#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the charity for the year ended 31 March 2010

#### CONSTITUTION

The Pre-Retirement Association (PRA) is a registered charity under the Charities Act 1993 and a company limited by guarantee. It is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association Charity registration number 801246. Company registration number 2194800.

In November 2005 the charity adopted the working title of 'Life Academy'

On a winding up of the company, every member of the company can be required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1

Legal and administrative information set out on pages 1 and 2 form part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements and with the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity. The Trustees have adopted the provisions set forth in the Statement of Recommended Practice for Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005.

#### **OBJECT OF THE CHARITY**

The principal object of the charity is the provision of education, planning and support services for those preparing for retirement from full time employment and to act as the national focus for the development of this pre-retirement education, mid-life planning and life planning work

#### **ORGANISATION**

A Board of Trustees, of up to twelve members, meets quarterly to administer the charity. The Board approved the 5 year Business Plan and vision for the charity. The Board also approves the annual Budget and activities for the coming year and receives a quarterly report on performance and achievements. The Board determines the financial strategy and takes major financial decisions. A Chief Executive is appointed by the Trustees to manage the operations of the charity.

## **APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES**

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the appointment of new Trustees. The Board identifies the knowledge and experience required of a new Trustee and makes an appropriate search for an appropriate individual who meets the criteria. The person identified joins the Board at the invitation of the Board of Trustees and submits himself/herself for election by the members at the next Annual General Meeting. During the year the Board of Trustees invited Tim Yudin to join the Board and he will submit himself for election at the Annual General Meeting. Penny Green retired from the Board in November 2009.

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

#### INVESTMENT POWERS

Under the Memorandum of Association, the Board of Trustees has power to make investments as may be thought fit, subject to conditions laid down by law. The Endowment Fund investment was made in compliance with the donor's wishes and will not be varied unless very strong reasons to change were to prevail

For other investments it is the policy to maintain value in "real" terms over a medium term period, yet recognising market movements in the UK All Share Index. A spread of risk over three Unit Trusts is considered adequate for the sum involved, whilst the level of income is subordinate to the main purpose. The market value of the investments increased during the year reflecting a similar improvement in the UK Share Index.

#### **RELATED PARTNERS**

There are a number of affiliated Local Associations, who are members of the Association They are independent organisations governed by their own constitutions. During the year the charity was an Associated Institution of the University of Surrey. The University validated some of the charity's educational courses. In February 2010 Kingston University accredited our MSc programme as part of our planned transfer of accreditation from University of Surrey to Kingston University. The accreditation by University of Surrey expires on 31 August 2010. The charity is in receipt of funding from the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills to raise and maintain standards in life and retirement planning.

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES; ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

In April 2004 the Trustees conducted a strategic review of the charity. They concluded that the need for the provision of education, planning and support services for those preparing for retirement had never been greater and the charity had knowledge and expertise that should be made available more widely. The Trustees approved the Business Plan in February 2005 that used the Trustee's review as the basis and recognised the demographic drivers of change and the changing nature of retirement, retirement planning, pensions and work for older workers

The Business Plan set out a strategy to broaden the range of activities in which the charity was engaged to reflect these changes, to raise the profile and reach of the charity so that more individuals would benefit from its knowledge and expertise, and to achieve the necessary increase in income to provide financial stability for the charity 2009/2010 was the fifth year of the new strategy

In order to reflect the broader range of work on which the charity was engaged the Trustees determined the charity should adopt the new working title of Life Academy. The new working title was adopted in November 2005

The Trustees reviewed the Business Plan and overall strategy in November 2006 and February 2007. The Trustees concluded that the broad strategy and philosophy of the Business Plan remain valid and intact and that going forward the key activity was to raise the brand awareness and profile of Life Academy and continue to grow our activities and income. For 2009/10 the Trustees set a Budget that sought to retain a neutral cash position over the year.

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The long term financial objective of the 2005 Business Plan was to increase unrestricted income fourfold over a three to five year period so that total income reached some £½ million. This objective was achieved in 2008/09. At that stage the "credit crunch" had not seriously impacted on the charity. During 2009/10 however we felt the impact of the recession. Employers reduced discretionary expenditure and the financial services sector with which we have strong relationships was particularly under pressure. Never was the need for our services greater and never was the ability of clients to pay for it lower. In addition to the pressures from the recession we also felt the impact of reductions in government expenditure. These reductions have of course continued at an increased pace in the current financial year as the Coalition. Government addressed the public sector deficit. It was not surprising the income of the charity fell back during 2009/10 and it was against this background that the Board of Trustees held a strategic "away day" in January 2010 to consider the strategic direction of the charity. A sub group of Trustees volunteered to specifically help with the consideration of our strategic options and this work continues.

During the year we continued to deliver the post graduate programme in Mid Life, Pre-Retirement and Life Planning and we were grateful to the Department for Business, Innovation, and Skills for their continued support. We also delivered open and in-house pre-retirement and retirement planning courses. In addition to meeting the needs of our own expanding client base we worked in partnership with Friends Provident, Standard Life, Punter Southall, Aon Consulting and Farnham Castle. We were pleased to extend our relationship to include AXA who are to introduce a programme of seminars in 2010/11, and Hays Career Transitions with whom we shall also be working in 2010/11.

As a result of our involvement with the Department of Business, Innovation and Skills learning Revolution we have arranged to deliver pre-retirement courses through Kent Adult Education Services and Morley College. These are included in the 2010/11 academic year and we hope these courses will enable us to deliver to individuals who would not otherwise benefit. At the end of the 2009/10 financial year the development with Friends Provident of an on-line pre-retirement course was completed. This is an exciting development that opens up the possibility for more individuals to benefit from pre-retirement education. It is particularly suitable for very large employers who are not able to provide face to face courses and employers with dispersed workforce. Early indications are that the course has been well received in the market place.

Our relationship with The Oddfellows has grown. We had a positive response to the holistic retirement concept during the testing phase in 2009/10. A trade association and pension provider are piloting the service with the intention of including it as a part of their portfolio of services to their members.

We were pleased to win funding from HMRC to continue the development of the electronic tax support network for guidance and advice staff in the voluntary sector and to run tax workshops for a further 160 staff and volunteers in the voluntary sector providing advice and guidance to their end users. The outcome of the tax workshops was very satisfactory. The evaluation again showed there was a lack of knowledge and understanding of tax issues and only a very small minority of advisers believing they could provide effective support to their end users on taxation issues. As a result of the workshops the knowledge and understanding of participants increased significantly. Before the workshops 24% had a good or very good understanding of the 10 taxation issues whereas after the workshops 87% had a good or very good understanding and 85% felt well or very well equipped to support their end users compared with 19% at the commencement of the workshop

## REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

We completed the first stage of the commission from BIS to take forward the pre-retirement work from the two 2009 White Papers "The Learning Revolution" and "Building a Society for all Ages"

During the year we started work with Careers Development Group to enhance the resilience, self esteem and status of long term unemployed adults so that they were better able to approach the labour market. This went well and has now become a regular ongoing input

At the end of 2009/10 we learned that a bid to the European Social Fund was successful. We will be working on a project with Polish and Italian partners to export our knowledge of the difficulties faced by workers aged 50+ in finding work and how they can more effectively approach the labour market. The project is based in the Greater Poland region where the unemployment rate for 50+ workers is 30%.

We worked with the social services professionals at the Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea to research and develop a financial education workbook for those in receipt of personal budgets. This task is continuing into 2010/11 and should be finished in the Autumn of 2010. A project we started with Standard Life will also come to fruition later in 2010. This is entitled "Everyone needs a Plan" and illustrates the need for everyone to have a life and financial plan.

#### RISK MANAGEMENT

The Board of Trustees undertakes periodic reviews of the major risks which face the charity major part of the General Fund is required to finance the premises from which the charity conducts its affairs, so the level of its remaining free General Funds calls for regular review A major source of its funds is from the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills for the training and development activities, this grant is subject to a review by them each year

## FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR

The financial outcome for the year reflected the recessionary headwinds that the charity experienced and the tighter financial conditions in Government funding for the voluntary sector and in the financial services sector. Our income fell back some 20% and this resulted in an excess of expenditure over income. The deficit however was contained and broadly within our amortisation and depreciation so that we were broadly cash neutral.

The investments of the charity made gains following the rise in the stock market and there was an unrealised gain for the year on investments of £6,134 on Unrestricted Funds and there was an unrealised gain for the year on investments of £7,705 on Restricted Funds. In accordance with the SORP, the amount of the Designated Reserve for Fixed Assets has been increased by a transfer of £2,118 from the General Fund to provide a total deficit of £5,787. The amount remaining to be carried forward on the General Fund becomes a surplus of £8,088.

#### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

It is with sadness that we record the death of Professor Alastair Heron who made a generous bequest to the charity during this lifetime. The Board of Trustees decided that the amount available from the Alastair Heron Endowment Fund should be used as part of the "matched funding" for the European projects to research intergenerational working amongst nurses in the health sector and to research an age diversity tool-kit programme

On restricted funds there was no balance to be carried forward

## **RESERVES POLICY**

The Board of Trustees has reviewed its policy on reserves to be held. In broad terms it wishes to generate reserves firstly to cover the capital payment terms, over time, of its property mortgage and then to have cover for some six to nine months operating expenses. However during the strategic review it was recognised that the value of the property was an asset which could support the funding of the increased level of activity and the Trustees subsequently adopted the policy.

#### **TRUSTEES**

The directors of the Charitable Company are its Trustees for the purpose of Charity Law The Trustees Report is therefore also a Directors Report under Section 417 of the Companies Act 2006. If continuing in office, the Trustees come forward every third year for re-election at the Annual General Meeting. New trustees are nominated by the existing Board of Trustees, though there is a right for two members of the Association to propose a person as a Trustee, having given due notice thereof

The members of the Board of Trustees for the period under review are listed on Page 2 of these Financial Statements

The Trustees retiring by rotation are Mr S Baynes, Mr A Bennet, Mr T Crossley and Ms A Munro who, being eligible, offer themselves for re-election

The Trustees received no remuneration other than expenses incurred on the business of the Charity Expenses reimbursed to Trustees are reported in Note 4 to the accompanying Financial Statement

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## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2010

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 1 1 BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified to include the revaluation of freehold property and investments. Freehold property is now shown at valuation as the Trustees consider that this reflects the current value of the property. The accounts are prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

#### 1 2 FUNDS

The PRA received grants towards specific courses and projects which are treated as restricted funds

The PRA received a donation from Professor Alastair Heron, which now forms the Expendable Endowment "Alastair Heron Research Fund" The donation of £20,000 is held in the F & C Stewardship Growth Accumulation Fund and the Trustees may from time to time realise amounts from income or gains in the valuation of the units, to fund the participation of the PRA in research projects which are not otherwise fully funded. In the year to 31 March 2010, the Fund was utilised in partially funding two European projects for an amount of £7,322 and after investment income of £437 and unrealised gains of £7,705, the balance carried forward on the fund was £22,877.

In accordance with the latest SORP, the balance held in General Funds, is subdivided as follows -

- 1 Designated Reserve Fixed Assets and Revaluation This is comprised of the net book value based on historic costs of the intangible and tangible assets, held in goodwill, re-branding costs, property and equipment The property is shown at the revaluation less the total sum outstanding at the balance sheet date on the mortgage for the property. The surplus on revaluation is shown in the Revaluation Reserve.
- 2 General fund. This being the remainder of that fund that has not been utilised for the designated reserve

The PRA reviews all incoming resources to determine whether any funds should be treated as restricted

#### 1 3 INCOMING RESOURCES

Grants are received from Government departments to provide funds for specific purposes and projects. These are accounted for on an accruals basis

Donations represent income for specific projects and general purposes. This is accounted for on a received basis

Incoming resources from training courses, projects and the sale of publications is accounted for on an accruals basis

Annual income on licence fees for the use of our materials is recognised immediately when invoiced, as this reflects the up front work and benefit to the client from the outset

Subscriptions from members are accounted for on an accruals basis

Any income received in advance is shown within deferred income

Investment income represents interest received on cash held on deposit and dividends receivable, including recoverable income Tax on listed investments. This is accounted for on a receivable basis.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2010

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **14 RESOURCES EXPENDED**

Costs expended on Charitable activities is analysed as follows

- 1 Training courses and projects, represents the direct costs incurred on running the courses and projects and is accounted for on an accruals basis
- 2 Support costs, representing the cost of the staff supporting the work on training courses and projects, together with the related costs of accommodation and services. Where costs need to be allocated between 'Support' and 'Governance costs' it has been done on the basis of the respective estimated staff time. Support costs allocated to restricted funds has been done in accordance with the terms agreed with the provider of the funds. The expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis.
- 3 Governance costs, represents those costs which can be directly related thereto, together with its share of allocated costs on the basis explained above. The expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis.

#### 1 5 INTANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS -

#### Re-branding

In 2005 the Board of Trustees feit that the current name did not fairly represent the wide range of activities carned out by the Pre-Retirement Association. Approval was given to appoint a firm of marketing consultants to recommend a name more in accordance with the range of activities and to produce a new logo and design templates. The re-branding costs of £53,395 incurred during the year ended 31 March 2006 also included legal costs to protect the title and the design costs of a web site in the new brand. The Trustees agreed to write off the total cost over five years.

#### 1 6 TANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

The freehold premises is shown at valuation following a professional valuation given in July 2006 with an estimated market value of £315,000. Other fixed assets are shown at cost less accumulated depreciation

It is the firm and clear policy of the PRA not to provide financial advice. The cost of the policy for the year 2010 was £731. (2009. £719)
