The directors present their strategic report for Brake Bros Limited ("Brakes") for the year ended 4 July 2021. This report analyses the performance and explains other aspects of the Brakes Group results and operations, including strategy and risk management.

The Brakes Group is a large European foodservice business supplying fresh, refrigerated and frozen food products, as well as non-food products and supplies, to foodservice customers ranging from large customers, including leisure, pub, restaurant, hotel and contract catering groups, to smaller customers, including independent restaurants, hotels, fast food outlets, schools and hospitals. The Brakes Group largest businesses are in the United Kingdom (UK), France, and Sweden, in addition to a presence in Ireland, Belgium, Spain and Luxembourg.

The Brakes Group supplies a broad variety of products, including a portfolio of privately branded products, which are generally delivered through its distribution networks, consisting of central distribution hubs, satellite depots and its fleet of delivery vehicles. The principal trading companies in the Group are Brake Bros Limited, Sysco Foods NI Limited, Fresh Direct (LK) Limited, Kent Frozen Foods Limited, Sysco France SAS, Menigo Foodservice AB, Clafra Akliebolag AB and EKO Fågel fisk och mittemellan ABEko Fisk AB.

Summary of results and key performance indicators
Revenue, operating profit, profit after tax, cash generated from operations and cash balance are considered to be the key performance indicators for the Brakes Group.

The results for the Brake's Group for the year are set out in the consolidated income statement on page 8 and a comparison of the results for the year ended 4 July 2021 is as follows:

Total revenue for the Brakes Group in the year totals £2,602m (2020: £3,501.2m), split as £1,296.4m (2020: £1,991.2m) for the UK (including Ireland), £827.2m (2020: £998.4m) for "Continental Europe" (France, Spain, Belgium and Luxembourg) and £478.4m (2020: £511.6m) for Sweden in the year.

Operating loss before exceptionals in the year are £181.3m (2020: £101.2m operating loss before exceptional items) and the operating loss is £207.8m in the year (2020: operating loss £224.8m). The loss after tax in the year is £92.4m (2020: £234.1m loss after tax).

Cash used from operations was £(34.6)m in the year (2020: cash generated £14.2m) and the cash balance at 4 July 2021 is £63.3m (2020: £312.5m).

The circumstances resulting from Covid-19 have had and still do have an impact on the trading performance in the year ended 4 July 2021. However, with the lifting of Covid 19 lockdown restrictions from the Spring in Europe, the Company and Group are seeing an increase in operating volumes which is

The Group has a risk management programme that seeks to limit the adverse effects of financial risks for the Company and for its subsidiary undertakings (see the Director's report below for further details). The principal risks and uncertainties facing the Brakes Group relate to a variety of risks that include competitive risk, the effects of changes in foreign currency exchange rates, interest rates, credit risks, commodity price risks and liquidity risk.

The European foodservice distribution industry is fragmented and highly competitive, with local, regional, multi-regional distributors and speciality competitors. New and increasing competition may result in increased focus on pricing and on limiting price increases, or may require increased discounting or other concessions. Such competition or other industry pressures may result in margin erosion and / or make it difficult for the Group to attract and retain customers.

• The effects of changes in foreign currency exchange rates
The Group is exposed to foreign currency exchange risks primarily with respect to Euro, Swedish Krona and the Polish Zloty trade purchases.

The nox Due to the nature of our distribution business, the Group is exposed to potential volatility in fuel prices primarily with respect to diesel purchases. The price and availability diesel fuel fluctuates due to changes in production, seasonality and other market factors generally outside of our control.

The Group has both interest bearing assets and interest bearing liabilities. Interest rate risk is not considered material for the Group.

The Group's credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss to the Group by failing to discharge an obligation.

· Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the group will encounter difficulty in meeting its obligations associated with financial liabilities.

Directors' report

The directors submit their annual report and the audited consolidated and parent company financial statements for the year ended 4 July 2021.

General information

Brake Bros Limited is a limited company incorporated in England and Wales and domicited and operating in the United Kingdom. The Company's subsidiary undertakings operate in France, Sweden and Ireland in addition to a presence in, Belgium, Spain and Luxembourg.

The immediate parent undertaking is Cucina Acquisition (UIK) Limited, a company incorporated in England and Wales. The Company's ultimate parent undertaking and controlling party is Sysco Corporation, a company incorporated in the Unites States.

Future outlook and going concern

In assessing whether the financial statements for the Company and Group should be prepared on the going concern basis, the directors have considered the future outlook of the Company and of the Brakes Bros Limited Group on a combined basis. The Company's ultimate parent undertaking Sysco Corporation has confirmed that they will continue to support the Company in order to allow it to satisfy its financial obligations in the normal course of business for a period of 12 months from the date of approval of the balance sheet. The Directors are satisfied that the ultimate parent undertaking Sysco Corporation has the ability to provide this support, should it be required. The Directors of the parent forecast to have sufficient liquidity through the going concern period even under its most downside forecast scenario and before any further mitigating actions it may take. The directors are satisfied that the and Group will have sufficient funds to repay its liabilities as they fall due. Consequently, the financial statements of the Company and Group are prepared on the going concern basis.

With the lifting of Covid 19 lockdown restrictions from the Spring in Europe, the Company and Group have seen a significant recovery in operating volumes. Whilst still below pre pandemic levels in the year to 4 July 2021, this improving trend is expected to continue.

Post balance sheet event

No other material events have occurred since the statement of financial position date which would affect the financial statements of the Company or Group.

During the year no interim dividends were paid by the Company (2020 £nil)) and the directors do not recommend a final dividend (2020 : £nil).

Employment report

The Group aims to keep employees aware of all material factors affecting them as employees and the performance of the Group and their respective businesses. It encourages good communication through regular meetings between management and staff, enabling senior managers to consult and ascertain employees' views on all appropriate matters. This is supplemented by regular briefings, intranet and e-mail bulletins and divisional newsletters. Employees are encouraged to participate in the performance of the Group by way of bonus schemes.

The Group employs over 11,000 people. We provide extensive training and career development programmes. It is our policy to achieve and maintain a high standard of health and safety at work and to ensure everyone, regardless of race, religion or sex, and including disabled people where reasonable and practicable, is treated in the same way as regards applications for employment, training, career development and promotion. Every effort is made to help with the rehabilitation of anyone injured during their employment, and to provide support we have an Employee Assistance Programme.

Health and safety

As a business the Group is strongly committed to providing a safe and responsible place to work. Risk Management

The Risk Management framework is established at the Brake Bros Limited group level. The Board of Directors of Brake Bros Limited have the responsibility for setting the risk management policies, in compliance with Sysco Corporation risk management policies and applied throughout the Brake Bros Limited group of companies. This framework identifies, monitors, measures and implements strategies to manage and mitigate risk across the group. Further detail on Financial Risk management are set out further below in our description of Financial Risk Management.

Our people are the heart of our business. The Company and Group is committed to being a responsible employer and managing the performance, needs and expectations of our employees in a fair and transparent manner. The Company and Group operates a number of initiatives promoting employee engagement, health and well being.

Our Customers and suppliers are key to our success. We foster long term relationships with our supplier network, fostering close collaboration and development of sustainable quality chains of supply. Our relationships with Customers is paramount to the ongoing success of the business. The needs and expectations of our customers are integral in our business strategy and planning to ensure the Company and Group delivers to the highest safety and high quality standards

Food distribution is not only our business — it is also our best opportunity to make a positive difference in the communities where we operate and live. The Company and Group participates in a number of Community based programmes to raise money for good causes and provide goods to those in need.

The Company and group is committed to delivering a better tomorrow. In 2019 the Brake Bros Group of Companies set out its Corporate and Social Responsibility goals and targets to continue to reduce the groups carbon footprint and commitment to sourcing sustainable, ethically sourced produce.

Shareholders

The Company's ultimate parent company is Sysco Corporation, a Company incorporated in the United States. The Company is aligned to the strategic vision of the Shareholder and discusses both short term and long term financial performance and business objectives regularly with Sysco management

Financial risk management

The Group has operations in the UK, the Republic of Ireland and Continental Europe including Sweden and has debt financing which exposes it to a variety of financial risks that include the effects of changes in foreign currency exchange rates, interest rates, credit risks, commodity price risks and liquidity risk.

The Board of Directors of Brake Bros Limited have the responsibility for setting the risk management policies, in compliance with Sysco Corporation risk management policies, applied by the Brake Bros Limited group of companies. The policies are implemented by the central group treasury department that receives regular reports from the operating companies to enable prompt identification of financial risks so that the appropriate actions may be taken.

(a) Foreign currency exchange risk

The Group is exposed to foreign exchange risks primarily with respect to the Euro and Swedish Krona although exposure to the Swedish Krona is not considered material. The Group has certain investments in foreign operations, whose net assets are exposed to foreign currency translation risk.

The Group's operations in the UK and Sweden have inventory purchases denominated in currencies other than their functional currency, such as the Euro, Polish Zloty and Danish Krone. These inventory purchases give rise to foreign currency exposure between the functional currency of each entity and these currencies. The Group enters into foreign currency forward swap contracts to sell the applicable entity's functional currency and buy currencies matching the inventory purchase, which operate as cash flow hedges of the Group's foreign currency-denominated inventory purchases.

(b) Interest rate risk

The Group has both interest bearing assets and interest bearing liabilities. The Group's interest rate risk primarily arises from floating interest rate long term borrowings owed to parent undertakings. Interest rate risk is not considered material for the Group.

(c) Credit risk
The Group has no significant concentrations of credit risk. The Group has implemented policies that require appropriate credit checks on potential

(d) Liquidity risk The Group's funding is derived from borrowings and amounts funded from parent and group undertakings that are designed to ensure the group has sufficient available funds for operations and planned expansions. The Group also has access to intercompany funding from parent entities, whom have access to an external Revolving Credit Facility of US\$2,000 million amongst other facilities. The Group also participates in a cash pooling arrangement with other Sysco Group entities providing additional sources of local liquidity as and when required.

The fall in turnover from the impact of Covid-19 is expected to have an immediate impact on the Company's liquidity reserves. The group manages cashflow and liquid reserves centrally and have committed to providing sufficient liquidity to manage through the impact on the Company and Group's ability to meet its financial commitments.

(e) Commodity price risk

The Group is exposed to commodity price risk primarily with respect to diesel purchases. The Group has in place a risk management programme that seeks to limit the adverse effects on the financial performance of the Group by using diesel fuel commodity swaps to hedge against future price changes.

Independent auditor

Streamlined Energy and Carbon Reporting (SECR) Statement

The methodology applied to the calculation of Greenhouse Gas emissions is the 'GHG Protocol Corporate Accounting and Reporting Standard'. An 'operational control' boundary has been applied. Carbon conversion factors have been taken from 'UK Government GHG Conversion Factors for Company Reporting – 2021'. Emissions are reported as CO2e. Only 'location-based' electricity emissions have been reported. Although not required under SECR legislation, we have included fugitive emissions associated with the use of refrigerant gas under Scope 1.

For purposes of baselining and ongoing comparison, it is required to express the emissions using a carbon intensity metric. The intensity metric chosen is £m turnover (UK and NI). The resultant emissions intensity is 53.1tCO2e/£m.

Energy Efficiency Action

Energy Emclency Action
In this financial year we have continued to closely monitor and manage our energy consumption in-line with Energy Management System ISO50001, which the majority of our UK operations are accredited to. In addition, our LED lighting installation programme has continued throughout the year, with another four sites having undergone a lighting upgrade. During the current reporting period, over 20% of our electricity was purchased from renewable sources. In comparison with the previous year, we have seen an overall drop in emissions of 26%. This is primarily due to the impact of Covid-19 resulting in a reduction in business activity, particularly in relation to the transportation of goods. However, this did result in an increase in our emission intensity from 45.7 to 53.1tCO2e/Em.

Intangible assets
(a) Goodwill
Goodwill
Goodwill represents the excess of the cost of an acquisition over the fair value of the Group's share of the net identifiable assets of the acquired subsidiary at the date of acquisition. Goodwill on acquisitions of subsidiaries is included in Intangible assets'. Goodwill in not subject to annual amortisation but its instead tested annually for impairment and carried at cost less accumulated impairment losses impairment losses on goodwill are not reversed,

Goodwill is allocated to cash generating units for the purpose of impairment testing. The adocation is made to those cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the business combination in which the goodwill arose.

(b) Computer software
Acquired computer software iscences are capitalised as an intangible asset on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring into use the specific software. Directly attributable costs associated with the development of software that are expected to generate future economic benefits are capitalised as part of computer software.

Where software costs are capitalised they are amentised using the straight-ine basis to write them down to their estimated realisable value over their estimated useful economic lives, which are considered to be between three and five years.

The residual value and useful economic life are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate at each statement of financial position date

(c) Customer contracts and rotationships
Customer lists and customer contracts and relationships are acquired separately or as part of a business combination.

For those customer Ests and customer contracts or relationships acquired separately, an intangible asset is recognised on the basis of the costs to acquire the customer Ests and customer contracts and relationships together with any dire

For those customer lists and customer contracts and relationships acquired as part of a business combination, the fair value of the asset is recognised at the date of the acquisition, in accordance with IFRS 3,

Customer lists and customer contracts and relationships are amortised on a straight line basis over their expected useful economic lives, which are considered to be between 3 and 11 years. These are assumed to have no residual value at the end of their expected useful economic life.

(d) Brands

Brands are acquired separately or as part of a business combination. For those brands acquired separately, an intangible asset is recognised on the basis of the costs to acquire the brands together with any directly attributable costs of acquiring the asset. For those brands acquired as part of a business combination, the fair value of the asset is recognised at the date of the acquiration, in accordance with IFRS 3.

Asset lives and residual values are reviewed during each financial period. An asset is carring amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount

Impairment of non-financial assets
Assets that have an indefinite useful economic file are not subject to amortisation and are tested annually for impairment. Assets that are subject to amortisation are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value loss costs to self and value in use. For the purposes of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash flows (cash-generating units).

Inventories
Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Provision is made for obsolete and slow-moving items. Cost comprises direct purchase costs and overheads that have been incurred in bringing the inventories to their present location and condition. Net realisable value represents the estimated setting price less all estimated costs of completion and costs to be incurred in marketing, setting and distribution.

Trade morehobles
Trade morehobles are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost less provision for impairment, a provision for impairment is established when there is objective evidence that the Group will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original ferms of receivables. Cash and cash equivalents
Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank (being the cash book balance) and in hand, short-term deposits and other short-term highly fiquid investments with original maturities of three months or less held for the purpose of meeting short-term cash commitments. Bank overdrafts are presented in current liabilities to the extent that there is no right of offisel with cash balances.

Current and deferred income tax
The current income tax charge is deskulated on the basis of the tax taws enacted or substantively enacted at the date of the statement of financial position. Management periodically evaluates positions taken in tax returns with respect to shadons which applicable tax regulation is subject to interpretation and establishes provisions where appropriate on the basis of amounts expected to be paid to the tax authorities.

Deferred income tax is provided in full, using the fability method, on temporary differences arising between the tax base of assets and fabilities and their carrying amounts in the financial statements. However, the deferred income tax is not accounted for if it arises from initial recognition of an asset or liability in a transaction other than a business combination that at the time of the transaction affects neither accounting nor taxable profit or loss. Deferred income tax is determined using tax rates (and taws) that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the date of the statement of financial position and are expected to apply when the related deferred income tax asset is realised. Deferred income tax is measured on an undiscounted basis.

Employee benefits
Ratiroment benefit abigations
The Group has both defined benefit and defined contribution pension plans.

Defined benefit pension plans
Following the amendment to IAS 19 Employee Benefits' issued in December 2004 and subsequently revised in June 2011, the Group has adopted an accounting policy whereby actuarial gains and losses for defined benefit pension sche are taken through the consciderated statement of comprehensive income in full each period, and the full deficit on an IAS 19 basis is included within the consciderated statement of financial position.

In the UK the Group operates a defined benefit funded pension scheme covering a number of its employees. The scheme is a contracted out defined benefit scheme, providing final salary related benefits account for each year of service. The scheme was made fully paid up at 131 December 2003 and no further benefits are account to members subsequent to this date, in addition, in Brakes Continental Europe Division and Sweden the Group is lable for certain post employment benefits which meet the ortified or a defined benefit plan. These obligations are of an unfunded nature.

The charge in the consolidated income statement in respect of the defined benefit pension plans comprises a net interest expense / income calculated as the product of the net defined benefit liability / asset and the discount rate as determined at the beginning of the period. The net interest expense / income is recognised in finance costs / income. Past-service costs are recognized immediately in income.

The liability recognised in the statement of financial position in respect of the defined benefit pension scheme is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the date of the statement of financial position less the fair value of the plan assets. The independent actuary, using the projected unit credit method and assumptions agreed with the trustees and directors, calculates the defined benefit obligation annually. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash flows using interest rates of high-quality corporate bonds that have terms to maturity approximating to the terms of the related pension liability.

The defined benefit pension obligation has been calculated by the scheme actuary for each reporting date, using the projected unit credit method and assumptions agreed with the Group (see note 17 to the financial statements).

Actuarial gains and losses arise from experience adjustments (the effects of differences between previous actuarial assumptions and what has actually occurred) and changes in actuarial assumptions. Actuarial gains and losses are recogi in full, in the period they occur, in the statement of comprehensive income.

Defined contribution plans
For defined contribution plans, the Group pays contributions to independently administered pension plans on a contractual basis. The Group has no further payment obligations once the contributions have been paid. The contributions are recognised as an employee benefit expense when they are due.

Provisions are formed for legally enforceable or constructive obligations existing on the date of the statement of financial position, the settlement of which is fixely to require outflow of resources and the extent of which can be reliably estimated. Where material to the financial statements, provisions are discounted over the life of their expected cash flows.

Trade payables and other payables
Trade payables are non interest-bearing and are stated at amortised cost.

Foreign currencies
Items included in the financial statements of the Group's subsidiary companies are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the subsidiary operates (the functional currency). The consolidated financial entering is starting, which is the Group's presentational currency.

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevaiing at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and fabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the relevant functional currency at the rates of exchange ruling at the date of the consolidated statement of financial position. Differences arising on translation are charged or credited to the consolidated income statement except when deferred in equity as qualifying cash flow hedges or qualifying net investment hedges.

Borrowings and finance costs
Borrowings are recognised initially at fair value (being the issue proceeds), less attributable transaction costs.

Borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Amortised cost is adjusted for the amortisation of any transaction costs. The amortisation is recognised in finance costs. Transaction costs amortised over the expected term of the related financial instruments.

The key assumptions in the value-in-use calculations were:

- Revenue growth. This was based on expected levels of activity under existing major contractual arrangements together with growth based upon medium term historical growth rates and having regard for expected economic and market conditions for other customers.
- Discount rates. The discount rates applied to the cash flow projections are based on an appropriate weighted average cost of capital for the Group and reflect specific risks relating to the relevant operating segments.
- Long term GDP growth rate. The long term growth rates applied to the cash flow projections are based on economic forecasts relating to the relevant operating segments.

The forecasts are based on the approved management plan covering the next three financial years. Subsequent cash flows have been forecast to increase by 3.0% (2020: 3.0%) for all CGUs in the UK and tretand, 3.0% (2020: 3.0%) in France and 3% (2020: 3.5%) in Sweden in line with the long term GDP growth rate and including inflation, reflecting minimum management expectations based on historical growth. The cash flows in the reportable segments were discounted primarily using post-tax discount rates between 9% and 10.5% (2020: 8.5%) in the UK and tretand, 9% (2020: 9.3%) in France and 9% (2020: 8.5%) in Sweden. 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Notes to the financial statements 1. Accounting policies

General Information
These financial statements are the consciedated financial statements of Brake Bros. Limited ("the Group") and the parent company financial statements of Brake Bros. Limited ("the Company") for the year ended 4 July 2021. These financial statements were authorised for issue by the Board of Directors on 11 April 2022. For practical reasons, the Group and Company prepares its financial statements to the Sunday closed to the Company reference date of 30 June.

The financial statements have been presented in Sterling (£) which is also the functional currency of the Company.

Significant accounting policies
The Company's principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Basis of preparation and going concern
These consolidated financial statements who been prepared in accordance with international Financial Reporting Standards in conformity with the requirements of the Companies Act 2008 and international financial reporting standards adopted pursuant to Requision (EC) No 1608/2002 as a applies in the European Union. The consolidated financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and financial assets and financial kabitiles (including derivative instruments) at few value through profit or loss.

The preparation of consolidated financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Group's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or areas where assumptions and estimates are significant to the consolidated financial statements are disclosed below within critical accounting estimates and assumptions.

in assessing whether the financial statements for the Company and Group should be prepared on the going concern basis, the directors have considered the future outlook of the Company and of the Group on a combined basis. The Directors have considered the future operating results, cash flows and facilities available.

With the lifting of Covid 19 lockdown restrictions from the Spring in Europe, the Company and Group began to see an increase in operating volumes which is expected to continue.

The Company and group participates in a European cash pooling arrangement with other Sysco Group entities providing additional sources of local liquidity as and when required. This cash pool has direct access to an external Revolving Credit Facility of \$US2,000m. As of 3 April 2022 there are no drawings on this facility.

The Company's ultimate parent undertaking Sysco Corporation has confirmed that they will continue to support the Company in order to allow it to satisfy its financial obligations in the normal course of business for a period of 12 months from the date of approval of the balance sheet. The Directors are satisfied that the ultimate parent undertaking Sysco Corporation has been ability to provide this support, should it be required. The Directors of the parent forecast to have sufficient facilities for the parent forecast to have sufficient facilities for the gradient period even under date months of the parent forecast to have sufficient facilities.

Given the expected return to profitability and the continued parental support, the Directors deem it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis.

It was identified during the year that there was an amendment needed in the recording of a recurring journal in the prior year accounts; the recording of amounts to other income was posted against direct purchase cost instead of distribution and setting costs. The correction amounted to £22.3m. Additionally, a was identified that a reclassification was needed in the prior year accounts between Administrative expenses and Exceptional sems due to a presentation error. The correction amounted to £39.9m.

Basis of consolidation

These consolidated financial statements consolidate the financial statements of the Company and all its subsidiary undertakings. Subsidiaries include structured entities where the substance of the relationship between the Group and the structured entity indicates that it is controlled by the Group. Subsidiaries are all entities (including structured entities) over which the Group has control. Controlls achieved when the Group has power over the investee; is exposed, or has rights, to variable return from its involvement with the investee; and has the ability to use its power to affects as returns. Subsidiaries are fully consolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group. They are deconsolidated from the date on which control is transferred to the Group.

Uniform accounting policies are adopted across the Group, Inter-company transactions, balances and unrealized gains on transactions between Group companies are eliminated. Unrealized losses are also eliminated unless the transaction provides evidence of an impairment of the asset transferred.

(b) Accounting for business combinations

The Group uses the acquisition method of accounting to account for business combinations. The consideration transferred for the acquisition of a subsidiary is the fair value of the assats transferred, the labilities incurred and the equity interests issued by the Group. The consideration transferred includes the fair value of any assats or lability arising from a contingent consideration arrangement. Acquisition-related costs are expensed as incurred. Hentifiable assats acquired and faibilities and contingent labilities assumed in a business combination are measured initially at their fair values at the acquiristion date. On an acquisition-by-acquisition basis, the Group recognities any non-controlling interests proportionate share of the acquired and tasks.

The Croup recognises the results of the acquired entity from the date on which the business combination between entities under control occurred on on their decrease.

Non-controlling interests in subsidiaries are identified separately from the Group's equity therein. Those interests of non-controlling shareholders that are present ownership interests entiting their holders to a proportionate share of net assets upon fiquidation may initiatly be measured at feir value or at the non-controlling interests proportionate share of the feir value of the acquires's identificable net assets. Financial risk management

Financial risk factors
The Grup has operations in the UK, the Republic of Ireland and France including Sweden and has debt financing which exposes it to a variety of financial risks that include the effects of changes in debt market prices, foreign oursery exchange cretors, credit risks, commodify price risks, fiquidity and interest rates. The Group has in place a risk management programme that seeks to limit the adverse effects on the financial performance of the Group by using foreign currency debt to hedge overseas rivestments in subsidiaries, using forward exchange contracts for inventory purchases and fuel commodify swaps to hedge against the risk of the change in the price of diesel.

The Board of Directors of Brake Bros Limited have the responsibility for setting the risk management policies, in compliance with Sysco Corporation risk management policies, applied by the Brake Bros Limited group of companies. The policies are implemented by the central group treasury department that receives regular reports from the operating companies to enable prompt identification of financial risks so that the appropriate actions may be taken.

(i) Foreign currency exchange risk
The Group is expassed to foreign exchange risks primarily with respect to the Euro and Swedish Krona although exposure to the Swedish Krona is not considered material. The Group has certain investments in foreign operations, whose net assets are exposed to foreign currency translation risk.

The Group's operations in the UK and Sweden have inventory purchases denominated in currencies other than their functional currency, such as the Euro, Polish Zioty and Danich Krone. These inventory purchases give rise to foreign currency exposure between the functional currency cache entire and these currencies. The Group entire rise foreign currency forward owap contracts to self the applicable entiry's functional currency and buy currencies matching the inventory purchase, which operate as each flow hedges of the Group's foreign currency-denominated inventory burchases.

(ii) Interest rate risk
The Group has both interest bearing assets and interest bearing Eablities. Interest rate risk is not considered material for the Group.

(iii) Credit risk
The Group has no dignificant concentrations of credit risk. Credit risk arises from cash and cash equivalents, as well as credit exposures to outstomers, including outstanding receivables and committed transactions. For banks, independently rated parties within the band 'A' rating are used for the main Group banking requirements, and wherever possible for subsidiary day to day operating requirements. For customers, task control assesses the credit quality of the outstomer, taking into account as financial position, past experience and other factors. Individual risk limits are set based on internal or external ristings. The Group has implemented policies that require appropriate credit checks no potential customers before sales commence.

The table below shows the credit rating and balance of the major bank counterparties at the date of the statement of financial position. A full analysis of cash at bank and short term deposits is included in note 18(d) to the financial statements.

17. Retirement benefit obligations

The Group operates a number of pension schemes for its UK employees; the assets of all schemes being held in separate trustee administered funds. The pension schemes are operated by the Company. In addition, in France and Sweden the Group is liable for certain post employment benefits which meet the oriteria of a defined benefit plan and these obligations are of an unfunded nature. The UK pension schemes are operated by the subsidiary company Brake Rose Limited and are as follows:

(i) The Brakes Final Salary Pension Scheme was closed to existing employees at 31 December 2003. No further benefits are occurring to members subsequent to this date. The scheme is a funded defined benefit pension plan.

The scheme is administered by a separate board of trustees which is legally separate from Brake Bros Limited. The trustees are composed of representatives of both the employer and the members and an independent trustee. The trustees are required by law to act in the interest of all relevant beneficiaries and are responsible for the investment policy with regard to the assets plus the day to day administration of the benefits.

Under the scheme, members are entitled to defined annual pensions on retirement at normal retirement age (typically age 63 or age 65). Benefits are also payable on death and following other events such as early retirement.

Brakes Final Salary Pension Scheme retirement benefit obligations up to a maximum amount of £20,0m (2020: £20,0m) are secured by way of a charge over certain property, plant and equipment of the Group.

Further details on the profile of the scheme, its funding requirements and risks associated with the scheme are explained later in this note.

(a) The Brakes Group Personal Pension Plan was opened on 1 April 2013 and is a qualifying workplace pension scheme that the Group is using to meet the automatic enrolment legislative requirements. It is contracted into the state pension scheme and for auto-errolment members the contribution rates are 5% of pensionable callary for members and only for employers and for elected members has contribution rates of 5% of pensionable callary for members and flow on % for employers, with higher employers contributions for managers. Funds are invested with Legal & Carl Investment Management.

(iii) The Brakes Money Purchase Pension Plan closed on 31 March 2015 with all existing members auto-enrolled into the Brakes Group Personal Pension Plan. Minimum contribution rates for ex-members of the Brakes Money Purchase Pension Plan are 3% of pensionable calary for members and 4% for employers, with higher employers contributions for managers.

(iv) The Fresh Direct Group Personal Pension Plans were opened on 1 January 2014 are qualifying workplace pension schemes that the Group is using to meet the automatic enrolment legislative requirements. Members of the scheme were transferred to The Brakes Group Personal Pension Plan.

In Sweden, the cubicidary company Merigo Foodcarvice AB, provides employees with defined benefit and defined contribution pension schemes. The majority of the arrangements are provided in accordance with the ITP plan (supplementary pension for industrial staffed employees). The Group's employees in Sweden are provided with ITP retriement benefits via an unfunded defined benefit plan. For certain salaried employees, the ITP pensions are secured through the insurance company Alects. The plans is reported as a defined contribution plan with the premiums paid effecting the pension cost.

In France, for the subsidiary companies Sysce France SAS, all employees are provided retirement indemnity benefits (indemnitéde Départ en Retraite 'IDR'). These are unfunded errangements that provides retirement benefits based on service and salary, with different level of benefits depending on employees' possion and grade.

Vesting requirements for awards under the 2018 Plan vary by individual grant and may include either time-based vesting or time-based vesting subject to acceleration based on performance criteria for fiscal periods of at least one year. The contractual life of all options granted under the 2018 Plan are and will be no greater than ten years.

The stock option awards are subject to graded vesting over a requisite service period with compensation recognised on a straight-line basis over the requisite service period over the duration of the award.

During the year 80,731 (2020: 30,830) restricted stock units were granted to Brakes employees which will vest rateably over a three-year period. The weighted average grant-date fair value per restricted stock unit granted in the period was US\$71.66 (2020: US\$72.60).

During the year, \$3,996 PSUs (2020; 45,175) were granted to Brakes employees, these will convert into shares of Sisco common stock at the end of the two-year performance period based on actual performance terrets enchanged, as well as the market-based return of Sysco's common stock relative to that of each company within the S8P 500 index.
