STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The National Life Story Collection is a registered charity and a company limited by guarantee. Each of the members of the charity has undertaken to contribute an amount not exceeding £5 to the assets of the charity in the event of it being wound up while they are members, or within one year after they cease to be a member. The charity is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Trustee Induction and Training

All new Trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity. They receive an induction pack containing the corporate governance document, a trustee role description, and copies of relevant minutes, policies and organisational information. They meet representatives of the Board to discuss and clarify their role.

Risk Management

The Trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining reserves at current levels, combined with a review of controls over key financial areas, will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The Trustees also examine other operational and business risks faced by the charity and have established systems to mitigate the significant risks. A risk register is maintained and reviewed annually.

Organisational Structure and Related Parties

The charity operates from the offices of the British Library (BL) and there is close co-operation between the two organisations, governed by a collaborative agreement which was reviewed and renewed in October 2019 for a further three years. The Oral History Section, of which NLS is part, is within the Sound and Vision department in the BL's Collections Directorate. The Trustees meet five times a year: four main meetings (of which one is a strategy meeting) and the AGM. The Director manages the work of the charity on a day-to-day basis supported by a Deputy Director, an Archivist, an Assistant Archivist/Administrator and a part-time Bookkeeper. A number of other staff, freelance staff, and individuals on unpaid placements also assist in the work of the charity. In 2003, the Trustees adopted a corporate governance document which regularised the business of the Charity and established an Audit Committee and a Remuneration Committee. In 2009 they established a Finance Sub-Committee, chaired by the Treasurer, which meets four times a year and also acts as the Audit and Remuneration Committee. At the 2017 AGM Trustees decided to merge the Executive Committee and the Board of Trustees, and agreed that from 2017 onwards Trustees should serve for a fixed term of three years, renewable up to a maximum term of nine years. In 2006 the charity adopted a trading name 'National Life Stories'. A business plan covering a four-year planning period is prepared, updated and reviewed annually, dovetailed to BL strategic plans and an oral history strategy, similarly for a four-year period. In October 2019 the Trustees reviewed their ten-year strategy for the charity (2011-2021) and will take forward several recommendations during the coming year.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued)

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The object of the charity as stated in its constitution is to advance the education of the public by the establishment of a national biography in sound consisting of a national collection of autobiographical and other life story records. The charity relies on the fundraising efforts of its Trustees, staff and advisory committee members, and on the support of the British Library, to obtain the resources to carry out the oral history fieldwork programmes that comprise its core activity. It works collaboratively with the British Library to ensure the collected materials are professionally recorded, documented, catalogued, archived and made accessible to as wide an audience as possible, both onsite and remotely via the internet. It also works in partnership with a variety of public and private organisations to document the unique life stories of a wide cross-section of people living in the UK.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE IN 2019

Interviewing fieldwork in the broad area of science and technology moved into a new phase following receipt of a major grant of £328,000 over three years from the Arcadia Charitable Trust: An oral history of farming, land management and conservation in post-war Britain is now underway, supported by a distinguished advisory committee. We are capturing the experiences of farmers and landowners engaged in food production and stewardship of land at a time of transformation in agricultural practices; scientists involved in the development of new knowledge and technologies – in fields including ecology, plant breeding, chemistry, soil science, information technology and natural history – that impacted on the experience of farming; and representatives of organisations, such as the National Agricultural Advisory Service (later ADAS), the Nature Conservancy (and its successors) and the National Institute of Agricultural Botany, involved in exchange of knowledge and expertise between farmers, landowners and scientists.

As part of our *Legal Lives* initiative with partner Linda Mulcahy at Oxford University's Law Faculty, a new project about law centres was submitted for funding to the Arts and Humanities Research Council. Other fundraising initiatives in this area were unfortunately not successful, and we are also still seeking funding for a second phase of our *City Lives* project.

Meanwhile work continued on existing interview fieldwork projects with funding in hand, namely *Artists' Lives*, *Architects' Lives* and *Authors' Lives*. With the assistance of an active advisory committee we were again successful in obtaining donations for *Architects' Lives*, and we continue to explore the potential for a project focusing on the Broadgate development in London. The dissemination strategy for our collections was furthered by successfully obtaining a grant from the Linbury Trust for a new theatre design web resource. We continued to scope a new project in the wider area of design and held several useful meetings with possible stakeholders. Our collaborative doctoral student concluded her interviews relating to the privatisation of government science.

2018-19 NLS Goodison Fellow Rib Davis has been writing a play script about the long-term impact of trauma, drawing on our Holocaust collections. A new 2020-21 Fellow was appointed from a very strong field: Suzanne Joinson's fellowship will focus on three artist/craftswomen interviewed for *Crafts Lives* and *Artists' Lives*.

The Trustees approved a new NLS Patrons scheme and, with the generous support of Hodson and Luanne Thornber, we have been working with Christine Buccella from Craigmyle Fundraising Consultants to prepare the scheme and develop publicity materials. We obtained approval from the BL's Development Office.

In October the NLS-BL Collaborative Agreement was renewed for another three years.

We continue to enhance our social media profile through blogs and twitter and have been exploring how we might launch an NLS podcast series. Oral history web page views totalled 1.21million in 2019.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued)

The charity continues to work with the Oral History Society to organise and administer a programme of oral history training courses: in 2019 we held 122 courses with 1200 attendees.

Staff and freelance contracts were also reviewed, revised and renegotiated, with support from external HR and legal advisors to meet new legislative changes.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set. The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2011.

The charity works with a variety of partners, organisations, individuals and users to create a unique national collection of life stories accessible to all via the British Library. It delivers services ranging from information about oral history and life story methodology to archival advice. As the leading charity of its kind in the UK it acts as a centre of excellence, offering best-practice advice on a daily basis to many organisations, individuals, charities, groups, funders and policy-makers.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Statement of Financial Activities shows total income for the year of £309,324 and total expenditure of £281,527. This expenditure total includes restricted income raised in previous years and now spent on project activity. Donations for specific projects are shown as income in the year of receipt whereas the related expenditure is shown when incurred which is often in a subsequent year. As regards activities not related to specific projects, unrestricted income exceeded unrestricted expenditure by £55,405. The reserves at the year-end amounted to £1,050,929. Of this total, £337,004 is restricted to expenditure committed to ongoing projects, and a further £200,000 is the Founders Donation.

Principal Funding Sources

Donations included £93,382 from the Arcadia Trust for *An oral history of farming, land management and conservation in post-war Britain*; £6,000 from Christopher Hampton for *General Interviews*; £3,700 from the Yale Center for British Art, and £3,350 from the Rootstein Hopkins Foundation, for *Artists' Lives*. Several donations were received for *Architects' Lives* from the Graham Foundation, Niall Hobhouse and Drawing Matter, Eric Parry, Mark Williams, and Feilden Clegg Bradley Studios. There were also anonymous personal donations for *Architects' Lives* and for *Design Lives*. A generous bequest of £67,913 was received from the estate of former Trustee Dundas Hamilton, and the family of the late pioneering oral historian George Ewart Evans kindly gifted book royalties of £4,000 in his memory.

Investment Policy

Having considered the options available, the Trustees continued to hold the charity's funds in a mixture of bank deposit accounts and charity Investment Funds.

Reserves Policy

The charity maintains two funds. Restricted funds are to be used for the purpose specified by the donor. Unrestricted funds are intended to provide sufficient resources to maintain the general activities of the charity. The Founder's Donation is the establishing donation given to NLS to contribute to the support of general activities. The Trustees carry out an annual review of the charity's reserves policy in the light of known risks and future plans to try and maximise the funds it can generate itself from the reserves.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued)

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

Over the next year the current projects with funding in-hand will continue, with the exception of our *Authors' Lives* project which we will pause to allow us to commission an independent evaluation before deciding how to proceed.

Our new initiative An oral history of farming, land management and conservation in post-war Britain will continue to capture the experience of farmers and landowners engaged in food production and stewardship of land; and scientists involved in the development of new knowledge and technologies. We expect to launch a publicity strategy for the project.

As part of our dissemination plans for our collections we will develop a new theatre design web resource with a grant from the Linbury Trust. We will also partner with the Cartier archive to collect interviews relating to their workshops for *Crafts Lives*.

We will prioritise fundraising to take forward *City Lives Revisited* and interviews relating to Broadgate. We will continue to develop our ideas around an initiative documenting British design, and revise our strategy for *Talking Therapists*. We will also commission a scoping study for a new project relating to small businesses.

2018-19 NLS Goodison Fellow Rib Davis will deliver his play script, drawing on our Holocaust collections, and a public reading is planned for the summer of 2020. The 2020-21 Fellow Suzanne Joinson's will deliver several outputs focusing on three artist/craftswomen interviewed for *Crafts Lives* and *Artists' Lives*.

We will launch the NLS Patrons' scheme with a target of recruiting twenty Patrons, and we will further develop our legacies campaign.

We expect to feature NLS content in the long-awaited new BL Sounds website, due to launch in the autumn as part of the Heritage Lottery-funded 'Unlocking Our Sound Heritage' (UOSH) initiative. UOSH has been digitising the remaining NLS analogue collections and this work will be concluded in 2020

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of The National Life Story Collection for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the report of the trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure; of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

So far as the trustees are aware, there is no relevant information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the charity's auditors are unaware, and each trustee has taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as a trustee in order to make them aware of any audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are aware of that information.

COVID 19

In common with many other organisations, Covid-19 has affected the charity's activities. All staff have been working remotely since the British Library closed due to the lockdown. Self-employed contractors have been able to take advantage of the government's Self-Employment Income Support Scheme (SEISS). The charity has received few donations during this difficult period but has reserves from earlier project specific donations, general core donations and an endowment fund. Expenditure has reduced as interview projects have been paused and these will not re-commence until it is safe and feasible to do so. The trustees consider that the charity has sufficient reserves to continue its activities for the foreseeable future and, accordingly, the financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis. The trustees continue to monitor the situation closely and will implement further changes as required.

AUDITORS

The auditors, Parker Cavendish, will be proposed for re-appointment at the Annual General Meeting.

REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS TO THE MEMBERS OF THE NATIONAL LIFE STORY COLLECTION

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The National Life Story Collection (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 December 2019 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Statement of Financial Position, the Statement of Cash Flows and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'.

NOTES TO THE 2019 ACCOUNTS

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key resources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

1.1 Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) – (charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The National Life Story collection meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

1.2 Fund accounting

Restricted funds can only be used for particular purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

1.3 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular income:

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.
- Donated services and facilities and the value of services provided by volunteers are acknowledged but have not been included in these accounts.
- Investment income is included when receivable.
- Other income including training income is included when receivable.

1.4 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis consistent with the use of resources.

- Expenditure relating to generating income.
- Expenditure on charitable activities comprise those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them, as well as governance costs.

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis consistent with the use of resources.

- Expenditure relating to generating income.
- Expenditure on charitable activities comprise those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them, as well as governance costs.

1.6 Fixed assets and depreciation

Small items of recording equipment are not capitalised and are written off in the income and expenditure account in the year of purchase.

1.7 Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Realised and unrealised gains and losses on investments are dealt with in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.8 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash at banks and in hand and short term deposits with a maturity date of twelve months or less.

Debtors and creditors

Debtors and creditors receivable or payable within one year of the reporting date are carried at their transaction price.

1.9 Taxation

The charity is exempt from taxation in respect of income and capital gains to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

1.10 Going Concern

In common with many other organisations, Covid-19 has affected the charity's activities. All staff have been working remotely since the British Library closed due to the lockdown. Self-employed contractors have been able to take advantage of the government's Self-Employment Income Support Scheme (SEISS). The charity has received few donations during this difficult period but has reserves from earlier project specific donations, general core donations and an endowment fund. Expenditure has reduced as interview projects have been paused and these will not re-commence until it is safe and feasible to do so. The trustees consider that the charity has sufficient reserves to continue its activities for the foreseeable future and, accordingly, the financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis. The trustees continue to monitor the situation closely and will implement further changes as required.
