REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2015

Governing Document

CODA International Training is a company limited by guarantee and not having share capital governed by its Memorandum and Articles dated 3rd January 1990 as amended on 14th July 2011. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission.

Trustees

CODA is constantly looking to strengthen its Executive Committee. Trustees are normally inducted on their duties and responsibilities as directors. The induction process includes meetings with staff and fellow Executive Committee members to introduce CODA's work and procedures. They are also provided with Charity Commission guidelines on trustees' responsibilities, management accounts and project reports.

Organisation and Management

The management/ executive committee (EC), which can have up to 15 members, administers the charity. The committee meets quarterly and oversees organisational development, financial management, engagement in new partnerships and other areas of our work. The EC formed subcommittees to meet on an ad hoc basis to discuss and make decisions on specific work areas such as general purposes and financial management. An executive director is appointed by the trustees to manage the day-to-day operations. In order to facilitate effective operations, the executive director has delegated authority, within terms of delegation approved by the trustees, for operational matters including finance, employment, and international development performance-related activities. Several volunteers and interns have been recruited and trained to support the organising of public events, speakers' tours and trust fundraising.

Risk Management

The trustees make a risk assessment annually. They explore the risks the charity may face; define measures to mitigate those risks and the implementation of procedures to minimise any potential impact on the charity. Our assessment has identified risks at the governance, operational, financial, and environmental levels. Particular focus was given to the risk of operating in an insecure funding environment. Another key item is the need to build healthy reserves. To respond to new challenges and to better mitigate financial risks, the trustees have agreed to review risk assessments quarterly.

Objectives and activities

The objects for which CODA International was established are:

- A The prevention or relief of poverty in the countries where the association works by providing or assisting in the provision of education, training, healthcare projects and all the necessary support designed to enable individuals to create sustainable livelihoods and become self-sufficient
- B To develop the capacity and skills of the members of socially and economically disadvantaged communities in the countries where the association works in such a way that they are better able to identify, and help meet, their needs and to participate more fully in society
- C To promote human rights (as set out in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and subsequent United Nations conventions and declarations) throughout the world by all or any of the following means:
- Relieving need amoung the victims of human rights abuse
- Research into human rights issues;
- Raising awareness of human rights issues;
- Promoting public support for human rights

Objectives and activities (continued)

CODA International's mission is to contribute to bridging inequality gaps through the facilitation of training with members of community organisations in Latin America, Africa and the Middle East. The training aims to contribute to the development of the organisations through strengthening the skills of their members in lobbying and advocacy, and increasing their awareness of constitutional and civil participation rights within their national contexts.

In shaping the objectives for the year and planning our activities, the trustees have considered the charity commission's guidance on public benefit.

Achievements and performance

Our partnership with Foundation for Security and Development in Africa (FOSDA)

A grant agreement (£174,864) with Comic Relief was signed in order to complete the implementation of a project in partnership with the Foundation for Security and Development in Africa (FOSDA)-Ghana. The project aims to increase economic and political empowerment of women in the Savannah Regions of Ghana and will run until February 2016. More specifically, the project aims to enable 200 women to champion the adoption of gender sensitive policies and women's participation in decision-making, support their election as members of Unit Committees, Area Councils and District Assemblies in 13 districts of Northern Ghana.

Since the last reporting period our partner organisation in Ghana has conducted a series of training workshops in order to build capacities among the to-be candidates for the up-coming municipal and parliamentary elections. A total of 154 women aspiring to become Assembly members were given training on how to plan their electoral campaigns, on public speaking, and Negotiation Skills within a political context. District assembly candidates have also gained a better understanding of Ghana's Governance Structures and Operations at the District Assembly level.

In order to facilitate the adoption and implementation of Gender sensitive development policies and practices at 13 District Assemblies in Northern Ghana, FOSDA has engaged the Gender desk officers at each district by raising their awareness on the Domestic Violence Law. This will help in effectively educate and support women at the local level to demand their rights, reduce teenage pregnancy, child labour, forced marriage, rape and other instances of domestic violence.

Our partnership with Treatment Advocacy and Literacy Campaign (TALC)

TALC, a Zambian NGO led by and for People Living with HIV is running the End AIDS portal in Zambia. In its pilot phase the Portal was accessible in three locations: Lusaka, Mongu and Mkushi. DFID provided 100% of the budget of £249,000 over 18 months.

The End AIDS Portal provides a one-to-one service for people living with or concerned about HIV that enables them to ask HIV-related questions by mobile phone short message service (SMS) and receive individualised SMS responses to their questions.

Achievements and performance (continued)

A final evaluation to the pilot was conducted in November 2014. The findings demonstrated that the Portal was a highly relevant intervention for people living with HIV. The project was successful in establishing a system that receives and responds to HIV-related SMS from users of mobile phones. Moreover, whilst the Portal concept appeared to be quite straightforward, it proved to be quite complex to implement and therefore the use of the Portal was lower than expected. It was concluded that TALC needs more time to determine if the intervention can be made effective, efficient, and sustainable. The evaluation also concluded that more resources should be sought for a second phase focusing on improving the work and addressing the challenges that were encountered during the pilot phase.

Following on from the piloting phase, we are now commencing a transitional phase for the End AIDS Portal. We obtained a grant of £419,807 from Comic Relief to fund this phase over the next two years.

Most of the technical teething issues have been resolved. This will enable a large number of people living with HIV to access information that is useful for them to adhere to their medication. We expect that at least 20,000 people will benefit from portal services over this transitional period before escalating the project nationally.

In order to influence Ministry of Health, the project makes use of the gathered data to inform future HIV programming. The project has also trained clinicians in new Treatment guidelines in order to improve their skills in HIV management at the front line within the health service system. In the event that clinicians are faced with questions that they cannot handle, they are also welcome to contact the portal for advice.

Moreover, the END AIDS Portal is also being used to remind people on ART on their clinical appointment dates. This is meant to improve adherence to antiretroviral treatment and help reduce the number of missed appointments.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Incoming Resources

Recognition of Incoming Resources

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- the Directors are virtually certain they will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

Incoming Resources with related expenditure

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising or contract income) the incoming resource and related expenditure are reported gross in the SOFA.

Grants and Donations

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in incoming resources when these are receivable, except as follows:

- When donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
- When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met.

When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants, are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to pre-conditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds receivable.

Tax reclaims on Donations and Gifts

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SOFA in the same financial period as the gift to which they relate.

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SOFA once the related goods or services has been delivered.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SOFA as incoming resources when receivable.

Donated Services and Facilities

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the Directors' annual report.

Incoming Resources Continued

Investment Income

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

Investment gains and losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Expenditure and liabilities

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

Governance Costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of the Directors' meetings and cost of any legal advice to Directors on governance or constitutional matters.

Grants with performance conditions

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Changes in Accounting policies and previous accounts

There has been no change to the accounting policies (variation rules and methods of accounting) since last year, and no changes to the previous accounts.

Support Costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of the resources, eg allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Assets

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity:

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £50. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt. Depreciation has been provided to write off the cost of fixed assets over their estimated useful life at the rate of 25% for equipment on written down value.

Investments

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at Directors' best estimate of market value.

Basis of preparation:

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis of accounting in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. In preparing the financial statements the charity follows best practice as laid down in the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP) issued in March 2005.
