## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2021. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The company is established to promote, for the public benefit in and around the County Durham and Darlington police force area, the protection of people and property from, and the prevention of, criminal acts in particular by:

- o Developing proactive projects to meet needs
- o Increasing positive perception of young people
- o Inspiring community confidence
- o Stimulating partnership and networking
- o Promoting innovative approaches to crime prevention and community safety
- o Funding, supporting and facilitating projects

#### **Public benefit**

The charity's aims and achievements are set out within this report. The activities set out in this report have been undertaken to further the Charity's charitable purposes for the public benefit. The trustees have complied with the duty under Section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission and the trustees have paid due regard to this guidance in deciding what activities the Charity should undertake, either directly or in conjunction with others.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

Formed in 1991 the Durham Agency Against Crime has gone from strength to strength supporting and creating positive initiatives to reduce crime and the fear of crime to make County Durham and Darlington become a safe place to work, live and invest. The charity responds to meet the needs of communities and now focuses on working towards long term change, by educating, challenging behaviours and acts as a catalyst to local action by managing and facilitating integrated crime prevention and community safety programmes across County Durham and Darlington.

Its award winning projects have received regional and national recognition, which have adapted to meet local needs and trends with huge success. The charity relies on forging strong positive partnerships with various organisations who support the agency ensuring substantial outcomes.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Reserves policy

The charity aims to retain sufficient free reserves on hand to facilitate the ongoing administration of the organisation for at least a period of 12 months. At 31 March 2021 this would approximate to £275,000. At 31 March 2021, the free reserves were £110,824, excluding fixed assets, which was sufficient to fund approximately three months of administration expenses. The charity continues to actively seek new sources of funding to maintain free reserves at the targeted level.

The charity receives the benefit of certain staff costs, including the executive manager and apprentice youth workers. No monetary amounts are recorded in the financial statements to reflect the market value of the financial benefit to the charity.

#### Review of financial statements

The charity held fund balances at the bank at 31 March 2021 of £211,159. Of these balances, £94,388 were restricted funds donated by companies, individuals, and other agencies to be used for specific activities. The balance of £116,771 unrestricted funds is to meet the running costs of the agency.

Donations continue to be received from individuals, companies and other sources to meet the administration costs of the charity. During the year to 31 March 2021 unrestricted income exceeded unrestricted expenditure by £38,241. The directors are aware that an administration charge can be levied on the restricted funds if administration costs are not going to be met by unrestricted income.

## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

In the event of the charitable company being wound up every member of the company undertakes to contribute such amount as may be required (not exceeding one pound) to the company's assets while he is a member or within one year after he ceases to be a member.

## Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of the charity law and under the company's Articles are known as Members of the Board. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the maximum number of Members of the Board shall be determined by the company in a General Meeting, but until so fixed there shall be no maximum number. The minimum number of Members of the Board shall be three. The Board shall have the power at any time, and from time to time, to appoint any person to be a Member of the Board either to fill a casual vacancy or as an additional Member of the Board.

Due to the nature of the company and its role focusing on young people and business crime, Members elected to the Board are recruited from such areas as the police service, fire and rescue service, probation service, youth engagement service, community safety service as well as Chief Executives of local businesses.

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Durham Agency Against Crime Limited ('the Company')

#### Responsibilities and basis of report

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under historical cost convention.

There were no material departures from that standard.

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below and have remained unchanged from the previous year, and also have been consistently applied within the same accounts.

#### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Charitable activities

The charity has operated a number of different projects that contribute to its aims and objectives during the year, details of the projects are given in note 15.

## Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Fixtures, fittings & other equipment

- 20% - 33% on cost

Motor vehicles

- 25% on reducing balance

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively for charitable purposes. The charity is not exempt from Value Added Tax. Irrecoverable Value Added Tax is included in the cost of those items to which it relates.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

## Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 March 2021

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

## Critical areas of judgement and key estimates

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

#### Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The charity makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

#### Critical areas of judgement:

Depreciation - Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less residual value, over the economic life of that asset. An estimate of the useful life of assets is detailed in the depreciation accounting policy. The value of depreciation charge during the year was £4,184.

#### Financial instruments

The charitable company has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

#### Government grants

Capital based grants are credited to the profit and loss account in equal instalments, over the estimated useful life of the related asset.

Revenue based grants are credited to the profit and loss account on receipt.

- 2. Insight Insight is a substance and alcohol misuse programme aimed at educating parents and carers to understand current issues within their neighbourhood.
- 3. **Haggrid** The HAGGRID project's mission is to ensure that young people in County Durham and Darlington area are seen as assets to their communities by raising their aspirations and developing them to ensure they achieve positive outcomes and improved community perceptions.
- 4. Wise Drive Driver awareness programme targeting young people who are ready to learn to drive, offering education on how to stay safe, vehicle maintenance, purchasing and opportunities to learn more about the dangerous effects of driving under the influence.
- 5. Cadet Youth engagement scheme for 13 to 17 -year-old children taking on community volunteering, education and outdoor adventure.
- 6. **IOMU** Integrated Offender Management Unit offering training/education to ex-offenders to get back into employment.
- 7. Paws up Fund raising project to support re-homing of retired police dogs.
- 8. Mini Police A project within Durham Constabulary. A fun and interactive volunteering opportunity for 9 to 11-year-old children. The Mini Police support the force priorities, through participation in community engagement events.
- 9. Youth Enrichment Scheme Targeting young people who fit a criteria of extreme poverty, suffered bereavement or have a mental health problem.
