STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment is a charitable company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of a winding up, and while a member or within one year of ceasing to be a member, the member's liability is limited to £1. The Company was incorporated in 1986 and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for selecting and recruiting suitable trustees to office at the Annual General Meeting, such trustees being elected to office by the members. There is a maximum of 12 trustees on the Board, including both player members of the Orchestra and non-playing directors. A majority of the Board must be non-player members. Trustees are elected for a period of three years and are eligible for re-election at the end of that period. There is no time limit imposed on the total number of years for which a trustee might serve.

The day to day management of the Company is delegated to the Chief Executive, who reports directly to the Board of Directors. The Orchestral management team, reporting to the Chief Executive includes six full time and two part time staff, in addition to several freelance staff and three office based volunteers.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the management of the risks faced by the charity. All significant activities undertaken are subject to risk review as part of the initial project assessment and implementation. The Board of Trustees reviews the major risks that the charity faces on a regular basis and controls are established accordingly.

DIRECTORS' ANNUAL REPORT (continued)

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The principal objectives of the charity are to advance education through the promotion, support and encouragement of the art of music (including opera, music, drama, singing and all forms consisting in whole or in part of music) and in particular the promotion, encouragement and appreciation of music as played on period instruments

The principal activity of the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment ('the Orchestra') is the performance of music on period instruments and its mission is to advance education through bringing the very best of the period instrument tradition to modern audiences in performances characterised by commitment, excellence and passion

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

2006/07 was the 21st anniversary year of the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment The year began with the announcement of new conductor relationships with Ivan Fischer, Vladimir Jurowkski and Sir Simon Rattle as the OAE's three Principal Artists and Frans Bruggen, Sir Charles Mackerras and Sir Roger Norrington as Emeritus Conductors In addition the OAE published *Spint of the Orchestra*, a book describing the foundation and progress of the Orchestra over the past 21 years

The main showcase of the Orchestra's work was the 21st Birthday Season at Southbank Centre – eight concerts in total seven at the Queen Elizabeth Hall and the last, our 21st Birthday Gala concert, at the newly reopened Royal Festival Hall

The Orchestra's commitment to touring abroad continued with concerts in France, Germany, Italy, Spain and the USA. CD recordings continue to be an important part of the organisation's activities and a high-light in the year was the recording for Opera Rara of Donizetti's *Imelda de' Lambertazzi* conducted by Mark Elder.

The OAE's education programme, Enlightening Education, continued successfully with projects in London and with our regional partners in Aldeburgh, Bradford-on-Avon, Bristol and Dartington Highlights of the year included "OAE 2028" in which students were asked to imagine what the OAE would look like in another 21 years' time (a film of this project was shown during the 21st Birthday Concert in June), and an on-going series of projects with schools in Camden and Islington ahead of our move to Kings Place in 2008

During the year audiences totally 90,000 people were reached through concert work and a further 3,000 through our education work

The year also saw the launch of "OAE Futures", a ten-year programme of activity that sets out the vision for the next phase of the Orchestra's life, focusing on "Future Orchestra" – a series of orchestral projects that cross artistic boundaries through the exploration of new approaches to performance, new repertoire and new ways of working, "Future Performers" – giving opportunities for the next generation of musicians, through Young Musicians' and Young Conductors' schemes, and "Future Audiences" – involving elements of our education activity, the development of our website as a more effective tool, and initiatives such as the *Insight Club* and *The Night Shift* which bring our work to new audiences

DIRECTORS' ANNUAL REPORT (continued)

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The company made a surplus for the year of £93,358 (2006 - £61,925) and this has increased the reserves at the year end to £393,300 (2006 - £299,942). The objective is to build up reserves to be used exclusively for furthering the charity's objectives in future years.

The Orchestra holds reserves which the directors consider sufficient to withstand a temporary downturn in operating results. In addition, these reserves will enable the Orchestra to have the confidence to make artistic investments through embarking on projects which will advance the standing of the Orchestra despite being loss-making. The charitable company seeks to invest any surplus funds in a high interest bank account to achieve a high rate of return, but safeguarding the charity's assets.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The most significant change for the Orchestra in 2007-08 will be the relocation of its administration offices to a new headquarters at Kings Place. This will take place in July 2007 and, as well as providing new office space, it will also provide the Orchestra with a new small-scale performance venue and a rehearsal venue, both of which are part of the recently-completed development at Kings Place, near King's Cross

The Orchestra is also currently devising a new Five-Year business Plan which will inform our work from 2008 to 2013

In terms of concert activity, the Orchestra will remain as busy as ever with a thriving series of show-case concerts at our Residency Home at Southbank Centre, and tours throughout the UK and abroad There are also plans for several further CD recordings and the education programme continues to be a model for this type of activity among arts organizations

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE DIRECTORS

The directors are responsible for preparing the Directors' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the directors have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for that period

In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with Companies Act 1985. The directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2007

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention (except for assets included at revalued mounts) and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 1985

Cash flow statement

The directors have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small

Donations and gifts

All monetary donations and gifts are included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable, provided that there are no donor-imposed restrictions as to the timing of the related expenditure, in which case recognition is deferred until the pre-condition has been met. If there are donor restrictions and the funds have been received then these are recognised as restricted funds.

Gifts in kind are valued and included in income to the extent that it represents goods or services which would otherwise be purchased. An equivalent amount is charged as expenditure

Grants receivable

Revenue grants are credited as incoming resources when they are receivable provided conditions for receipt have been complied with, unless they relate to a specified future period or project, in which case they are deferred within restricted funds

Charitable trading activities

This relates to income received from concerts and sessions undertaken during the year. The income is recognised on the completion of the concerts

Non-charitable trading activities

This relates to royalties and income from sales of compact discs net of direct expenses

Allocation and apportionment of overhead costs

Wherever possible, expenditure is allocated specifically to the relevant activities for which it is incurred. Where costs cannot be directly attributed they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources as and when received.

Expenditure

Expenditure, which is charged on an accruals basis, is allocated between

- 1) Expenditure incurred directly to the fulfilment of the charity's objectives together with Support costs relating to these activities
- 2) Expenditure incurred in order to raise funds for charitable activities including support costs, and
- 3) Expenditure incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2007

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Fund accounting

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charges against the specific fund.

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for expenditure on the general objectives of the charity

Depreciation

Assets intended for use by the company over more than one year are capitalised as Fixed Assets on the balance sheet at cost

Depreciation of fixed assets held for charity use is calculated to write down the cost less estimated residual values by equal annual instalments over the period of their estimated useful economic lives as follows

Office and other equipment

- over 4 years

Computer equipment

- over 5 years

The Orchestra has adopted a revaluation policy in regards to its musical instruments. The last revaluation was completed in 2007. As per the SORP paragraph 221, the Orchestra will review the value of the assets regularly, at least every five years. No depreciation is charged on musical instruments as the expected residual value will be equal to valuation.

Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease

Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating profit.
