Annual Report of the Trustees

The members of the Board of Directors of Special Olympics Great Britain, present their annual report together with the audited accounts for the year ended 30th September 2009 The 'Reference and administrative information' is set out on page 1

Structure, governance and management

Special Olympics Great Britain (SOGB) is a charitable private company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital. The company is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association under which the Board of Directors is appointed and the management of the charity is set out. The company operates a national programme of training and local, regional and national competitions which is accredited by Special Olympics International

SOGB is governed by a Board of Directors (Trustees), most of whom have been appointed for their expertise in specific areas. They are joined by two representatives elected from the membership, and by an elected Special Olympics athlete. Reporting directly to the Board of Directors is the National Executive Committee, which oversees the work of the sports and services programme, and provides the two elected Board members. There is also a Management Committee to fulfil and oversee day-to-day duties allocated by the Board (with particular reference to finance and fundraising) and under the leadership of the Vice Chairman of the Board, the Committee meets bi-monthly

Apart from the above persons, the membership of the Company is made up of individuals nominated by local accredited groups which are considered to be branches under the regulations of the charity

Risk review

The Board of Directors is aware of the risks facing the charity in its funding and financial survival and in carrying out its activities to further its objectives. The Board has continued to examine more formally the major risks to which the charity is exposed and reviewed the systems established to mitigate those risks.

Statement of directors' responsibilities

Company law requires the directors to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company as at the end of the financial year and of the surplus or deficit of the company for that period In preparing these accounts the directors are required to -

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- To observe the methods and principles in the Charity Statement of Recommended Practice,
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- Prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Board of Directors who have served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1

Disclosure of information to auditors

The directors confirm that so far as they are aware, there is no relevant audit information (as defined by section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware. Objectives and activities

The mission of Special Olympics is to provide year round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with a learning disability (mental handicap) giving them continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community

Special Olympics is founded on the belief that people with learning disabilities can, with proper instruction and encouragement, learn, enjoy and benefit from participation in individual and team sports, adapted as necessary to meet the needs of those with special mental and physical limitations

Special Olympics believes that consistent training, including physical conditioning and nutritional and health-related activities is essential to the development of sports skills, and that competition among those of equal abilities is the most appropriate means of testing these skills, measuring progress and providing incentives for personal growth

Special Olympics believes that through sports training and competition, people with learning disability benefit physically, mentally, socially, and spiritually, families are strengthened, and the community at large, both through participation and observation, is united with people with learning disabilities in an environment of equality, respect and acceptance

Special Olympics believes that every person with learning disabilities who is at least eight years old should have the opportunity to participate in and benefit from sports training and competition. Special Olympics also permits individual programmes to accept children from ages five to seven for training, although these children may not participate in Special Olympics competitions.

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities

Chairman's review of achievements and performance

Over the past 12 months SOGB has enjoyed unprecedented levels of awareness including national coverage of our GB team at the World Winter Games in Boise in February and of our own National Summer Games in Leicester The SOGB National Summer Games in July were a tremendous success, especially in raising further awareness of our ongoing effort to secure regular and centralised government support for our organisation and I am especially grateful to Leicester City Council for their significant commitment in delivering a spectacular and professional event. During the next year the organisation will continue to strive for this level of awareness with a particular focus of local and regional coverage.

SOGB continues to be an active member of both the English Federation of Disability Sport (EFDS) and the DCMS led, National Disability Sports Organisation's Committee and we were honoured in February when The Secretary of State for DCMS, Andy Burnham MP, facilitated a meeting to review and address the current challenges of funding and profile for SOGB. The meeting addressed what more can be done through organisations such as SOGB, to help and encourage those with learning disabilities to fully participate in sport and highlighted the wish of DCMS to look at how organisations such as SOGB can access the systems and resources required to make the widest possible offer from engaging with NGB's to involving us in school activities and community schemes. SOGB will also continue to work with key government departments including DWP and Department of Health over the next 12 months.

During 2009, the Board continued to review its structure and at its meeting in May, reaffirmed both its Vision and Core Values. A Development Committee has been established with the primary aims of agreeing a revised fundraising strategy and a full re-structure of the Leadership Council, now completed. From this re-structure a newly constituted group called the National Executive Committee has been formed with 2 representatives from each Home Country and will oversee the management of the Sports & Services Department.

SOGB Board Vision & Core Values

To promote and strengthen its leadership to create improved organisation performance and make certain that Special Olympics Great Britain is the leader in the provision of sport to all people with learning disabilities ensuring the health,

wellbeing, respect and dignity of all its members and allowing them to achieve their full potential in life through meaningful inclusion

LEADERSHIP To lead, motivate and inspire with clear direction and management

TRUST To develop relationships with our members and partners and the community-at-large that are based on honesty and integrity

QUALITY To attain the highest level of excellence in all aspects of our activities

DIGNITY To respect and honour our clients, staff, volunteers and contributors

COMMUNITY To continue to promote and change attitudes towards people with learning disabilities

The charity is actively ensuring that the Board includes specialists in the relevant fields of education, fundraising and charity management and that they are given all relevant information to act effectively

I would like to acknowledge and sincerely thank our 2,600 dedicated volunteers who throughout the year, as well as helping to stage more than 130 competitions across the country, continued to provide and organise the day to day sport programme for our athletes SOGB will look to further develop initiatives to recruit, professionally train and recognise its volunteers over the next 3 years

I am especially grateful too to all the SOGB sponsors and donors for their continued commitment during 2009/10 In particular I would like to highlight the significant contribution that our Official Partner, National Grid has been playing in the development and growth of the organisation. With over 600 employees now actively volunteering within the programme bringing a level of professionalism and support to many key events and to many local community clubs.

Finally, I would like to pay tribute to the Founder of Special Olympics, Mrs Eurice Kennedy Shriver who sadly passed away in August Over the last 41 years Special Olympics has, due to Mrs Shriver's determined and unconquerable spirit, grown from an annual summer sports camp held in the grounds of her house, to a daily global sporting movement promoting inclusion, respect and acceptance for people with learning disabilities. Today, over 3 million athletes in more than 170 countries across the globe, benefit from being involved in this truly unique organisation.

Financial review

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year is set out on page 9 of the accounts and shows net incoming resources of £58,204 compared to £73,787 the previous year

Both incoming and outgoing resources were significantly higher than the previous year, mainly due to the National Summer Games being held in July 2009 whereas there were no major sporting or awareness and promotional events in the previous year

Voluntary income has increased by £360,000, which mainly reflects increased funding obtained by the regions for the National Games but also includes £95,000 of restricted funding for the National Office to carry out athletes' health screening at the Games The significant increase in fundraising events and activities compared to the previous year relates almost exclusively to the regions

The large increase in awareness and promotion income and expenditure is in respect of the Torch Run (for the National Summer Games) and the 30th Anniversary Gala Dinner in November 2008

Income and (particularly) expenditure relating to sports events and conferences is significantly higher (as explained above) and this is reflected not only in the cost of event entries but also in sports kit given to participating athletes and increased training and travel costs—Restricted funding has also continued for the Youth Unified Football Development Project

The increase in other overhead costs (mainly relating to the National Development Office) is largely due to increased staffing levels rather than any structural changes

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

As explained in Note 1 to the accounts, some progress has been made in the quest for more long term funding for the activities of the National Development Office and regional branches

Principal funding sources

During 2009, fundamental steps were taken to not only underpin the current core funding infrastructure but to explore and expand the funding base from which SOGB currently obtains its annual funding. Through the offices of Special Olympics Europe/Eurasia, a full time resource was agreed to support the fundraising role for a period of 12 months. During this period, key stewardship work was carried out by the fundraising manager and included the appointment of a graduate volunteer to the role of fundraising assistant, concentrating primarily on making applications to Trusts and Foundations

The work in this area over the past 12 months has been very successful and I am delighted to report that over and above our long term corporate partners and donors listed below, the following Trusts have agreed to support us over a 3 year funding period - The Henry Smith Charity and Bailey Thomas Charity and we are currently working with Esmee Fairbarn and the Rank Foundation to secure further 3 year agreements

As well as corporate and trust fundraising, a series of public fundraising events were attended and organised. The full time appointment of an Events Management Co-ordinator was agreed and we will be looking to expand the various initiatives we are currently involved in which include British London 10k, Great North and South Runs, London Triathlon, CokeZone and Everyclick

We should very much like to thank those sponsors and supporters who continue to support us Special mention must go to our Official partner National Grid Plc, and our Premier Partners The Coca-Cola Youth Foundation, ABB, Domino's Pizza, Fitflop Ltd and Lions Clubs International (MD 105) We have also benefited from either financial support, expertise or sound advice from the following Chris Knott Insurance, Geoff and Fiona Squire Foundation, JWT, Law Enforcement Torch Run, Lexis PR, Onside Law, Orrick Herrington & Sutcliffe, Piggybank Kids, R&A, Simpson Wreford & Partners, Special Olympics International and Vodaphone Foundation. Our sincere gratitude to everyone concerned.

We would also like to thank our current SOGB Ambassadors Anna Hemmings MBE, Armand Beasley, Darren Campbell MBE, David James, Georgina Hulme (SOGB athlete), Graham Bell, Hope Powell OBE, John Amaechi, Katharine Merry MBE, Lawrie McMenemy MBE (Chairman), Mark Cox MBE, Moira Brown (SOGB athlete) Shaun Baker, Tina Baker and Shobna Gulati for their tremendous support in spreading the word about our organisation

Reserves policy

The Board of Directors has adopted a policy whereby 'free' reserves (i.e. general funds in excess of amounts invested in fixed assets held for charity use) should be maintained, which at least amount to six months expenditure by National Development Office, not covered by related income or specific donations. Whilst Head Office expenditure varies from year to year, it is felt that minimum reserves of approximately £200,000 need to be maintained in order to satisfy this policy.

Plans for future periods

In the period 2009-2012 SOGB intends to strengthen management structures across the whole organisation in order to improve efficiency and overall effectiveness. The Board recognise that at its core, Special Olympics is a volunteer driven movement

SOGB is committed to developing depth and diversity and recruiting young athletes and volunteers to ensure a seemless operation across the structure. Staffing requirements, particularly from a regional delivery perspective, will be reviewed to ensure that the organisation is adequately staffed to support the future development of the programme and an application will be made to Sport England in partnership with Mencap Sport during the first 6 months of 2010

Special Olympics creates opportunities for athletes to train and compete and, as a result, develop many critical life skills SOGB will provide a balanced calendar of events at local, regional, national, European and International level

Annual Report of the Trustees (continued)

All events, at whatever level, will strive for the highest standards, not only on the playing field, but in the areas of coaching and event management. Forthcoming highlight events will include a GB team attending the Special Olympics European Games in Warsaw in September 2010 and the Special Olympics World Summer Games in Athens in 2011

The Board is committed to ensuring that the organisation is financially secure so that it is in a position to maintain the current operational level and lay the foundations for major development going forward

Regional fundraising opportunities (particularly for development staff) will be developed in parallel with the national fundraising plan SOGB recognises the value of 'Community' in developing new corporate partnerships. The fundraising campaign for SOGB requires the ongoing support of companies, private donors and individuals. Current relationships will be nurtured and new avenues will be followed.

The key focus areas for the first twelve months will be to achieve sustainability through significant core funding and securing recognition and resource as a National Disability Sports Organisation throughout all government departments and related agencies

We have audited the accounts of Special Olympics Great Britain for the year ended 30th September 2009 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities (including Income and Expenditure Account), Balance Sheets and the related notes. These accounts have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein and the requirements of the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

Notes to the accounts - 30th September 2009

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007) and follow the Statement of Recommended Practice, 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005

The Charity has few permanent funding arrangements to cover the costs of carrying out its services. Furthermore the services it is required to provide are not evenly spread and are often one-off or incurred on a quadrennial basis. Whilst sponsorship has previously been forthcoming it cannot be guaranteed that the derived income will be sufficient to cover the projected regular expenditure by the National Development Office as it arises and that no further funding will be necessary

During the year the existing significant longer term sponsorship has continued and some useful additional three year funding by trusts, foundations and companies has been obtained, extending support for national (rather than regional) purposes and covering some specific costs (e g office rent). The charity was also assisted by professional fundraisers in producing a detailed five year stategic development funding proposal which particularly targeted government funding.

The Board therefore considers it appropriate to prepare the accounts on the going concern basis given the nature of charitable operations and current projections

Basis of consolidation

Following the definition of branch activities given by the Statement of Recommended Practice, the accounts include the activities of the National Development Office and those groups, which have been brought together in regional consolidations, whose operations are considered to be wholly dedicated to the activities of Special Olympics Great Britain Inevitably the groups which are considered to fall within this definition (as set out in note 15a) will vary from time to time resulting in transfers of funds in or out of the consolidated accounts

The consolidated accounts also incorporate the accounts of SOGB Promotions Ltd, a subsidiary company of Special Olympics Great Britain The 'Company Balance Sheet' on page 11 shows the balances relating only to Special Olympics Great Britain and does not include the balances of the subsidiary. There is no separate income and expenditure account for the holding company and the surplus for the year is £58,204 (2008 £74,203). The consolidated result is almost the same as the holding company as all taxable profits of the only subsidiary are donated to it.

Incoming resources

(1) Grants receivable

Grants receivable are credited to the income and expenditure account on an accruals basis with grants received for specific purposes treated as restricted income

(11) Donations and gifts

All monetary donations and gifts are credited to the income and expenditure account in the year of receipt. No value is attributed to donations in kind and these are not included in the Statement of Financial Activities. Donations under Gift Aid together with the associated income tax recoveries are credited to the income and expenditure account when the donations are received.

(111) Charitable activities

Incoming resources from charitable activities are accounted for when earned

Resources expended

Expenditure, which is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. Salaries have been

1 Resources expended (continued)

allocated on the basis of time spent and other cost allocations reflect estimates of the resources consumed by the activity. The main categories of expenditure are as follows

- (1) Costs of generating funds are incurred in generating contributions to the charity. This largely involves actively seeking donors and sponsors but can also include publicity to educate and inform with the main aim being to encourage further voluntary income.
- (ii) The costs of charitable activities relate to the charity's sports programme. This involves training and competive activities together with 'awareness and promotional' activities which have the main intention of increasing the number of people benefitting from the charity's activities. The cost of sports kit purchased is slightly offset by sales of small amounts of kit and related merchandise.
- (iii) Governance costs are incurred in running and administering the charity and are not attributable to furthering the charity's objects, support, publicity or fundraising

Sporting events

Income and expenditure relating to specific sporting events is included in the accounts in the financial year during which the event takes place in so far as it is identified when the accounts are prepared

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Plant, equipment, fixtures and fittings - 15% p a on cost Computer equipment - 25% p a on cost

Fund accounting

(1) Restricted funds

The restricted funds are funds which have been raised for, and their use restricted to, a specific purpose, or donations subject to donor imposed conditions

(11) Designated funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside by the Directors for particular purposes

(111) General fund

The general fund consists of those funds which the company may use in furtherance of its charitable objects or generating contributions, at the discretion of responsible officers

Taxation

The company is a registered charity and therefore is not liable for income tax or corporation tax on income derived from its charitable activities, as it falls within the various exemptions available to registered charities

Leases

Operating lease commitments are provided in the balance sheet at the time rental payments fall due Such rental costs are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities are retranslated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All adjustments are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

Ethical standards - Provisions Available for Small Entities

In common with many other entities of our size and nature we use our auditors to prepare and submit returns to the tax authorities and to assist with the preparation of the accounts
