STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee and is registered as a charity

Risk Management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error

Trustees

Trustees are therefore both company directors and trustees. Under the amended Memorandum & Articles of Association adopted at the 2008 AGM at least 50% of the board of trustees must be healthcare professionals and the core of the board is formed by the chairman, immediate past chairman/chairman elect and the honorary secretary of the BMS Medical Advisory Council. Trustees with expertise in areas other than medicine, including financial, publishing, marketing/PR and business may be appointed to the board of trustees by the board of trustees.

At the AGM on Thursday 5 July, Mary Ann Lumsden, Joan Pitkin and Judith Lovelace stood down as trustees Mary Ann completed her four-year tenure as chairman and Joan Pitkin her five-year tenure as honorary secretary and Judith Lovelace completed four years as an independent non-medical trustee Thanks to all three of them for their continued commitment, hard work and support

Four new trustees were duly elected at the AGM Eddie Morris as chairman elect, Heather Currie as honorary secretary, together with Patrick Shervington and John Stevenson, who join the board following the acquisition of Women's Health Concern

The BMS board of eight trustees, with combined skills in the areas of medicine, charity, business & finance and publishing, provides the BMS with a balanced and effective governing body. Trustees are inducted to the policies and procedures of the charity by the chief executive and training is offered as appropriate.

Medical Advisory Council

Medical Advisory Council members are elected by the members of the BMS. With the exception of the chairman, immediate past chairman and chairman elect, one third of council members retire from office at each AGM. A retiring council member is eligible for re-election for one further term. Council members are appointed at the AGM, although they can be appointed by council in the interim.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The British Menopause Society is a registered charity and multi-disciplinary society. It is directed at the medical profession, with membership open to healthcare professionals and others specialising in post reproductive health

The BMS was founded in 1989 and is dedicated to advancing education in all matters related to post reproductive health through lectures, conferences, meetings, exhibitions and publications, including its journal, Menopause International

The challenge of post reproductive health management is increasing. As most British women can expect more than thirty years of post-reproductive life, the consequences for immediate and long-term healthcare are significant. The BMS aims to increase awareness of these healthcare issues and is committed to promoting optimal clinical management through its activities.

The Memorandum & Articles of Association (Mem & Arts) of the BMS, which was incorporated on 27 October 1992, define the objects for which the company was established These are

- 1 To facilitate the advancement of education by the promotion of interest in all matters relating to the menopause (meaning the short and long term consequences of ovarian failure and the associated life events occurring in women)
- 2 To facilitate the multi-disciplinary study of matters relating to the menopause and exchange of information and ideas between persons working in this field
- 3 To promote high standards of training for those involved in advising women about the menopause and its consequences

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

BMS acquisition of Women's Health Concern (WHC)

Following four years of consultation, both externally with lawyers and accountants and internally with our members, and following lengthy negotiation and due diligence, the Board of Trustees' proposal to acquire WHC as the society's patient arm was unanimously supported by the membership Sara Moger, the chief executive, reported that there would be inescapable cost implications, pertaining to governance including legal, accounting, IT and administration, but she reassured the membership that these would be monitored and contained rigorously and shared equably with WHC where possible. Chairman Nick Panay said at the AGM that it had long been his ambition for the BMS to 'square the circle' and help educate both clinicians and patients by acquiring a patient arm. He was delighted that this had happened under his chairmanship and said that the prospects for greater outreach and the opportunity for increased fundraising were very exciting.

Conference & Meetings

The BMS once again organised an active and varied education programme during 2012

Annual conference

The 22nd annual conference and the Annual General Meeting took place at the Norton Park Hotel in Winchester on 4 - 6 July There were 172 paying delegates (147 in 2011) and 17 trustees/medical advisory council members paying at cost £27,400 was secured from 14 sponsors (2011 £19,500 from 9 sponsors) The conference made a surplus of £29,978 (2010 £28,800) It was encouraging too that for the second year running - after nine years of declining attendance - delegate numbers increased from 203 in 2011 to 230 in 2012

Mr Tim Hillard chaired the scientific advisory group, which selected the subjects and speakers for the conference, taking care to represent the multi-disciplinary nature of post reproductive health. The quality of the speakers, national, and international, and the standard of their presentations was particularly high. Special thanks go to Dr David. Richmond, RCOG Vice-President Standards for delivering the BMS Lecture RCOG Recommendations for women's health and to Dr James Pickar, Associate Professor of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Columbia University College of Physicians. & Surgeons, New York, who gave the Pat Patterson Memorial Lecture TSECS. The future of Hormone Replacement?

This year we were pleased to revive the Nurse Symposium, which took place on Wednesday 4 July and was generously sponsored by MSD. Our thanks to MSD for their continued support of the society. The session was chaired by Kathy Abernethy and Mandy Hillard and the topics covered were Prescribing issues in menopause and Advanced nursing practice in menopause. Our thanks to Jan Brockie and Debra Holloway for two excellent sessions.

Educational meetings

Regional women's health meetings continued to be well attended and were highly evaluated. The 2012 programme comprised seven one-day women's health meetings, these took place in Crewe, Perth, Southend-on-Sea, Bexley, Guildford, Glasgow and Leeds

We are very grateful to Simon Cunningham, Liz Kennedy, Nidhi Tripathi, Mike Savvas, Sovra Whitcroft, Heather Currie and Julie Ayres for arranging comprehensive and relevant programmes and inviting to-quality speakers also go to Jenny Lyons who arranged an excellent half day Masterclass in Carlisle

Special thanks go to Heather Currie for overseeing all regional meetings and for generously giving of her time and talent

In addition to regional meetings and masterclasses, the joint RCOG/BMS ATSM took place at the RCOG in March and was attended by 98 delegates over the two days (2011 60). Our thanks once again to Nick Panay for putting together a superb programme. For the first time, the BMS staged its own joint FSRH/BMS Special Skills Modules. These were held in Reading and Manchester and were very well attended. These meetings, led by Heather Currie, Elaine. Stephens and Julie Ayres, are core to the BMS educational programme and such is the need, we will look to increase these from two per year to three, when resources permit.

Finally, as a result of the acquisition of WHC, two new educational meetings were introduced to the programme. A joint BMS/WHC meeting comprising a masterclass aimed at clinicians in the afternoon, followed by a lay meeting for women in the evening. This took place in Marlow and we were very grateful to Nick Panay, John Stevenson, Joan Pitkin, and Patrick Shervington for attending and speaking at both meetings. Thirty GPs and specialist nurses attended the masterclass, seventy-five women attended the evening workshop and both meetings were very well evaluated. The joint meeting also made a surplus of £3,500 and we hope that this will be the first of many such joint meetings.

Also slotted into an already busy autumn programme was the Women's Health Concern 22nd Annual Symposium John Stevenson put together a comprehensive programme and lectures included Sexual function and the older woman, Joan Pitkin, Urogynaecology update fixing the plumbing Dudley

Robinson and Menorrhagia alternatives to hysterectomy, Tim Hillard The symposium took place at the

RCOG on 12 December and 188 delegates attended, giving a surplus of £17,400 - a helpful dose of income at the close of the year

Meetings continue to be a core activity and financial lifeblood for the BMS. As well as providing education, and information for more than 1,000 GPs, specialist & practice nurses, the seven regional meetings and the masterclass made a healthy surplus of £30,000 (£40,000 2011). This was a drop in income on the previous year as a result of the resources expended on the additional two SSMs and the WHC symposium, which between them brought in additional revenue of £25,800.

In 2013, eight one-day women's' health meetings are planned in Alsager, Glasgow, Solihull, Cambridge, Colchester, Peterborough, Portsmouth and Leeds Two joint FSRH/BMS SSMs in Nottingham (11 and 12 March) and Kenilworth (3 and 4 October) and a half-day MSD sponsored HRT update meeting in Stevenage entitled Million Women Study/Women's Health Initiative 10 Years on The 23rd annual conference will take place in Stratford-upon-Avon on 23 and 24 May and the WHC Annual Symposium will be staged at the RCOG on Thursday 14 November

Nick Panay is once again arranging a joint RCOG/BMS ATSM at the RCOG which will take place on 26 and 27 November 2013

External educational meetings

The BMS was invited to arrange programmes at prestigious meetings during 2012 Firstly the FRSH annual conference "Current Choices" at the Royal College of Physicians on 23 November and secondly the RCOG Annual Professional Development Conference on 27 November In 2013 the BMS has been invited to have a dedicated session at the RCOG World Congress in Liverpool Arena & Convention Centre on 26 June 2013

Membership

Membership numbers as at 31 December 2012 were 615 (cf 656 as at 31 December 2011) a drop in revenue of £5,930. The issue is the number of cancelled (31) and lapsed (70) memberships during the year. The majority of cancelled memberships are due to retirement, closure of menopause clinics and a change of focus from post-reproductive health.

The additional work generated by the WHC Symposium during October and November materially affected the autumn membership drive and for this reason the date in 2013 is three weeks earlier, which should go some way to alleviate this problem

Retaining and attracting new members remains a constant challenge. Incentives are offered to new members and to lapsed members from September for example fifteen months membership for the price of twelve and discounted memberships are offered to delegates at the autumn one-day women's health meetings. However, the downward trend continues. A key focus in 2013 will be retaining and increasing membership, but realistically, until women's health is part of the GP contract, this will continue to be a challenge.

Menopause International

In November 2012, the Royal Society of Medicine Press announced that it was selling RSM Press Journals and society-assigned journals and this sale took place on 19 November by SAGE Publications. An informal meeting was held with SAGE at the RCP to discuss a new contract. The journal was transferred to SAGE on 23 November and the December issue was produced and circulated as normal. There was some delay in the production of the March edition, but this was due largely to the handover between RSM Press and SAGE Publications. A meeting to finalise the contract was held on 1 May 2013. It was agreed to commit to a four year contract (1 January 2013 - 31 December 2016), with regular reviews and with a view to discussing renewal - or not - of the contract mid-2015.

Eddie Morris and Heather Currie, the editors, together with Tony Mander, the associate editor, are to be congratulated on their hard work, commitment and dedication to the journal Menopause International continues to be a well-received resource of news, research and opinion and is a valued and important part of BMS membership

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Website

The website continued to be an invaluable source of information and guidance for healthcare professionals. The importance of online registration for the annual conference, women's' health meetings and masterclasses became increasingly apparent, as was the facility to renew and sign up for membership. An important benefit of membership is the member's forum, giving the opportunity to discuss clinical problems and raise queries and receive personal focussed responses. This continues to be somewhat underused, but is slowly improving. Our thanks go to Heather Currie who oversees the website

Administration

Caroline Matthews, our part-time Office Manager & Membership Secretary, continues to provide excellent support to the board of trustees, the medical advisory council and to the membership - and to the office. In addition to her office manager responsibilities, Caroline added to her financial responsibilities by undertaking the role of book-keeper, mastering the Sage accounting package and thus has making a significant saving to the society. Her commitment, hard work and good humour have been greatly valued. Thanks also go to Barbara Halstead, who provides marketing support to the BMS, on a consultancy basis. She provides a professional service and the BMS has benefitted from her external marketing perspective. In February 2013 Kate Ellis joined the small BMS team. Kate is responsible for the administration involved in the extended education programme and is the main point of contact with the venue, speakers and delegates. Whilst working only ten hours per week, she has already made her mark working with great efficiency and humour.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The general economic climate throughout 2012 continued to be challenging. In addition, the BMS continued to weather the effects of the ongoing reduction in industry budgets, restricted interest in menopause, lack of NHS funds and reduced study leave.

However, the BMS made a surplus of £8,728 in 2012 [2011 £7,206 surplus] Given the additional expenses relating to the acquisition of WHC, which included legal and accountancy costs, nurse and consultancy fees, website and other expenses, together with a new telephone system and IT, this is a respectable year-end result. A combination of stringent management of outgoings and increased income generation through the annual conference and, in particular, the education programme, resulted in this significantly better end-of-year financial situation in 2012

2013 FORECAST

The 2013 budget was circulated, in October 2012 and approved and endorsed by the board of trustees at the meeting held on 6 November 2012

The draft budget showed a projected surplus of just under £13,500, which, given the additional ongoing overheads—and the economic recession is modest, but realistic—As ever, income is forecast conservatively and expenditure is a mixture of realistic and 'on the high side'

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

The charity had total incoming resources for the year of £249,591 (2011 £198,925) details of which are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities Resources expended totalled £240,936 (2011 £191,783) resulting in a surplus for the year of £8,728 (2011 surplus £7,206)

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Plant and machinery etc

- 33% on cost and 20% on reducing balance

Stacks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease
