The Board presents the report with the financial statements of the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy (BACP) Group for the year ended 31 March 2011

Company Status

BACP is a company limited by guarantee, without a share capital, and is a registered charity. The guarantee of each member is limited to £1. The governing document is the Articles of Association of the company and members of the Board of Trustees are directors of the company.

The company registration number is 2175320 (incorporated 8 October 1987)

The charity registration number is 298361

The registered office is BACP House, 15 St John's Business Park, Lutterworth, Leicestershire, LE17 4HB

Basis of accounting

The financial statements comply with the format required by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005 2nd edition – May 2008), and with the Companies Act 2006

Group Structure

BACP has two wholly owned subsidiaries called BACP Enterprises Limited and BACP Research Foundation

BACP Enterprises Limited receives its main income from advertisements placed in Journals produced by BACP, online advertisements and events also make a contribution to income

BACP Research Foundation did not commence operations in the year, however expenditure totalling £55,834 relating to pre start up costs were incurred

Structure, Governance and Management

Chair

The Chair is elected by the members, and the Officers are appointed by the Trustees The Board convenes four times each year and holds an additional 24 hour strategic planning event

Trustees

The Board of Trustees consists of between 7 and 11 members. Trustees serve for a term of three years, and may be appointed to serve for one further term. Appointment is by election announced at, and with effect from, the Annual General Meeting, which takes place between September-November each year, and postal ballots are conducted when necessary

Trustees are appointed by election from the membership of the Association by single transferrable vote, supervised by an external organisation appointed by the President of the Association

Some members of the Board of Trustees are also members of other Committees as detailed above Members of the Board of Trustees may attend other Committee meetings as required

All Trustees must be members of BACP and the members are able to nominate Trustees for election. The Board may co-opt members with the relevant skills and experience to fill any vacancies that may arise.

On appointment each Trustee completes a register of interests. They are given a Trustee Handbook that includes the Articles of Association, Standing Orders of the Association, policies and procedures on issues such as delegation of authority, recruitment, equal opportunities, investment, reserves, conflict of interest, business expenses, and other guidance. It contains a role description for Trustees and a copy of various other, relevant, Charity Commission leaflets including 'The Essential Trustee. What you kneed to know' (CC3), Responsibilities of Charity Trustees – a Summary (CC3a) and Trustee Expenses and Payments (CC11)

The new Trustees meet with the Chair and Chief Executive and are invited to an induction meeting with senior staff and a tour of the office. Training needs are regularly assessed and met

Company law requires the Board of Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and group, and of the surplus or deficit of the group for that year. In preparing these financial statements, the Board of Trustees is required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- follow applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice without any material departures, and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company and group will continue in business

The Board of Trustees is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company, and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2006, and the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities (revised 2005 2nd edition – May 2008) It is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and group, and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities

Statement as to disclosure of information to auditors

So far as the Board of Trustees is aware, there is no relevant audit information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the company's auditors are unaware, and each Trustee has taken all the steps that he or she ought to have taken as a Trustee in order to make himself or herself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the group's auditors are aware of that information

Management and Staffing

BACP Trustees have delegated the management of BACP to the Chief Executive who reports on the performance against the Strategic Plan approved by the Trustees

The Chief Executive and the Director of Finance report, via the Treasurer and Finance and Policy Committee, on the financial position, including the actual performance compared to budget. Management Accounts are received quarterly by the Board and regularly by the Finance and Policy Committee

The Chief Executive, Mr L W Clarke, who is also the Company Secretary, has responsibility for planning and developing the services and strategies for BACP, within clear policies and protocols set by the Trustees

The Chief Executive ensures that the staff team is recruited and supported to provide the skills and expertise needed to run a successful organisation, and that the values of BACP are observed Particular attention to staffing structures and staff development continues to be a key factor and is managed through the following Directorate structure

The responsibilities of the Chief Executive include operational responsibility through the Directorate for Finance, Human Resources and Customer Relations, Marketing, Stakeholder Communications across the four home countries, Europe and internationally, Membership, PR and media strategy, Publications, Regulation, Research, Policy and Professional Practice and IT systems used by BACP

Committees

Following a period of consultation, led by an external consultant, the Professional and Ethical Practice and Professional Standards Committees collaboratively agreed the two Committees should stand down and a new Professional Ethics and Quality Standards Committee be established. This was duly and unanimously ratified by the Board of Governors and the recruitment process for a Chair and members commenced. The new Committee held its inaugural meeting on 15 April 2011. All Committees have their own Terms of Reference which are reviewed on an annual basis, and reports from the Committees are a standing Agenda item for the Strategic Direction Committee. The Finance and Policy Committee submits a full report at the Board meetings. The Board also receives reports from others, outside of our main work areas, as described later in this report.

Objectives and aims

Our vision
An emotionally healthy society

Our mission

To be relevant to members, clients and all those who influence the development and delivery of counselling and psychotherapy so that the profession continues to grow, develop and contribute to society in an equal and just manner

Our objectives BACP is established

- (i) to promote and provide education and training for counsellors and/or psychotherapists working in either professional or voluntary settings, whether full or part-time, with a view to raising the standards of counselling/psychotherapy for the benefit of the community and in particular for those who are the recipients of counselling/psychotherapy, and
- (ii) to advance the education of the public in the part that counselling and/or psychotherapy can play generally and in particular to meet the needs of those members of society where development and participation in society is impaired by mental, physical or social handicap or disability

The income and property of the Association is used for the promotion of the aims and objectives summarised above. Importantly for BACP's members, and the general public, BACP is a registered charity, legally recognised as established and existing for charitable purposes only. This means that the funds raised do not profit the Association, its employees or Trustees and are used to achieve the above objectives, developing the Association for the benefit of its members and the community it serves.

In setting the Association's vision, mission and objectives, and ongoing strategic planning and related activity, the Trustees have given careful consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit, and in particular to raising public awareness of the benefits of counselling and psychotherapy, increasing public knowledge, understanding and awareness of therapy, sourcing evidence on the effectiveness and impact of therapy and enabling wider access to safe and accountable practice

Our work today

BACP seeks to advise, inform and influence national and international policy and procedures concerned with counselling and psychotherapy, offering information and guidance to those involved in the process Through regular consultation the Association offers advice to, and is consulted by, Governments, professional bodies, funding organisations, teaching institutions and others throughout the UK on all counselling and psychotherapy matters

Importantly a key element of BACP's role is to educate a field of stakeholders drawn from the public and members, legislators and policy developers. This educative task is expressed throughout this report

The Association sets, promotes and maintains standards for the profession, is strongly committed to high practice standards and the protection of the public. This continues to be of the utmost importance in view of the approaching regulation of counselling and psychotherapy, which Government has now confirmed will not be statutory but through a process of voluntary regulation.

BACP's Ethical Framework for Good Practice in Counselling and Psychotherapy, with its Professional Conduct Procedure, ensures that its members abide by an accepted and approved code of conduct and accountability This Ethical Framework, introduced in April 2002 and revised in February 2010, provides a core frame of reference for members to use in their relations with clients, colleagues, fellow members and the wider community. It safeguards both practitioners and members of the public alike. The Professional Conduct Department deals with any alleged breaches of conduct.

BACP sets and monitors its own advertising policy to ensure that both Accredited and non-Accredited members advertise their services in a way that does not misinform or mislead the public

The Association has a reduced fee for all grades of individual membership and for its Accreditation schemes. This enables those with limited income to benefit from the support and recognition which accompanies BACP membership and Accreditation.

BACP also sets recognised and robust standards for the delivery of education and training. Through developing and promoting BACP's various Accreditation schemes as benchmarks for the highest standards of counsellor/psychotherapist training and practice it enables members to achieve a recognised level of excellence.

BACP's *Training Directory*, available on-line by subscription, contains details of course listings for Universities, Further Education Colleges and specialist training providers and other useful information including funding, awarding bodies, and a guide to theoretical approaches. An on-line *Trainee Placement Directory* is also available, enabling student members to search for a training placement that will meet the conditions of their training course.

BACP's Hoxter Educational bursary fund, to which students studying on BACP accredited courses can apply, contributes to BACP's aims and objectives of furthering education and training

BACP disseminates information to members and the public through a wide range of books, guidelines, journals, Information Sheets and pamphlets, many of which are also available online. This includes publications for counsellors and psychotherapists, those receiving therapy, and purchasers of counselling services. The on-line Seeking a Therapist Directory specifically gives guidance to members of the public on choosing the most appropriate counsellor or psychotherapist according to their needs as well as information on counselling services and specialist organisations and has become an essential tool used by potential clients seeking a BACP practitioner.

Through a wide range of communication channels, BACP's Customer Service Team provides information and knowledge about counselling and psychotherapy to members and the general public for professional and/or personal support and guidance

BACP's Ethics and Client Helpdesks offer a service to members encountering ethical dilemmas in their practice and help clients with any queries about the counselling and psychotherapy process respectively

A wide portfolio of conferences, seminars, workshops and other training events is run each year, providing additional continuing professional development opportunities for counsellors and psychotherapists and other professionals Equality and diversity are key in all of BACP's activities and initiatives, from both an internal and external perspective

BACP's PR, Media and Communications and Policy teams work to promote public knowledge and awareness of counselling and psychotherapy, as well as informing and communicating with members. The team plays a significant role in developing public understanding of the profession as counselling and psychotherapy's public profile is raised.

BACP aims to undertake and commission research to encourage informed practice, to help researchers develop new skills in the field of research methods and support the generation and dissemination of new knowledge to promote a better understanding of counselling and psychotherapy and its effects. This work is underpinned by the publication of a Research Journal, Information Sheets and a variety of research reports.

The Ethical Guidelines for Researching Counselling and Psychotherapy ensure that members of BACP who undertake research abide by an accepted and approved code of conduct, based on the concept of trust between researchers and researched. This provides a core framework for members to use in their work

The Research Network, facilitated by the Research Department, enables members to make direct contact via the Research Directory. This comprehensive directory is available free to BACP members and is used for information sharing and networking, averting duplication of work. BACP's Research pages can be found at http://www.bacp.co.uk/research/

BACP has a number of Divisions that represent crucial and important special interest groups within the Association's membership Divisional activity has widened and increased to ensure that BACP is included in a variety of relevant initiatives across the four home countries. Whilst membership has continued to grow, research has been commissioned to further enhance the membership offering and attract new members. Current benefits include information provision, conferences and journals specifically related to the relevant sector and development of websites to further inform and support members. The work of each of the Divisions is described briefly below.

- Association for Independent Practitioners (AIP) represents the interests of independent
 practitioners it provides the information and support necessary for the modern professional practitioner
 through a wide range of training opportunities, its website and a quarterly journal that keeps members upto-date with the world of therapy through articles and discussion columns
- Association for Pastoral and Spiritual Care and Counselling (APSCC) seeks to promote the values
 of the spiritual dimension, pastoral care and counselling and encourages the recognition of pastoral care
 and counselling as distinct yet complementary practices. APSCC members work in both the voluntary
 and paid sectors and come from a broad range of professional backgrounds.
- Association for University and College Counselling (AUCC) promotes student counselling as an
 integral part of the educational process in FE and HE institutions through the establishment and
 development of counselling networks both within and without the institution AUCC seeks to promote and
 foster good practice through research, dissemination of knowledge, through its journal, website and
 annual conference, and resource provision Members have access to up-to-date national and
 international information, research and publicity material

- BACP Coaching (BACP C) formally established in November 2010, BACP C supports and advises
 members in the context of coaching practice and development in a variety of settings. It is working to
 provide a definition of coaching, which will identify implications for membership standards, identifying and
 agreeing standards for accreditation/assessment, and categories of membership, exploring potential
 provision of publications, events, CPD and other initiatives relevant to coaching and evolving a
 communications strategy, aimed at a variety of stakeholders, around coaching.
- BACP Healthcare (BACP H) provides a forum for those involved with counselling in GP surgeries, hospitals and other healthcare settings. It provides training, through a variety of conferences and publications, for therapists working in all professional healthcare settings with a view to maintaining standards of practice and service delivery.
- BACP Workplace (BACP W) exists to promote best practice in workplace counselling and the provision
 of related employee support interventions, providing a mutual support network for individuals and
 organisations working in this area. It achieves this by facilitating local networks, influencing purchasers of
 counselling services and disseminating information through its journal, conferences, local consultation
 events and the BACP W website.
- Counselling Children and Young People (CCYP) promotes, develops and supports counselling and
 psychotherapy for children and young people in a wide range of settings. The Division advocates for
 young people to have access to professional counselling, has published school counselling best practice
 guidelines, disseminates good practice and research findings through conferences and a quarterly
 journal and offers information to its members on ethical issues.

Principal achievements for the year

The principal activities and achievements for the year are summarised below

Member Services

1 .

- Membership is renewed annually and at 31 March 2011 BACP had 35,211 (2010 33,334) individual members and 1,087 (2010 – 1,098) organisational members. Student membership accounted for 13% of the total figure.
- Eight new Making Connections events, free to members, were held across all four home countries and attended by over 1,200 members. These events allowed members to be informed and consulted on relevant local and national issues.
- The first Committee Day, incorporating the Association's Annual General Meeting, Awards and Fellowship presentations, was held in London
- A British Sign Language version of the Ethical Framework has been put on the website, together with Equality and Diversity web pages
- Support procedures for Accreditation applicants with disabilities, diversity training for counselling students and service providers and BME counselling networking agencies have all been developed
- Development and launch of online CPD modules
- Over 70 BACP events were delivered throughout the year, attended by more than 5,000 delegates, covering a wide and diverse portfolio of training, information sharing and CPD opportunities. These included
 - Two Student Conferences 'Making the Future Yours'
 - A total of 37 Accreditation workshops and surgeries
 - o Four 'Essential Law' workshops
 - o Divisional Conferences in Belfast, Edinburgh, London and Solihull
 - The second joint BACP/Welsh Assembly Government conference, supporting and endorsing schoolbased counselling in Wales
 - A Scottish Parliamentary Reception around the provision of school counselling in Scotland
 - Sector and geographical member networking meetings

- Further development of the Member area of the BACP website including the introduction of BACP Connect, a project offering a social networking site to members
- A 30% increase in the website design and hosting service to members
- A 10% increase in online advertising of member websites
- A new online CPD directory enabling providers to list their CPD courses for BACP members
- Between 75-80 pieces a month appeared across a wide range of media from national newspapers to local radio
- Successful campaigns for greater media presence in Scotland to support BACP's improved activity and work on the agendas of de-stigmatising counselling, promoting the profession and the wellbeing agenda
- Approximately 60,000 telephone calls and over 6,000 email enquiries were dealt with during the year, 10,000 of which related to a variety of ethical issues
- A membership survey was carried out to determine the challenges facing BACP in the future
- Development of a competency framework for delivery of counselling within the IAPT programme, and national curriculum for training
- A Practice Research Network (PRN) for school-based counselling was established to foster practicebased research within the sector
- Commissioning of new systematic reviews and updating others
- Responses given to over 170 research enquiries
- Creation of a database holding over 81,000 academic references and abstracts allowing the Research team to provide enquirers with robust research information

Public Benefit

BACP has complied with the duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the public benefit Summarised below are the main activities undertaken to further its charitable purposes for the public benefit

- Providing information on counselling and psychotherapy to assist in the alleviation of mental distress and promote wellbeing
- Securing good media visibility to de-stigmatise counselling and psychotherapy and promote the wellbeing agenda and profession
- Further development of the interactive, public-facing, website www.itsgoodtotalk.org.uk. The website
 aims to de-mystify counselling and psychotherapy through education and understanding and with over
 30,000 visitors a month is proving to be a much-needed resource for people seeking information about
 the profession and BACP
- The on-line Seeking a Therapist directory, plus a variety of Information Sheets and publications offering clear information about therapy and good practice standards to assist with public education and understanding
- Widening access and encouraging a more diverse range of therapists within membership of the Association, in particular from under-represented groups in society, so as to be better equipped to meet the needs of society
- A campaign to ensure all children and young people in the UK have equal access to counselling in schools
- Ongoing work with the Welsh Assembly Government to evaluate its National Strategy for School-based counselling
- Participation in the Wales Mental Health in Primary Care Network, to educate healthcare clinicians about good practice
- A poster and leaflet campaign to GP practices to educate the public about counselling and how to access services
- 'Open' events to increase learning and knowledge on specific therapy-related subjects
- Supporting and directly contributing to Government-led initiatives to widen access to therapy and influencing its mental health strategy for the benefit of service users

- Working with Government and other stakeholders in the regulatory field to ensure an appropriate voluntary regulatory model is achieved that will deliver public protection through high standards of training, conduct and ongoing CPD
- BACP has endorsed the 'We Need to Talk' and 'Time to Change' campaigns, and the National Dementia Declaration and is commissioning research into the effectiveness of counselling for carers of people with dementia
- Identification of ethical and competent therapists and high quality services through a variety of accreditation schemes. In addition, a CPD Endorsement Scheme, that quality assures CPD events, was launched in October 2010.
- The Association's robust and transparent professional conduct procedures are recognised by other
 professional organisations in terms of consultancy and by clients/the public should they need to access
 and pursue action in this context

Policy and Campaigns

BACP has been involved in a variety of campaigns, as previously described

The Association's work in seeking to influence, and keep members informed of, legislative changes is highly regarded and valued by organisations wishing to consult. The Policy team initiated a number of parliamentary questions in the UK and Scottish Parliaments and the Northern Ireland and Welsh Assemblies, correspondence with Ministers and opinion-formers, provided briefings for Parliamentary debates and supported members with information on various issues relevant to the profession.

BACP responded to 38 public consultations, across the four home countries, on a variety of topics including legislative changes, mental health and wellbeing issues

Within the regulatory arena, BACP's work has included,

- Regular meetings with Ministers, Department of Health civil servants, the Health Professions Council (HPC) and the Council for Healthcare Regulatory Excellence (CHRE) as well as with other major professional therapy associations
- Engagement with Government and other stakeholder groups to explore options in the context of voluntary regulation to ensure an appropriate system which will offer public benefit and be 'fit for purpose' is achieved
- · Member communications to inform and update as a result of Government's decisions
- Mapping practitioner training in counselling, psychotherapy and coaching
- Involvement with a number of national committees, project and stakeholder groups, including IAPT Education and Training Sub-Committee, the HPC's Professional Liaison Group for Counsellors and Psychotherapists, and the National Audit for Psychological Therapies for anxiety and depression

Publications

Developing Operations

During the year the following development operations occurred

- Commissioning and delivery of Counselling for Depression training within the Improving Access to Psychological Therapy (IAPT) services
- Research and consultation on how the Association communicates with its members which will inform and ensure effective communication protocols in the future

Review of Financial Position

The Association remains in a healthy financial position in line with its reserves policy

There are sufficient funds available to carry out the Strategic Plan of the Association over the forthcoming year and, in particular, the activities concerning the regulation of the counselling and psychotherapy profession

Reserves Policy

The Board of Trustees has established a policy whereby the unrestricted general funds held by the charity should represent the funds needed if the charity ceases to operate. The funds required to wind-up the charity are estimated at £1,653,000, with cash reserves standing at £1,310,905.

The Board of Trustees reviews the reserves policy annually

Currently Group reserves total £3,284,785, of which £2,760,576 is held in an unrestricted general fund. A total of £458,685 is held in designated funds of which £78,327 relates to the BACP Research Foundation and £380,358 for special projects. The remaining £65,524 relates to a Property Revaluation and would only be realised on the sale of the Freehold Property known as BACP House, Lutterworth. The property has been valued at £2,600,000 on which there is a mortgage liability of £160,211 as at 31 March 2011.

Investment Policy

Kleinwort Benson Private Bank Limited (KBPB) provides discretionary investment management services of the investment portfolio

The investment objectives criterion is based on maximum total gross return, by generating growth through capital appreciation in the value of shares and the reinvestment of income as generated from dividends and complying with the BACP policy on ethical investment

KBPB is regulated by the Financial Services Authority and is a member of the London Stock Exchange. The results for the year are set out in notes 10 and 17.

Tangible fixed assets

Information relating to changes in the fixed assets is shown in note 9 to the financial statements

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of listed investments and freehold property to market value, and comply with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Principles and Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2005 2nd edition - May 2008) All figures are exclusive of value added tax

Basis of consolidation

The group financial statements consolidate the financial statements of the company and its wholly owned subsidiaries on a line by line basis. A separate Statement of Financial Activities, or Income and Expenditure Account, for the Charity itself is not presented because the Charity has taken advantage of the exemptions afforded by Section 408 of the Companies Act 2006 and Paragraph 397 of SORP 2005

Fund accounting

General income funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Board of Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Board of Trustees for particular purposes

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the Charity for particular purposes. There are no restricted funds

Incoming resources

Subscriptions are accounted for in the period in which the service is provided. All other income is included in the period in which it is receivable.

The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included

All income from departments is treated as furthering the charity's objectives since it either relates to the membership of an accredited body to enhance the public's confidence or the sale of publications and training aids and facilities to improve the standard of counselling and psychotherapy in the UK

Resources ex pended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities.

Operating leases

Operating lease rentals are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on payment

Pensions

The company contributes towards the personal pension schemes of employees Contributions are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which they are made

Resources expended (continued)

Irrecoverable value added tax

As the membership subscriptions are exempt from value added tax, there is a restriction in the amount of input value added tax that the group is allowed to reclaim on its expenses

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised and included at cost together with any incidental costs of acquisition

Depreciation is provided so as to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of tangible fixed assets, over their estimated useful lives as follows

Freehold property - not provided

Computer equipment and accessories - 25% per annum - straight line basis
Office furniture and equipment - 20% per annum - straight line basis

The trustees have adopted a revaluation policy in respect of the freehold property in accordance with FRS15. As a result, no depleciation is provided on the freehold property as the trustees are of the opinion that the residual value is at least equal to the book value.

Stocks

These are valued on a first in, first out basis, at the ower of cost and net realisable value

Investments

Listed investments are stated at market value on the balance sheet date

Realised and unrealised gains and bases are included in the Statement of Financial Activities

2 COMPANY STATUS

The company is a company limited by guarantee. All members guarantee an amount not to exceed £1 payable in the event of the company being wound up with a deficiency of net assets. At 31 March 2011 there were 36,298 members (2010 - 34,432).

4 ACTIVITIES OF SUBSIDIARIES

The Charity has two subsidiaries, BACP Enterprises Limited (formerly BACP Advertising Limited) and BACP Research Foundation. It owns the entire share capital of 1,000 shares of £1 each in BACP Enterprises Limited, a company incorporated in the United Kingdom.

BACP Enterprises Limited was originally donated to the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy and therefore there is no cost of investment in the balance sheet of the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy BACP Enterprises Limited deals with income raised from advertisements placed in the Therapy Today Journal (TT), Counselling and Psychotherapy Research Journal (CPR) and Divisional Journals produced by the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy It is a trading subsidiary and gifts Net Profit to the parent company the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy

BACP Research Foundation was incorporated on 5 February 2008, and attained Charitable status on April 12 2010 Pie-trading expenditure, totalling £55,834 (2010 - £11,865), was paid for as donations during the year by the parent company the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy The British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy is the only member of the BACP Research Foundation, a company limited by guarantee The maximum liability of the British Association for Counselling and Psychotherapy in the event of the winding up of the subsidiary is £10 The principal activity of the company will be the undertaking of research into counseling and psychotherapy practices.
