Future Developments

Notes

(forming part of the financial statements)

1 Status of the association

The Finance & Leasing Association is a company limited by guarantee and does not have share capital. In the event of winding up, each full member is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 towards its debts and liabilities. At 31 December 2006 there were 109 full members and 84 associate members.

2 Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the Associations financial statements

In these financial statements the following new standards have been adopted for the first time

- FRS 21 'Events after the balance sheet date'
- The presentation requirements of FRS 25 'Financial instruments' presentation and disclosure'
- FRS 28 'Corresponding amounts'

The accounting policies under these new standards are set out below. They have had no material effect on these financial statements

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and under the historical cost accounting rules

Member' subscriptions

Members' subscriptions are recognised on an accruals basis

Fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided by the Association to write off the cost less the estimated residual value of tangible fixed assets by equal instalments over their estimated useful economic lives as follows

Leasehold improvements

- period of lease

Office equipment

- 3 to 5 years

Leases

All leases are accounted for as "operating leases" and the rental charges are charged to the profit and loss account on a straight line basis over the life of the lease

Pension costs

Contributions are made to the Group Personal Pension Scheme as set out in Note 16 The amount charged against profits represents the contributions payable to the scheme in respect of the accounting period

Taxation

Deferred tax is recognised without discounting in respect of all timing differences between treatment of certain items for taxation and accounting purposes which have arisen but not reversed by the balance sheet date, except as otherwise required by FRS 19

2 Accounting policies (continued)

Other trading income

Other trading income represents income from conferences and training courses held during the year, income from statistical services, income from the sale of publications, and project income from chargeable projects carried out on a cost recovery basis on behalf of group members, excluding value added tax

Cash and liquid resources

Cash, for the purpose of the cash flow statement, comprises cash in hand and deposits repayable on demand, less overdrafts payable on demand. Liquid resources are current asset investments which are disposable without curtailing or disrupting the business and are either readily convertible into known amounts of cash at or close to their carrying values. Liquid resources comprise term deposits of less than one year (other than cash)
