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# Directors' report for the year ended 31 March 2019

NSK Europe Limited (the Company) is a company domiciled and incorporated in the United Kingdom. It is a private Limited Company with its shares being 100% held by NSK Limited. The Group for the year ended 31 March 2019 comprise the Company and its subsidiaries and the Group's interest in an associate company (together referred to as the Group, see note 24 of the consolidated financial statements).

The directors present below their report, the Strategic report, the audited consolidated financial statements of the Group and the Company financial statements for the year-ended 31 March 2019. The following matters are reported upon in the Strategic report: financial risk management, employee involvement, disabled employees and future developments.

#### Principal activities and business review

The principal activity of the Group is to manufacture and sell standard, special and precision bearings and components to the automotive and engineering industries in the United Kingdom and overseas. The principal activity of the Company is the same as the Group and also to provide management and financial services to NSK Europe Limited group companies in the Europe, Middle East, and Africa region ("EMEA"). It also bears the cost of the majority of the technical and development activities undertaken by the group.

The Group and Company holds a provision of €15.7 million (2018: €21.0 million) in respect of litigation and other legal matters. The provision represents the Group's best estimate of the potential liabilities associated with the claims taking into account the circumstances, uncertainties and many complexities of each case and the final amount might be materially different from this provision. Further details are set out in Note 20 of the Group Financial Statements and note 13 of the Company accounts.

During the year, weaknesses were identified in the control environment of the UK manufacturing plants, affecting a number of areas of accounting. Following identification of this, Management have strengthened the control environment and corrected the accounting to ensure the accurate reporting of results in the Financial Statements. This process included using an external firm to investigate the issue and to make control improvement recommendations as necessary. A restatement of €5.2 million has been booked to the financial position as at 31 March 2018. Additionally, a further €4.5 million correction has been adjusted in 2019 as it could not accurately be attributed to any one period (Note 31). No material adjustments were necessary to the financial position as at 31 March 2017.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. In preparing the financial statements, the directors are required to:

- state whether applicable IFRSs as adopted by the European Union have been followed for the group financial statements and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, comprising FRS 102, have been followed for the company financial statements, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the group and company will continue in business.

The directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the group and company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the group and company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the group and company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006.

# Strategic report for the year ended 31 March 2019

#### **Review of the Business**

Revenue for the year was €1,023.4 million (2018: €1,067.4 million). Profit before tax was €52.5 million (2018: €46.9 million - restated). The operating profit was €52.7 million (2018: €47.7 million - restated). Revenue and operating profit are considered to be the Group's key performance indicators. Trading conditions in Europe were difficult amidst a Global economic slowdown, trade policy uncertainty and stricter emissions regulations. The year was characterised by significant volume reductions especially in the Automotive business. The negative impact was partially offset by improved product mix and price increases resulting in a net reduction in revenue of €44.0 million.

Operating profit increased in the year from €47.7 million (restated) to €52.7 million. There were some key drivers to this performance:

- Volume, mix and price increases resulted in a more or less neutral performance year on year.
- Pension expenses: During the financial year the total pension cost recognised by the Group was €7.7 million compared with a charge of €14.8 million in the prior year (see Note 28). The current year charge consisted primarily of a charge for guaranteed minimum pension "GMP", the prior year charge largely consisted of the cost of the Enhanced Transfer Value ("ETV") exercise.
- The Group was positively impacted, compared with the prior year, by the price of finished goods from its parent entity NSK Limited due to the value of the Yen versus the Euro at the point prices are set. The positive impact year on year was estimated at €8.1 million
- There was a decrease in provisions for liabilities with a current year charge of €1.1 million (2018: €7.9 million).
- Wage inflation, particularly in the Polish plants, impacted the Group. The increase in staff costs year on year was €8.4 million (Note 8).
- A prior year adjustment of €5.2 million was required to correct certain balance sheet accounts(see note 31).
- The underlying performance reflect a deterioration in the results of the Group's Automotive Bearings business due to a combination of lower margin new business and increased plant costs.

The positive and negative factors above resulted in the increase to operating profits achieved in the year.

For the next financial year it is expected that the operating profit will be much more challenging particularly in the Automotive sectors due to a slowdown in demand, particularly in China and Germany. We would expect a reduced level of profitability compared with the current year.

The net assets of the Group at the end of the year were €362.0 million (2018: €331.2 million - restated).

#### Prior year misstatement

During the year, weaknesses were identified in the control environment of the UK manufacturing plants, affecting a number of areas of accounting. Following identification of this, Management have strengthened the control environment and corrected the accounting to ensure the accurate reporting of results in the Financial Statements. This process included using an external firm to investigate the issue and to make control improvement recommendations as necessary. A restatement of €5.2 million has been booked to the financial position as at 31 March 2018. Additionally, a further €4.5 million correction has been adjusted in 2019 as it could not accurately be attributed to any one period (Note 31). No material adjustments were necessary to the financial position as at 31 March 2017.

#### Strategy

The Group's long-term objective is to achieve sustainable growth. To reach this goal the focus continues to be on further strengthening its product offering and manufacturing capabilities, and fully utilising its technological strengths and resources. In particular the expansion of manufacturing in Europe is important. The Group continues to look to expanding its activities by focussing on new applications that address the advance of automotive technology, and developing industrial sales in emerging markets and in growth sectors.

#### Principal risks and uncertainties

The Group's senior management team, the Operating Committee, meet formally on a monthly basis to review the performance and status of each business unit and of the Group as a whole. Additionally, the Board of Directors has established three formal sub committees as below:

- the Risk and Audit Committee to oversee risk and audit activities in Europe and to support
  the initiatives of the Internal Audit Department of the Group;
- the Compliance and Ethics Committee to ensure the Group operates to the highest ethical business standards and in compliance with applicable laws and regulations; and
- the Security Management Committee to ensure the confidentiality, integrity and availability of its information assets and those of its partners.

As from September 2018 the Security Management Committee was merged into the Risk and Audit Committee. The principal risks and uncertainties facing the Group are financial risk (considered in more detail below), competitive risk from other manufacturers and more generally but importantly, from the prevailing economic environment in Europe.

#### Financial and Business risk management

The Group's operations expose it to a variety of financial risks that include foreign currency exchange rates, price risk, credit risk, liquidity risk and interest rate cash flow risk. These risks and the sensitivity to rate changes are disclosed in note 29 "Financial Instruments" of the Group financial statements. #### Research and development activity

Research and development continues to play a vital role in the Group's success. The Group is engaged in research and development activities designed to develop new products, improve quality and performance and to maintain and improve product competitiveness and profitability. The costs of the research and development activity are borne by the Company.

#### **Future developments**

The directors aim to maintain and improve the Group's strength of putting quality at the forefront of its offering. The business environment for the foreseeable future is expected to remain uncertain, with demand from both the industrial machinery business and automotive business to be sluggish. At the same time, we are expecting production for several new car models to start in the automotive business and also production to commence at the new production site in Morocco for the automotive component business. Overall, there will be more focus on recovering profitability of the business and improving cash flow.

### **Employee involvement**

The Group systematically provides employees with information on matters of concern to them, consulting them or their representatives regularly, so that their views can be taken into account when making decisions that are likely to affect their interests. Employee involvement in the Group is encouraged, as achieving a common awareness on the part of all employees of the financial and economic factors affecting the group plays a major role in maintaining its performance. The Group encourages the involvement of employees by means of continuous improvement teams and regular communication activities.

## Disabled employees

The Group is committed to employment policies which follow best practice, based on equal opportunities for all employees, irrespective of sex, race, colour, disability or marital status. The Group gives full and fair consideration to applications for employment for disabled persons, having regard to their particular aptitudes and abilities. Appropriate arrangements are made for the continued employment and training, career development and promotion of disabled persons employed by the group. If members of staff become disabled the Group continues employment, either in the same or an alternative position, with appropriate retraining being given if necessary.

### **Environmental policy**

The Group has a well-established environmental policy, setting out its environmental objectives and commitment to progress towards environmental excellence. The emphasis is on continuous improvement of environmental performance, utilising Total Quality Management as the key methodological tool. The philosophy underpinning this approach is one of "Cradle-to-Grave" focus.

This entails influencing suppliers and sub-contractors to adopt sound environmental management practices, working on an environmental partnership basis with the Group's customers and taking account of environmental impacts throughout the total life-cycle of its product range.

### 1. Summary of significant accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies and estimation techniques is set out below.

#### Basis of accounting

NSK Europe Limited (the Company) is a company domiciled and incorporated in England. The Group financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019 comprise the Company and its subsidiaries and the Group's interest in an associate company (together referred to as the Group, see note 24 of the consolidated financial statements).

The financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and applicable International Financial Reporting Standards, as adopted by the European Union.

The Company accounts are prepared in accordance with FRS 102 the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland and details of the Company accounts, notes to the accounts and principal accounting policies are set out on pages 68 to 87.

These financial statements have been prepared on an accounting basis consistent with that applied in the financial year ended 31 March 2018.

The Group's trading is predominantly within Europe and the company uses the Euro as its functional currency. The financial statements have been prepared using the Euro. The exchange rate of the Euro to Sterling at 31 March 2019 was 1.17 (2018: 1.14). The average during 2019 was 1.13 (2018: 1.13).

#### **Basis of consolidation**

The Group financial statements incorporate the financial statements of NSK Europe Limited and entities controlled by the Company and its subsidiaries. Control is achieved when the Group:

- has power over the investee;
- is exposed, or has rights, to variable returns from its involvement with the investee; and
- has the ability to use its power to affect its returns.

Consolidation of a subsidiary begins when the Group obtains control over the subsidiary and ceases when the Group loses control of the subsidiary.

All intragroup assets and liabilities, equity, income, expenses and cash flows relating to transaction between members of the Group are eliminated on consolidation.

There have been no acquisitions or disposals since the date of transition to IFRS.

#### Statement of compliance

The Group financial statements have been prepared in accordance with IFRS as adopted for use in the EU.

# Notes to the Group financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

### 1. Summary of significant accounting policies - continued

#### Revenue

Revenue, which arises wholly from the Group's principal activity of the manufacture and sale of bearings and components, represents the invoiced value of goods and services sold, exclusive of trade discounts and value added tax.

Revenue is recognised when the significant risk and reward of ownership has transferred to the customer based on the contract terms.

#### Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is stated at historic purchase cost net of accumulated depreciation and any provision for impairment. Cost includes the original purchase price of the fixed asset and the costs attributable to bringing the fixed asset to its working condition for its intended use. Once an asset has been brought into use its cost, less estimated residual value, is depreciated over its expected useful life.

Assets are written off over the following periods:

Residual value is calculated on prices prevailing at the date of acquisition.

### Intangible assets

Research costs are expensed in the income statement as incurred. Development expenditures, on an individual project, are recognised as an intangible asset when the Group can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that it will be available for use or sale.
- Its intention to complete and its ability to use or sell the asset.
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits.
- The availability of resources to complete the asset.
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development.

## 1. Summary of significant accounting policies – continued

#### Intangible assets - continued

Subsequent to initial recognition, internally generated intangible assets are reported at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses.

An intangible asset is derecognised on disposal, or where no future economic benefits are expected from use or disposal. No items were derecognised in either the year ended 31 March 2019 or 31 March 2018.

Intangible assets are written off over the following periods:

Capitalised software

between 5 and 10 years

Amortisation is charged to Administration expenses.

#### Investment in an associate

An associate is an entity over which the Group has significant influence. Significant influence is the power to participate in the financial and operating policy decisions of the investee but is not control or joint control over those policies.

In the Group financial statements the investments in associates is accounted for using the equity method. The consolidated profit and loss account includes the Group's share of associates' profits less losses, while the Group's share of the net assets of the associates is shown in the consolidated balance sheet.

#### **Inventories**

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes all costs incurred in bringing each product to its present location and condition as follows:

Raw materials & stores:

Purchase cost on an average basis.

Work in progress and finished goods:

Costs of direct materials and labour plus attributable

overheads based on a normal level of activity on an average basis.

Net realisable value is based on estimated selling price less any further costs expected to be incurred to completion and disposal.

Provision is also made, where necessary, for slow moving and obsolete stock.

#### Foreign currency

In the financial statements of individual undertakings, transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded in their functional currency at the actual exchange rate as of the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the year-end are reported at the rates of exchange prevailing at the year-end. Any gain or loss arising from a change in exchange rates subsequent to the date of the transaction is included as an exchange gain or loss in the profit and loss account. The results of operations whose financial statements are not drawn up in the local currency of the company are translated at the average rates of exchange during the period and their balance sheets at the rates ruling at the balance sheet date. Exchange differences arising on translation of the opening net assets and results of such operations are dealt with through reserves.

## 1. Summary of significant accounting policies - continued

#### **Taxation**

Corporation tax payable is provided on taxable profits at the current rate. The Group's current tax is calculated using tax rates that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the end of the reporting period.

The taxation liabilities of certain group companies are reduced wholly or in part by the surrender of losses by fellow Group companies. The tax benefits or charges arising from the group relief are recognised in the financial statements of the surrendering or recipient companies.

#### **Deferred taxation**

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date, where transactions or events that result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future or a right to pay less tax in the future have occurred at the balance sheet date.

Deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that the directors consider that it is more likely than not there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Deferred tax is measured at the average tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis.

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of the retained earnings of overseas subsidiaries only to the extent that, at the balance sheet date, dividends have been accrued as receivable or a binding agreement to distribute past earnings in future periods has been entered into by the subsidiary.

### Retirement benefit obligation

The Group is party to an arrangement whereby one externally managed defined benefit pension scheme is operated for its United Kingdom employees. This scheme was closed to future benefit accrual on the 31 December 2016, with participating members transferred to the Group's defined contribution arrangements. In addition, there are a further three defined benefit schemes operated in Poland providing one off retirement bonuses for employees, and further defined benefit schemes in Germany, France and the Netherlands.

Defined benefit pension scheme liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit basis, discounted at the interest rate applicable to high-quality corporate bonds of the same currency and term as the liabilities. Scheme assets are measured at their fair value. Any surplus or deficit of scheme assets over liabilities is recognised in the balance sheet as an asset or deficit. An asset is only recognised to the extent that the surplus can be recovered through reduced contributions in the future or through refunds from the scheme. Scheme assets are held separately from those of the company in independently administered funds for the Group's primary scheme in the United Kingdom and in the form of an insurance contract with a third-party provider in the case of Germany and the Netherlands.

# Notes to the Group financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

### 1. Summary of significant accounting policies - continued

#### Retirement benefit obligation - continued

The current service costs and any past service costs are charged to the profit and loss account within administrative expenses – staff costs. The expected return on scheme assets less the unwinding of the discount on the scheme liabilities is included in finance costs. Foreign exchange gains or losses arising on schemes held in a currency other than the functional currency of the entity are included in finance income or costs as either an income or expense. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

For the defined contribution schemes, the cost of providing benefits is charged to operating profit as incurred.

#### Leases

The group enters into operating leases. Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Please see page 27 "New standards, amendments and interpretations" for the future accounting treatment of leases.

#### Financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are recognised when the Group becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

The Group has the following classifications of financial assets and liabilities:

### (i) Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables (including trade and other receivables, cash and cash equivalents and loans to related parties) are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### (ii) Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised financial cost of a financial liability and allocating interest expense over the relevant period.

#### Research and development

Research and development expenditure is written off in the year of expenditure, unless the costs meet the criteria to be capitalised as discussed above in intangible assets.

# Notes to the Group financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

### 1. Summary of significant accounting policies - continued

#### **Provisions**

Provision for litigation and other legal matters, reorganisation and environmental restoration are recognised when: the Group has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events; it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation; and the amount has been reliability estimated.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in a settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

Provisions are measured at the present value of the expenditures expected to be required to settle the obligation.

#### Assets classified as held for sale

Non-current assets are classified as held for sale if their carrying amount will be recovered principally through a sale transaction rather than through continuing use and a sale is considered highly probable. They are measured at the lower of their carrying amount and fair value less costs to sell. An impairment loss is recognised for any initial or subsequent write-down of the asset to fair value less costs to sell. A gain is recognised for any subsequent increases in fair value less costs to sell of an asset, but not in excess of any cumulative impairment loss previously recognised. A gain or loss not previously recognised by the date of the sale of the non-current asset (or disposal group) is recognised at the date of de-recognition.

### Segmental information

Certain segmental information is presented in note 3 of these Financial Statements. Further detailed segmental discourse is available in the consolidated financial statements of NSK Limited, the ultimate parent company NSK Europe Limited is a wholly owned subsidiary of NSK Overseas Holdings Company Limited and consequently is exempt from the requirements of IFRS 8 Operating segments.

### Prior year misstatement

Where a material prior year adjustment is identified the Group will restate the prior year financial statements as required. A prior year misstatement was identified for the year ended 31 March 2019 as explained on page 7 in the Strategic Report and in note 31 of these Financial Statements.

# Notes to the Group financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

## 1. Summary of significant accounting policies – continued

#### New standards, amendments and interpretations

No new standards, amendments or interpretations, effective for the first time for the financial year beginning on or after 1 April 2017 have had a material impact on the Group. The following standards and interpretations have been issued but have not yet been applied:

#### IFRS 16 Leases

This standard is effective for accounting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2019 and as such will be applicable to the Group for the year ended 31 March 2020. IFRS 16 'Leases' addresses the definition of a lease. A key change arising from IFRS 16 is that most operating leases will be accounted for on the balance sheet for lessees as an asset with an associated financing liability. The effect on the Group was to increase the value of Right to Use Assets and Financing Liabilities by €18.0 million on 1 April 2019. The transition method used by the Group was the modified retrospective approach, meaning prior periods were not impacted by this change but rather there is an opening adjustment to assets and liabilities on the date of adoption. The effect of this standard on the Group's profit and loss is insignificant.

### 2. Critical accounting judgements and estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the Group's consolidated financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in future periods.

#### **Judgements**

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, management has made the following judgments, which have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the consolidated financial statements.

#### Retirement benefit obligation

The cost of defined benefit pension plans and the present value of the pension obligation are determined using actuarial valuations. An actuarial valuation involves making various assumptions which may differ from actual developments in the future. These include the determination of the discount rate, future salary increases, mortality rates and future pension increases. Due to the complexity of the valuation, the underlying assumptions and its long-term nature, a defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to changes in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date. The assumptions adopted reflect historical experience and current trends. Further details about the assumptions used are given in note 28.

The United Kingdom defined benefit plan was closed to future benefit accrual on 31 December 2016.

Additionally there is a risk Increases in pension liability due to GMP Equalisation being applied to transferred out members (Note 28).

# Notes to the Group financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

### 2. Critical accounting judgements and estimation uncertainty - continued

Development costs

Development costs are capitalised as intangible assets in accordance with the accounting policy in note 1. Initial capitalisation of costs is based on management's judgment that technological and economic feasibility is confirmed, usually when a product development project has reached a defined milestone according to an established project management model. In determining the amounts to be capitalised, management makes assumptions regarding the expected future cash generation of the project, discount rates to be applied and the expected period of benefits. At 31 March 2019, the carrying amount of capitalised development costs was €9.7 million (2018: €10.5 million).

The main project capitalised was an internally developed sales and inventory management system "RAS" and the implementation of the Oracle General Ledger at the Company, sales entities and UK manufacturing plants. Future expenditure will be undertaken on the Oracle General Ledger to be rolled out to the Polish manufacturing entity.

#### Useful economic lives of tangible assets

The annual depreciation charge for property, plant and equipment is sensitive to changes in the estimated useful economic lives and residual value of the assets. The bulk of the Group's capital expenditure is incurred at the plants and is depreciated in accordance with NSK Limited's accounting policy of 9 years for Automotive Components and 12 years for Industrial and Automotive Bearings. However, the appropriateness of the charge is assessed regularly and adjusted where necessary.

# Inventory provisioning

The Group manufactures and sells standard, special and precision bearings and components to the automotive and engineering industries. As a result it is necessary to consider the recoverability of the cost of inventory and the associated provisioning required.

The inventory provisions for slow moving or obsolete stock and net realisable value are first of all calculated automatically by RAS by reference to latest sales prices, quantity of inventory held, historic sales made and forecast orders. The detailed line by line provisions are then reviewed each month by the relevant business unit managers who assess whether the provisions are adequate or overstated based on additional information they will have.

### Impairment of debtors

The Group makes an estimate of the recoverable value of trade and other debtors. When assessing the impairment of trade and other debtors, management considers factors including the current credit rating of the debtor, the ageing profile of debtors and historical experience. At the end of every reporting quarter the adequacy of the bad debt provision has to be formally confirmed by the relevant senior finance manager responsible.

# Notes to the Group financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

## 2. Critical accounting judgements and estimation uncertainty - continued

Taxes

Uncertainties exist with respect to the interpretation of complex tax regulations, changes in tax laws, and the amount and timing of future taxable income. Given the wide range of international business relationships and the long-term nature and complexity of existing contractual agreements, differences arising between the actual results and the assumptions made, or future changes to such assumptions, could necessitate future adjustments to tax income and expense already recorded. The Group establishes provisions, based on reasonable estimates, for possible consequences of audits by the tax authorities of the respective counties in which it operates. The amount of such provisions is based on various factors, such as experience of previous tax audits and differing interpretations of tax regulations by the taxable entity and the responsible tax authority.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all unused tax losses to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the losses can be utilised. Significant management judgment is required to determine the amount of deferred tax assets that can be recognised, based upon the likely timing and the level of future taxable profits together with future tax planning strategies. The Group has tax loss carry forwards amounting to €51.5 million (2018: €37.0 million) which have not been recognised as the Group does not consider that is probable they can be used.

#### Rebates and other sales provisions

The Group has contractual arrangement with many of its major customers which require rebates to be paid should certain conditions be met. The Group can use RAS to estimate some elements of the provision required but uncertainties exist over the timing and likelihood of future orders which could materially impact the assessment made. As at 31 March 2019 the accrual held for rebates and price adjustments was €6.0 million (2018: €6.2 million).

# Provision for litigation and other legal matters

The Group holds a provision for the settlement of litigation and other legal matters in the amount of €15.7 million (2018: €21.0 million) – note 20 of the Group financial statements. The provision represents the company's best estimate of the potential liabilities associated with such claims taking into account the circumstances, uncertainties and many complexities of each case and the final amount might be materially different from this provision. The primary uncertainty relates to the population of customers who may or may not claim.

## Capitalised upfront payments

The Group capitalises upfront payments paid to a customer when it is has been made demonstrably in respect of future business and is not in respect of a distinct good or service. Where such amounts are not refundable the amounts capitalised are reviewed to ensure there has been no impairment of the underlying contract, as the impairment review is based on assumption relating to future sales it is uncertain in nature. As at 31 March 2019 the value of upfront payments capitalised and non-refundable was €0.5 million (2018: €1.5 million). However, this value is expected to rise materially during the course of the next financial year.

#### c. Financial risk management objectives

The Group's operations expose it to a variety of financial risks that include market risk (including foreign currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk), credit risk and liquidity risk. The Group, in conjunction with the treasury department of its ultimate holding company, has in place a risk management programme that seeks to limit the adverse effects on the financial performance of the Group from such risks.

Given the size of the Group, the directors have not delegated the responsibility of monitoring financial risk management to a sub-committee of the Board. The policies set by the Board of directors are implemented by the Group's finance department. The department has a policy that sets out specific guidelines to manage foreign exchange risk, interest rate risk and credit risk, and circumstances where it would be appropriate to use financial derivative instruments to manage these. However, no such derivative instruments were used in the current or prior year.

#### d. Market risk

The Group's operations expose it primarily to the financial risks of changes in foreign currency rates (page 60 & 61) and interest rates (page 61).

The Group is also exposed to commodity price risk as a result of its operations. However, given the size of the Group's operations, the costs of managing exposure to commodity price risk through the use of hedging would exceed any potential benefits. The directors will revisit the appropriateness of this policy should the Group's operations change in size or nature.

There has been no significant change to the Group's exposure to market risks or the manner in which these risks are managed.

#### e. Foreign currency risk management

The Group monitors its exposure in conjunction with the treasury department of its ultimate holding company.

In management's opinion, the sensitivity analysis is representative of the inherent foreign exchange risk in the business.

### f. Interest rate risk management

The Group draws down on available facilities, on a short-term basis, and these loans are provided on a floating rate basis. These loans are refreshed during the year depending on currency requirements (see note 19).

Additionally the Group has a long-term loan at a rate of 0.40%, maturing in January 2020.

The Group believes the mix between long-term and short-term borrowing is appropriate and does not currently engage in interest rate swaps or hedges.

#### Interest rate sensitivity analysis

The sensitivity analyses below have been determined on the exposure to interest rate for the non-derivative instruments at the end of the reporting year. For floating rate liabilities, the analysis is prepared assuming the amount of liability outstanding at the end of the reporting year was outstanding for the whole year. A 50 basis point increase or decrease is used when reporting interest rate risk internally to key management personnel and represents management's assessment of the reasonably possible change in interest rates.

If interest rates had been 50 basis points higher / lower and all other variables were held constant, the Group's:

- Profit for the year ended 31 March 2019 would decrease / increase by €421,000 (2018: €431,000).
- Other comprehensive income would not be impacted.

### g. Credit risk management

Credit risk is the risk that counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Group. We have a policy of only dealing with creditworthy counterparties. We regularly monitor our exposures and the credit ratings of our counterparties, and the aggregate value of transactions concluded is spread amongst approved counterparties.

Trade receivables consist of a large number of customers spread over EMEA. We carry out ongoing credit evaluation on the financial condition of accounts receivable.

#### 1. General information

#### Company

NSK Europe Limited (the Company) is a company domiciled and incorporated in England. It is a private company limited by shares. The registered address is Belmont Place, Belmont Road, Maidenhead, SL6 6TB UK.

#### 2. Statement of compliance

The individual financial statements of NSK Europe Limited have been prepared in compliance with UK GAAP, including Financial Reporting Standard 102, "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Companies Act 2006, under the provision of the large and medium-sized Companies and Groups (Accounts and Reports) Regulation 2008 (SI 2008/410).

Under section 408 of the Companies Act 2006 the Company is exempt from the requirement to present its own Profit and Loss Account.

#### 3. Exemptions for qualifying entities under FRS 102

FRS 102 allows a qualifying entity certain disclosure exemptions, subject to certain conditions, which have been complied with, including notification of, and no objection to, the use of exemptions by the Company's shareholders.

The Company has taken advantage of the following exemptions:

- (i) From preparing a statement of cash flows, on the basis that it is a qualifying entity and the consolidated statement of cash flows, included in these financial statements, includes the Company's cash flows;
- (ii) From the financial instrument disclosures, required under FRS 102 paragraphs 11.39 and 11.48A and paragraphs 12.26 and 12.29, as the information is provided in the consolidated financial statements disclosures;
- (iii) From disclosing the Company key management personnel compensation, as required by FRS 102 paragraph 33.7.

#### Summary of significant accounting policies 4.

#### Revenue

Revenue, which arises wholly from the Company's principal activity of the manufacture and sale of bearings and components, represents the invoiced value of goods and services sold, exclusive of trade discounts and value added tax.

Revenue is recognised when the significant risk and reward of ownership has transferred to the customer based on the contract terms.

### **Tangible assets**

Tangible assets stated at historic purchase cost net of accumulated depreciation and any provision for impairment. Cost includes the original purchase price of the fixed asset and the costs attributable to bringing the fixed asset to its working condition for its intended use. Once an asset has been brought into use its cost, less estimated residual value, is depreciated over its expected useful life.

Residual value is calculated on prices prevailing at the date of acquisition.

#### **Inventories**

Inventories, which consist of finished goods, are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost includes all costs incurred in bringing each product to its present location and condition.

Net realisable value is based on estimated selling price less any further costs expected to be incurred to completion and disposal.

Provision is also made, where necessary, for slow moving and obsolete stock.

#### Foreign currency

In the financial statements of the Company, transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded in their functional currency (Euro) at the actual exchange rate as of the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the year-end are reported at the rates of exchange prevailing at the year-end. Any gain or loss arising from a change in exchange rates subsequent to the date of the transaction is included as an exchange gain or loss in the profit and loss account.

## 4. Summary of significant accounting policies - continued

#### Retirement benefit obligation

The Company is party to an arrangement whereby one externally managed defined benefit pension scheme is operated for its United Kingdom employees. This scheme was closed to future benefit accrual on the 31 December 2016, with participating members transferred to the Company's defined contribution arrangements.

Defined benefit pension scheme liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit basis, discounted at the interest rate applicable to high-quality corporate bonds of the same currency and term as the liabilities. Scheme assets are measured at their fair value. Any surplus or deficit of scheme assets over liabilities is recognised in the balance sheet as an asset or deficit. An asset is only recognised to the extent that the surplus can be recovered through reduced contributions in the future or through refunds from the scheme. Scheme assets are held separately from those of the company in independently administered funds for the group's primary scheme in the United Kingdom.

#### Intangible assets

Research costs are expensed in the income statement as incurred. Development expenditures, on an individual project, are recognised as an intangible asset when the Company can demonstrate:

- The technical feasibility of completing the intangible asset so that it will be available for use or sale.
- Its intention to complete and its ability to use or sell the asset.
- How the asset will generate future economic benefits.
- The availability of resources to complete the asset.
- The ability to measure reliably the expenditure during development.

Subsequent to initial recognition, internally generated intangible assets are reported at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses. An intangible asset is derecognised on disposal, or where no future economic benefits are expected from use or disposal. Intangible assets are written off over the following periods:

### Prior year adjustment

Where a material prior year adjustment is identified the Company will restate the prior year financial statements as required.

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

### 5. Critical accounting judgements and estimation uncertainty - continued

### Critical judgements in applying the entity's accounting policy

#### (i) Multi-employer defined pension scheme

Certain employees participate in a multi-employer defined benefit pension scheme with other companies in the UK. In the judgement of the directors, the Company can reasonably allocate plan assets and liabilities with the assistance of our actuaries. Accordingly, the scheme is accounted for as a defined benefit scheme.

### Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The Company makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are addressed below:

#### (ii) Retirement benefit obligation

The cost of the defined benefit pension plan and the present value of the pension obligation are determined using actuarial valuations. An actuarial valuation involves making various assumptions which may differ from actual developments in the future. These include the determination of the discount rate, mortality rates and future pension increases. Due to the complexity of the valuation, the underlying assumptions and its long-term nature, a defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to changes in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date. This scheme was closed to future benefit accrual on the 31 December 2016, with participating members transferred to the Group's defined contribution arrangements. However, the underlying scheme assets and liabilities can still materially change.

The assumptions adopted reflect historical experience and current trends. See note 14 for the disclosures relating to the defined benefit pension scheme.

#### (iii) Inventory provisioning

The Company sells standard, special and precision bearings and components to the automotive and engineering industries via its subsidiary companies. As a result, it is necessary to consider the recoverability of the cost of inventory and the associated provisioning required. The inventory provisions for slow moving or obsolete stock and net realisable value are first of all calculated automatically by our inventory management system by reference to latest sales prices, quantity of inventory held, historic sales made and forecast orders. The detailed by line provisions are then reviewed each month by the relevant senior business unit managers who assess whether the provisions are adequate or overstated based on additional information they will have.

#### (iv) Provision for litigation and other legal matters

The Company holds a provision for settlement of litigation and other legal matters in the amount of €15.7 million (2018: €21.0 million) – note 13 of the Company financial statements. The provision represents the Company's best estimate of the potential liabilities associated with such claims taking into account the circumstances, uncertainties and many complexities of each case and the final amount might be materially different from this provision.
