Annual Report of the Trustees

The members of the Board of Directors of Special Olympics Great Britain, present their annual report together with the audited accounts for the year ended 30th September 2012 The 'Reference and administrative information' is set out on page 1

Structure, governance and management

Special Olympics Great Britain (SOGB) is a charitable private company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital. The company is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association under which the Board of Directors is appointed and the management of the charity is set out. The company operates a national programme of training and local, regional and national competitions which is accredited by Special Olympics International

SOGB is governed by a Board of Directors (Trustees), most of whom have been appointed for their expertise in specific areas. They are joined by two representatives elected from the membership, and by an elected Special Olympics athlete Reporting directly to the Board of Directors is the National Executive Council, which oversees the work of the sports and services programme, and provides the two elected Board members. The Chief Executive Officer is delegated, by the Board, to oversee the day-to-day running of the organisation and is supported by two committees that meet bi-monthly, a Development Committee (with particular reference to fundraising) under the leadership of the Vice Chairman of the Board and a Finance Committee.

Apart from the above persons, the membership of the Company is made up of individuals nominated by local accredited groups which are considered to be branches under the regulations of the charity

Risk review

The Board of Directors is aware of the risks facing the charity in its funding and financial survival and in carrying out its activities to further its objectives. The Board has continued to examine more formally the major risks to which the charity is exposed and has reviewed the systems established to mitigate those risks.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company as at the end of the financial year and of the surplus or deficit of the company for that period. In preparing these accounts the directors are required to -

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- To observe the methods and principles in the Charity Statement of Recommended Practice,
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- Prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Objectives and activities

The mission of Special Olympics is to provide year round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with a learning disability (mental handicap) giving them continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community

Special Olympics is founded on the belief that people with learning disabilities can, with proper instruction and encouragement, learn, enjoy and benefit from participation in individual and team sports, adapted as necessary to meet the needs of those with special mental and physical limitations

Special Olympics believes that consistent training, including physical conditioning and nutritional and health-related activities is essential to the development of sports skills, and that competition among those of equal abilities is the most appropriate means of testing these skills, measuring progress and providing incentives for personal growth

Special Olympics believes that through sports training and competition, people with learning disability benefit physically, mentally, socially, and spiritually, families are strengthened, and the community at large, both through participation and observation, is united with people with learning disabilities in an environment of equality, respect and acceptance

Special Olympics believes that every person with learning disabilities who is at least eight years old should have the opportunity to participate in and benefit from sports training and competition. Special Olympics also permits individual programmes to accept children from ages five to seven for training, although these children may not participate in Special Olympics competitions.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities

Chairman's review of achievements and performance

The Charity's strategic objectives to the end of 2013 are to strengthen management structures across the whole organisation in order to improve efficiency and overall effectiveness, to be transparent and accountable at all levels, to look to secure sufficient staff to achieve programme growth and quality goals, to retain and reward the current volunteer force but also engage and train a new generation of volunteers to push the programme forward to continue to improve the quality, delivery and number of opportunities available to people with learning disabilities to participate in sport, to provide a balanced calendar of events and at whatever level, will strive for the highest standards, not only on the playing field, but in the areas of coaching and event management and to work for maximum public awareness of the programme across all levels and ensure that due recognition is received.

This year's AGM held in Loughborough in November themed 'Working Together to Reach our Potential' set out our priorities for the following year under the revised organisation Vision which is "To facilitate access to year round inclusive training and competition for ALL people in Great Britain with an intellectual disability through direct provision and partnerships". The AGM heard that during the year to September 2012, Special Olympics GB had one its most successful years in terms of development for over 10 years. Firstly with the expansion in numbers of athletes and clubs providing the year round programme — a further 13 new clubs were accredited during the year with over 650 new athletes registering also. Alongside this and to support the growth of the charity 2 additional sports & services staff were recruited and we secured funding in partnership with Mencap for 2 learning disability sports advisors through the Sport England Inclusive Sports Fund

The charity continued to promote volunteering and coaching excellence and alongside capacity building grants of over £20,000 from the Special Olympics / National Grid development fund we also held 13 volunteer induction training workshops, provided over 25 coaches with coaching education grants and appointed Technical advisors to each of the 23 sports offered 34 Special Olympics GB volunteers and athletes were also trained as Sports Leaders in 2012 During 2012, over 500 new volunteers were registered with the charity bringing the total number to 3,400

Our athletes train week in and week out in their chosen sports for their chance to compete at local, regional, national and for some, also at international level. During the year there were over 100 competitions held across the country including 20 local, 74 regional and 14 national single sport competitions. We also had 84 British athletes competing across 10 international invitational competitions, the largest ever

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

I am especially grateful to our sponsors and donors many of whom either increased their contributions in 2012 and/or have signed up to a further length of time in support of the charity. This tremendous ongoing support is reflected in the development and achievements we have been able to achieve this year and places the charity on a further stronger footing for the year to come. Partners such as Domino's whose customers through the Pennies 'online charity box' have raised over £275k since November 2010 and Coca-Cola Great Britain who have supported us through an additional grant of £100k towards the expansion and development of our innovative global programme Unified Sports @ and also gave the opportunity of a lifetime to 8 of our Special Olympics footballers to walk out in their football heroes' footsteps in Ukraine after being selected to lead out the England team as flag bearers at the UEFA Euro Cup. In 2012 we were also the nominated charity of the British London 10k Run and over 1,650 runners took to the streets of central London to raise over £160k for the charity. A very special thanks to all our corporate partner employee runners who took part — such as 200 runners from National Grid, and those from CMS, ABB, Mattel and Blackbaud. In May 2011, we were announced as the Charity of the Year for CMS Cameron McKenna and since then the employees of the law firm have been raising money in all sorts of dynamic and innovative ways raising to date over £115k. We also welcomed a new partnership with Evans Cycles to support a new SOGB cycling programme.

And so to the main event of 2012 – the Olympic & Paralympic Games! We were very proud to see two of our Special Olympics athletes Table Tennis player Victoria Bromley and 1,500 metre runner Stephen Morris qualifying for and competing at the 2012 event! Throughout the summer over 60 SOGB athletes and coaches were celebrated as Torchbearers. The majority were nominated by their communities while 9 athletes and one coach were selected through Coca-Cola's Future Flames campaign in recognition of their achievements at the 2011 Special Olympics World Summer Games in Athens. In addition there were also 14 athletes who were Olympic Games Makers and volunteered throughout the Olympic and Paralympic Games.

Our charity would of course not exist without our volunteers and I would like to pay tribute to the 3,400 volunteers who have this year helped to stage competitions, wash kit, drive athletes, raise funds, raise awareness and continue to provide and organise the day to day sport programme for our 8,000 athletes

Financial review

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year is set out on page 9 of the accounts and shows net incoming resources of £478,605 compared to £74,750 the previous year

The incoming resources were significantly higher than the previous year, but resources expended have reduced by almost £100,000, reflecting that in the year there were few major sporting events (which would create larger amounts of 'one-off income and expenditure) Donated income and generated finds increased comfortably

Voluntary income in total increased by £278,000 compared to the previous year although sponsorship by companies has reduced from £370,000 to £296,000 and grants and donations from both companies and individuals and trusts and foundations have all shown an increase. In particular, a development fund has been set-up with £103,000 from National Grid, corporate donations have increased by £30,000 and income from various trusts and foundations has increased by £90,000 Donations from individuals (including 'Pennies') have shown a healthy increase. Grants and donations received directly by regional groups have also increased by £100,000

Specific activities carried out to generate funds (both by the National Development Office and the regions) have resulted in a healthy increase in income of £197,000 whilst the costs allocated to fundraising events and activities are a lower proportion of the income than previously. It should also be noted that staff and professional consultant 'overhead' time charged under this heading help to generate all types of voluntary income. The main contributories to the improvement in generated income have been fundraising by the staff of CMS Cameron McKenna and British London 10K Run participants.

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

In the current year, similar to last year, there have been no awareness and promotion events yielding income and the costs of day-to-day promotional work and activities (designed primarily to increase the number of participating athletes) have only increased by a small amount.

Income and expenditure relating to sports events, projects and conferences shows a large reduction although there has been new funding of almost £140,000 this year for projects in unified football and unified sports generally Restricted funding has also continued for the Volunteer Support Programme

The increase in overheads and allocated support costs (mainly the National Development Office) reflects the increase in the resources provided for national development. Staff cost increases are mainly relating to pension provision and the higher rental for increased office space has been separately funded. Leasing charges and the cost of office refurbishment are also part of the increases.

The balance sheet now shows net assets of over £1,100,000 boosted by the significant bank balances held by the regions and significantly improved National Office bank balances. 'Debtors and prepayments' is almost wholly made up of prepaid expenditure relating to the period after the year end and similarly much of the creditors relate to income deferred to a later period. However, the reserves include £760,000 of regional funds (not available for national development) and the general funds held by the National Development office do not exceed the balances payable to outside parties by a significant amount. The funds built-up at the year end are also budgetted to contribute to spending in the current year.

As explained in Note 1 to the accounts, there has also been continuing progress in the quest for more long term funding for the activities of the National Development Office and regional branches

Principal funding sources

During 2012 the charity continued to underpin the core funding and expand the funding base from which SOGB currently obtains its annual funding

The work in this area over the past 12 months has been very successful and the Board of Directors would like to extend their sincere thanks to all its corporate partners, sponsors, donors and Ambassadors for their continued generous support.

Reserves policy

The Board of Directors has adopted a policy whereby 'free' reserves (i.e. general funds in excess of amounts invested in fixed assets held for charity use) should be maintained, which at least amount to six months expenditure by National Development Office, not covered by related income or specific donations. Whilst National Development Office expenditure varies from year to year, it is felt that minimum reserves in excess of £300,000 need to be maintained in order to satisfy this policy. This is in addition to reserves held by regions, which are used for local activities and are not available for the funding of national development activities.

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

Plans for future periods

The Board of Directors will, in line with the new Special Olympics global strategic plan, look to extend the current strategic plan 08-12 through to 2015 to continue to support the charity's goal to expand the Special Olympics GB programme across England, Scotland and Wales and seek a minimum 25% increase in income through new and varied fundraising streams to support the new strategic objectives

We continue to focus on establishing a fuller and more regular competition calendar - Competition enables athletes to meet other people and interact with them. Competition also gives athletes an opportunity to have measurable achievement through participation. In August 2013, the charity will, for the first time, plan and fully manage its 9th National Summer Games, which will take place in Bath. Held every four years the event is key to the further awareness of the programme along with legacy plans to expand the programme across the South West.

We will continue to recruit and train more volunteers and sports coaches who are key to delivering the sport training and competitions opportunities for our athletes in England, Scotland and Wales. It is therefore essential that we also expand the resources of the National Volunteer Programme to support the recruitment, training and retention aspects involved with the programme. We are also looking to partner and work more closely with National Governing Bodies and in turn their clubs, to enable them to become more inclusive in their everyday sports provision.

The Board is committed to ensuring that the organisation is financially secure and in a position to maintain the current operational level and lay the foundations for major development going forward. As part of this, the Board will continue its lobbying efforts in securing central government funding in particular focusing on the additional benefits derived by people with intellectual disability from taking part in sport in the areas of health, inclusion and education. There will also be a focus on expansion of the young athletes programme

TRUSTEES OF SPECIAL OLYMPICS GREAT BRITAIN

We have audited the accounts of Special Olympics Great Britain for the year ended 30th September 2012 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities (including Income and Expenditure Account), Balance Sheets and the related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to Smaller Entities)

This report is made solely to the charitable company's trustees, as a body, in accordance with regulations made under Section 154 of the Charities Act 2011. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charitable company's trustees those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charitable company and its trustees as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As explained more fully in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities, the trustees (who are also the directors of Special Olympics Great Britain for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing of the accounts and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view

The trustees have elected for the accounts to be audited in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 rather than the Companies Act 2006. Accordingly we have been appointed as auditors under section 151 of the Charities Act 2011 and report in accordance with that Act. Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the accounts in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors, including "APB Ethical Standard - Provisions Available for Small Entities (Revised)." in the circumstances set out in note 1 to the accounts.

Scope of the audit of the accounts

- (b) preparing accounts which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company as at the end of each financial year and of its surplus or deficit for each financial year in accordance with the requirements of Sections 394 and 395 and which otherwise comply with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006 relating to accounts, so far as applicable to the charitable company.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and follow the Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005

Whilst the Charity has some permanent funding arrangements to cover its costs and the sporting events are largely self-financing, the charity still requires additional donated income to cover expenditure by the National Development Office. Whilst sponsorship and donations have previously been forthcoming it cannot be guaranteed that the derived income will be sufficient to cover the projected regular expenditure by the National Development Office as it arises and that no further funding will be necessary. This will also enable the charity to continue its development work on training and volunteer support.

During the year the existing significant longer term sponsorship has largely continued and some useful additional three year and one-off funding by trusts, foundations and companies has been obtained, extending support for national (rather than regional) purposes. The services of a corporate fundraising consultant and fundraising assistant have also continued to be used during the year and fundraising has been overseen by the Development Committee, led by the Vice Chairman. Furthermore, Special Olympics International will shortly be helping to implement more 'special event' fundraising and a 'major donor' campaign

The Board therefore considers it appropriate to prepare the accounts on the going concern basis given the nature of charitable operations and current projections

Basis of consolidation

Following the definition of branch activities given by the Statement of Recommended Practice, the accounts include the activities of the National Development Office and those groups, which have been brought together in regional consolidations, whose operations are considered to be wholly dedicated to the activities of Special Olympics Great Britain. Inevitably the groups which are considered to fall within this definition (as set out in note 16 a) will vary from time to time resulting in transfers of funds in or out of the consolidated accounts

The consolidated accounts also incorporate the accounts of SOGB Promotions Ltd, a subsidiary company of Special Olympics Great Britain The 'Company Balance Sheet' on page 12 shows the balances relating only to Special Olympics Great Britain and does not include the balances of the subsidiary There is no separate income and expenditure account for the holding company and the surplus for the year is £484,388 (2011 £68,940) The consolidated result is almost the same as the holding company since all the taxable profits of the only subsidiary are donated to it

Incoming resources

(i) Grants receivable

Grants receivable are credited to the income and expenditure account on an accruals basis with grants received for specific purposes treated as restricted income

(II) Donations and gifts

All monetary donations and gifts are credited to the income and expenditure account in the year of receipt. No value is attributed to donations in kind and these are not included in the Statement of Financial Activities. Donations under Gift Aid together with the associated income tax recoveries are credited to the income and expenditure account when the donations are received.

(iii) Charitable activities

Incoming resources from charitable activities are accounted for when earned

Resources expended

Expenditure, which is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. Salaries have been

1. Resources expended (continued)

allocated on the basis of time spent and other cost allocations reflect estimates of the resources consumed by the activity. The main categories of expenditure are as follows

- (1) Costs of generating funds are incurred in generating contributions to the charity. This largely involves actively seeking donors and sponsors but also includes the costs incurred in holding events by the charity and activities carried out by individuals that result in funds being raised.
- (11) The costs of charitable activities relate to the charity's sports programme. This involves training and competive activities together with 'awareness and promotional' activities which have the main intention of increasing the number of people benefitting from the charity's activities. The cost of sports kit purchased is slightly offset by sales of small amounts of kit and related merchandise.
- (III) Governance costs are incurred in running and administering the charity and are not attributable to furthering the charity's objects, support, publicity or fundraising

Sporting events

Income and expenditure relating to specific sporting events is included in the accounts in the financial year during which the event takes place in so far as it is identified when the accounts are prepared.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Plant, equipment, fixtures and fittings - 15% p a. on cost Computer equipment and software - 25% p.a on cost

Fund accounting

(i) Restricted funds

The restricted funds are funds that have been raised for, and their use restricted to, a specific purpose, or donations subject to donor imposed conditions

(11) Designated funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside by the Directors for particular purposes

(111) General fund

The general fund consists of those funds which the company may use in furtherance of its charitable objects or generating contributions, at the discretion of responsible officers

Taxation

The company is a registered charity and therefore is not liable for income tax or corporation tax on income derived from its charitable activities, as it falls within the various exemptions available to registered charities

Leases

Operating lease commitments are provided in the balance sheet at the time rental payments fall due. Such rental costs are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities are retranslated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All adjustments are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities

Ethical standards - Provisions Available for Small Entities

In common with many other entities of our size and nature we use our auditors to prepare and submit returns to the tax authorities and to assist with the preparation of the accounts
