Annual Report of the Trustees

The members of the Board of Directors of Special Olympics Great Britain, present their annual report together with the audited accounts for the year ended 30th September 2003.

Objects and policies

The mission of Special Olympics is to provide year round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with a learning disability (mental handicap) giving them continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community.

Special Olympics is founded on the belief that people with learning disabilities can, with proper instruction and encouragement, learn, enjoy and benefit from participation in individual and team sports, adapted as necessary to meet the needs of those with special mental and physical limitations.

Special Olympics believes that consistent training, including physical conditioning and nutritional and health-related activities is essential to the development of sports skills, and that competition among those of equal abilities is the most appropriate means of testing these skills, measuring progress and providing incentives for personal growth.

Special Olympics believes that through sports training and competition, people with learning disability benefit physically, mentally, socially, and spiritually; families are strengthened; and the community at large, both through participation and observation, is united with people with learning disabilities in an environment of equality, respect and acceptance.

Special Olympics believes that every person with learning disabilities who is at least eight years old should have the opportunity to participate in and benefit from sports training and competition. Special Olympics also permits individual programmes to accept children from ages five to seven for training, although these children may not participate in Special Olympics competitions.

Organisation

Following the restructuring of the organisation in 2002, Special Olympics Great Britain continued to be governed by a Board of Directors (Trustees), most of whom have been appointed for their expertise in specific areas. They are joined by two representatives elected from the membership, and by an elected athlete. Reporting directly to the Board of Directors is the Leadership Council, which oversees the work of the Athletes, Families and Sports Committees, and provides the two elected Board members. The revised constitution also called for a Management Committee to fulfil and oversee day-to-day duties allocated by the Board (with particular reference to finance and fundraising) and under the leadership of the Vice Chairman of the Board, the Committee convened its first meeting in August and continues to meet bi-monthly.

Apart from the above persons, the membership of the Company is made up of individuals nominated by local accredited groups which are considered to be branches under the regulations of the charity.

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

Directors' responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company as at the end of the financial year and of the surplus or deficit of the company for that period. In preparing these accounts the directors are required to:-

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- Prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Board of Directors who have served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Financial results

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year is set out on page 9 of the accounts and shows net outgoing resources £26,101 compared to net incoming resources of £103,556 the previous year. Whilst income has shown encouraging increases in most areas, this has been a year of high expenditure on sporting events (World Summer Games and National Championships) and promotional events to increase the awareness of what Special Olympics has to offer. Expenditure on targetted fundraising has also increased and has resulted in the increases in donated income.

The surplus last year partly reflects the carry forward of reserves to offset the higher expenditure this year, both in the restricted funds for certain officers' employment costs and branch income spent on the major sporting events. Support and management costs have inevitably increased, particularly with higher staffing costs. The work of the charity is reviewed below.

Review of activities

National Development Office

Following a very successful first half of 2003 and a World Summer Games which was held in Dublin 21st-29th June the National Development Office relocated from Tunbridge Wells to central London, within the office of Coley Porter Bell, Grosvenor Gardens, SW1 at the beginning of August. This move marked the commencement of the Board's definitive plan to move forward on the issues of national identity and growth.

The Board is highly appreciative of the combined efforts of our small but dedicated team which has continued to work towards our goals throughout the year.

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

Fundraising and Development:

Raising our profile and generating funds remain top priorities, in order that SOGB can progress and this year has seen encouraging increases in sponsorship and donated income.

We should very much like to thank those sponsors who continue to support us. Special mention must go to our Premier Partners, Coca-Cola GB & Ireland and ABB. We have also benefited from either expertise, financial support or sound advice from the following companies: The Coca-Cola Youth Foundation, Lions Clubs International, SAS, GE, Otis Limited, O'Briens Irish Sandwich Bars, Skandia Life, Goldman Sachs, CIU Working Men's Clubs, Vodafone, J Walter Thompson, Fleishman Hillard, AOL, BBC TV, Sky Sports and Reed Elsevier - our sincere gratitude to everyone concerned.

In addition, SOI are currently reviewing the repayment terms of the loan extended to us and there is a strong possibility that most or all of the amounts owing will be waived. Whilst we are extremely grateful for this support, our aim must be to strive for a strong and independent future.

We hope you will enjoy the following resume of the very exciting events that took place during 2003.

'Give a Million More People a Chance' - Launch of Campaign:

The Rt. Hon Gordon Brown MP and Mrs Sarah Brown hosted a reception at Downing Street on 28th January 2003 for 130 guests in honour of Special Olympics Great Britain. Eunice Kennedy Shriver, Founder of Special Olympics and Timothy P Shriver, Ph.D. the President and CEO of Special Olympics World-wide attended the reception to support the launch of the organisation's new campaign, 'Give One Million More People A Chance'. Following the Reception at 11 Downing Street a fundraising dinner for 120 honoured guests including Special Olympics athletes, luminaries from the World of Sports, sponsors, patrons and potential patrons. The auction on the evening run by Sir David Frost raised £75,000 for the organisation.

London Stock Exchange - 28th April 2003:

SOGB held a breakfast briefing at the London Stock Exchange hosted by its Chairman, Don Cruickshank and Special Olympics International and SOGB Board Director, Mark Booth.

Special Olympics athletes Miss Sarah Biggs and Mr Marc Curtis gave a speech to the assembled 50 city corporation representatives who attended the breakfast.

Stock exchanges, a global symbol of investment, were the selected sites of the announcement as proof that Special Olympics is a good cause as well as a good investment, and that *Invest in a Life* will transform lives for people with learning disabilities worldwide.

SOEE European Football Week - 22nd-29th April 2003:

SOGB participated once again in this exciting European wide programme of Special Olympics and as football continues to grow in popularity, with athletes of both sexes, we value the involvement of the football authorities and appreciate the work of SOEE in this area.

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

SOGB sent 50 football players to the World Games in Dublin – one 11-a-side team, two male 5-a-side teams and a female 5-a-side team. Football was by far the largest squad in the GB team. This was the first time that a women's team from GB had competed at any SO international competition. The women's team and one of the male 5-a-side teams both won silver medals in their division.

Special Olympics Law Enforcement Torch Run in London - 11th June 2003:

On June 11th the flame arrived in London and was carried along the South Bank by over 1200 runners, including athletes and children with learning disabilities, British Police Officers, corporate sponsored teams, local schoolchildren, the law enforcement police runners from around the world, who are by tradition guardians of the Special Olympics flame, and celebrities and stars from the sports world.

The flame visited Gordon Brown at the Houses of Parliament and then at 2.00pm The Minister of Sport, Rt. Hon Richard Caborn officially started the run. The flame was welcomed by the Countess of Wessex and the Mayor of London, Mr Ken Livingstone, on its arrival at City Hall. The ceremony was followed with a programmed stage of entertainment and afternoon of fun and celebration.

Special Olympics World Summer Games 21st-29th June 2003:

The GB team performed magnificently at the World Summer Games in Dublin. British athletes scooped 89 gold, 91 silver and 80 bronze medals competing amongst 7000 athletes from 166 countries. The 199 athletes scooped gold medals in swimming, athletics, powerlifting, badminton, ten pin bowling, tennis, judo, sailing, golf, basketball, equestrian, cycling, table tennis and gymnastics. The GB delegation, made up of athletes from England, Scotland and Wales, competed in 16 of the 23 sports offered at the Games. The athletes were supported by a team of 59 coaches all of whom were volunteers. Our thanks go to all the athletes for being such a credit to Special Olympics GB and to their families and all the volunteer coaches particularly Team Manager, Gordon McCormack and his assistants Keith Wilcox and Jed Renilson.

The future

Within the next 12 months it is our aim to build up the number of our Patrons, thereby giving us a stream of steady income. We also hope to increase our Ambassadors, who help raise our profile.

The Board continues to meet quarterly to discuss the overall financial and development side of our programme. All issues that involve our members at regional level are also given very full consideration at these Board meetings. To this end, we have also put into place twice-yearly informal tea with the Leadership Council.

In order to further strengthen Board activity, the Executive Management Committee meets on a monthly basis, ensuring that all matters are dealt with regularity and efficiency. This Committee is conscientiously headed up by the Vice Chairman of the Board, Mr Robert Datnow.

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

Since January 2004 our Development Office in London has been greatly strengthened. The team now includes Chris Hooper, who joined as Executive Director from Special Olympics New Zealand. He brings with him 6 years experience of working within Special Olympics and is already firmly established. The inimitable Karen Bunton continues to be our very talented and experienced mainstay in Administration and will be primarily directing her skills towards special projects in the future. We now also have a new Team Administrator, Jessica Pointon, who has a wealth of skills that will hugely benefit the National Development Office.

Special mention must also be made of our other staff who are both talented and integral to the overall work we do: Andrew Heffer, Director of Sports & Services and Robert Billson, Regional Development Officer for London & South East.

As Chairman of SOGB, I am confident that we are moving forward with our programme in a constructive manner. Whilst we are still growing, our goals must remain realistic, but it is my aim nonetheless, to build a very sure and solid foundation from which our infrastructure can grow.

Reserves policy

The Board of Directors has adopted a policy whereby 'free' reserves (i.e. general funds in excess of amounts invested in fixed assets held for charity use) should be maintained which at least amount to six months expenditure by national Head Office not covered by related income or specific donations. Whilst Head Office expenditure varies from year to year, it is felt that minimum reserves of approximately £100,000 need to be maintained in order to satisfy this policy.

Risk review

The Board of Directors is aware of the risks facing the charity in its funding and financial survival and in carrying out its activities to further its objectives. Following the organisational restructuring described in last year's report, the new Board has re-examined more formally the major risks to which the charity is exposed and reviewed the systems established to mitigate those risks.

Auditors

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE

MEMBERS OF SPECIAL OLYMPICS GREAT BRITAIN

We have audited the accounts of Special Olympics Great Britain for the year ended 30th September 2003 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities (including Income and Expenditure Account), Balance Sheets and the related notes. These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out therein.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

The trustees' (who are also the directors of Special Olympics Great Britain for the purposes of company law) responsibilities for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the accounts in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards are set out on page 3.

Our responsibility is to audit the accounts in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom Auditing Standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the accounts give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Trustees Annual Report is not consistent with the accounts, if the charity has not kept proper accounting records, or if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding trustees' remuneration and transactions with the charity is not disclosed.

We are not required to consider whether the statement in the Trustees' Report concerning the major risks to which the charity is exposed covers all existing risks and controls, or to form an opinion on the effectiveness of the charity's risk management and control procedures

We read the other information contained in the Trustees' Annual Report, and consider whether it is consistent with the audited accounts. We consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements or material inconsistencies with the accounts. Our responsibilities do not extend to any other information.

Basis of opinion

In our opinion the accounts give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the group as at 30th September 2003 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, in the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985.

Notes to the accounts - 30th September 2003

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002) and follow the Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in October 2000.

The Charity has few permanent funding arrangements to cover the costs of carrying out its services. Furthermore the services it is required to provide are not evenly spread and are often one off or incurred on a quadrennial basis. Whilst sponsorship has previously been forthcoming it cannot be guaranteed that the derived income will be sufficient to cover the expenditure as it arises and that no further funding will be necessary.

In order to support the ongoing activities of the charity, while outside fundraising to secure its future continuance and developments was obtained, a loan was advanced by Special Olympics, Inc. in 2001 repayment of which was not to commence until funds were available (see note 12). There is currently a proposal under consideration that the loan be written off in return for Special Olympics Great Britain agreeing to the implementation of a programme of development with defined growth targets. This would enable funding to be directed towards future benefits rather than clearing old debts.

Whilst firm long term funding is not yet fully in place fundraising initiatives have achieved some success and donations and sponsorship income for national (rather than regional) purposes was significantly higher than the previous year. The salaries of the Chief Executive Officer for one year and a Regional Development Officer for three years, have also been funded from outside sources.

The Board therefore considers it appropriate to prepare the accounts on the going concern basis given the nature of charitable operations and current projections.

Basis of consolidation

Following the definition of branch activities given by the Statement of Recommended Practice, the accounts include the activities of the National Head Office and those groups, which have been brought together in regional consolidations, whose operations are considered to be wholly dedicated to the activities of Special Olympics Great Britain. Inevitably those groups which are considered to fall within this definition (as set out in note 16a) will vary from time to time resulting in transfers of funds in or out of the consolidated accounts.

The consolidated accounts also incorporate the accounts of the subsidiary company of Special Olympics Great Britain.

Voluntary income

(i) Grants receivable

Grants receivable are credited to the income and expenditure account on an accruals basis with grants received for specific purposes treated as restricted income.

Notes to the accounts - 30th September 2003

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(ii) Donations and gifts

All monetary donations and gifts are credited to the income and expenditure account in the year of receipt. No value is attributed to donations in kind and these are not included in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Donations under Gift Aid together with the associated income tax recoveries are credited to the income and expenditure account when the donations are received.

Resources expended

Expenditure, which is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. Salaries have been allocated on the basis of time spent and other cost allocations reflect estimates of the resources consumed by the activity. The main categories of expenditure are as follows:

- (i) Costs of generating funds are incurred in generating contributions to the charity. Merchandise and sports kit, incorporating the Special Olympics name, are purchased either to sell to members and friends or to give to competitors in certain events partly as a means of publicity. Fundraising and publicity costs also educate and inform governments, organisations and members of the public on the issues being addressed by the Charity.
- (ii) Activities to further the charity's objects and support costs are incurred in providing the sports training and competitive activities carried out by the charity.
- (iii Management and administration costs are incurred in running and administering the Charity and are not directly attributable to furthering the charity's objects, support, publicity or fundraising.

Sporting events

Income and expenditure relating to specific sporting events is included in the accounts in the financial year during which the event takes place in so far as it is identified when the accounts are prepared.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

Plant, equipment, fixtures and fittings - 15% on cost
Computer equipment - 25% p.a. on cost

Motor vehicles - 25% p.a. on cost

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Fund accounting

(i) Restricted funds

The restricted funds are funds which have been raised for, and their use restricted to, a specific purpose, or donations subject to donor imposed conditions.

Notes to the accounts - 30th September 2003

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(ii) Designated funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside by the Directors for particular purposes.

(iii General fund

The general fund consists of those funds which the company may use in furtherance of its charitable objects or generating contributions, at the discretion of responsible officers.

Taxation

The company is a registered charity and therefore is not liable for income tax or corporation tax on income derived from its charitable activities, as it falls within the various exemptions available to registered charities.

Leases

Operating lease commitments are provided in the balance sheet at the time rental payments fall due. Such rental costs are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities are retranslated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.
