FINANCIAL REVIEW

DanceXchange has ended 2006/07 in a good financial position, with a healthy surplus, largely due to prudent budget management. This will be used to support ongoing organisational development, and is this year being used to cover the cost of employing a Programme and Marketing Assistant. The next challenge for DanceXchange as it moves forward, is to further diversify its funding base in order to support escalating core costs and fund new and innovative projects in an increasingly difficult funding climate. The impact of this is felt across all areas of our work.

RESERVES POLICY

The income and expenditure of the charity fluctuates according to the pattern of the grant and project income obtained. As the charity employs a number of staff, the Board of Directors consider that reserves are needed to provide for an orderly wind down in the event of unexpected reduction in the funds obtained. The company is also required on occasion to incur the costs of developing and researching work before the grants which have been awarded, and other related income, are actually received, the company therefore needs a level of reserve for cash flow reasons. In the opinion of the Board of Directors the reserves of the charity are appropriate for its scale of operation.

Main Achievements During the Year

The following selection of significant projects in 2006/07, offers a perspective on artistic quality, and highlights progress in terms of profile, audience development and participation

The Patrick Centre Performance Programme

A particular highlight of 2006 was DanceXchange's 15th Anniversary Performance in November, which celebrated 15 years of DanceXchange and 5 years in the redeveloped Birmingham Hippodrome building Bringing together a mixed bill of community and professional performances, we achieved a line-up that was accessible and very watch-able whilst at the same time cutting-edge and of extraordinary quality. This event marked The Patrick Centre's coming-of-age and was also very successful in helping to raise our profile with key stakeholders in the region.

Overall, 2006/07 saw The Patrick Centre go from strength to strength, with a diverse programme, including work from Bill Shannon, Hofesh Shechter, Maresa von Stockert, Vincent Dance Theatre and Rui Horta, and family performances from Cas Public and Aracaladanza Audiences for our performance seasons were the best ever, with average ticket sales per show increasing by a staggering 75% from 66 in 05/06 to 116 in 06/07, and exceeding audience targets by 32%. This is largely due to our much improved marketing, as well as stronger relationships with schools and colleges which have generated more group attendances. It is also due to the maturing of The Patrick Centre as a venue and to our strong commitment to build a quality programme which is distinct from other venues in the region. The Patrick Centre is at an exciting stage in its development, with more international companies being programmed for the coming year, and much more to come.

Recreational Class Programme

The Class Programme continues to offer regular classes for people of all ages and abilities, with 51 classes a week in a diverse range of styles, from Ballet to Bollywood, Salsa to Street Dance

Our Autumn class survey showed 57% of participants were aged 24 or under, and over 25% were from non-white backgrounds. Across the year, participation increased by over 14% from 17,953 experiences in 2005/06, to 20,491 in 2006/07, demonstrating that our classes are now engaging more people than ever in healthy dance activity

Bare Bones

Bare Bones – The 5 Man Show toured from May to November 2006, visiting 20 venues, attracting a total audience of 7,667, and delivering education work to over a thousand participants. The show was incredibly well received by press, audiences and venues alike

Other Bare Bones highlights

- Bare Bones The 5 Man Show reached an international audience and for the first time toured in Israel as part of a prestigious European dance festival. During 4 performances in Israel the show was seen by 3,500 audience members and the Bare Bones dancers work-shopped over 800 young people. The Suzanne Dellal Centre in Tel Aviv now wants to develop further links with DanceXchange.
- As a result of Bare Bones' success across the UK and abroad, the British Council has invited Bare Bones for inclusion in its Performance In Profile 2007 directory, which gathers together 'some of the most talented people working in the arts today' and is 'a guide to UK companies and artists currently creating interesting, innovative work available for international touring'
- DanceXchange sourced extra funding from Birmingham City Council to create a Bare Bones 'Boys into Dance' project, resulting in three boys groups performing at DanceXchange's 15th Anniversary Celebrations

DAIR To

Dance Xchange's Dance Artists in Residence initiative, *DAIR To*, has continued to do excellent work throughout 2006/07, creating over 7,000 education experiences for disadvantaged young people across the West Midlands, along with hundreds of opportunities for them to perform. We are particularly pleased with the new relationships built through the Refugee Council, Pupil Referral Units and Looked After Children Centres, in a level of engagement with such groups that we have not had before

The professional commission was also a highlight of the DAIR To—year, with a very positive and successful tour reaching over 1,800 audience members in the five partner areas – Birmingham, Dudley, Solihull, Stoke-on-Trent and Shropshire Choreographed by Dylan Quinn, Seeing Red was a piece about isolation and fitting in, made especially for young audiences

The following list gives a sense of the range and depth of DAIR To 's work, which has included Leading a series of cheerleading workshops linked to a local youth football league for a community centre, Hosting a summer school where students from Special Educational Needs schools and mainstream schools work together to create a performance piece,

Choreographing for an advanced performance group that showcases the talent of the area's best dancers through performances in professional theatres,

Delivering the Arts Award (an arts-focused scheme similar to the Duke of Edinburgh Awards) for a group of young dancers linked to the Youth Service,

Creating workshops for young people that link to professional shows taking place in partners' venues, Producing sold-out performances of youth dance platforms at The Regent Theatre in Stoke-on-Trent and Stourbridge Town Hall,

Encouraging boys to take part in dance through workshops created specifically for them, Working with people of different ages to create a performance piece celebrating Mother's Day, Offering opportunities during term breaks and half-terms for young dancers to develop their skills and meet likeminded individuals,

Engaging young people attending Pupil Referral Units through dance activity, Devising an issue-based piece for the Refugee Council's Unaccompanied Minors' Group

Telford Culture Zone

DanceXchange began delivery on the Telford Culture Zone project in 2006/7 and has worked hard to build meaningful creative partnerships with the Culture Zone project partners. Throughout the project, dance has been in huge demand across sixteen Telford schools, and in response to this we have generated more than 3,000 educational experiences and over 40 performance events for children and young people. As a result of this success, work is currently underway to develop a new dance space in Telford.

Along with numerous dance workshops and very successful CPD days, key projects in 2006/07 were

- Raising the Roof Roadshows. Over two weekends in May 2006, Key Stage 2 students from all the Telford Culture. Zone schools were invited to an exciting day of Bollywood and Street Dance workshops and performances designed to encourage newcomers to both see and participate in dance. This stimulated a huge amount of interest in dance and was an overwhelming success.

- Bare Bones took up residency in Telford during a week in May 2006, delivering workshops at Wrockwardine Wood Arts College, Abraham Darby Arts College, and Burton Borough Arts College, teaching more than 200 secondary school students over the week. For many of the students this was their first experience with contemporary dance. Bare Bones The 5 Man Show also gave a matinee and evening performance at Wrockwardine Wood Arts College.
- Reading/Dancing Mission¹ DanceXchange Shropshire DAiR (Dance Artist in Residence) Emma Goodwin, and Telford and Wrekin Librarian Jane Baker delivered a series of groundbreaking workshops in the 2006 summer term, combining elements of reading and dancing based around the Library's Summer Reading Challenge, Spying Mission¹ A resource pack of information was also published

Professional Development

Throughout 2006/07, DanceXchange continued to support local dance artists and cultivate a community of dancers and choreographers in the West Midlands through a range of professional development activity. In September 2006, we employed a Professional Development Coordinator which has generated a more focused and consistent approach to professional development across the organisation. It has also been incredibly positive in building trust with West Midlands-based artists.

Youth Dance Coordinator

Funded by Youth Dance England, this role was created in May 2006 to lead on the development and implementation of a youth dance strategy for the West Midlands, and to build and facilitate links which will encourage an increase in extracurricular dance activity in the region. This post has delivered a number of successful networking and training events during 2006/07, and the coming year will see a period of intensive consultation leading to a 3-5 year development plan for youth dance in the region.



I ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Accounting

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost accounting rules in accordance with the Companies Act 1985, Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2005) and SORP 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities'

(b) Treatment of Grants

Capital grants are amortised over the length of life of the asset purchased Revenue grants are credited to the income and expenditure account for the year that they are received and to the appropriate year's activity that they are related

(d) Depreciation

Depreciation has been calculated on the following basis -

(e) Taxation

The company is registered as a charity with the Charity Commissioners and is not liable to corporation tax on its income arising from its normal activities
