees for their hard work and tremendous contributions that they have made during the year.

We are very proud that Dr Vicky Goh, Consultant Radiologist at the Scanner Centre since 2002, was appointed Professor of Clinical Cancer Imaging at King's College London in February 2011 Professor Goh has retained her research links with the Scanner Centre

Dr Jane Chambers retired as Consultant Radiologist but continues her association as Honorary Consultant Radiologist. She was first appointed to the Centre in 2001

We were very pleased to appoint two new Consultants, Dr Luke Sonoda and Dr Andrew Gogbashian, to continue the development of the Centre and build upon the work of their consultant colleagues, Dr Wai-Lup Wong and Professor Anwar Padhani

I should also like to express my gratitude to all our staff and volunteers including all of those mentioned above. Their hard work, dedication and enthusiasm ensures our high reputation. We are ever grateful

Our results for the last financial year reflect a year of continued increase in activity – this year we have scanned 13,203 patients from both NHS and private sources. We are pleased to be able to say that our patient satisfaction surveys show that we are giving a very satisfactory service given the underlying health reasons for patients' visits to our Centre.

The Centre has also continued to contribute to the training of future specialist imaging consultants in CT, MRI and PET CT who come to us from other UK centres. During the year we have had 10 registrars learning about new techniques in cancer imaging. This training service is provided freely and is part of the contribution that the Centre makes to improving diagnostic services. We have also contributed to the training of an imaging consultant in specialist PET CT scanning.

The Centre has also contributed to the goal of local NHS providers to reduce their waiting times for scans and to improve diagnosis for patients

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER 2011 (continued)

The Centre continues to participate actively in clinical research at a very high level as our staff and equipment put us at the forefront in the development of functional imaging protocols in all three modalities. Our consultant radiologists, physicists and radiographers publish extensively and present at several international radiological conferences.

Professor Vicky Goh has been elected to the Executive Board and is Vice President of the European Society of Oncologic Imaging, to the Research Committee of the European Society of Radiology, and steering committee (Imaging Section) of the Experimental Cancer Medicine Centre Network in the UK. She serves on both the NCRI renal cancer clinical studies group and the anal cancer group. She has been appointed Section Editor (Oncology) and to the Scientific Editorial Board of European Radiology, Europe's premier radiology scientific journal. She has continued her multi-modality research in gastro-intestinal, lung and renal cancers in collaboration with colleagues at the Mount Vernon Cancer Centre and other national and international centres, and is closely involved in three NIHR HTA funded multicentre trials, and two CRUK funded trials.

We congratulate Professor Anwar Padhani, Consultant Radiologist, on his appointment as a Professor of the Institute of Cancer Research in November 2011. Professor Padhani has taken forward the use of advanced MR imaging to improve whole body scanning and prostate cancer diagnosis. Our prostate cancer MRI work now has national and international recognition. For example, he is in involved in formulating the Royal College of Radiologist guidance on the imaging of prostate cancer and is advising the Health Technology Assessment board (HTA) of the NHS on the application of advanced prostate MRI. Our UK experience on whole body MRI has also been acknowledged. We are part of a national research effort (HTA funded) on the application of this technology for newly diagnosed lung and colorectal cancer patients.

Dr Wai Lup Wong, Consultant Radiologist and our lead for PET CT, is currently the Department of Health (DH) PET CT Clinical Guardian and chairs the DH PET CT Clinical Governance Board. He has continued to work in the National Cancer Research Institute, on the NCRI Head and Neck Clinical Study Group, PET CT expert panel and on the PET Research Network, and has taken the lead to produce a DVD on "The Patient Journey through PET CT". During the year he has continued to engage the Centre in UK DH HTA multi-centre clinical trials."

We are always very grateful for donations and legacies, and the contribution that they make to our work, and we offer sincere thanks to all of those who supported us by holding events and raising funds during the year – we are indebted to them. In the midst of a difficult financial climate, which has made fundraising more difficult, we have been extremely heartened by the ongoing commitment of our supporters. The Friends of Paul Strickland Scanner Centre, chaired by June Nickless, have once again worked tirelessly to support our funds. The well being of these funds is vital to ensure our future ability to invest in new scanners and maintain our leading technological edge.

During the year the Centre has reviewed its strategy and renewed its aims and objectives as a charity. We continue to be committed to creating an environment of excellence in cross-sectional diagnostic imaging for the purposes of early diagnosis, treatment planning and the measurement of treatment efficacy. We look forward to 2011/12 and to continuing the task first set down by Dr Strickland in 1983 of ensuring the relief of suffering and the saving of lives.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER 2011

1 STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- The Financial Statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)
- b) The Financial Statements are prepared in accordance with applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting for Charities' (revised 2005) and the Companies Act 2006
- Income from legacies, donations and gifts has been accounted for on a cash received basis
- Grants received, which relate to a specific period of time, are dealt with on an accruals basis
- e) Income tax recoverable in respect of Gift Aid received to 30 September 2011 has been reserved in these financial statements
- f) Fees receivable for scans are brought into the Financial Statements on the date on which the services are provided by the Scanner Centre
- g) Expenditure has been charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on the accruals basis
- h) Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows.

Where significant building costs are incurred in order to install the new scanners, these costs are capitalised and depreciated in line with the respective scanner. General property improvements are depreciated over the remaining length of the leasehold.

- Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts and finance leases are capitalised as tangible assets and depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful lives Obligations under such agreements are included in creditors net of the finance charge allocated to future periods. The finance element of the rental payment is charged to the income and expenditure account so as to produce a constant periodic rate of charge on the net obligation outstanding in each period.
- Rentals payable under operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease
- k) Research and development expenditure is written off in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which it is incurred
- No provision has been made for taxation as the Charity's status renders it exempt from UK direct taxation
- m) Unrestricted funds (General funds and Designated funds) are those funds expendable at the discretion of the Trustees in accordance with the charitable objects

15 CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

The Charity operate from leasehold premises. During the current and previous year, the Charity received invoices from their landlord totalling £846,265 which purport to be in respect of service charges for the period from 1st April 2008 to 31st March 2011. The Charity strongly dispute these invoices through their legal advisors, as the leases in place do not make any provision for any such service charge to be payable. Therefore, the Charity has not made any allowance for these invoices in the Financial Statements, other than by way of this note.

16 OTHER INCOME

Following a VAT compliance review undertaken by the Charity it was noted that certain medical supplies which have incurred VAT charges in the past, can be zero rated when an appropriate VAT zero rating certificate is in place. An appropriate certificate was made available to suppliers. Credit notes were then raised by these suppliers totalling £398,706 (net of advisor fees) to enable the reimbursement of VAT previously paid. The certificates were issued between October and December 2010. These credit notes have been reflected as Other Income on the Statement of Financial Activities. See also note 18.
