### Directors' report

The directors present their report and the financial statements of the Group for the year ended 31 December 1995.

### Principal Activities and Review of the Business

The Group's principal activities during the year continued to be the provision of municipal services, industrial and commercial waste collection, and the recycling, treatment and disposal of waste, utilising both landfill and waste-to-energy incineration.

Trading continued to expand significantly with consolidated revenues of £110.2 million representing a most acceptable increase of 88% on 1994. Pre-tax profits, at £3.62 million excluding minority interests, also showed a satisfactory 41% increase.

Management attention within the Municipal & Commercial Services Division was primarily concentrated, during the first half of the year, on the starting-up and integration of the significant number of new contracts awarded to the Company towards the end of 1994 - these contracts covered not only the mainstream refuse collection and street cleansing activities, but also a number of multi-service externalisation operations, in which the Company maintained its market leadership position. The second half of the year saw an upturn in new business opportunities, as a result of which a further 15 contracts with annual turnover values in excess of £18 million were secured for commencement early in 1996.

The landfill disposal division also enjoyed a successful year's trading, with both Midland Land Reclamation Ltd and Shropshire Waste Management Ltd exceeding their forecast expectations. Prices remained firm throughout the year, and a slight increase in volumes led to revenues increasing by 12.3% from £9.2 million to £10.3 million - pre-tax profits showed a very healthy increase of 35.9%. Environmental legislation and public awareness continue to play a major role in the day-to-day management of the business and, in response, the division opened a new Environmental Office at Narborough in Leicestershire which includes a fully equipped in-house laboratory able to service both companies in the division.

The LondonWaste Ltd venture with North London Waste Authority, which commenced operations in December 1994, enjoyed a successful first year's trading, achieving its Business Plan in respect of both sales and profits. Considerable management effort was invested in preparation for retrofitting the Edmonton Solid Waste Incineration Plant in order to meet the IPR 5/3 emission control regulations by 1 December 1996. The relevant supply contracts were negotiated and placed during the year and work started in line with the prescribed programme.

## Directors' report (continued)

Looking to the future, the Board believes that opportunities for the Company to maintain its development will continue to be available. With more than 4000 employees, less than 8 years after its formation, SITA (GB) Ltd is now amongst the major public sector service organisations in the country. The dedication and professionalism of its management and staff have played, and continue to play a dominant role in that development - they are to be thanked and congratulated for those efforts.

#### Results and dividends

The results for the year ended 31 December 1995 are shown in the profit and loss account on page 8. The profit for the year after taxation and minority interests was £1,721,745 (1994: £1,266,667).

The directors recommend the payment of a dividend of £500,000 (1994: £148,000).

#### Post balance sheet events

In April 1996 a new subsidiary undertaking, Historic Property Restoration Limited, was set up. This company provides specialist maintenance and restoration services for historic properties.

In August 1996 the Group purchased Nene Valley Waste Limited and Quadron Services Limited.

Nene Valley Waste Limited is involved in the collection and disposal of waste.

Quadron Services Limited and its wholly-owned subsidiary, Quadron Rushmoor Limited are involved in the provision of municipal services.

#### Fixed assets

As part of the Group's expansion of its normal activities, significant purchases of plant have been made during the year. The movements are given in note 10 to the financial statements.

#### **Employees**

The Company's policy is to ensure the health and safety and welfare of everyone engaged in, or affected by its activities. Within the limitations of its business, the Company's policy is to engage disabled persons on standard terms of employment. Opportunities for career advancement are available to disabled persons.

The success of our business depends upon maintaining a highly qualified and well motivated work force and every effort is made to achieve a common awareness of the financial and economic factors affecting the performance of the Group.

Directors' Report

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 1995.

### **Review of the Business**

The company's principal activities are the acquisition and management of landfill sites, infilling and restoration.

1995 has been a challenging year with increasing environmental legislation and awareness becoming a major part of the day to day running of the business.

In response to this we have opened a new Environmental Office at Narborough Lodge, within which we now have our own in house laboratory.

Prices have remained firm throughout the year with volumes showing a slight increase.

Financial expectations of 1995 have been met, both in turnover and profit before tax.

#### Result and Dividends

The result for the period ended 31st December 1995 are shown in the profit and loss account on page 5. The profit after taxation for the year was £1,188,653 (1994: £1,156,664).

An interim dividend of £1,300,000 has been proposed (1994: £850,000).
