#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association

The company is limited by guarantee, whereby every member of the company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of winding up, while they are members or within one year after they cease to be a member, for payment of the debts and liabilities of the company contracted before they cease to be members, such amounts as may be required not exceeding  $\pounds 1$ 

#### Appointment of trustees

The trustees who have served during the year are set out on page 2. The trustees are appointed by the members of the company and one third of the trustees retire by rotation each year and may offer themselves for re-election in accordance with the Articles of Association.

#### Trustee induction and training

Initially, new trustees are inducted into the Organisation by attending the same induction course as staff, sessional workers, volunteers and placements. Additionally, trustees have access to Age Concern's Board builder training programme, which covers such items as roles and responsibilities, legal obligations under charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, organisation structures and decision making processes, business planning and understanding financial information. The induction process also involves an opportunity for new trustees to meet key employees and other trustees. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events which will facilitate their understanding of their role and meet their individual training needs

#### Organisation

The Board of Trustees administers the charity. The board meets six times during the financial year to manage the charity's affairs receiving reports from senior employees. A Chief Executive is appointed by the trustees to manage the day to day operations of the charity. To facilitate effective operations, the Chief Executive has delegated authority, within terms of delegation approved by the trustees, for operational matters

#### Risk Management

The Board of Trustees considers the major strategic, business and operational risks that the charity faces each year when considering budgets and business planning. Systems have been developed to monitor and control these risks to mitigate any impact that they may have in the future

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

To promote the relief of elderly people in any manner which now or hereafter may be deemed by law to be charitable in and around St Helens (hereinafter called "the area of benefit")

#### Activities

- a) to encourage, promote and organise direct services appropriate to the needs of individual elderly people or groups of elderly people and if thought fit to make reasonable charges for any services provided hereunder,
- b) to promote and organise co-operation in the achievement of the above objects and to that end to support, join in with and co-operate with other charities, voluntary bodies, statutory authorities and other organisations operating in furtherance of the objects or of similar charitable purposes and to exchange information and advice with them,
- c) to establish, support, undertake or execute any charitable trusts, associations or institutions formed for all or any of the objects,
- d) to promote and carry out, or assist in promoting and carrying out, surveys, investigations and research,
- e) to provide food, drink and refreshments as appropriate but only for persons participating in the activities of the Organisation,
- f) to arrange and provide for, or join in arranging and providing for, the holding of exhibitions, meetings, lectures, classes and training courses,
- g) to publish books, pamphlets, reports, leaflets, journals, films, videos, tapes and other material,
- h) to appoint and constitute such advisory committees as the Board of Trustees (hereafter referred to as "the Board" and as further described in Article 1 of the Articles of Association) may think fit,

#### Key Aıms

In line with the organisation's business plan 2006/07 Trustees have stated that in 5 years, Age Concern St Helens will have

- Further developed a system for involving older people in the planning, delivery, monitoring and development of services
- Supported older people in presenting their views and getting their voice heard
- Continued to offer practical support to those people who are less able to help themselves
- Embraced and contributed to the development of the Age Concern "federation" in particular exploring the potential for development partnerships in the context of improving quality of service and efficient use of resources
- Embraced and promoted the Heyday Membership Scheme

The year 2006/07, has continued to be challenging for the Trustees and Staff Changes to our external environment in the context of the re-organisation of our Primary Care Trust to become Halton and St Helens PCT, changes in political leadership of St Helens Council, the changes in profile of both service users and volunteers to support our services, a greater emphasis on providing neighbourhood level services, the advent of practice based commissioning bringing together groups of GP's to commission at a locality level, the shift towards public service commissioning and thus the potential impact upon grant funding locally, have all contributed to us constantly reappraising our work and identifying ways in which we can protect the services which we provide for and with older people

Despite this, in excess of 19,000 people have accessed and benefited from using our range of services

The year began with the news that our franchise agreement with St Helens College to deliver IT courses for older people both at the Mansion House and in community settings would not be renewed as a result of changes in government policy. As a result, we submitted an application to the European Social Fund (ESF) and were successful in securing two years funding to appoint a full-time Lifelong Learning Technologist (IT Tutor) who joined the organisation in September

We were also successful in securing two years Neighbourhood Renewal Funding (NRF) to commence in April 06, which has enabled us to continue to develop our *Workwise* service which we run in partnership with Age Concern Training and which is designed to help older people 50+ make informed decisions about the employment options

One of the major strengths of the voluntary sector is that we can usually add value to the funding which we receive by ensuring that new initiatives dovetail with existing services to enhance our service delivery. In this instance, we have been able to link the ESF funded project to the NRF projects as well as enhancing both projects through the support which has been available through our information and advice service

Within our Active Care Service, we have observed both highs and lows during the year. In July, we held a glorious Garden Party at the Mansion House for all service users, their families, friends and members of the local community through our links with the "Friends of Victoria Park" group, Surestart and the Stroke Association who work with us on the site to engage with local people of all ages to use the facilities on site. The weather was kind and we were delighted to welcome the Mayor of St Helens, Councillor Theresa Simms to join in the celebration.

As the year progressed however, we have seen reducing numbers within our Active Care Service, both at the Mansion House and in the community. We have also observed a reduction in the numbers of volunteers coming forward to work in this area. When combined with increasing costs and following a period of consultation with those people using the service, volunteers and external funders, we took the decision to move out of some of our community venues and bring people together in a more vibrant group within the Mansion House Active Age Centre which in turn makes the service more viable moving forward.

We remain committed to making a real difference in the lives of those people who are at risk of becoming socially isolated and housebound. Our Befriending Scheme continues to be valued within the community and this year we are delighted that the Scheme has been awarded the Mentoring and Befriending Foundation Award in recognition of the quality of the service delivery and support for our volunteers

In July we underwent the Age Concern Federation Quality Counts Assessment Audit. This places a requirement on local Age Concerns to achieve certain standards, which are described as statements of expectations. Failure to do so can result in the organisation losing the Age Concern brand. We are also delighted to report that the organisation achieved all of the expectations and the feedback from the Membership and Standards Committee nationally, captures both the vibrancy of the organisation and the commitment to quality, which is demonstrated each day through our work.

As the organisation has grown, so too has the need for us to continue to develop our management information systems. The demands now placed upon us by our funders is such that we have to demonstrate not simply the numbers of people accessing our services, but also what difference we have made in their lives (the outcome). To this end, we have developed and piloted a Lifestyle Survey which is designed to capture information with regard to the impact that we make on peoples' lives. This is additional to our routine Customer Satisfaction Surveys which have been in existence now for the past couple of years. In September, we were selected as one of only seven Age Concerns nationally to develop the outcomes focus framework around our Information and Advice Services and we are grateful to the Big Lottery for allowing us to reallocate some under-spend from year two of their funding to further develop this work into the third and final year of the Information and Advice Project

Over the previous two years, we were unsuccessful in trying to secure funding to upgrade the IT infrastructure within the organisation. However, in September, we heard that we had been successful in a bid to Age Concern England's New Opportunities Fund which has awarded money to be spent during 2006/07 and 2007/08 to install a server which will allow remote access, to continue to develop the database structures and establish an on-going training programme for staff and volunteers

We have continued to hold fundraising events to raise funds to upgrade and replace a minibus. By November, we had raised in excess of £9,000. In December 2006 Trustees took the decision to commit to the expenditure as a demonstration of our commitment to maintain our core business activity despite the difficult financial climate. We are grateful to Age Concern Tameside for negotiating a price which was within our remit and thus enabled us to take delivery of our new bus in January 2007.

Also in November 2006, we held a celebration event to recognise the achievements of the one year Abbey funded *Workwide* Project which was launched in November 2005. In excess of 80% of those people who joined this borough wide programme were successful in securing employment opportunities. Gordon Lishman, Director General of Age Concern England, was the guest speaker at the event and he acknowledged the way in which older people were being offered choices with regard to employment opportunities and also praised the way in which Age Concern St Helens and Age Concern Training were able to work in partnership to make a real difference at local level by bringing together specific employment expertise and embracing it into the other local Age Concern services to enhance the work of both Organisations for the benefit of older people in St Helens

Age Concern St Helens continues to remain committed to working in partnership, recognising that as the population ages, Age Concern can be all things to all people. Following successful achievements with the Quality Counts Award, plaudits have been received from The Chief Executive of St Helens Council, The Chief Executive of Halton and St Helens PCT, The Director of Social Services for St Helens Council as well as other key partners

The year has proved to be difficult in terms of surviving in a volatile income environment. In recognition of predicted changes to income streams over the next few years, Age Concern St Helens committed to participating in the national Age Concerns Heyday Membership Recruitment Scheme. This necessitated us committing some local resource to trying to attract paying members to join Heyday who would in return be offered a range of discounts and products through a range of top brands and tourist attractions. Unfortunately, the local approach to recruitment did not appear to work and at a national level Age Concern England reviewed its business plan and decided in February to move away from local recruitment organisers to a more centrally based approach targeting larger employers. From Age Concern St Helens' point of view, the decision to cease involvement was taken early in November to ensure that we were able to protect the viability of our trading subsidiary, St Helens Age Concern Trading Limited, given that we were also experiencing a significant drop in unrestricted income previously generated through our insurance service commissions.

The introduction of our Wedding Service offered on the Mansion House site, continues to go from strength to strength. At the end of the second year of the original business plan, the activity is now in surplus and we have seen a return on our original investment. We are currently reviewing the business plan with a view to allocating more resources to develop the service further in the future

As a result of the continued financial challenges during the year, in December we were forecasting an end of year deficit of £72K. The Chief Executive recommended that action needed to be taken to remedy the situation and proposed that some posts which had been frozen for recruitment since the summer, should be removed from the budget for 2007/08 and with some adjustments to staff roles, that tasks should be reallocated. Additionally, continued efforts were made to reduce expenditure which resulted in a year end deficit of £50,481.

The adjustments, moving forward, enabled the Trustees to approve a balanced budget for 2007/08. This includes strengthening the contribution which will be made from the Trading Company to the Chanty, based upon the reduction in Insurance Arranger posts. We have invested also in the development of a Market Based Sales function which aims to use the internet to sell donated goods, as opposed to simply using our charity shops. As a result of the increasing charity shop competition in St Helens, the Trustees have approved an external review and have asked Age Concern Retail to conduct the review

In March, Trustees held their Forward Planning Day, "The Olympics" Colleagues from Age Concern England, St Helens Council's Adults Social Care and Health and Age Concern Halton were invited to contribute to the planning process. The outcome of this process was to confirm our commitment to our mission statement, values and principles and re-define our aims and vision for the next five years.

There has been much talk about changes in the way in which services will be funded in the future with the advent of the concept of public service commissioning. It is suggested that for us to compete for some of the contracts, we will need to demonstrate that we are "fit for purpose" in the context of due care and diligence around financial management, having sufficient resources to cover contract liabilities and a proven track record of delivering the service. This will necessitate we believe, the need to strategically align ourselves with other partners, and one first attempt at this is us seeking to work more collaboratively with Age Concern Halton given that we both work to the same Primary Care Trust

Over the next few years it is likely that commissioners will tender for a specific service activity as opposed to an age sensitive service provision. This we believe could necessitate us aligning ourselves with other organisations including not-for-profit, public sector and possibly the private sector.

We ended the year with the news that our attempts to secure funding to sustain our Advocacy, Information and Advice Service had been unsuccessful. This meant that we have had to lose committed staff at the end of their contracts and we are now only able to offer the service for 3 days each week. We are indebted to the support we have received from St Helens Council Adult Health and Social Care who are keen to ensure that we find a way with our health partners of protecting our Advocacy, Information and Advice and Senior Voice services

The Trustees have undertaken ongoing monitoring of the situation during the course of the year. An Action Plan was introduced to address the emerging issues which has resulted in a reduction from the original forecasted deficit of £72K, to an end of year actual deficit of £50,481

We continue to demonstrate our commitment to involving older people and ensuring that their voice is heard through supporting the facilitation of St Helens Senior Voice Forum. They have made a significant contribution to service development, monitoring and evaluation as part of the local community including leading a consultative event to contribute and inform the emerging local transport plan which is integral to the Local Area Agreement being operated within St Helens.

The Trustees continue to recognise the commitment and contributions from the Chief Executive, all of the staff and volunteers and would like to extend a sincere thank you to everyone for their continued support, encouragement, guidance and commitment and hope that as we move forward, we can begin to achieve a sense of stability, for the next part of our journey

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The net resources expended of the group for the year amounted to £50,481 (Year to 31 March 2006 £46,881)

#### Volunteer Contribution

The organisation currently has 129 volunteers delivering 518 hours of service each week. If the minimum wage is used as the basis of calculating these contributions (£5 85 per hour) over the course of the year, volunteers have provided 26,936 hours, which equates to a contribution of £157,576. This figure excludes any recruitment, national insurance, pension or other costs that would normally be paid for employees

The charity is aware of changes in the age profile, skill base and availability of those who are volunteering Increased monitoring activity has been introduced in the context of increasing recruitment activity and the potential increased costs of volunteer turnover

#### Income

Total incoming resources for 2006/07 were £942,034 compared with £875,750 in the previous year which represents a marginal increase of 75%. Services have continued to develop but Trustees and Senior Officers are monitoring incoming resources from charitable activities, which are up by 15% to £535,769. This is a result of changes in eligibility criteria by several funding bodies with a greater emphasis on targeted funding for geographic communities or communities of interest.

The trading company incoming resources for 2006/07 were £146,206 compared with £170,376 in the previous year. This represents a 14% decrease

The insurance commission income is down by £30,311 on last year, due to the underlying trend of business decline which is the result of increased competition within the insurance industry. Total trading commission income is down by £30,390 to £86,173 in 2006/07

With the continued development of Weddings at the Mansion House as an activity the Trading Company Conference and Wedding income is up by 17% on the previous year to £54,995 in 2006/07

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW (continued)

#### Expenditure

Expenditure increased by £69,884 (75%) over the previous year £29,000 of this increase was represented by an increase in staff costs. Additional costs were also incurred in improving services delivered to service users. A new expenditure incurred this year was Workwise training of £64,436. In the case of payroll costs, all employments are scrutinized and sanctioned by the Trustees.

In respect of repairs and renewals, the additional expenditure arose from damage and ongoing maintenance to the grade II listed building, known as the Mansion House, which the charity has now owned for thirteen years

The increase in Active Age expenditure has arisen as a result of the development of activities within the Active Age Centre at the Mansion House and in the community

The Trading Company expended resources for 2006/07 were £143,493 compared with £136,423 in the previous year. This is an increase of 5%

The Trustees are aware that the accounts for 2006/07 have a deficit of £50,481 and in March 2007 reviewed all activities and took remedial action where necessary

#### Investment powers and policy

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the trustees have unlimited powers of investment subject only to seeking advice from a person or organisation authorised under the Financial Services Act

As cash funds are considered not to be available in the long term, the trustees have engaged the treasury reserve centre of National Westminster Bank to monitor bank balances which meets the charity's requirements to generate additional income. The trustees consider the return achieved of £3,782 to be satisfactory

Age Concern St Helens investments are small, never the less Trustees and Senior Officers review these on a regular basis

#### Reserves Policy

The Trustees have reviewed the charity's needs for reserves in line with the guidance issued by the Charity Commission, and have a reserves policy which is reviewed annually in accordance with financial audit processes. The trustees believe that in addition to known commitments there is a need to hold at least six months running costs in reserve given that the charity's sources of funding are not certain

The policy statement provides that the trustees will produce annually a detailed analysis of reserves, both restricted and unrestricted based on the audited accounts, indicating the trustees' intentions with regard to the use of those reserves

For the year ended 31 March 2007 this analysis revealed that of total reserves of £1,649,532, £1,425,040 was held as tangible fixed assets, £49,169 was held as restricted funds less £25,569 (restricted fixed assets) and the balance of £200,892 represented less than three months running costs

#### TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITIES IN RELATION TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Responsibilities of the Board of Trustees

Company law requires the trustees, who are also the directors of the charity, to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the group and of the surplus or deficit of the company and of the group for that period In preparing those accounts, the trustees are required to -

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- follow applicable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts,
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and of the group and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and of the group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF AGE CONCERN ST HELENS

We have audited the accounts on pages 15 to 38 which have been prepared under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out on pages 19 and 20

This report is made solely to the charitable company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and its members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

The responsibilities of the charity trustees who also act as company directors for preparing the Annual Report and the accounts in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards are set out in the Statement of Trustees Responsibilities

Our responsibility is to audit the accounts in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland)

We report to you our opinion as to whether the accounts give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Trustees' Report is not consistent with the accounts, if the charity has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law, regarding trustees' remuneration and transactions with the charity is not disclosed

We read the Trustees' Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it

# NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007

#### 1 Accounting Policies

#### 1.1 Basis Of Accounting

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985, Accounting and Reporting by Charities – Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP 2005) and The Charities Act 1993

The company has taken advantage of the exemptions in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small company

#### 1.2 Basis Of Consolidation

The accounts have been prepared for the charity and its subsidiary, St Helens Age Concern Trading Limited. A profit and loss account for the company has not been presented as permitted by Section 230 of the Companies Act 1985.

#### 1.3 Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are capitalised at cost, where acquired, or management's approximate valuation of cost where donated

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, over their expected useful lives on the following bases -

Land not provided
Buildings 2% on cost
Equipment 20% to 33% on cost

Furniture, fixtures & fittings 20% to 33% on cost

Motor vehicles 20% on cost

#### 1.4 Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value

#### 1.5 Donations and Grants

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when

- the charity becomes entitled to the donation, grant or similar income and any conditions for receipt are met
- the trustees are reasonably certain they will receive it, and
- the trustees are reasonably certain that the value can be reliably measured

#### 1 Accounting Policies (continued)

#### 1.6 Investment Income

This and any associated tax credits are included in the accounts when receivable

#### 1.7 Expenditure and liabilities

General liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to expenditure. Expenditure has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

#### 1.8 Leased Assets

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the leases

#### 1.9 Pension Costs

Age Concern St Helens contributes to defined contribution pension schemes and stakeholder pensions schemes for certain employees, and to Age Concern Retirement Benefits Scheme a defined benefit scheme for one employee Contributions are charged in the Statement of Financial Activities

#### 1.10 Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either

- Unrestricted general funds these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees
- Restricted funds these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

#### 22 Pension Costs

The charity contributes to defined contribution pension schemes and stakeholder pension schemes for certain employees and the charge for the year was £5,139 (2006 £5,839)

The Charity participates in the Age Concern Retirement Benefits Scheme which with effect from 1 October 2001 has a defined contribution section and a defined benefit section. The Scheme is a multi employer scheme as described by FRS17 – Retirement Benefits and it has not been possible to identify the charity's share of the underlying assets and liabilities. As a result all pension costs for the Charity will be reported on a defined contribution basis

The cost for the period was £6,878 (2006 - £5,214)

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at the balance sheet date

The last actuarial valuation of the Age Concern Retirement Benefits Scheme at 1 April 2004 showed a deficit for the whole scheme of £8 9m using an ongoing assessment of the funding position. The employer contribution rate was increased to 21% of pensionable salaries from 1 April 2004 and further increased to 25 2% from 1 April 2005 with the aim of eliminating the deficit over the future working lifetime of the membership

Financial Reporting Standard 17 is being phased in over the next year. Using this as a basis the deficit for the whole scheme would be in the region of f 13 4M (2006 - f 14 022M)
